Officers Seek Suspect In New Rural Burglary

Lynn County officers had the name of a Lubbock suspect in one of the latest of a recent rash of rural home burglaries in the county and were trying to locate the subject this week. They hope to clear up at least some of the recent wave of break-ins which have seen several residents return home to find their houses ransacked and major items such as TVs and microwaves missing.

The home of A.C. Fillingim Sr., a mile north of FM 211 and a half mile east of FM 179 was burglarized between 10 a.m. and 10:30 a.m. Monday. A witness reported seeing a gray 1978

Chevrolet pickup occupied by two Hispanic males leaving the residence with a TV set visible in the back. He followed the vehicle into Lubbock County and when he tried to pass, he said they attempted to run him off the road.

Officers checked out the license number and were seeking the suspect, but also were offering a \$500 Crime Line reward for more information in the case. Stolen were a Zenith 25-inch TV, Whirlpool microwave, and electric screwdriver and a tie bolo, with all stolen items valued at a total of \$1215.

Another \$500 reward is offered

by Crime Line, 998-5145, in the burglary last Thursday of the home of Nicky Patterson, located on FM 2192 near the Lynn-Lubbock County line. The crime was between 10 a.m. and noon, and residents of the area reported seeing a black van in the vicinity which may have been connected to the break-in. Items stolen included two television sets, a stereo, a VCR and cassettes, speakers and a girl's 1966 Slaton class ring with the initials "JCW".

Arrested in Slaton this week on a warrant from Lynn County was Florencio Maldonado, 31, of Slaton, who was brought to Lynn County jail. He was charged with burglary of a habitation in the county around the first of the year.

Lancé Kieth of New Home reported a spare tire stolen from his pickup parked at the Lynn County stock show last Thursday. (See **BURGLARIES**, page 4)

A HEADLINE IN last Sunday's Lubbock Avalanche-Journal read "Solution from cows may be used as blood in humans." Now, after reading the story, I know this is serious business, but to many of us, this announcement opens up a whole new world of weird possibilities.

Tech Coach Spike Dykes To Speak At Banquet Here

Texas Tech head football coach Spike Dykes will be principal speaker at the annual Tahoka Chamber of Commerce banquet scheduled for April 3.

Dykes, former defensive coordinator for the Red Raiders, was named head coach after David McWilliams quit to take the head coaching job at the University of Texas. He told Tahoka chamber officials last week he "would be very happy to speak" at the annual banquet.

Another highlight of the banquet will be announcement of the Man of the Year and Woman of the Year for 1986. Clubs, organizations and individuals are urged to submit their nominations for these honors as soon as possible, said Chamber President Weldon Self.

Nominations may be submitted in writing to the chamber office, Box 777, Tahoka, or to any chamber officer or board member.

Tickets to the banquet in Tahoka school cafeteria are priced at \$8.50 per plate in advance, or \$9.50 at the door. Advance tickets will be available starting Monday from Chamber officers and board members.

Over the years, the Chamber has honored citizens in the county and community in a variety of ways, sometimes giving awards to Man of the Year and Woman of the Year, sometimes limiting it to

one award and calling it Citizen of the Year, and sometimes giving special awards to Outstanding Conservation Farmer of the Year and Homemaker of the Year, awards which now are presented at the annual banquet of the Soil and Water Conservation District.

Clint Walker was the first recipient of the Man of the Year award, getting this honor in 1970. Others designated as Man of the Year were: 1976—Meldon Leslie; 1978—Winston Wharton; 1979—Harold Roberts; 1980—Richard White; 1981—Jim Solomon; 1982—Carl Reynolds; 1983—Bill Craig; 1986—Maurice Huffaker.

Chamberettes To Meet Tuesday

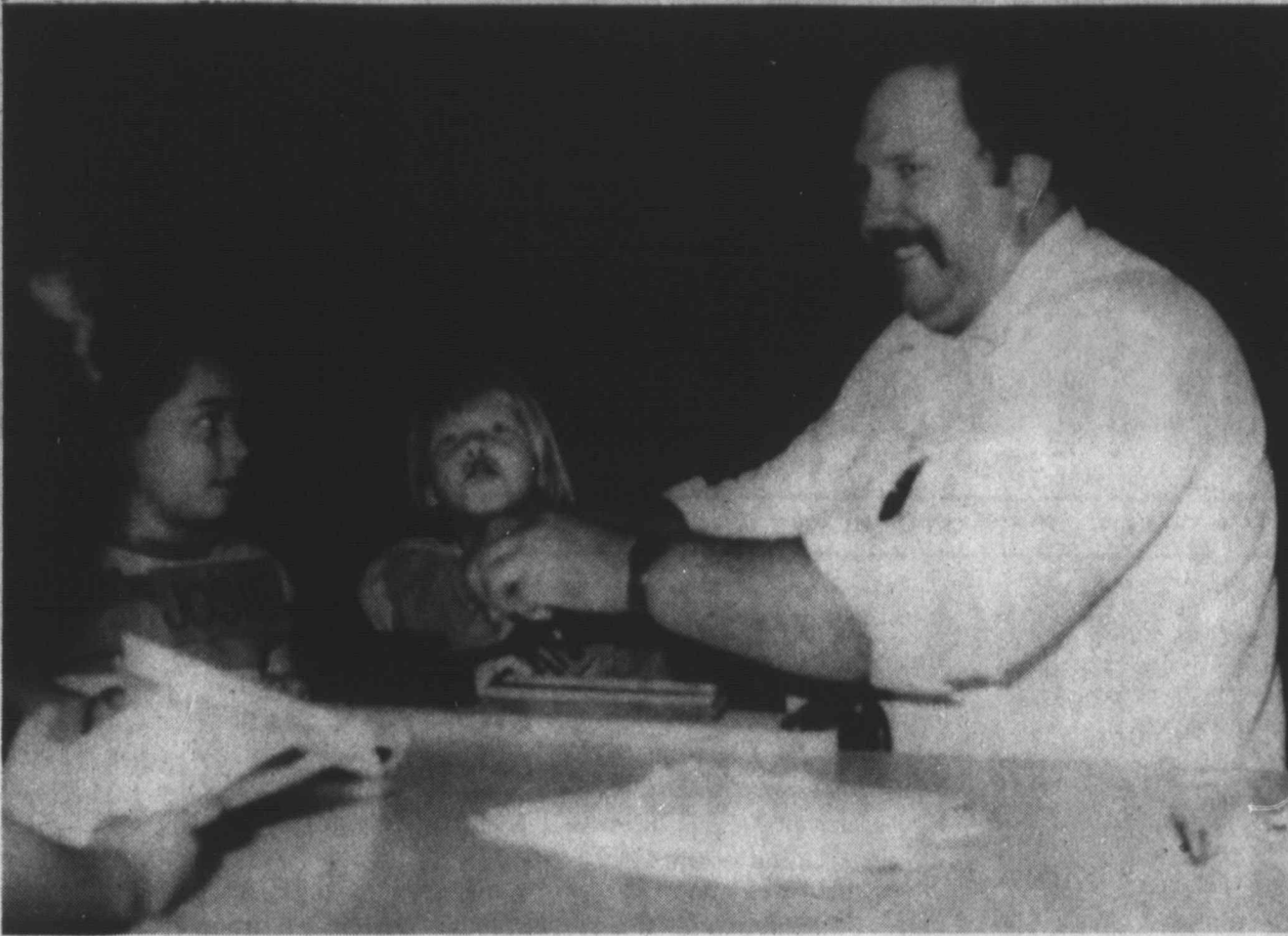

Most of these clubs began as reading groups, but they gradually became more involved in legislative areas and in their communities. The Phebe K. Warner Club was organized in 1922 as part of the "old seventh" district. It is now a member, with 42 other clubs, of the Caprock District which was formed in 1960. Bingo Tax Rebate Told

State Comptroller Bob Bullock sent checks totaling \$1,343,538 to 95 cities and 66 counties out of the 119 cities and 71 counties that have legalized charity bingo and levy the two-percent local gross receipts tax on the game.

As of Jan. 30 a total of 1,576 non-profit organizations were licensed to hold bingo games in Texas.

City Finances Are Reported In Good Shape

The City of Tahoka operated within its budget during the last year and is in good condition, council members were told Monday night as the annual audit of finances was reported and accepted.

Presented by Joe Hays of the firm of Love, Hays and Schaffner, the audit showed the city has \$25,000 more in working capital available than at the end of the previous year, and no stipulations or recommendations of changes in procedures were made by the auditing firm.

"The city's financial position has never been stronger," said Mayor Jim Solomon. "We do have a long way to go, however, with capital expenditures such as a new street sweeper, garbage truck, backhoe and fire truck coming up in the near future."

City councilmen Monday night set the annual election of city officers for April 4, and noted that the deadline for filing for one of the two council seats up for election or for the mayor's post is Feb. 18. Terms of Mayor Solomon, councilman Dalton

Wood and the seat formerly held by Jim Thomas are up for election.

One candidate, Milt Uzzle, had filed for city council by Tuesday.

The council Monday also heard a monthly report from Police Chief Gary Morrison and discussed the fire department communications.

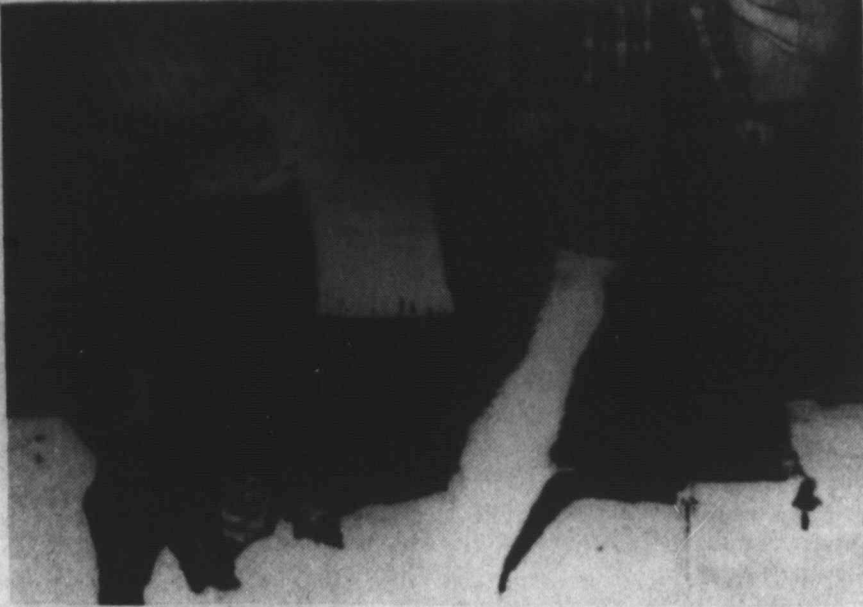

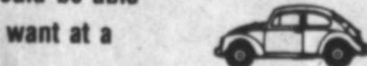

FARM COMPUTER TRAINING--Farmers and ranchers can learn more about using microcomputers as management tools by attending special training sessions in the coming months conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in cooperation with the Texas

Agricultural Experiment Station. The sessions are three-day short courses at the Stiles Farm Computer Training Center at Thrall, about 6 miles east of Taylor on U.S. 79. The short courses are designed to provide in-depth subject matter training and hands-on microcomputer use of software available from the private sector and Texas A&M University, says an Extension economist. County Extension offices have a schedule of the various short courses and registration information.

EXTENSION LAB DOES SOIL, WATER, FORAGE TESTING--Helping farmers and ranchers increase the efficiency of their operations is a major goal of the Soil, Water and Forage Testing Laboratory operated by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at Texas A&M University.

The Extension Service also operates a Soil Testing Lab at Lubbock. Costs of various tests are determined by the specific analyses requested. Information sheets on specific analyses and collection and mailing instructions are available at any county Extension office. Soil testing is important for the most economical use of fertilizer while forage testing allows producers to better plan winter feeding programs.

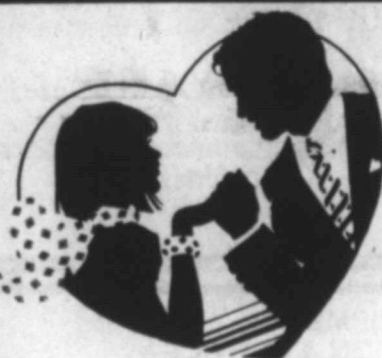

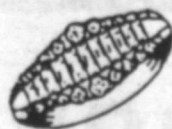
