**COPTER AMBULANCE**--This Flight for Life helicopter owned and operated by St. Mary's Hospital in Lubbock was demonstrated last Wednesday at Lynn County Hospital. The same kind as is used for rescue missions in the mountains, the Alouette 3 chopper cruises at 120 mph; it can go from Tahoka to Lubbock in 15 minutes. It will hold two patients and is a fully equipped flight ambulance with a crew of a pilot, a paramedic and one flight nurse. ## 10th Annual Stock Show Activities Now Underway

Judging in the Lynn County Livestock Show for 1987 will get underway today (Thursday) at 6 p.m. when the steer judging opens the show, which actually began Wednesday with weighing of steers and lambs. Lamb judging will begin at 7 p.m.

The largest segment of the show, the barrow competition, will take place at 9 a.m. Friday. Also at 11 a.m. Friday will be judging in the baked goods division. Baked items will then go on sale at 2 p.m.

The Pee Wee Barrow Show for children under nine years of age is scheduled 30 minutes after the barrow judging. (Barrows will be furnished.)

### Barbecue Planned

At 11:30 a.m. Saturday the popular barbecue luncheon will begin, with serving to continue for at least an hour.

Immediately following the barbecue will be the annual sale of animals and presentation of awards. The auction always is a big event with the results showing the youngsters how their efforts are appreciated by business and individuals in this agricultural area.

### Plaques and Belt Buckles

Lynn County Farm Bureau will present belt buckles and plaques to grand champions and reserve grand champions. Buckles will be presented for showmanship in each division.

Special donations have been made by First National Bank of Tahoka, Wilson State Bank, Production Credit Assn. of Tahoka and First National Bank of O'Donnell for the financing of the show.

Harold Sanders, president of the Livestock Assn. said he is hoping for a good turnout by the public at all events in the show.

## Daylight Burglars Hit Another Home

Latest in a series of daylight burglaries of rural homes in Lynn County, mostly in the north portion of the county, was reported this week.

The Wallace Schafer residence on U.S. 87 14 miles north of Tahoka, just inside Lynn County, was burglarized between 10:30 a.m. and 3 p.m. Monday. A triple-locked front door was pried open. Among the missing items were a stereo and speakers, 20-gauge shotgun, .22 automatic rifle, three men's suits, two ladies coats. A microwave had been unplugged but was left, indicating the burglars may have been frightened away.

Crime Line, 998-5145, is offering a \$500 reward in this case. Anyone with any information is reminded they do not have to identify themselves when they call. They will be assigned a number which will be used to pay the reward if their tip clears the case.

Henry Valdez, 1807 S. 1st St., reported last Thursday that on Jan. 14 someone broke a window out of his 1982 Chevrolet.

Tahoka police arrested a 21-year-old Lubbock man on Thursday for felony possession of marijuana after the subject was reported to have run a red light at U.S. 380 and Main. Eric Lyn Wright was booked and jailed and was charged with possession of marijuana, DWI first offense and El Paso DPS warrants. Police arrested a 25-year-old

female of Tahoka on Tuesday for speeding, failure to appear and unrestrained child (under two years).

Police arrested a 36 year-old Tahoka man on Tuesday for theft by check.

Police are also currently investigating a forgery case where a check was passed at Summitt Venture Foods during the past week. No arrests had been made at press time.

## City, School Candidates Now May Sign Up

Candidates for city and school board elections now may sign up, and those seeking city council or city commission or mayor posts were warned that the filing deadline is Feb. 18, a full 45 days before the April 4 elections in Tahoka New Home, Wilson and O'Donnell.

School board candidates in those school districts also may file now, but they have until midnight March 4 to sign up.

Early this week no candidates had filed for the Tahoka city council or the school board. Terms are expiring on the Tahoka city council for Dalton Wood, for the seat now vacant, formerly held by Jim Thomas, and Mayor Jim Solomon's term also is scheduled to expire.

Terms of Tahoka school board members J.E. Nance Jr. and Jim Wells also are scheduled to expire.

School board members are elected for three-year terms. City council and mayor terms are two years.

Terms of O'Donnell school board members David Franklin, and Finis Rogers are scheduled to expire, along with Tommy Woolam, Billy Edwards and David M. Smith, city council members. No one has filed in either of the positions.

New Home's Mayor, Clifton Clem, and two aldermen's terms are expiring, Freddie Kieth and Lee Roy Nettles, they have filed for re-election. Terms of school board members Danny Nettles and George Dozier are scheduled to expire. Dozier is filling an unexpired term. They have not filed for re-election.

The term of Wilson's Mayor, Jackie Bishop, will expire along with terms of Victor Steinhauser, Lonnie Paul Donald, and Charlene Webb. The terms of Keith Wied and Servando Benavides are expiring on the Wilson school board. No one has filed for these places.

It also said they are about 15 inches long, not counting a 6-inch tail.

So the mystery is solved. A groundhog is a woodchuck. This still doesn't tell me where to go to see one coming out of his hole Monday. It would be nice to be present to explain to the critter how weird his logic is.

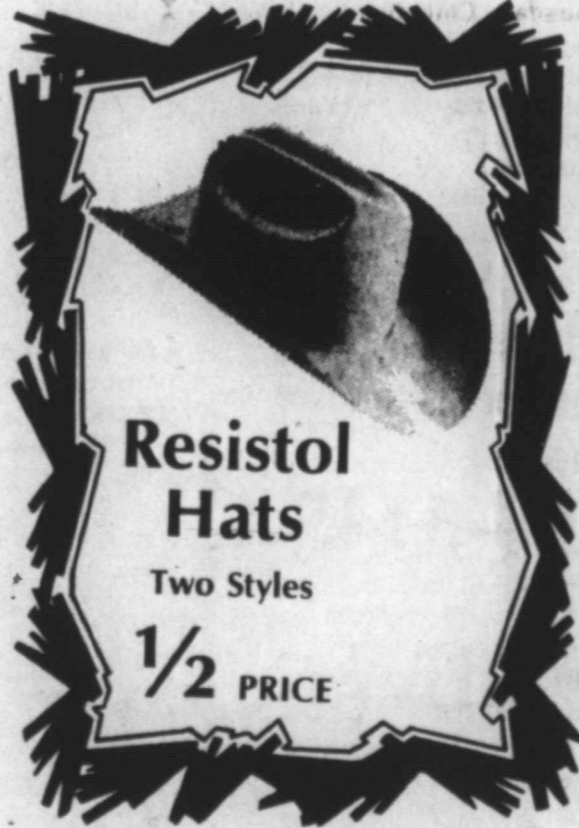

The Tahoka varsity girls lost a hard fought game to Morton Tuesday night 62-71. Morton led at the half 40-36. The Lady Bulldogs came back in the third quarter to lead 10-9 but fell behind in the final quarter 16-22. High scorers for Tahoka were Lawson with 24 points, 10 rebounds; Tesha Hood 16 points, 9 assists and Tammi Hood 9 points, 9 assists. Jolly had 11 rebounds and Teaff, 10.

"The girls played a fantastic game. The rebounding, shooting and free shot percent were up. They really played hard for 32 minutes. These girls are representing us very well," said Coach Shedd.

The next game will be Friday at Ralls.

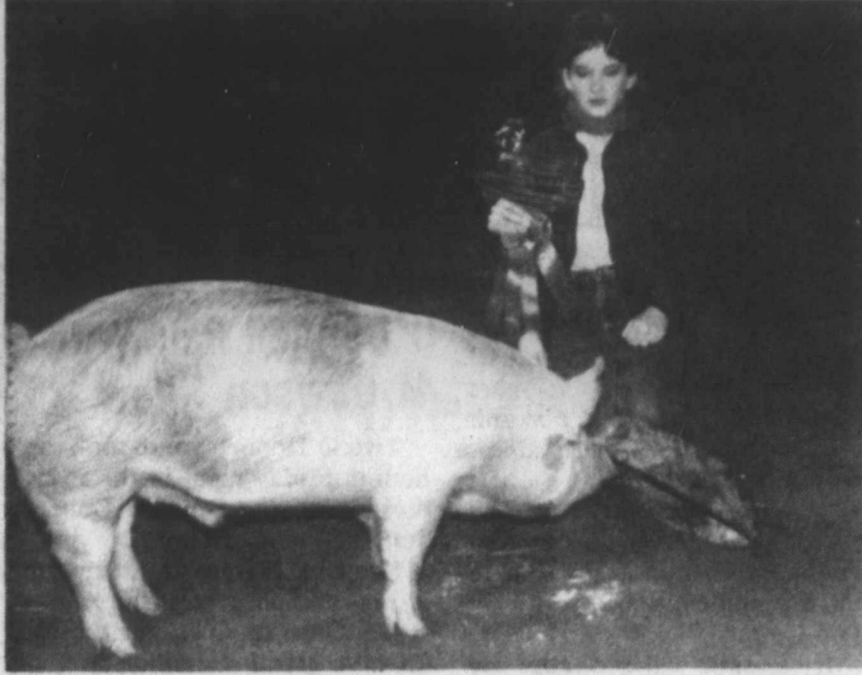

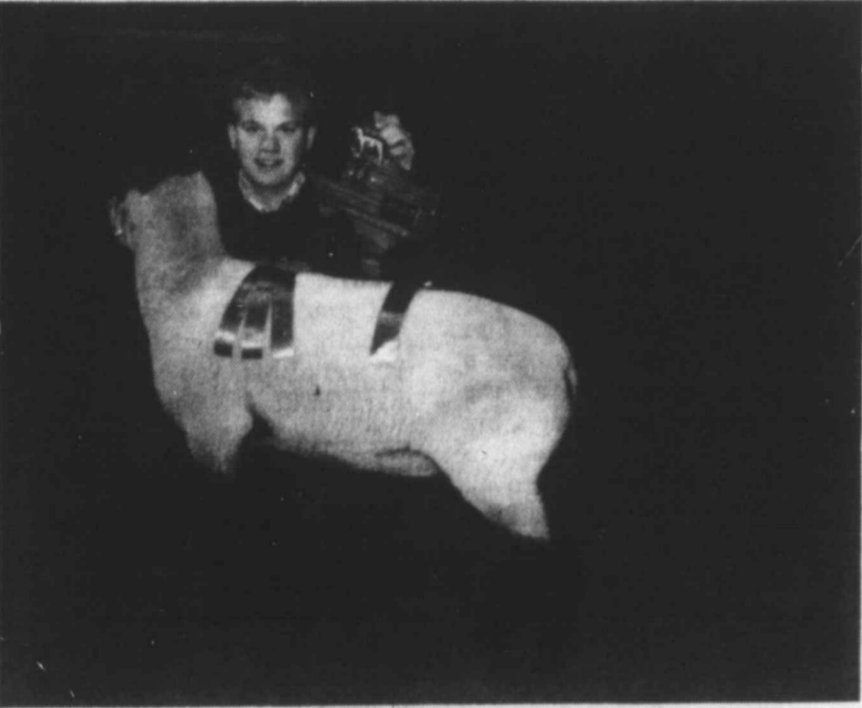
