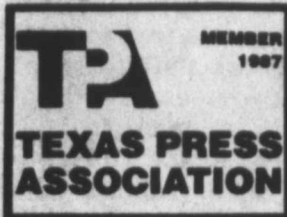

### Rabies Shots Offered Here

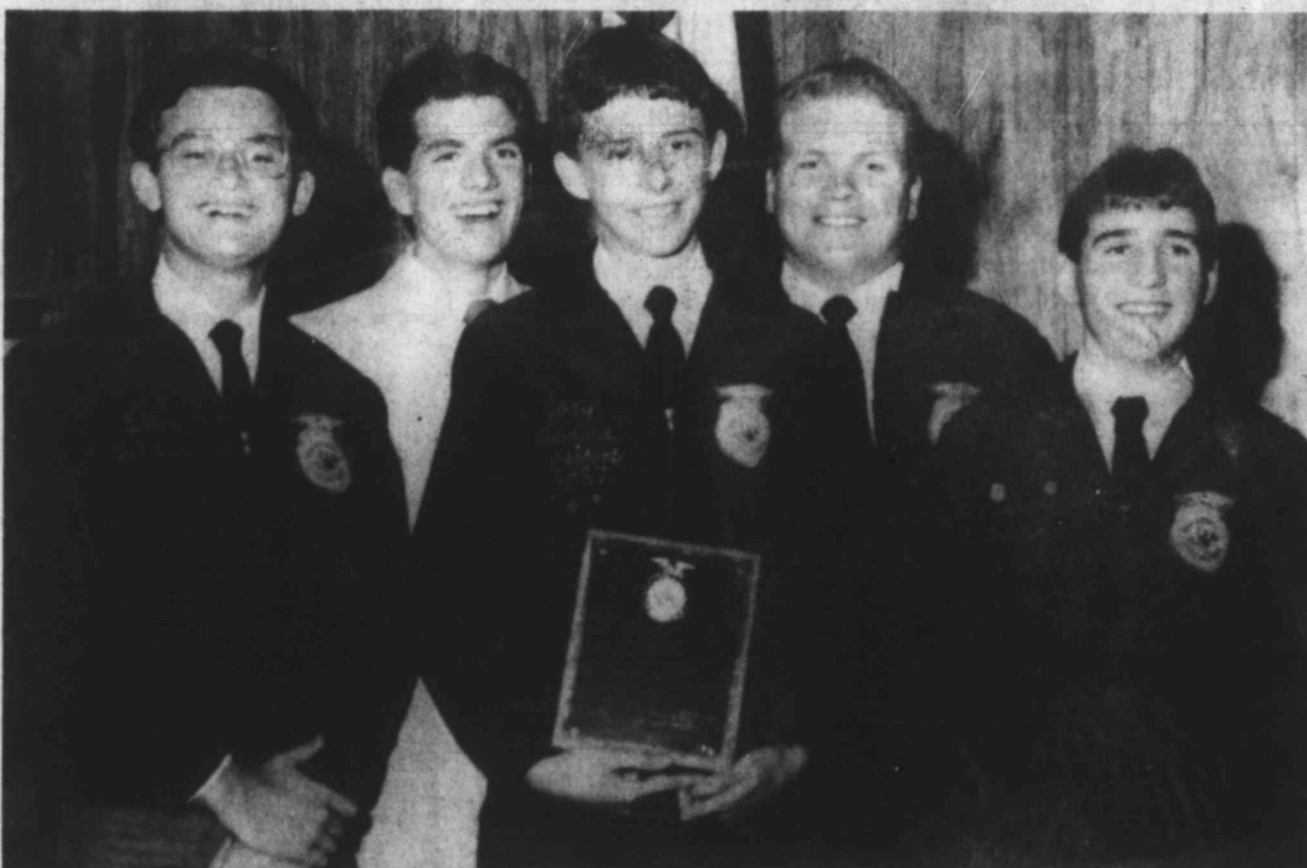

### Kidney Transplant Works For Former Lynn Resident

A kidney transplant in January has made a new life for a former Lynn County resident now living in Tulia, and 33-year-old Steve Rhoads, who had lost 95 percent of the use of his kidneys, barely had the operation in time.

At the time of the surgery, transplant of a kidney from a 36-year-old man who had died that same day in a motorcycle accident, Rhoads was very weak. And when the call came that a kidney was available, his doctor advised him to do it immediately, telling Rhoads "you may have only four or five months to live in your present condition."

Rhoads now feels so good he is ready to go back to work; he has a degree in finance and experience in sales.

People in the Tulia area have donated money to help the tremendous expenses of the operation and other care. He has no hospital insurance. Rhoads is the son of Mr. and

Mrs. Billy Rhoads, Rt. 2, Tulia. They formerly lived in the Wilson area.

### Good Rains Finally Come To Plains Area

Lynn County and most of the South Plains received good rainfall last week, with totals in the Tahoka area ranging from an inch to more than two inches.

Some areas had even heavier rains, and some also had received rainfall earlier which brought their totals up to three or more inches in the last month.

Some cotton had just been planted and may have to be replanted; others now are waiting for the fields to dry sufficiently to get in and plant.

Storms struck in Lynn County again Tuesday night and early Wednesday, dumping up to 3 inches of rain in the O'Donnell area, and also some heavy rain in the east part of the county.

In Tahoka, the rainfall Tuesday night was mostly about an inch.

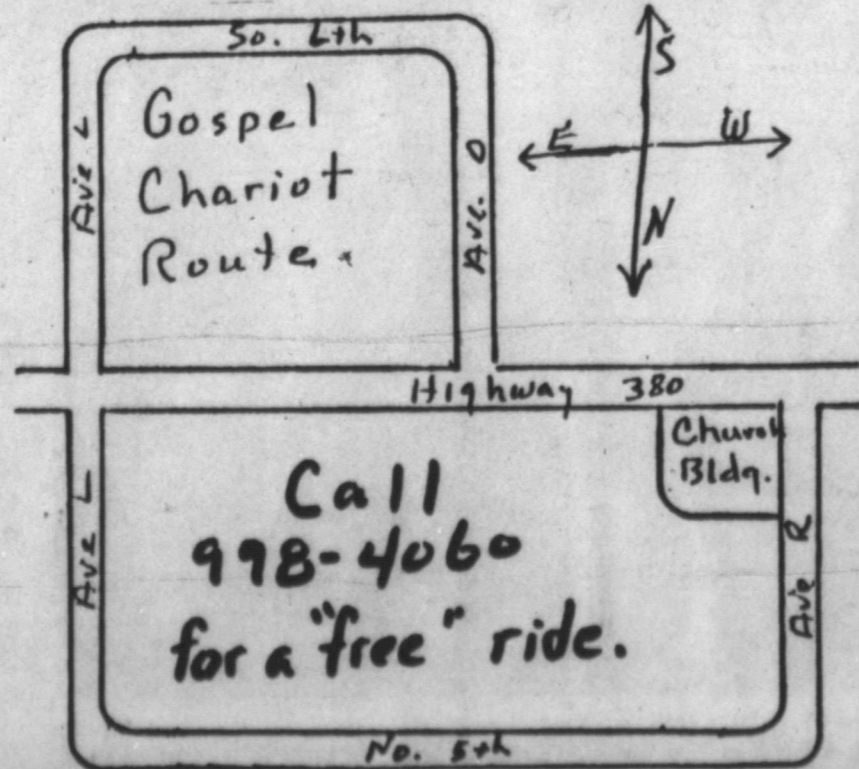

**4-H HELPS WITH LIFE SKILLS**

Results of a nationwide study reveal that 4-H, the "learning-by-doing" program for youth between the ages of 9 and 19, has made a positive impact on the life skills needed by adults to become self-directing and productive members of society. Conducted by the Texas Agri-

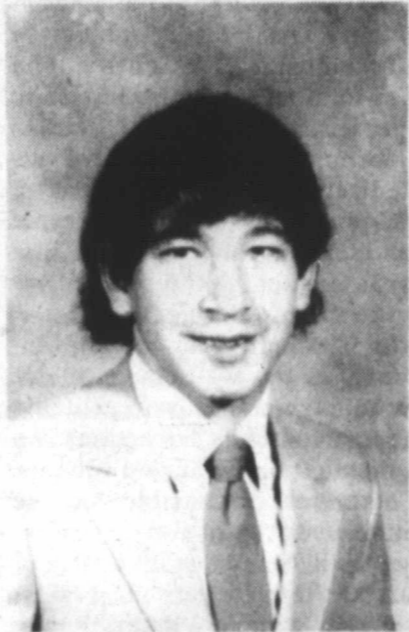

**IMPROVING FAMILY COMMUNICATION**—Listening, empathizing, and self expression are some basic communication skills. They also can be giant steps on the road to improving family communication. According to Diane Welch, family life specialist, "Improving family communication rests on improving the communication skills of the individual family members. There also must be a willingness to communicate. Forced or hostile communication will not help the situation. The family needs to set aside time to spend together." Welch recommends setting up a family council to improve family communication and respect. Family councils are informal family meetings which give each family member a chance to express his or her feelings, and most importantly, to be listened to. According to Welch, "Family councils are a worthwhile means of organization, but the bottom line in family communication is the individuals' communication skills."

**Pre-Kindergarten Registration Set**

Pre-Kindergarten registration has been set for June 2. Parents will need to come to the Tubb Building Office to register. Office hours are 8 a.m. to 12 noon and 1 to 3:30 p.m.

Your child needs to meet the following requirements to qualify for Pre-Kindergarten.

Your child must be at least four (4) years old by Sept. 1 of the year of enrollment.

If your child is unable to speak and comprehend the English language; or

Your family income, according to standards set by the State Board of Education, is at or below subsistence level.

Pre-kindergarten classes will be taught on a one half (½) day basis only. Transportation and meals will not be provided by the school district.

You will need to bring a birth certificate and immunization records before your child can be registered.

**TGSPB Accepting Nominations For Board Members**

Texas sorghum producers will elect five directors to the Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board (TGSPB) this summer. The board was organized in 1969 to research and develop new markets for grain sorghum.

Anyone involved in grain sorghum production within the regions represented by TGSPB and paying Texas grain sorghum assessments (including farm owners, tenants and sharecroppers) may be nominated for a TGSPB position and/or vote in this year's election.

Nominations must be filed with the Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board, P.O. Box 530, Abernathy Texas, no later July 15, 1987.

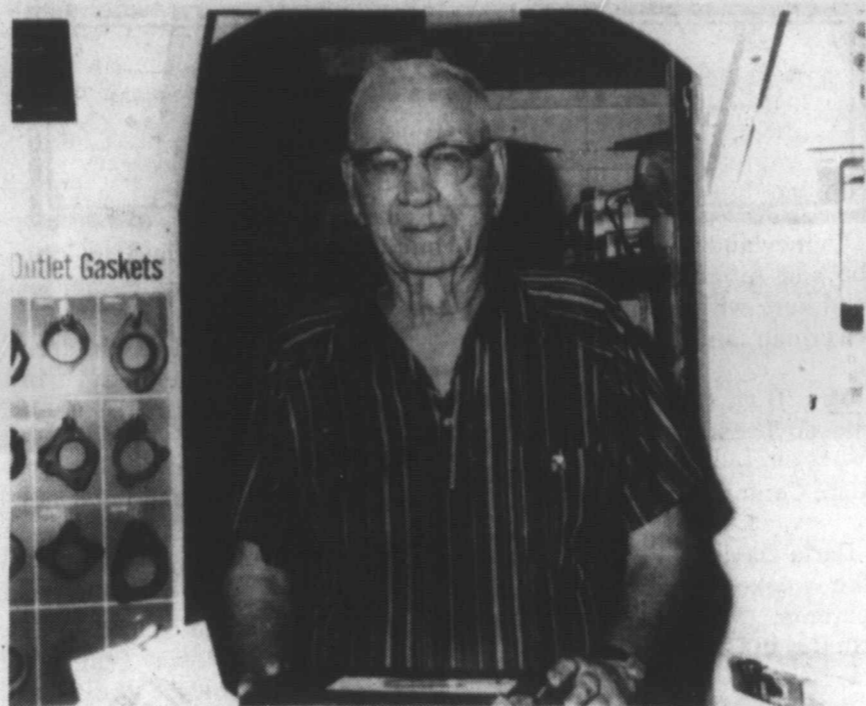

**CHECK YOUR HOUSE FOUNDATION**--This is a good time of year to check the interior and exterior foundation walls of your house for cracks or insect infestation. "Early detection and repair can save you a lot of money," says Dr. Susan Quiring, a housing specialist. "You can do some of the smaller repairs yourself, though the larger ones should be done professionally." Foundation cracks occur for a variety of reasons ranging from the house settling to an improper mix of

the foundation. Water also plays a role in the condition of the foundation, says Quiring. If your yard isn't graded properly or the soil around the foundation pulls away, the excess water can seep into the foundation and cause cracks. "Before you have any repair work done, get at least three estimates," the specialist suggests. "Check out the reputation of the company before they go to work on the foundation. They may not be qualified to do the repairs that you need."

**Letter To The Editor**

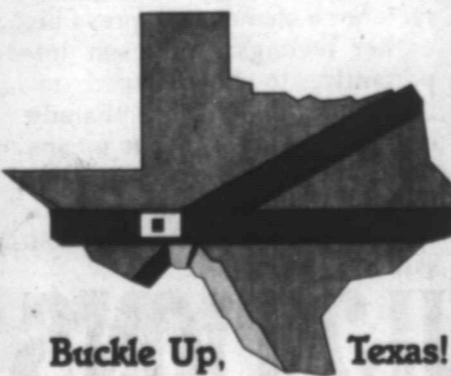
Dear Editor:

### Cotton Today

**Bright Prospects Seen For Cotton?** "Never before have we in the cotton industry had so many promising developments working in our favor," National Cotton Council President Aven Whittington said in address this week to the National Cottonseed Products Assn.

Citing the unprecedented turnaround experienced by the industry in past year due to the 1985 farm act, he said the industry's potential are "the brightest they've been in a long time."

Greenwood, Miss. producer noted that (1) amendments to the research and promotion bill could nearly double Cotton Incorporated funds for increasing cotton's growing share of the domestic textile market. (2) New

federal export assistance has more than doubled Cotton Council International's promotion work abroad, (3) record-level Cotton Foundation funding by supplier companies is putting new research at work to lower production costs and improve quality, and (4) expansion of the Cotton Telecommunications Network from pilot project to full-blown operation this year will give the industry better communication at lower cost.

**1987-88 Export Sales Near 1.3 Billion** While cotton export sales commitments for the current marketing year remained virtually static during the week ended May 14, sales for the next marketing year reached 1,275,900 running bales. The week's new sales of 378,400 bales included 173,500 to Japan, 106,300 to South Korea, 35,600 to Taiwan and 21,200 to Italy. At the adjusted world price in effect that week, the sales were equivalent to \$118 million worth of cotton.

Meanwhile, 77 percent of 1986-87 sales commitments have been delivered. The week's exports of 142,000 running bales brought total shipments to 5,082,800.

**Textile-Apparel Imports Hit Highest First Quarter in History** Textile/apparel imports hit 3.37 billion square yards -- or \$6.7 billion worth-- during 1987's first quarter. It was the highest first-quarter level in history, and 4.4 percent higher than the same period last year. Cotton textile/apparel imports were 11.4 percent higher than in last year's first quarter.

National Cotton Council Vice President Dan Frierson, a Chattanooga, Tenn., textile manufacturer, said new trade agreements negotiated by the government assure that imports will continue to grow at rates far greater than domestic market growth. "The textile and apparel trade mart must be enacted to provide global quotas and stop the damage being done to the U.S. fiber, textile, and apparel industries and their workers."

**Grown and Made Gifts To Get National Honors**--Velma Rankin, Extension Services' national programs leader for textile and clothing, has requested 170 of "Grown and Made in the USA" organizational kits from the Na-


tional Cotton Council. The kits will be distributed nationally to 110 state textile and clothing specialists at land-grant universities, and to 60 state textile and clothing chairmen of National Extension Home Makers Council. The "Grown and

Made" campaign was initiated by the National Cotton Council to promote U.S. made textile and apparel products of U.S. grown cotton. Nick Hahn of Cotton Incorporated is program coordinator.

### Savings Bonds Rate Set At 5.84 Percent

The semiannual market-based interest rate for United States Savings Bonds, in effect from May through October 1987, has been set at 5.84 percent, the Treasury Department announced today. The rate is 85 percent of the average market yield on five year Treasury marketable securities during the preceding six months.

Although Bonds may be redeemed after six months, they must be held five years or longer to receive market-based rates. Bonds held less than five years earn interest on a fixed, graduated scale. Yields at redemption are the average of semiannual market-based rates during the time held, rounded to the nearest quarter percent and compounded semiannually, or a minimum rate, whichever is more. The current minimum rate is six percent.

## CAPITOL JOURNAL

House of Representatives

The budget wars continue at the Capitol. The House and Senate have passed spending bills which exceed Gov. Clements' announced bottom line and a conference committee of House and Senate members is now working to forge a compromise measure. The governor says he will approve no more than \$36.9 billion in spending; the Senate bill called for \$39.9 billion, and the House voted for \$39.4 billion. The governor's recent back-and-forth position on additional taxes ended with a return to an absolute veto threat. Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby has proposed to cut \$876 million from the Senate plan in an effort to move the budget stalemate off dead center. House Speaker Gib Lewis proposed a deeper cut with a \$38.4 billion budget, but the Lewis plan relied in part on the doomed state lottery option.

all law enforcement agencies in the state.

Special interests may have defeated any chance of tort reform this session by securing House passage of a version which is at odds with the delicately balanced Senate tort reform package. Tort reform deals with the complicated civil justice system, and reform is aimed at making liability insurance rates affordable again for Texans. The Senate has spent many months preparing its tort reform package, and the hastily created house plan may prove too different from the Senate legislation to be resolved by conference committee before the end of the regular legislative session. The Senate bill provides desperately needed protections for non-profit organizations and more affordable liability coverage for small local governments and small business. Gov. Clements has vowed to call yet another costly special session if the tort reform issue is not settled.

Among the more ludicrous suggestions to address the fiscal crisis is a budget proposed this week by the so-called no-tax plan would mean big increases in your local property taxes. For example, \$450 million in state contributions to the Teacher Retirement System would be forced on local school districts. Another \$433 million is "found" in repealing teacher pay incentives and funds now used by local school districts for such programs as vocational education. Further, the "conservative" budget assumes a savings of \$110 million by withholding payments to school districts for reducing class sizes in the third and fourth grades; these payments were never made in the first place. Other measures in the proposal include selling state lands...to the state, "Transferring to local funds" certain school expenses, and cuts in programs for elderly and handicapped. Obviously, I do not support this Conservative Coalition budget, since its impact on local taxpayers is far from "conservative".

The House witnessed another interesting lesson in politics last week when the author of a handgun bill completely changed the intent of his legislation and switched supporters into opponents. The bill started out as a bill to allow Texans to carry handguns, and it was originally supported by the National Rifle Assn. and other pro-gun groups. But the author substituted a bill which would have required stiff fees and severe restrictions on use. By the time the House voted the measure, the legislation looked like gun control instead of protection for law-abiding Texans. The final bill could have seriously threatened existing Texas law protecting the right to bear arms, and would have certainly limited the sporting use of handguns. ## Flower Showdown

Dear John: Is it okay to corral annual and perennial flowers in the same area? Or do they fight one another?

Dear Why-at-Herb: Perennials and annuals make fine partners in the flower garden. In fact, annuals can be planted in a perennial garden or border to change the look of the area from year to year. Annuals also come in handy after early flowering perennials fade in the spring. You can plant annuals to disguise the withering perennial bulbs and to extend the blooming season of the area.

Dear John: Is it necessary to have my mower blade sharpened?

Dear Sharp Eye: You might not think that soft grass can dull a metal mower blade, but it can. Especially in summer, grass can become tough and wiry and can dull the blade pretty fast. If your grass tips turn brown and are shredded after mowing, the blade should be sharpened. Here are some tips for sharpening a walk-behind mower blade:

- First, disconnect the spark plug wire to prevent accidental starts.
- Wrap the blade with a heavy rag while unscrewing it.

- Sharpen the blade with a file or grinding wheel, but don't hone it to a razor's edge. A thin edge will roll over, fray and get dull quickly.
- Remove an equal amount of material from each side of the blade to maintain proper balance.
- Check for balance by resting the mid-point of the blade on the edge of a ruler.
- If the blade has been damaged, replace it.

Dear John: How does a disease get started in a lawn?

Dear Fungus Foothold: Lawn diseases are mostly of the fungus variety and can arrive in your lawn by way of birds, animals, people's shoes or windblown debris.

Disease won't thrive in a healthy lawn. A weak lawn, on the other hand, is a favorite hot spot for disease. Also, a thatch layer of more than a 1/2 inch is an incubator for disease organisms. It's warm and moist and full of nutrients that don't get to grass roots.

An overfed or underfed lawn also is a breeding place for disease as is a lawn that's watered too often. With proper care, there's less chance of disease infecting your lawn.

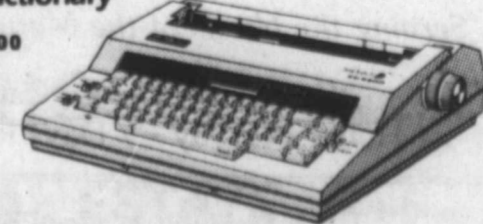
