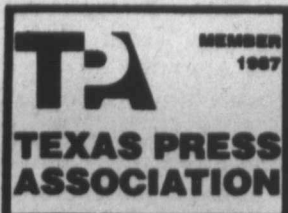

## Tahoka Man Assessed Term In Shooting Death

In Wilson early Tuesday morning, a 1977 Chevrolet pickup driven by Larry Gene Dworaczyk, 36, of Wilson, backed into the front of Trevino

Cafe, causing damage to the building and front door, according to investigating officers.

Feliciano Bustamente, 35, of Tahoka, was sentenced to 10 years in prison after pleading guilty before District Judge George Hansard of a charge of voluntary manslaughter in the shooting death of Thomas Quintero of Lubbock, who was found near Lakeview community last July, shot five times. Bustamente originally had been charged with murder.

In jail during the week were three persons for driving while intoxicated, and one each for public intoxication, unlawful possession of a firearm plus reckless conduct, and driving while license suspended.

Tahoka police arrested a 33 year-old Tahoka man on Sunday in the 1700 block of South 8th Street and confiscated a 20-gauge sawed-off shotgun that had reportedly been discharged during a disturbance. Gilbert Garcia, 33, was charged with unlawful possession of a firearm and also charged with reckless conduct and public intoxication.

Police investigated criminal mischief activity at Signet Cablevision early Wednesday morning as someone had attempted to pry open the front door with a crow bar. Police continue their investigation in this case.

Estella Rodriguez reported to police that someone had broken a window in her residence at 1705 S. 8th and had stolen a 19 inch color television. Total loss was estimated at \$300.

Police investigated an accident Tuesday, April 14, at Ave. M and South 6th that involved a 1980 Buick driven by Maria Louisa Bernal of Tahoka and a 1973 Ford pickup driven by Horace L. Grider of Tahoka. No injuries were reported.

Police investigated an accident on Tuesday at 1800 N. 7th and Ave. L involving a 1987 GMC pickup driven by Randy Kay Erickson of Tahoka and a 1980 Chevrolet driven by James Antu of Tahoka. No injuries were reported.

## Fun, Food Festival Slated Here May 2

The Lynn County Hospital Auxiliary's seventh annual Fun and Food Festival and auction is set for Saturday, May 2, from 4 to 9 p.m. in the Lynn County Show Barn. Since the auxiliary was organized in 1979, over \$55,000 has been raised for the Lynn County Hospital and ambulance. The proceeds from this year's festival will go toward the purchase of a fetal heart rate and purchase of a fetal labor monitor which will monitor both fetal heart rate and uterine contractions during labor. At present, the hospital has a monitor designed for use in determining fetal well-being before labor. The proposed fetal labor monitor will determine fetal well-being throughout labor, quickly alerting hospital staff to possible fetal stress. "Close fetal monitoring is an important advancement in modern obstetric care," stated Dr. Lonnie Vickers.

The Fun and Food Festival will feature food booths sponsored by various groups and organizations in the county. Health awareness booths providing helpful information and en-

couraging safer, more healthful living will also be set up. "We are making a greater effort to provide attractions for children at this year's festival," says Auxiliary President Nadine Dunlap. "Children of all ages are urged to bring their dolls and teddy bears to our Doll Hospital." There will also be a clown to welcome children to the festival and game booths for them. Any group or organization interested in sponsoring a booth should contact Debbie Vickers or Mabel Gurley.

The auction will feature dozens of items and crafts donated by the businesses and individuals of Lynn County. Billy Miller will be auctioneer and Clint Walker and Danny Curry will emcee. Donations may be given to any hospital auxiliary member, Ann Roberts, Vicki Ashbrook, Dean Bartley, Madeline Hegi, and Grace Prohl are in charge of gathering the donated items.

Admission to the festival will be 50 cents. Each 50 cent ticket entitles a person to a chance for the door prize drawing. Tickets may be bought from any auxiliary member as well as at the door.

United Blood Services, assisted by the Tahoka EMS, will be conducting a blood drive during the festival. For the 1986 year, 87 units of blood were donated in local blood drives and 85 units were used by the Lynn County Hospital.

"The Lynn County Hospital Auxiliary is always encouraged by the generosity and teamwork of so many Lynn County residents toward making our festival and auction a success," stated Mrs. Dunlap. "One area we can always use extra help in is setting up on Friday at 6 p.m. the day before the festival and in cleaning up immediately following the festival. Volunteers for this job are greatly appreciated."

Friends, relatives and others interested in seeing challenging science experiments are invited to attend.

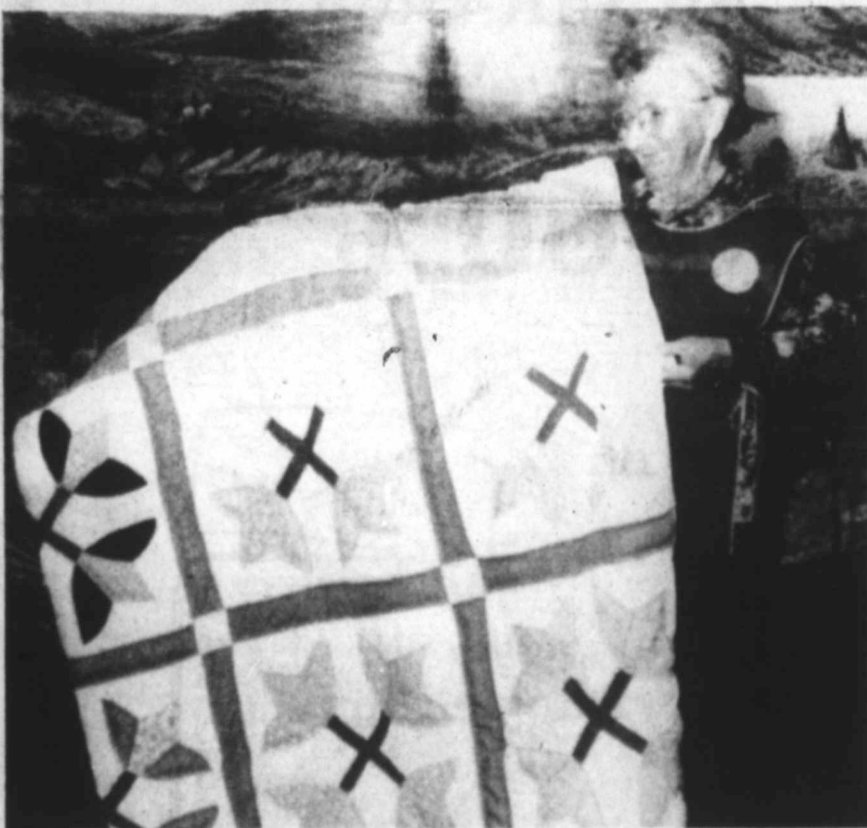


## Golf Event Saturday To Boost Cancer Fund

## Family Praises Worker For 40 Years At Home

Dr. and Mrs. K.R. Durham this week paid special tribute to Helen Bookman of Tahoka, who has recently completed 40 years of continuous service as a maid in the Durham home in Tahoka.

Helen started working for Mrs. Durham a month before Ken Durham's 9th birthday, and the Durham's son now lives in Longview with his wife and three sons, teaching with 25 years experience and three college degrees. "Helen saw all of this," said Dr. Durham, adding that their daughter Dot was 11 and now has two granddaughters. "She has been teaching for 30 years...Helen helped at her wedding reception," Dr. Durham said.

The Durham's daughter Margaret, who died in 1982, was 14 when Mrs. Bookman, wife of

T.B. Bookman, began working. Margaret married Ed McMeans and had three children and a granddaughter. The Durhams said Helen helped to raise the Durham children and their children over the 40-year span.

"Helen is a most dependable, loyal and trustworthy person," said Dr. Durham. He said she often was left alone in the home to do her work while the Durhams were away.

Helen's son, Andrew Nance, was the first black person to graduate from Tahoka High School, in May 1957, according to Dr. Durham.

"She was ambitious for her son and had him write to the school board president, Maurice Bray, asking permission to enter what then was an all-white school, to finish high school,

citing the hardship of having to travel to Slaton, Lubbock or Brownfield to attend school." According to Durham, Bray took a strong stand for the youngster in what was a controversial situation.

Mrs. Bookman also has been active in the Wesley Chapel of Christian Methodist Episcopal congregation in Tahoka, and is described by the Durhams as a fine citizen with staying qualities "who has made a contribution to the world."

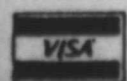

**VITAMIN C**  
 Vitamin C is necessary for formation of connective tissue (collagen) between cells, for tooth formation, cartilage, strong capillary tissue, absorption of iron, and to fight infection. 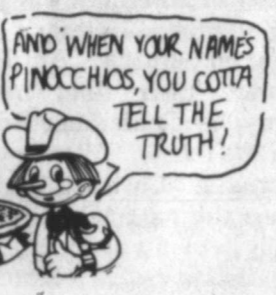

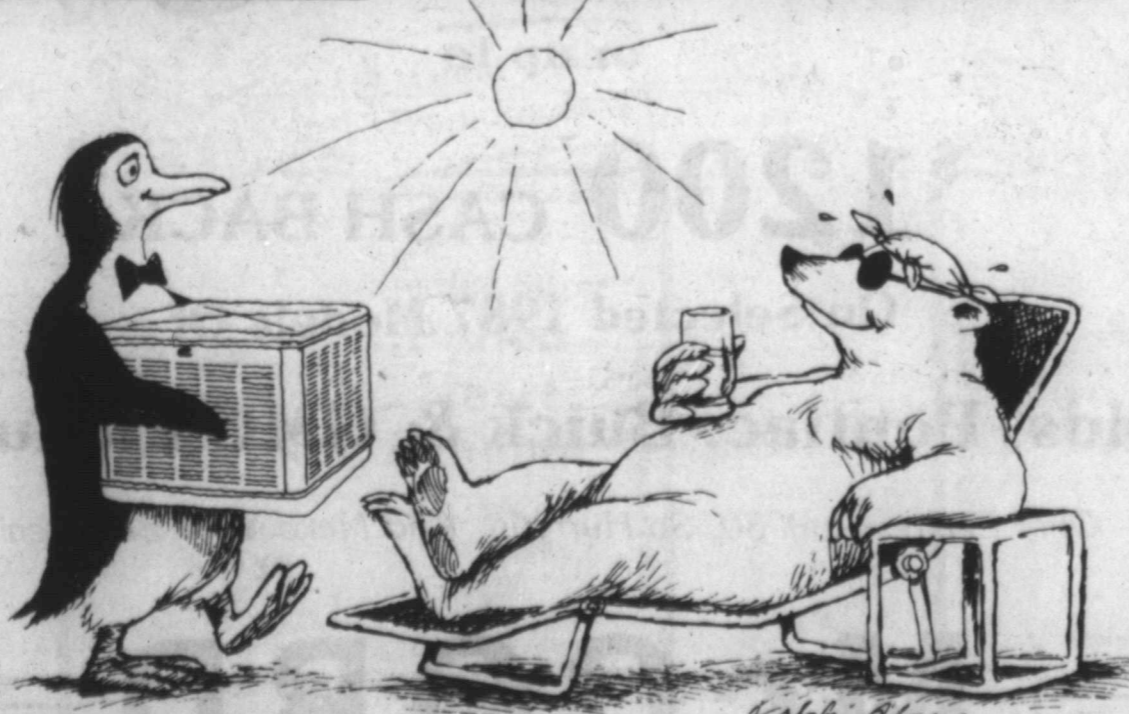
