Crime Line Spotlights Burglary

Another burglary of a rural home and theft of a pickup tailgate in Tahoka headed up the list of activities of law enforcement officers in the county during the last week.

Crime Line, 998-5145, is offering a \$500 reward for information leading to the clearing of the burglary of the Ray Cook residence, about eight miles east of Wilson, between 7:30 p.m. and 9:30 p.m. Tuesday. Among items stolen after entry was gained by breaking a door glass were two TV sets, a Sound Design stereo, 35mm camera and Browning 12-gauge automatic shotgun.

Gary Brooks of Tahoka reported someone had stolen the tailgate off his black 1986 Ford pickup while it was parked at 2001 Main early Feb. 14.

Police issued tickets for running stop sign, speeding, no drivers license, defective vehicle, failure to control speed, failure to yield right of way and improper turn.

In jail during the week were one person each for assault and revocation of probation, theft by check, driving while intoxicated (judgment and sentence) and judgment and sentence for possession of marijuana.

Tahoka Losses Cause Lynn Tax Rebate Loss

Sales tax rebates returned to cities which charge a 1 per cent city sales tax were received this month and Lynn County, like most others in the area, received less money than at the same reporting period a year ago.

Sales in O'Donnell and Wilson showed very slight increases in the February report, but Tahoka's tax rebate reflected a

decline in retail sales in that city. Tahoka received more than \$1,200 less in returned taxes than at the same time in 1986, more than enough to offset the slight increases shown in the other two cities in the county which charge a 1 per cent sales tax.

The three cities combined received rebates totaling \$12,514, compared to \$13,711 in February 1986. The totals, with last year's figure in parentheses:

O'Donnell \$2820 (\$2802);
Tahoka \$8420 (\$9730); Wilson
\$1274 (\$1179).

The county's totals reflect a decline of about 9 percent from the totals a year ago. The Lubbock Avalanche-Journal reported this week that over the South Plains area, the decline was about 15 per cent.

It was too much for us, so we went to a movie instead.

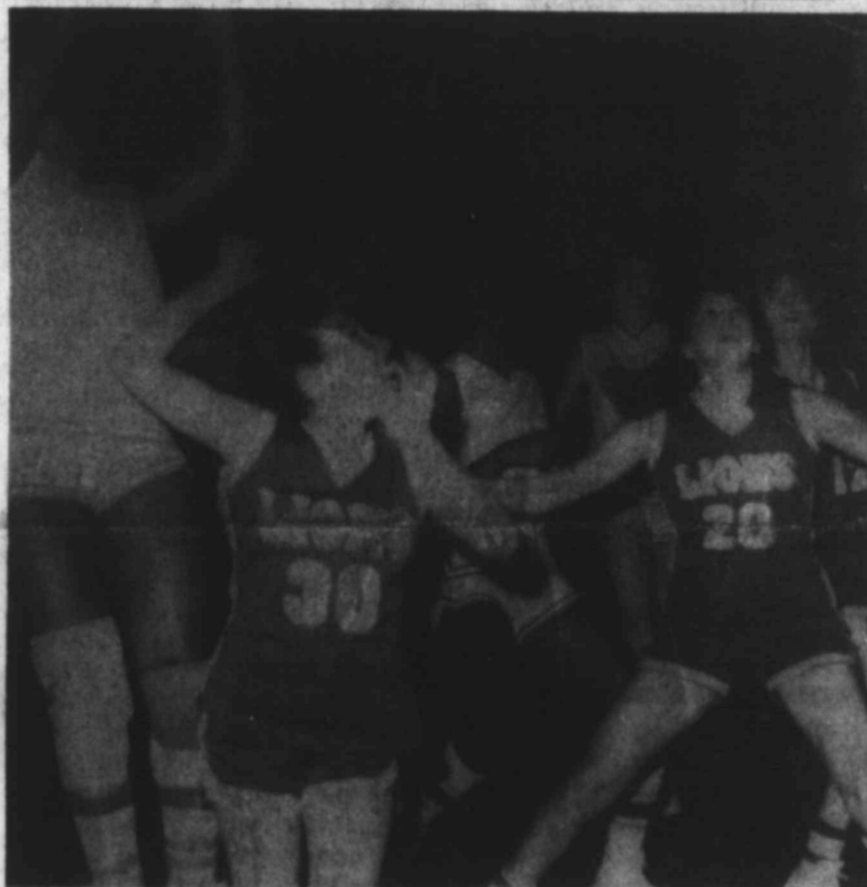
Decades ago, my wife and I belonged to a bowling league. It seems to me that in those days I carried an average of more than 150, but I'm told this average gets a little better every year I remember it. I do know that we bowled once about a year or so ago in Dallas. I think I had 270 that time (90, 91 and 89).

A story in the Feb. 16 issue of U.S. News, Etc. confirms that bowling alleys are doing well everywhere. Big bowling centers in growing metropolitan areas have spent a lot in upgrading their facilities with computerized scoring, upholstered furniture and other fancying up to appeal to yuppies. And says the magazine, most of these places are making money.

No more gutter language, either, except from those people who are lousy bowlers. The bowling industry, says U.S. News, has banished the words "alley" and "gutter" and now call them "center" and "channel".

There reportedly are 70 million people bowling, nine million of them regular weekly league bowlers.

O'Donnell, New Home Teams In Playoffs

Both O'Donnell varsity basketball teams and the New Home varsity boys team are in the UIL playoffs with games coming up during the next week.

The unbeaten O'Donnell girls, 30-0 for the year, again were led by Stacy Bessire, who scored 35 points, as they won bi-district 76-38 over Grandfalls at Midland Monday night. The Lady Eagles took a 20-12 first quarter lead and were never headed.

They will play Fort Hancock at 7:30 p.m. Friday in Kermit, seeking to continue their trip toward the state title.

O'Donnell's boys teams, also district champions, will play Sanderson in Monahans Tuesday night. The boys team, now 25-4,

walloped Wink in a practice game Monday, 95-72, as Cody Crouch poured in 34 points and Kyle Summers 24.

Another Lynn County team, the New Home Leopard boys, runnerup in district play, will meet Loop in bi-district at Brownfield next Tuesday night. It will be the second game of the playoffs there that evening, so tipoff is expected to be about 8 p.m.

The Leopards are 17-9 for the year after losing a practice game to Roby Monday night, 84-69. In that game Gaylon Paul scored 21 points, Lloyd Caballero scored 20, Darryl Paul 12 and Coby Wyatt usually are starters for the Leopards.

Charles Cate Named High School Principal

Charles Cate, assistant high school principal and head basketball coach for boys for the last two years, has been named Tahoka High School principal starting with the 1987-88 school year.

At that time the current high school principal, Dr. Duane Carter, will become superintendent of schools, succeeding Clifton Gardner, who is retiring.

The action taken by the Tahoka school board means that a new boys basketball coach must be hired before next season. The

board in its regular February meeting last Thursday also commended Cate "on his leadership, coaching ability and discipline as basketball coach for the last two years." Early in the season just ended Cate dismissed several varsity players, including most of his starters, for disciplinary reasons.

Cate was hired as principal on a two-year probationary contract at an annual salary of \$35,000.

Business manager Loretta Tekell reported a balance in all funds on Jan. 31 of \$1,799,936. She said that on that date the 1986 tax roll had reached 83.7 per cent collection with \$532,878, less discount, collected.

The board ordered the trustee election to be held April 4, with absentee voting to be at Tahoka City Hall. The election for two trustees will be held at the same time and place (Tahoka school cafeteria) as the city election. Maurice Huffaker was chosen election judge with Dean Bartley as alternate and Hazel Connally as absentee voting clerk.

March 2-6 was approved as Public Schools Week.

All board members were present. They are Billy Davis, Joe Hays, Mike Huffaker, J.E. Nance Jr., Robert Smith, Jim Wells and Nedra Young.

City Council Race Assured In Tahoka

With less than 12 hours remaining for candidates to sign up for the city elections in Texas, three persons had filed for two spots on the Tahoka city council and incumbent Mayor Jim Solomon had filed for re-election.

Filing for the city council by that time were Milt Uzzle, Nick Summitt and Bernice Phipps. Terms of Dalton Wood and Jim Thomas are to expire.

Wilson Mayor Jackie Bishop has filed for re-election to a one-year term.

In New Home, four persons have filed for two spots on the city council, and one candidate, Roy Blevins, has filed for the office of mayor now held by Clifton Clem. Terms of Freddie Kieth and Lee Roy Nettles on the city council are scheduled to expire. Nettles and Cecil Kieth have filed for a two-year term. Filing for a one-year unexpired term on the council are Louis Rodriguez and J.A. Evans.

These all had filed by Tuesday; deadline for filing was Wednesday.



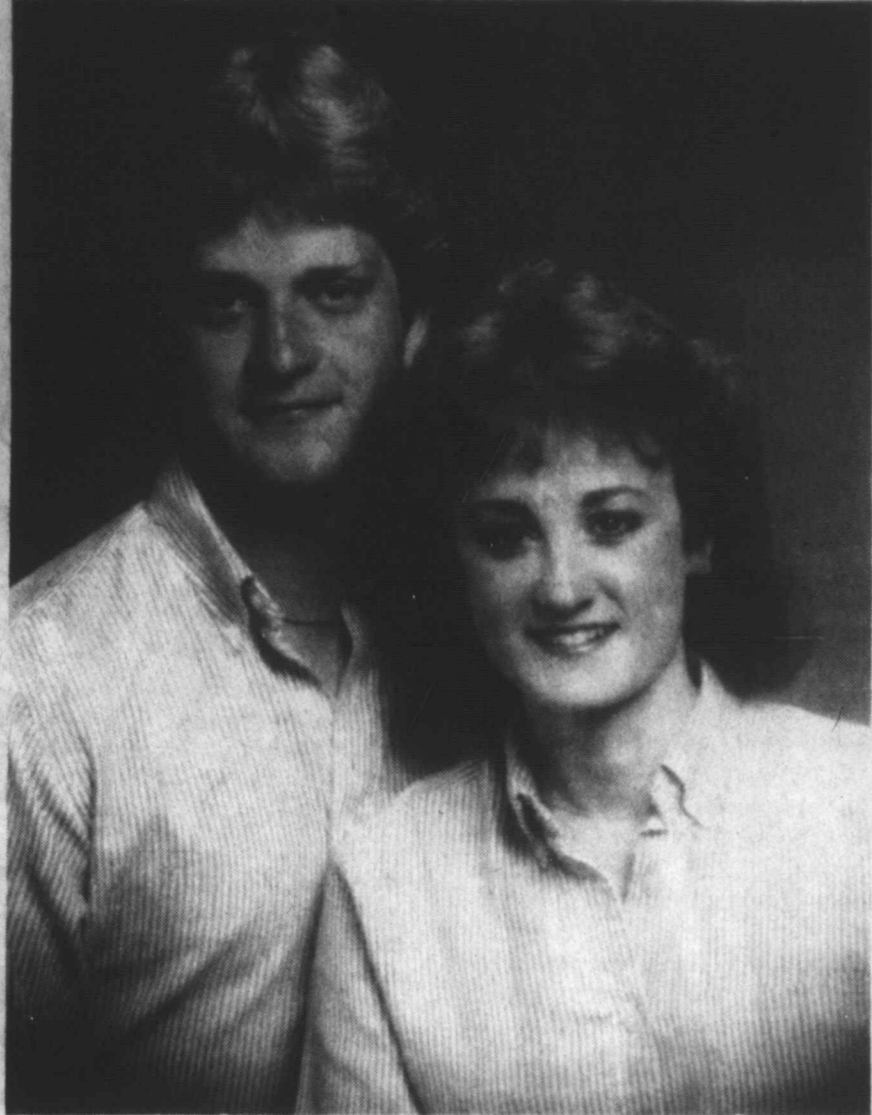

Costumes Of India Modeled For Study Club Members

The Phebe K. Warner Club met Feb. 10 in the home of Mrs. Beuna Hagood with Mrs. Mildred LeMond serving as co-hostess. President Edna White presided over the meeting with 20 members and six guests attending.

The program was presented by Dr. Jayati Banerjee on the costumes, jewelry, home life and customs of India. "Jay" as she likes to be called, is the wife of Dr. Swapan Banerjee, who has practiced medicine in Tahoka and O'Donnell since 1982. Dr. Banerjee is from Motihari, India and grew up in this small town near the base of the Himalayan Mountains and Mt. Everest. Her mother served as President of Congress for a five-year term and her father, who was once a member of the Indian Parliament, retired recently from the practice of medicine at the age of 87. She completed her medical training in both India and

England and practiced medicine in London for ten years.

For the program, Dr. Banerjee brought three Tech students to model the various costumes of India. Hello America ...

Paul Harvey

(Following is a transcript of Paul Harvey's TV & radio commentaries, week of Jan. 19-24, 1987)

Hello Americans, I'm Paul Harvey. I was preparing to address a convention to the Farm Bureau, the largest of all organizations dedicated to the quality of rural living.

On my desk was a copy of current Farm Bureau policies. As I read about the precepts and the purposes of this organization, I found myself reading about progress based on moral and religious concepts, individual opportunity rather than guaranteed security, helping to elect people who share these fundamental beliefs and principles and suddenly I've realized that I'm reading what dues-paying, grass-roots Americans have always believed in and died for.

In this document, I read specific guidelines on family, national security, law enforcement, property rights. I'm reading an American manifesto, what we stand for and what we will not stand for.

Frustrated Americans of recent generations have felt their country is slipping away from them, felt they had no where to turn for help. Most of the once-honored organizations have atrophied, have become impotent, but not the Farm Bureau. It's as vigorous and virile and united as ever in defense of the Americanism.

The Farm Bureau has everything it needs except the numbers. As our nation's farm population dwindles, so has its clout in Washington. Then I realized you don't have to be a practicing farmer to belong to the Farm

Bureau, to support its objectives. Imagine what would happen if our Bureau leadership, speaking not for 3.3 million, but for 50 million Americans, could confront the compromisers! Now you say you never get that many free-wheeling individualists to stand in line behind any leader. Don't be too sure.

The Farm Bureau has already managed the miracles of leading and speaking for farmers who farm everything from lumber to cattle to cotton to catfish. If they can embrace that polyglot minority, they can organize our disorganized majority against all of our enemies, foreign and the domestic.

The silent majority right now has a valid, established, credible voice. That voice needs only to be amplified. You could call us city folks who might kick in \$20 a year, call us the Farm Bureau Auxiliary or something like that, letting us help them to help us to out-manuever, out-legislate, out-shop the home-grown ingrates and the hyphenated intruders who refuse to repledge their allegiance.

We don't need another organization. Our nation already has too many organizations. So what we need is to breathe fire into the belly of this most respected one before the ugly crack of that grand old hand-made bell gets any wider. What do you say? I will if you will.

CONTROL ENERGY TO BOOST NET RETURNS--

One way for farmers to boost net returns is to control energy costs, says an agricultural engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Good management in all operations, coupled with routine maintenance, can produce worthwhile dividends in reduced energy bills. Energy-saving tips include reducing the number of trips across fields by combining operations, using minimum or no-till practices, using tractor weights and duals properly, avoiding excess engine idling, combining errands, operating equipment at the rated speed, testing irrigation systems and using the right-sized equipment.

SOYBEANS FALLING ON HARD TIMES--

Soybeans are no longer a profitable alternative crop in Texas due to low prices and weather and plant disease problems the past several years. Texas farmers harvested only 210,000 acres of soybeans in 1986 compared to some 800,000 acres during the mid-'70s, points out an economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Nationally, soybean acreage dropped below the 60-million mark last year for the first time since 1977. The current government loan rate for soybeans stands at \$4.77 per bushel and sets a price floor. Soybean exports will suffer from the recent actions by the European Economic Community.

Bulldog Boys Close Out Tough Cage Year

Tahoka varsity boys basketball team lost to New Deal 41-85 last Friday night, closing out a tough year which saw the team decimated of starters early in the season after three victories and the group wound up 3-22 for the year.

Coach Charles Cate commended the group of youngsters who played most of the season for Tahoka, including some boys brought up from junior varsity after four starters were among some six players dismissed in connection with a report of some basketball shoes missing at Coahoma.

"We had problems, but these young men worked together and never gave up," said Coach Cate. "It has been a real treat for me to be able to coach such great young men. Thank you, parents and community, for your support and help during the season... And keep backing the Bulldogs: they are winners."

Against New Deal Friday Chuck Cate had 20 points and 17 rebounds. Thomas Glisson had 6 points and 5 rebounds; Mike McDonald scored 5 points; and Jim Patterson scored 5 points, plus 4 rebounds, 6 assists and 5 steals. John Aldous, Kurt Bryan and Joseph House each had 2 points and George Morin 1. Only Mike McDonald is a senior.

Service News

Master Sgt. Gary W. Brazil, son of Woodrow and Mary Brazil of Tahoka, has been graduated from the U.S. Army Sergeants Major Academy at Fort Bliss, Texas.

The Sergeants Major Academy is the highest level of the Army's non-commissioned officer (NCO) education system. The 22-week course prepares selected NCOs for positions of greater responsibility.

Selection for attendance at the academy is made by a Department of the Army board from among NCOs with fewer than 23 years of service who have demonstrated the highest standards of performance and job proficiency.

LONELY OR ALONE? --Family and friends sometimes confuse an elderly person's desire to be alone with loneliness. "If grandma has always enjoyed solitary pursuits, there's no reason to expect her to become more social not that grandpa has died," says gerontologist Dr. Judith Warren. "The fact that she spends her time alone doing needlework or gardening may not necessarily mean she is lonely." Family members should listen to elder relatives for time-oriented complaints, such as "I'm just putting in my time until I die." Expressions of abandonment, such as "Nobody cares about old people, they're just put on the shelf," are another sign of loneliness. Further indicators that loneliness is a problem may include changes in behavior, such as increased irritability, withdrawal, increased talkativeness, restlessness or an inability to concentrate. She notes that psychosomatic symptoms or real health problems can also be linked to loneliness.

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Tahoka Girls Team Ends Good Season

The Tahoka High School girls' varsity basketball team closed out its finest season in 19 years Feb. 13 with a 67-63 overtime loss to New Deal. This left Coach Elaine Shedd's team with a record of 16-9 for the year, the best for any Tahoka girls team since 1968 when the girls were 15-4.

Against New Deal, Tammi Hood scored 28 points and Shannon Lawson 16. Lawson also had 16 rebounds, while Lacy Jolly had 14 and Dawn Teaff 12. Tammi Hood also had 9 assists, Tesha Hood 8 and Jolly 9.

"The girls played a good game and had a good season overall," said Coach Shedd.

In one game against Spur during the season, the Lady Bulldogs scored the most points for a Tahoka girls team in 40 years, beating Spur 81-47. Coach Shedd said the total number of rebounds for the girls during the season was 990, just 10 under the goal of 1,000 the girls had set.

Also, the girls scored 1,476 points in the season after setting a goal of 1,000. They placed in both tournaments they were in, second at O'Donnell and consolation winner at Coahoma.

Lawson has led the South Plains area Class AA schools in rebounds and points per game since the beginning of the season, according to the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal. In 25 games she scored 572 points, had 381 rebounds and shot 58 percent from the field and 60 percent at the free throw line.

Lawson will be back next season; only Teaff and Tammi Hood are seniors.

Tesha Hood scored 435 points in 25 games, and had 129 steals. Tammi Hood had 293 points in the season and 226 assists, and was all-tournament at Coahoma.

Jolly had 208 rebounds in the season and was described by Coach Shedd as the 'most improved player of the year.'

Teaff had 205 rebounds.

Coach Shedd said players to watch for next year include squad members Rochelle Reid, Johanna Phillips and LaDonna Tillman.

Junior High Boys End Season

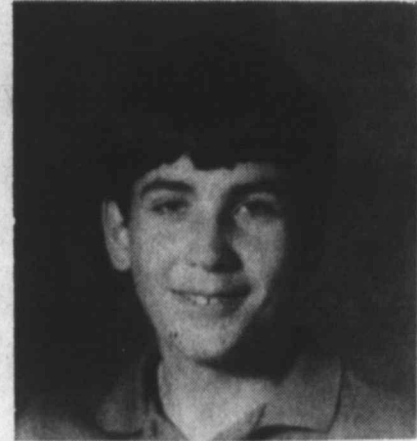

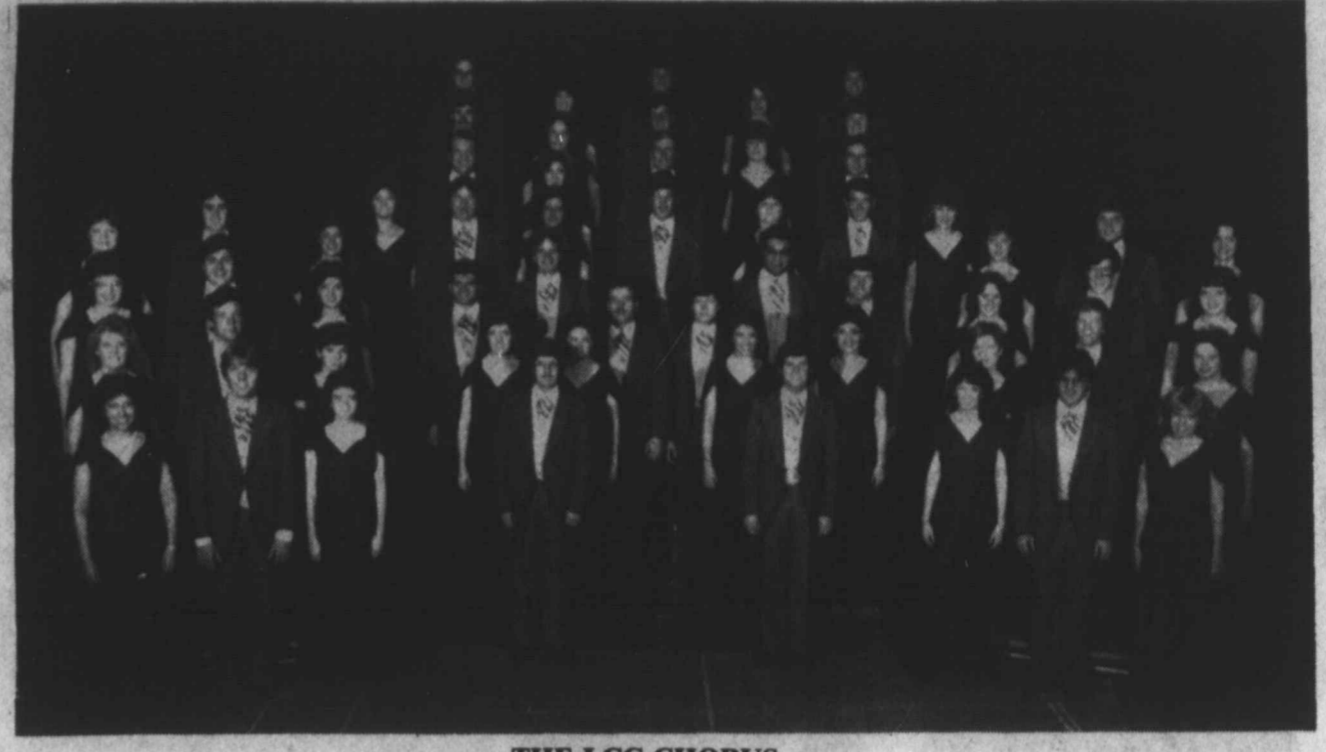

Some sheriffs, however, say that this approach to state overcrowding, may ultimately cause worse overcrowding problems at the county level, since it is expected to increase the local load of parole violators. Clements proposes to use some of those funds cut from education to build prisons.

Texas Chief Justice John Hill, in his State of the Judiciary address, continues to call for the appointment of judges and justices. Supporters of judicial appointment claim evidence that Texans want appointed judges. Completed totals from the 78th District questionnaire show an overwhelming support for the continued election of judges. Almost 75 percent of you responding to the questionnaire said you want to elect judges; about 20 percent of the 78th District preferred to have judges appointed, and the remaining five percent were undecided on the issue. Statewide groups supporting the continued election of judges have used the results from the 78th District as evidence that Texans want to preserve the right to elect their judicial officials.

Capitol Journal

Governor Clements has revealed his long-awaited budget plan in his State of the State speech to the Legislature. The governor called for the continuation of the "temporary taxes" he had opposed during the recent Special Sessions. He called for a permanent 3-cent increase in the gasoline tax, and an extension of the sales tax to additional unspecified sales and services. He also proposed the selling of some unwanted state lands to the Permanent School Fund, and pulling capital gains out of the Permanent University Fund.

On the spending side, the Clements plan can be expected to draw criticism from educators and rural people. Vocational education is on the block for a \$125 million cut. Kindergarten would be reduced \$80 million. The Teacher Retirement Fund would lose \$45 million, and local school boards would lose the \$66 million bank franchise tax rebate. Though he proposes continuing the controversial career ladder, he wants to cut \$165 million in state funding to local districts and reduce teacher bonuses. School administrators complain that these cuts will force corresponding increases in local property taxes.

There is concern among rural legislators over the Clements proposal to de-fund the Farm-to-Market road program, cut-back the Agricultural Extension Service, and eliminate state funding for soil and water conservation. The Texas Forest Service (which provides equipment for many rural fire departments) and the Rodent and Predatory Animal (Coyote) Control Service are also on the chopping block.

The state's prison overcrowding situation is now causing problems for local counties. The

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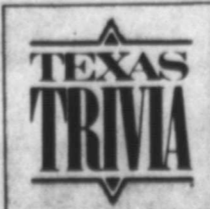

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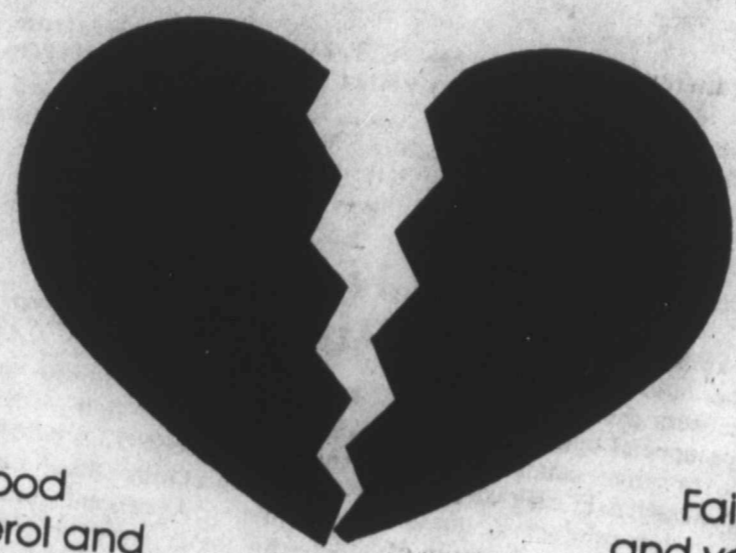

CRP Signup Deadline Near

Signup for the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) which began Feb. 9, will end Feb. 27.

This is a 10 year program where the landowner rents land to the government for a set amount of money per acre, per year. In return, the landowner agrees to establish and maintain a stand of permanent grass for the 10-year period. The 1986 rate was \$40 per acre per year.

Very sandy crop land or other marginal land gives an opportunity to receive an income for 10 years. It costs more to farm marginal and very sandy land than it does to farm good land. If the marginal land is in grass, making an annual income, you don't have to worry about the Jan. 1, 1990 deadline on Conservation Compliance. Don't gamble that this compliance thing will go away. It could be a very expensive gamble on your part.

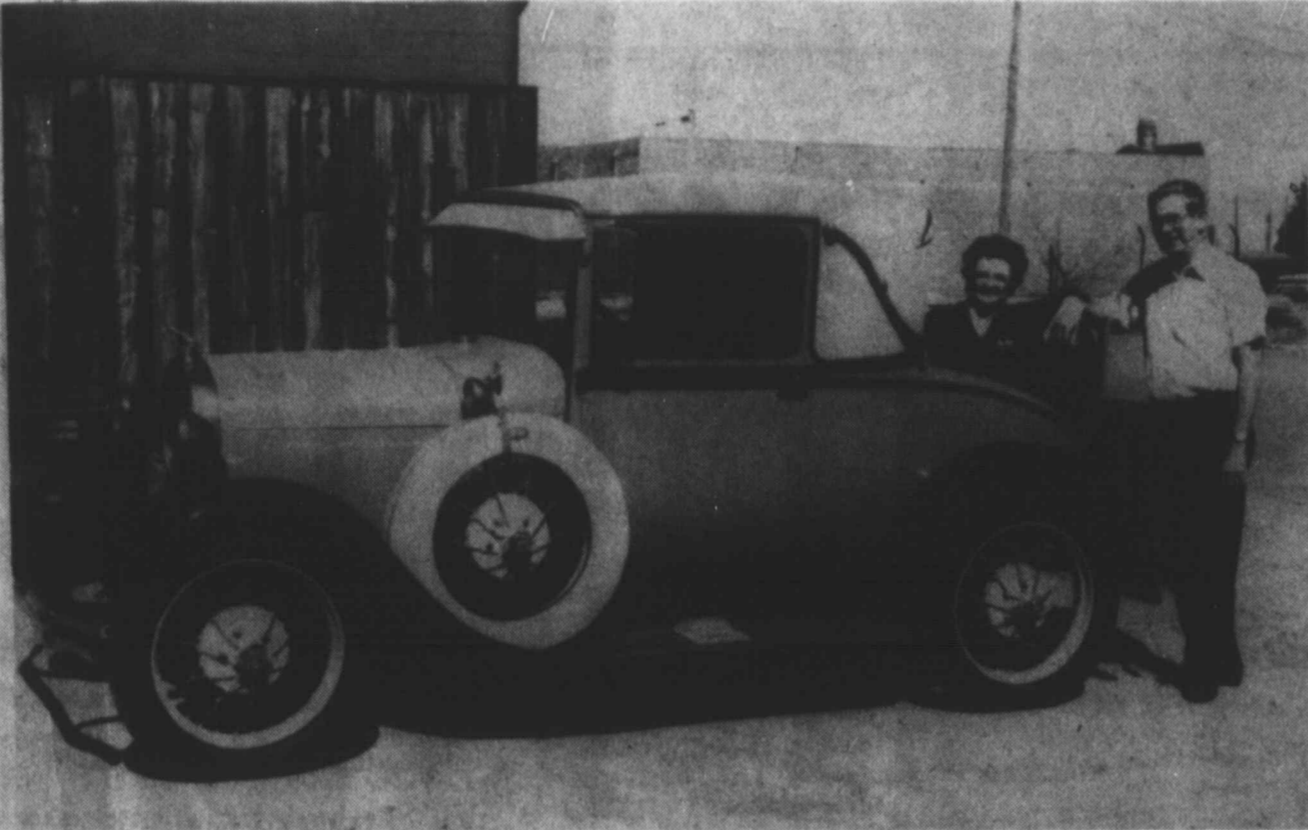

Cotton Today

Korean Officials To Visit U.S.: A delegation of 10 Korean textile officials will visit the United States on a cotton-buying mission Feb. 28-March 22. During the mission, sponsored by Korea's purchases of U.S. cotton for the entire season are expected to be around 1.4 million bales or about 80 percent of its total imports.

The group will call on business executives and community leaders in Fresno, Bakersfield, Dallas, Memphis, and Washington, stressing Korea's strong will-

ingness for a balanced and expanded trade with the U.S. The mission will conclude with a meeting in Washington with Agriculture Secretary Richard Lyng.

ITMF Spinners Coming To U.S.: The International Textile Manufacturers Federation is sending a special committee of spinners to this country for meetings March 8-13 with USDA officials, cotton producers, ginners, seed breeders, and textile mill executives. The eight-member delegation—including spinners from West Germany, Belgium, Italy, the United Kingdom, and Switzerland—will hold sessions in Memphis and Gastonia, N.C., to discuss fiber property requirements for spinning, the current status of high-volume instrument classing the impact of mechanical testing on cotton marketing, cotton breeding programs, the current cotton grading system, and bale packaging.

Award Leads To New Scholarship: A Cotton Foundation project has led to the establishment of a \$20,000 endowment fund for an agricultural engineering scholarship to further cotton research. Texas A&M University initiated the fund with the \$10,000 it received when one of its professors, Dr. Lambert H. Wilkes, won the 1987 Mobay Cotton Research Recognition Award. In response to the gesture by Texas A&M — which named the endowment fund in his honor — Wilkes agreed to match the university's contribution from his \$15,000 award from Mobay.

Interest earnings from the endowment fund, which is open to further contributions, will be used for one scholarship annually.

"This perpetual endowment fund will provide a fitting and lasting recognition of Lambert's tremendous contributions to research in the cotton industry," said Dr. Ed Hiler, head of A&M's agricultural engineering department. "We're extremely proud of him and we hope the fund will grow."

New Cotton Reference Book Available: Just off the press is a new 817 page reference book, "Cotton Physiology". The first in a series of cotton reference books to be published by the Cotton Foundation, this volume was made possible by a grant from BASF Corporation. Drs. Jack R. Mauney and James McD. Stewart edited the book and were among 50 leading authorities contributing articles.

Foundation President Sykes Martin, a Courtland, Ala., grower, said the book will be especially helpful to cotton producers who want to know more about the consultants, researchers, teachers, students, and others also will find it a valuable information source, he added.

Yield Loss Payment Increased

U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm announced Tuesday that Texas farmers will receive 73.9 percent of their total claims rather than the former 50 percent under which the losses were to have been figured.

The increased funding — which will be issued in government-owned surplus commodity generic certificates instead of actual dollars — means that \$132 million will come to Texas farmers. The change means an increase of about \$50 million.

"This is remarkably good news for the many Texas farmers who suffered extensive crop losses due to severe weather during 1986," said Gramm.
