Kidney Transplant Works For Former Lynn Resident

A kidney transplant in January Mrs. Billy Rhoads, Rt. 2, Tulia. has made a new life for a former Lynn County resident now living in Tulia, and 33-year-old Steve Rhoads, who had lost 95 percent of the use of his kidneys, barely had the operation in time.

At the time of the surgery, transplant of a kidney from a 36-year-old man who had died that same day in a motorcycle accident, Rhoads was very weak. And when the call came that a kidney was available, his doctor advised him to do it immediately, telling Rhoads "you may have only four or five months to live in your present condition."

Rhoads now feels so good he is ready to go back to work; he has a degree in finance and experience in sales.

People in the Tulia area have donated money to help the tremendous expenses of the operation and other care. He has no hospital insurance.

Some areas had even heavier rains, and some also had received rainfall earlier which brought their totals up to three or more inches in the last month.

Some cotton had just been planted and may have to be replanted; others now are waiting for the fields to dry sufficiently to get in and plant.





Pre-Kindergarten Registration Set

Pre-Kindergarten registration has been set for June 2. Parents will need to come to the Tubb Building Office to register. Office hours are 8 a.m. to 12 noon and 1 to 3:30 p.m.

Your child needs to meet the following requirements to qualify for Pre-Kindergarten.

Your child must be at least four (4) years old by Sept. 1 of the year of enrollment.

If your child is unable to speak and comprehend the English language; or

Your family income, according to standards set by the State Board of Education, is at or below subsistance level. Pre-kindergarten classes will be

taught on a one half (1/2) day basis only. Transportation and meals will not be provided by the school district.

You will need to bring a birth certificate and immunization records before your child can be registered.

Anyone involved in grain sorghum production within the regions represented by TGSPB and paying Texas grain sorghum assessments (including farm owners, tenants and sharecroppers) may be nominated for a TBSPB position and/or vote in this year's election.

Nominations must be filed with the Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board, P.O. Box 530, Abernathy Texas, no later July 15, 1987.


CHECK YOUR HOUSE FOUN-DATION--This is a good time of year to check the interior and exterior foundation walls of your house for cracks or insect infestation. "Early detection and repair can save you a lot of money," says Dr. Susan Quiring, a housing specialist. "You can do some of the smaller repairs yourself, though the larger ones should be done professionally." Foundation cracks occur for a variety of reasons ranging from the house

the foundation. Water also plays a role in the condition of the foundation, says Quiring. If your yard isn't graded properly or the soil around the foundation pulls away, the excess water can seep into the foundation and cause cracks. "Before you have any repair work done, get at least three estimates," the specialist suggests. "Check out the reputation of the company before they go to work on the foundation. Dear Editor:



"We, the members of the Texas Highway Department of Public Safety, want to remind you that with the extra traffic on the roadways there will also be extra hazards and dangers. Kids get tired on long trips and you need to take some games to keep them occupied. Take frequent breaks during your trip to get out and stretch your legs and shake the cobwebs from your head. Make sure you stay wide awake and alert on your trip," states Major Cawthon.

Cawthon also said that with our city driving everyone needs to be especially watchful for children. "With the excitement of playing, children seem to forget the rules of safety and sometime dart into the street in pursuit of a misguided toy or ball. While driving in residential areas be especially watchful for smaller children," he said.

"We also want to remind you to protect everyone in your vehicle by using your safety belts," said Cawthon.

Savings Bonds Rate Wilson Elementary Set At 5.84 Percent School Awards

The semiannual market-based interest rate for United States Savings Bonds, in effect from May through October 1987, has been set at 5.84 percent, the Treasury Department announced today. The rate is 85 percent of the average market yield on five year Treasury marketable securities during the preceding six months.

Although Bonds may be redeemed after six months, they must be held five years or longer to receive market-based rates. Bonds held less than five years earn interest on a fixed, graduated scale. Yields at redemption are the average of semiannual market-based rates during the time held, rounded to the nearest quarter percent and compounded semiannually, or a minimum rate, whichever is more. The current minimum rate is six percent.



The budget wars continue at the Capitol. The House and Senate have passed spending bills which exceed Gov. Clements' announced bottom line and a conference committee of House and Senate members is now working to forge a compromise measure. The governor says he will approve no more than \$36.9 billion in spending; the Senate bill called for \$39.9 billion, and the House voted for \$39.4 billion. The governor's recent back-and-forth position on additional taxes ended with a return to an absolute veto threat. Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby has proposed to cut \$876 million from the Senate plan in an effort to move the budget stalemate off dead center. House Speaker Gib Lewis proposed a deeper cut

with a \$38.4 billion budget, but

the Lewis plan relied in part on

the doomed state lottery option.

Among the more ludicrous suggestions to address the fiscal crisis is a budget proposed this week by the so-called no-tax plan would mean big increases in your local property taxes. For example, \$450 million in state contributions to the Teacher Retirement System would be forced on local school districts. Another \$433 million is "found" in repealing teacher pay incentives and funds now used by local school districts for such programs as vocational education. Further, the "conservative" budget assumes a savings of \$110 million by withholding payments to school districts for reducing class sizes in the third and fourth grades; these payments were never made in the first place. Other measures in the proposal include selling state lands...to the state, "Transferring to local funds" certain school expenses, and cuts in programs for elderly and handicapped. Obviously, I do not support this Conservative Coalition budget, since its impact on local taxpayers is far from 'conservative''.

The House witnessed another interesting lesson in politics last week when the author of a handgun bill completely changed the intent of his legislation and switched supporters into opponents. The bill started out as a bill to allow Texans to carry handguns, and it was originally supported by the National Rifle Assn. and other pro-gun groups. But the author substituted a bill which would have required stiff fees and severe restrictions on use. By the time the House voted the measure, the legislation looked like gun control instead of protection for lawabiding Texans. The final bill could have seriously threatened existing Texas law protecting the right to bear arms, and would have certainly limited the sporting use of handguns. Also, the legislation was opposed by

all law enforcement agencies in the state.

Special interests may have defeated any chance of tort reform this session by securing House passage of a version which is at odds with the delicately balanced Senate tort reform package. Tort reform deals with the complicated civil justice system, and reform is aimed at making liability insurance rates affordable again for Texans. The Senate has spent many months preparing its tort reform package, and the hastily created house plan may prove too different from the Senate legislation to be resolved by conference committee before the end of the regular legislative sesssion. The Senate bill provides desperately needed protections for non-profit organizations and more affordable liability coverage for small local governments and small business. Gov. Clements has vowed to call yet another costly special session if the tort reform issue is not settled.

Dear John: How does a disease get started in a lawn?

Dear Fungus Foothold: Lawn diseases are mostly of the fungus variety and can arrive in your lawn by way of birds, animals, people's shoes or windblown

Disease won't thrive in a healthy lawn. A weak lawn, on the other hand, is a favorite hot spot for disease. Also, a thatch layer of more than a 1/2 inch is an incubator for disease organisms. It's warm and moist and full of nutrients that don't get to grass roots.

An overfed or underfed lawn also is a breeding place for disease as is a lawn that's watered too often. With proper care, there's less chance of disease infecting your lawn.


