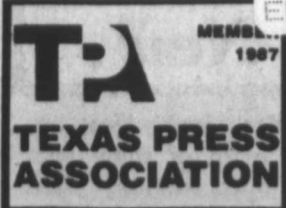


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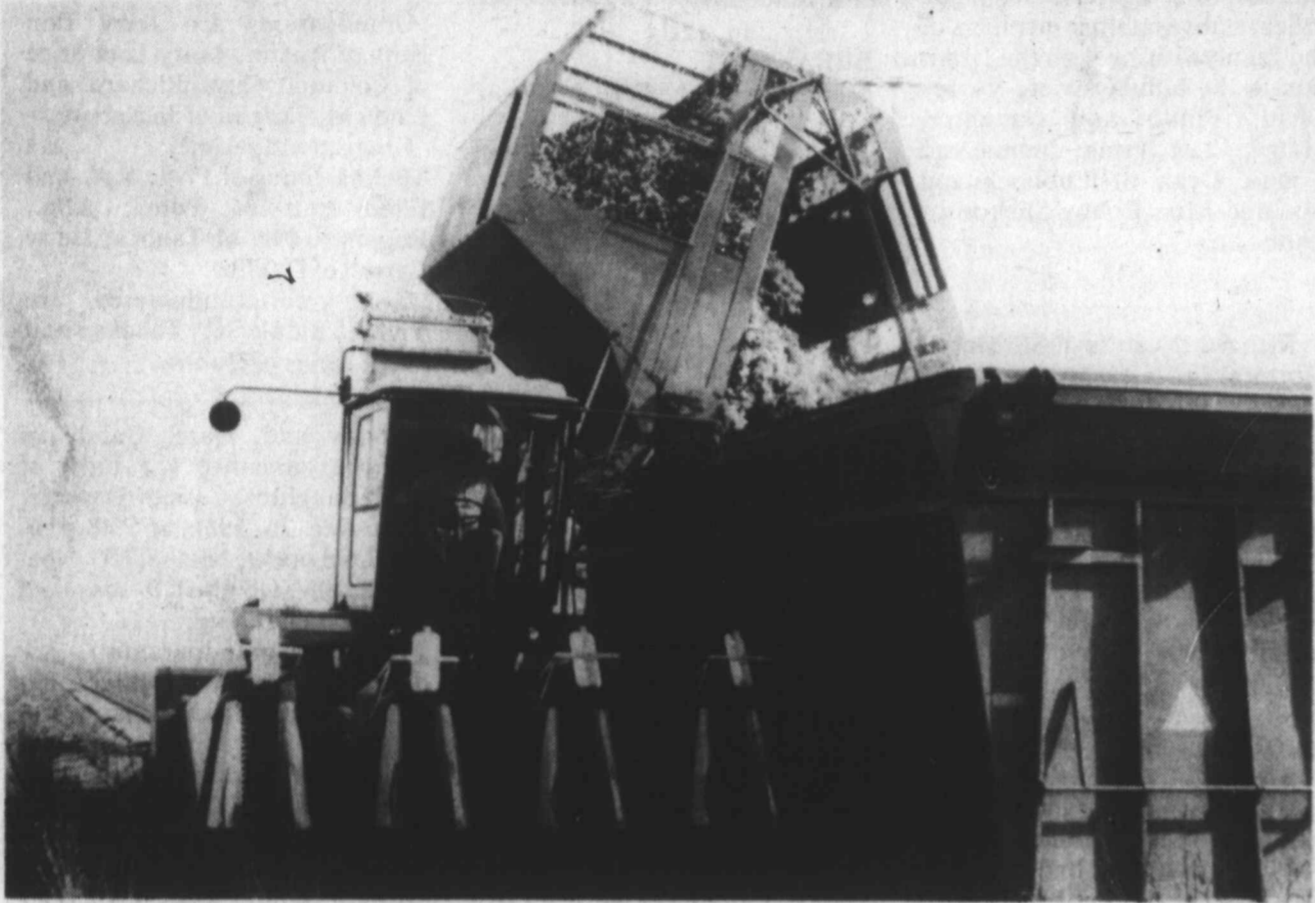

City Considers Manager Applicants

Tahoka City Council Monday night considered applications for the position of city manager of Tahoka and indicated a decision would be made this week on hiring a replacement for City Manager Carl Reynolds, who resigned in December to accept a position with First National Bank of Tahoka.

A called meeting of the city

council is scheduled for 7 a.m. Friday, at which time the council is expected to vote on hiring a new city manager.

Reynolds voluntarily appeared at the council meeting Monday night, a regular monthly session, along with acting city manager Melvin Burks, to answer any questions council members might have about activities which

Reynolds had dealt with prior to his resignation.

The council voted to set prices on lots at the new cemetery section at \$250 each, after this figure was recommended by the cemetery association. Lots in the currently used section of the cemetery have been priced at \$150. It is anticipated that the new cemetery section will be put into use possibly by late this summer.

A resolution backing the current status of Texas Tech as a major research university rather than have it classified as something less than that was approved by the council.

A contract for painting trim on city hall, expected to cost between \$1000 and \$1300, was approved.

Council voted approval to purchase a used 1980 Oldsmobile for use as a police car to replace a 1979 Plymouth needing repairs, and also authorized Mayor Jim Solomon and the city manager to negotiate on a new lease contract

Burglars Strike Four Places In Lynn County

Two homes near Wilson, a building near New Home and a service station in Tahoka were burglarized during the last week, and in one of these either a very strong burglar or team of two or more made off with a bulky item weighing several hundred pounds.

At a building owned by Feeders Supply, Inc., on FM 211 two miles west of U.S. 87 Sunday night someone took a Kellogg American gasoline-powered air compressor and also a submersible pump. The equipment was strung out over several feet and was heavy, according to investigating officers. The compressor was valued at \$2300 and the pump at \$250, and Crime Line, 998-5145, has offered a \$300 reward in the case.

Eight miles east of Wilson and a mile north, the home of Mark Brieger was burglarized New Year's Eve, with many items stolen from the house. One oddity noted was that while a component stereo system was stolen, including parts Pioneer, JVC and Sharp, only one of the two speakers was stolen. Other items missing included a VIC-20 computer keyboard, kitchen items including an electric skillet, clothing, a child's racing set, a 10-volume set of P.F. Collier encyclopedias, and Collier dictionary and children's books. Total value of the missing articles had not been determined. The home of Roy Pate, five

miles east of Wilson was reported Monday to have been burglarized, with missing items including a Remington 12-gauge

shotgun, two .22 rifles, some silver dollars, a VCR, and jewelry.

A burglary reportedly occurred at a Texaco station at U.S. 87 bypass and U.S. 380 in Tahoka, but no details were available from Tahoka Police Dept.

Four THS Band Members Honored

Four Tahoka band students have been nominated to play at South Plains College in the South Plains Honor Band Concert Saturday, Jan. 17, at 7 p.m. Those nominated were Charles Ray Ash, senior; Marisa Roberts, senior; Andrew Horwood, junior; and Lisa Carter, junior.

The concert is free of charge and area residents are urged to attend in support of the band members.

Fabian Rios, 21, of Wilson, was assessed a 10-year prison term, probated by District Judge George Hansard in Tahoka Tuesday. Rios pleaded guilty of the burglary of the home of Kelly Livingston in Wilson in September.

In addition to Rios, other persons in jail during the last week included one each for driving while intoxicated plus driving while license suspended, for no drivers license plus speeding, for traffic warrant, public intoxication and assault, and two persons for theft by checks.

Emergency Farm Loan Applications Being Taken

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by drought, wind, rain, flooding and hail are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office located in Tahoka, FmHA County Supervisor Curtis Barlow said last week.

Lynn County is one of 29 in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Richard E. Lyng as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the drought, wind, rain, flooding and hail.

Curtis Barlow said farmers may be eligible for loans up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate is 4.5 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan," Barlow said. Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance Programs will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until Aug. 12, 1987, but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season," Barlow said.

FmHA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to

for farmland owned by the city.

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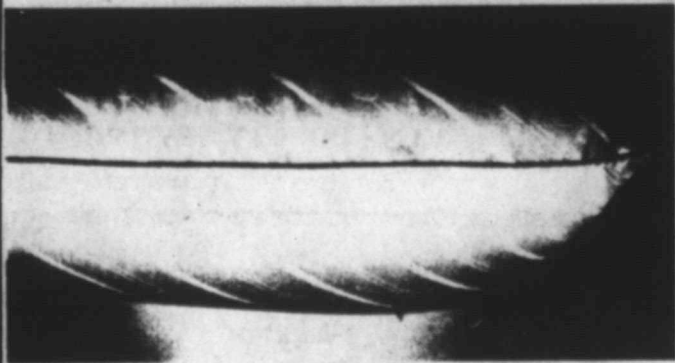
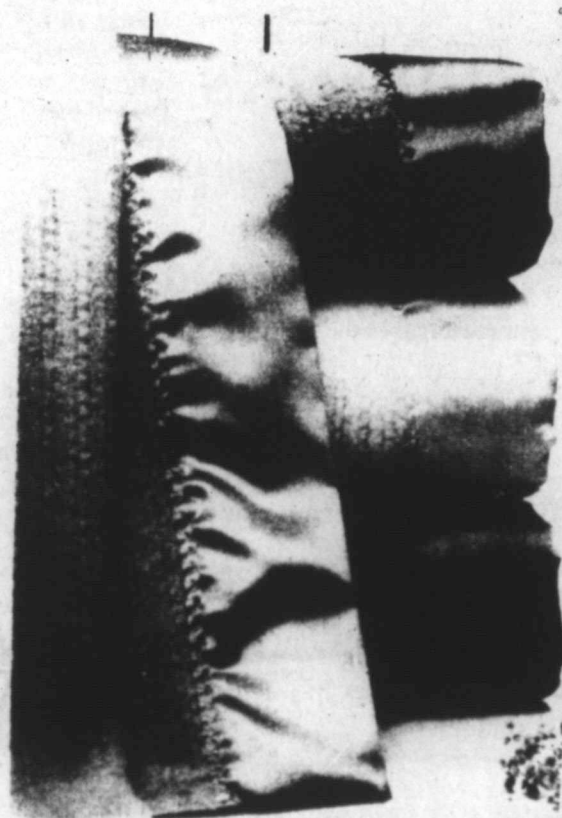
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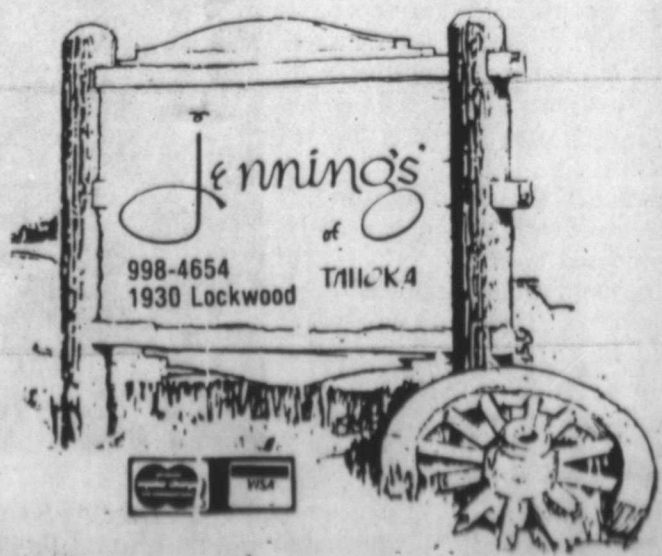
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"Everythin

An Exciting Moment In Texas History

It was the Texas Centennial year of 1936. Governor James V. Allred needed extra help in his office. He asked Senator Nelson of Lubbock to send him a good secretary. Sen. Nelson sent my grandmother, the late Olabelle Singleton Lamb of Tahoka. Gov. Allred liked her work so much she never went back to the senator's office.

My grandmother also became

Mrs. Allred's personal secretary in the mansion. Because the first lady did not like politics, grandmother helped entertain people like Mrs. Roosevelt, whom she said was most charming, Vice-President John Nance Garner and Oveta Clup Hobby. Lyndon Johnson was a frequent visitor.

Each of the governor's secretaries had a Centennial project. My grandmother kept scrapbooks for the Allred administration for her project. She thought it was so important that she kept them for all of his four year term in office. Because of her the scrapbooks are on loan for five years to the Muleshoe area Public Library. Then they will be sent to the Allred collection in Houston.

The other Centennial project my grandmother had was to research the life of Sam Houston for Paramount Studios. The premier was shown in San Antonio and all the Allred staff attended. Later she got a VIP tour of the studio in Hollywood. Grandmother Olabelle was not an average person. She had muscular dystrophy and was at the top of her high school and college classes.

She was very patriotic. She would not walk over the state seal in the capitol. Newspapers even wrote about her patriotism, but she had muscular dystrophy and was scared to walk over it because it was so slick.

This was all thrilling for a young lady from a small West Texas town of Tahoka to be part of Texas Centennial — an exciting moment in Texas history.

COTTON NEEDS ADEQUATE FERTILIZER

A well-managed fertility program is one of several key practices essential for profitable cotton production, says a cotton specialist. Adequate amounts of nutrients at the right time or growth stage are essential in developing healthy, productive plants. Producers should order fertilizer now and get some of it down early this winter. All the phosphate, potash and a portion of the nitrogen needed can be applied now. Producers should follow soil test recommendations and should take into account yield goals and soil types.

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DON'T PRESCRIBE YOUR OWN SPECIAL DIET — Do-it-yourself special diets to treat self-diagnosed medical problems usually don't work, are often costly and can be harmful. If you have a medical problem that requires a special diet, such as hypertension, diabetes or heart disease, the only proper way to get that diet is from a physician, says nutritionist Mary K. Sweeten. "Because special diets are used to treat or manage medical problems, they should be prescribed by a doctor and be considered a part of your medical treatment," advises the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service specialist. Borrowing or sharing special diet plans is not recommended, she says, even if a family member or

friend has the same medical problem.

TEXAS AG SHOULD IMPROVE IN '87—Texas farmers and ranchers should see somewhat better times in the year ahead, says an economist. Higher cattle prices and better cotton markets are the main reasons for the improved prospects. Although grain prices will remain under pressure from too many supplies, government payments will support income. Production expenses will be held in check by low rates of inflation. Because market prices will remain depressed, participation in farm programs will be high.

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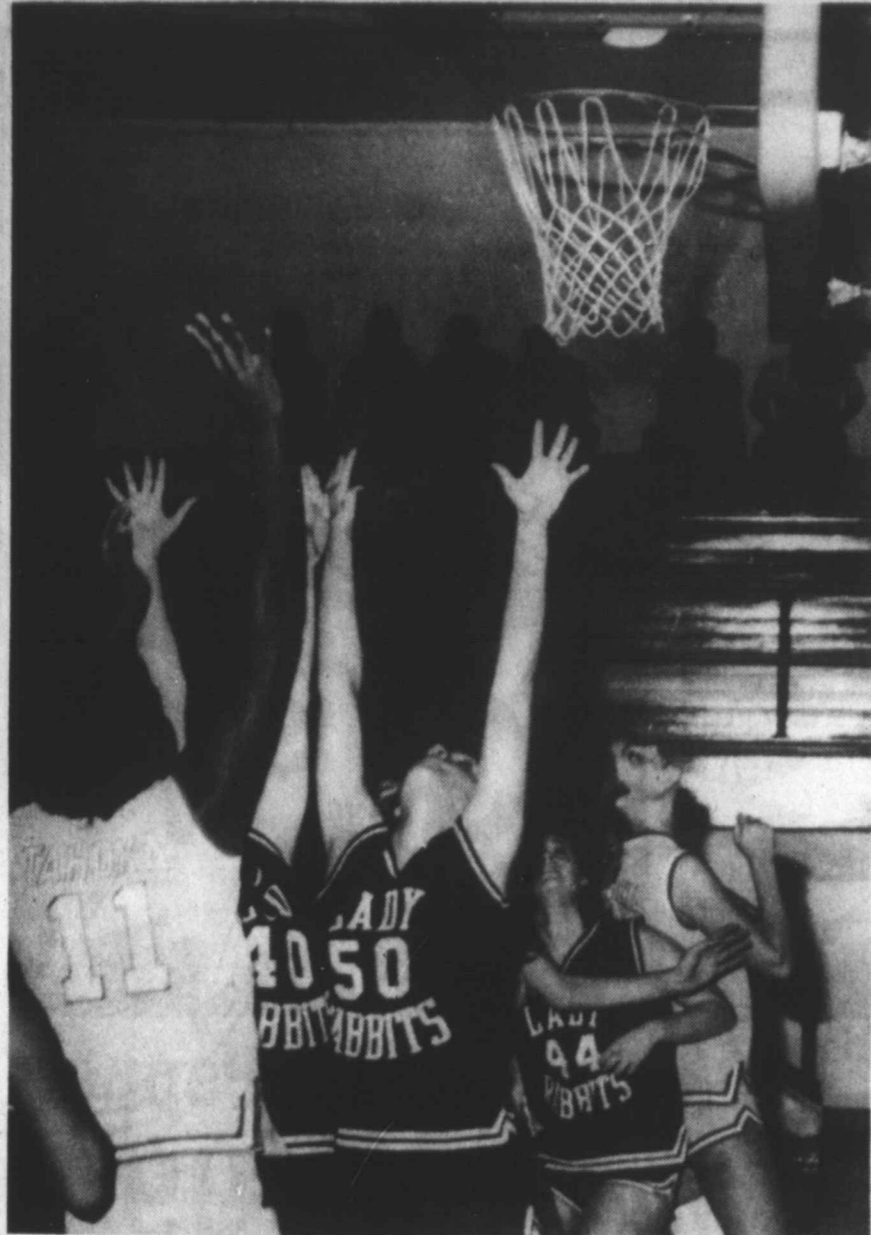

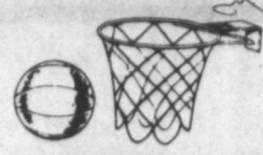

It is called direct deposit and it is a voluntary program that allows you to have your Social Security or SSI check deposited directly into a checking or savings account at a financial organization.

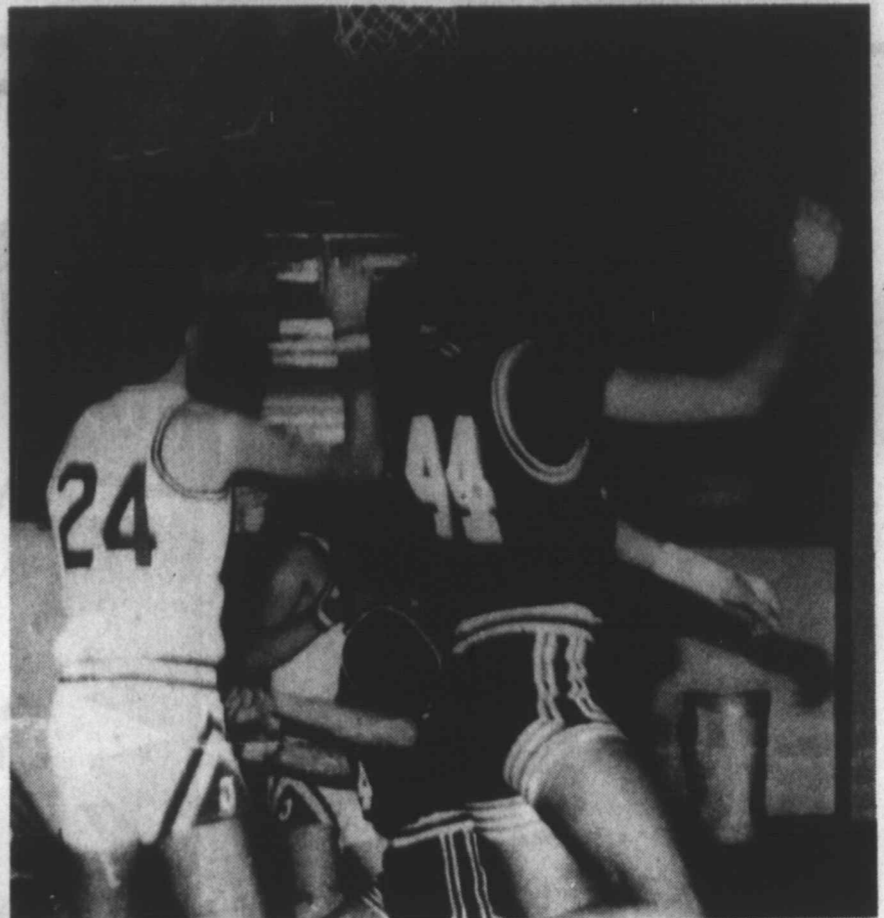
Bogus Invoice

voices from a company called American Better Business Publications of Alameda, California. The fake invoice is for a manual entitled, "Entrepreneurialship Within The Corporate Structure." The invoice is for \$197.50. Business managers are encouraged to inform their bookkeepers in order to avoid mistakenly paying the bogus invoice.

Business Practices - Consumer Outlook for 1987
The new year will bring some new marketing concepts to the South Plains as well as an increase in some old marketing tactics.

The newest method of marketing goods will be the television auction programs. The cable industry will be promoting several auction programs across the country with some auctions running 24-hours per day. Consumers must use the same common sense when dealing with these television auction promotions that they use with any other marketing plan. Consumers should note that the "regular" prices quoted by the "auctioneers" are usually greatly inflated. Unfortunately, when viewing a television auction, it is difficult when a consumer sees an item that appeals to him or her, to do any comparative shopping.

The mail order industry will continue to grow. The newest direct mail solicitation method involves companies sending real checks to prospective customers. When the customer endorses the check, he or she agrees to a contract to purchase whatever item or service is being marketed. This is reminiscent of the practice in which businesses used to send unsolicited credit cards to consumers. The potential for problems with this new type of promotion is, in the view of the BBB, substantial.

To arrange for direct deposit, all you have to do is complete a direct deposit form SF-1199. You can get this form at your financial organization and the people there will help you fill it out. Your monthly social security or SSI check contains all the information you will need for the direct deposit form. Once the form is completed, it takes about 60 to 90 days for the check to be changed to the financial organization. You continue to receive your checks at home until the change.

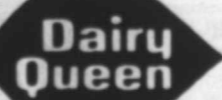

COFFEE LIGHTNERS CAN ADD FAT--Although powdered non-dairy coffee lightners can boast that they contain no cholesterol, they may still help elevate blood cholesterol levels, says a nutritionist. "The coconut oil commonly used in these products is even more saturated than the fat in cream," says Dr. Alice Hunt. "The more saturated the fat, the more it works in saturated the fat, the more it works to raise blood cholesterol." She notes that powdered non-dairy coffee creamers are often used in the workplace because they require no refrigeration. As an alternative, the nutritionist suggests bringing a box of nonfat dry milk powder to lighten coffee at the office. It contains very little fat, virtually no cholesterol, and does not require refrigeration. At home or when eating out, low-fat evaporated milk, low fat or skim milk are also alternatives to the non-dairy creamer.

VOLATILE COTTON MARKET

The current cotton market is volatile, and that makes it all the more important for producers to stay up with what is happening, says an economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System. Cotton consumption is rising at an accelerated rate, pushing world cotton trade to a higher level while reducing stocks. U.S. prospects look good for regaining the past market share of about 30 percent of the projected 23 million bales of cotton traded internationally. Higher market prices will likely increase plantings in 1987.
