Officers Believe Arrests To Clear Most Of Recent Rural Burglaries

Arrests of four suspects during the last week plus another arrest the previous week probably will clear most of the recent burglaries of rural homes in Lynn County, plus some in Lubbock, Terry, Hockley and Hale counties.

This was the assessment of Lynn County Sheriff Clifford Laws, who said four Lubbock men were in jail this week in lieu of \$50,000 bond set for each by Justice of the Peace H.W. Edwards, all on charges of burglary of a habitation.

Arrested in the recent burglary of the A.C. Fillingim home near New Home was Raul Wilson Jr., 27, who at the time of his arrest was free on bond on a Lubbock County burglary charge.

The other three suspects arrested this week were nabbed in a van containing stolen goods and headed for Lubbock around noon Sunday. A deputy on patrol in the New Home area heard on the radio that Lubbock officers had stopped a van on FM 179 just inside Lubbock County and headed north. At that time, no new burglary reports had been turned in, but shortly after that the Lynn sheriff's office was notified that the home of Dale Martin Hollar, four miles south of Lakeview on 179 had been burglarized sometime after 10 a.m. Items in the van, including a TV set and stereo system, were then identified as having been stolen from the Hollar home.

The three men in the van were charged and remained in jail this week at Tahoka. They are Juan Leyna Garcia, 33, Francisco Lopez, 27, and Daniel Gonzales Martinez, 40. Martinez and Garcia are on parole on burglary charges, officers said.

"I would like to thank the citizens of the county for calling in license plate numbers of

suspicious vehicles," said Sheriff Laws. "And, although these latest arrests apparently will clear up many of the recent burglaries, I would urge citizens to continue to be alert and to call in. We also want to thank the citizens who have started a Neighborhood Crime Watch in the county. This is a good program and we support it fully."

In an incident related to the jailing of the burglary suspects, alert action by a deputy at the jail resulted in arrest of two other

persons for auto theft. Two women visited one of the burglary suspects, Raul Wilson Jr., at the jail Sunday afternoon, and the deputy noticed that the car driven by the women, a 1981 Chevrolet, had no front license plate.

On checking the rear license plate, he learned that it was registered to another vehicle. Further checking of the vehicle identification number showed that the car had been stolen in Brownfield last Sept. 30. The two Lubbock women were arrested and held for Terry County authorities, who claimed them Monday. Charged with theft over \$750 were Santos Castilleja Lara, 45, and Jessica Moya Gallegos, 44.

Officers expressed the opinion that the arrest of the two women would clear up vehicle theft cases in several area counties.

Fourteen persons were in jail during the week, including those mentioned above, plus two for public intoxication, and one each for theft by check, aggravated assault plus bond forfeiture, DWI second offense, no seat belt and failure to appear, no drivers license and failure to appear, and one serving out jail time on a DWI charge.

Tahoka police investigated an accident on Friday at U.S. 87 access road and U.S. 380 that involved a 1981 Pontiac driven by Dusty Cook of Tahoka and a 1975 Chevrolet driven by Rafael Garcia of Tahoka. No injuries were reported.

Two Tahoka men were arrested on Thursday for public intoxication after they had reportedly run into a gas pump at the Texaco station in a 1979 Ford.

One person was arrested by police during the past week for DWI.

Tickets issued during the past week include two for failure to control speed, one for failure to yield right of way and improper turn-wrong lane, and one ticket each for running stop sign, running red light, defective vehicle and no drivers license.

Candidates Sign Up For April Elections

The City of Wilson had more candidates sign up for the April 3 election, but in Tahoka no new candidates had filed by Tuesday, for either the city council or the Tahoka School board.

Terms of Tahoka School board members J.E. Nance Jr. and Jim Wells are scheduled to expire. Neither these nor any other candidates had filed, but the school board candidates may file up to March 3. City candidates in Tahoka, New Home, O'Donnell and Wilson must file by Feb. 18, next Wednesday, in order to get their names on the April 3 ballot.

Terms of Jim Thomas and Dalton Wood and the term of Mayor Jim Solomon are to expire in the Tahoka city government. Only candidate to file by Tuesday was Milt Uzzle for city council.

No one has filed for places on the Wilson School Board. The terms of Keith Wied and Servando Benavides are expiring.

No candidates have filed for the expired term of Jackie Bishop, Wilson Mayor, but Charlene Webb, Roy Isham, Oscar Ortega, Arthur Castillo and Victor Steinhauer have filed to fill the expired terms of Victor Steinhauer, Lonnie Paul Donald and Charlene Webb.

George Dozier has filed for reelection to the school board in New Home.

SOME PEOPLE like small cars, mainly because they are economical and easy to park and handle better than most large cars. Other people like big cars because they are safer (and because they like to run over people?) and because they think big cars are more comfortable on a long trip.

Without arguing the merits of either (we have a small car and biggie in our garage), here's a deal for you folks who want a really big car: a two-bedroom Buick. We saw the following ad in a Lubbock newspaper last week: "MUST SELL extra clean 1984 Riviera, two bedroom, two bath. Take over payments..."

ACCORDING to the magazine Bits & Pieces, a millionaire named Elmer Kelen once commissioned a young Hungarian artist, Arpad Sebesy, to do a portrait of him, but when the picture was finished, Kelen didn't like it.

"That's a rotten portrait and I refuse to pay for it," Kelen said, turning to leave the studio. Sebesy thought of the wasted weeks of effort and the money he would not be getting for the painting. Bitterly he recalled that the millionaire had only posed three times, so the painting had been mostly from memory. Still, he thought, it was not a bad likeness.

"One minute! he called out. 'Will you give me a letter say-

ing you refused the portrait because it didn't resemble you?' Glad to get off so easily, Kelen complied.

A few months later the Society of Hungarian Artists opened an exhibition in Budapest, and Kelen's phone started to ring. He quickly went to the gallery and headed for the section where a Sebesy painting was on display. It was the one he had rejected.

He glanced at the title and turned purple. Storming into the office of the gallery manager, he demanded that the portrait be removed at once. The manager said all the paintings were under contract to be on display for six weeks.

"But it will make me the laughing stock of Budapest," Kelen raged. "It's libelous, and I'll sue!"

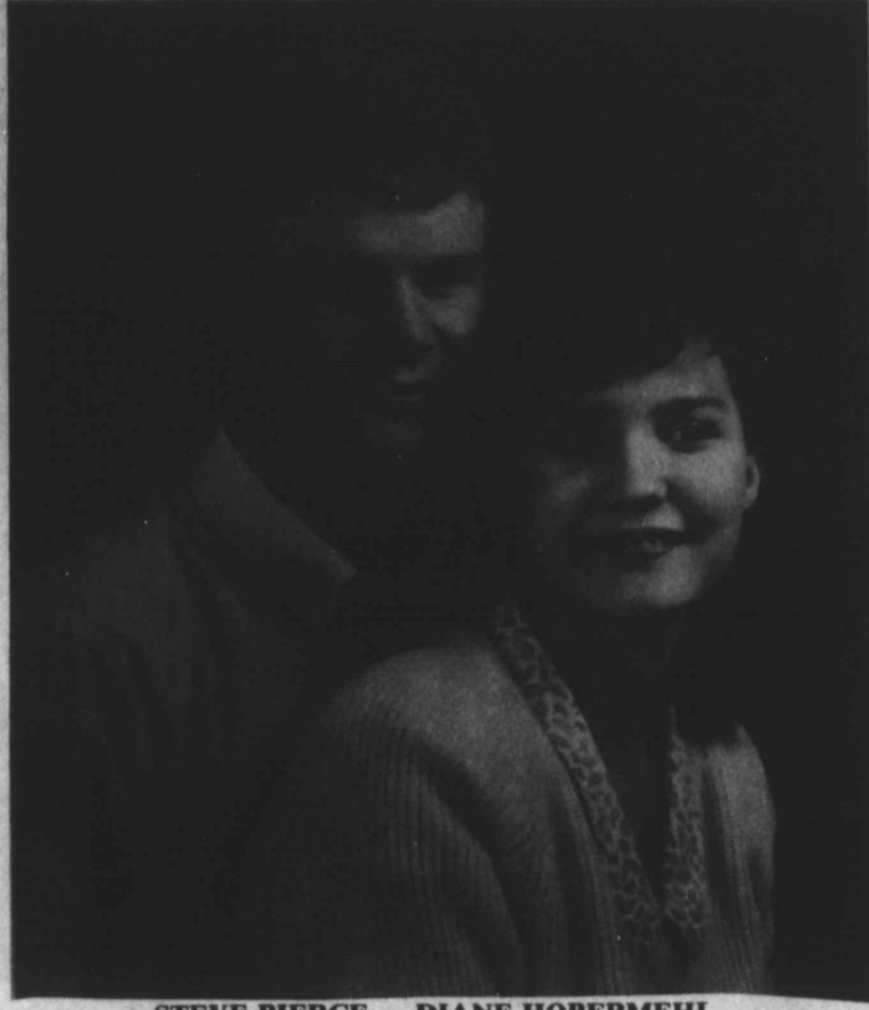
But the manager pulled out the letter Kelen had given the artist. "Since you yourself have said that the portrait does not look like you," he said coldly, "you have no jurisdiction over its fate."

In desperation Kelen offered to buy the painting, only to find its price 10 times what it had been originally. But with his reputation at stake, he wrote out a check.

Not only did the artist sell the rejected portrait to the man who had commissioned it, but he also achieved his revenge simply by showing it with the title "Portrait of a Thief."

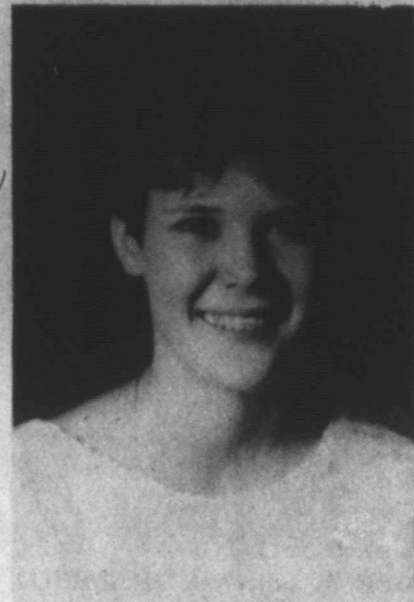

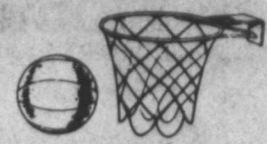

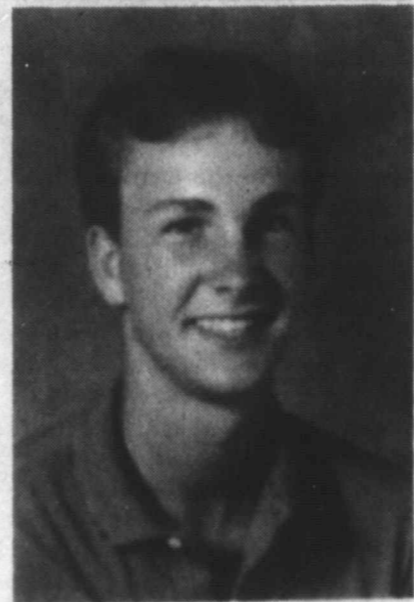

WINTER FEEDING OF FISH-- Winter feeding need not be a daily routine for fish farmers. Instead, they need to feed only when fish will eat, says a fisheries specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Fish will eat on warm sunny days during the winter. They will feed best in shallow water areas because that is where water will warm up most rapidly. Since fish feed more slowly in the winter, provide enough feed for about a 30-minute feeding period. Without winter feed, fish can lose up to 15 percent of their body weight.

Capitol Journal

More than 2000 voters have responded to questionnaires mailed out by this office in late December. Many people attached thoughtful letters about areas of special concern, while even more people added welcome comments in the margins. These comments and responses are extremely helpful in reaching decisions regarding some of the State's more pressing problems.

Tallying the responses from such a large number of questionnaires will take a bit of time to complete, but some consensus opinions of the 78th District voters are readily apparent. For example, over 90 percent of those responding favor keeping the Homestead provisions of the Texas constitution in tact. That puts the 78th District solidly in line with the coalition of retired persons, farm organizations, consumer groups, labor groups, the Texas Democratic Party, and the recently convened Silver-Haired Legislature in opposing the out-of-state banking and consumer finance lobbies. In spite of the traditional opposition to monkeying with Texas' Homestead protection law, the finance lobby is feeling its oats after a successful assault on branch banking prohibitions during last fall's special session and will make an all-out effort to get a foot in the door of Texas' homeowners with new second-mortgage laws.

The new Texas Presidential Primary law is already having an effect on the field of Presidential aspirants. Due to a change in the law which I and other members of the House Elections Committee successfully advocated, Texas will have one of the earliest

Presidential primaries in the Nation in March of 1988. Former Arizona Governor and Presidential hopeful Bruce Babbitt dropped by the House Chamber last week at the invitation of the House Democratic Caucus. Babbitt is a former Texas resident and maintains some close connections in the state. Like other '88 contenders, he views Texas' early primary as a key to the nomination. Presidential candidates can be expected to make Texas issues like agriculture, energy, and relations with Mexico top priorities.

Since the introduction of the bill to do away with the teacher career ladder, I have received quite a few comments supporting the bill and practically none opposing it. 

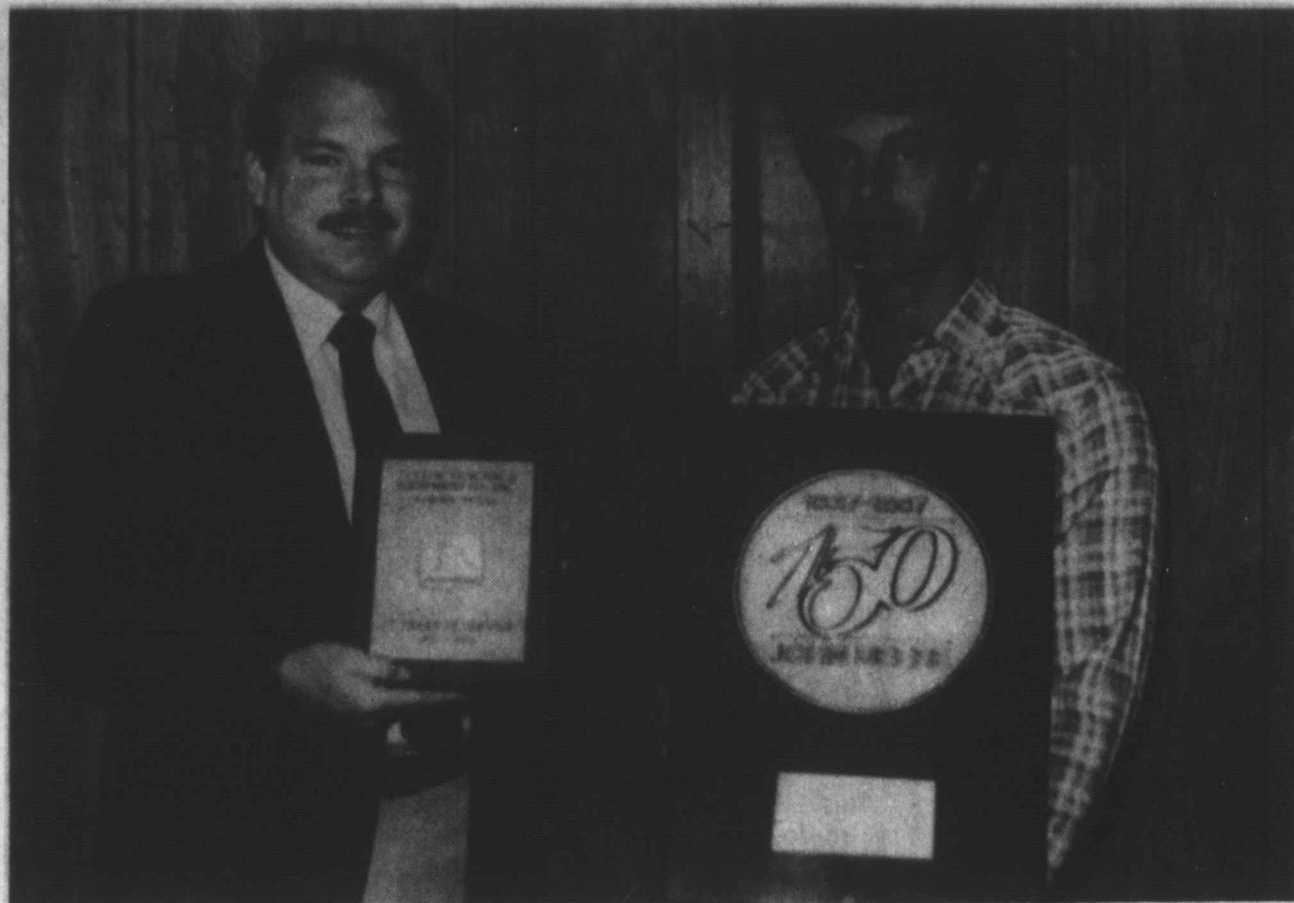
Agriculture Meeting Set In Big Spring

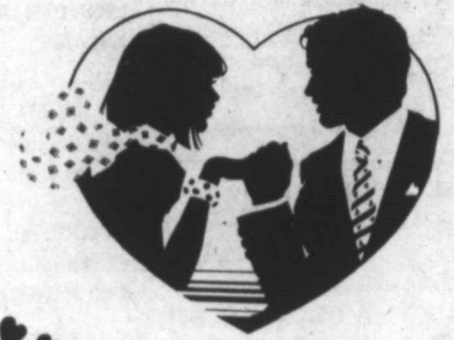

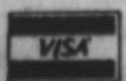
