THIS NEWSPAPER office gets lots of mail every day except Tuesday and we always have the biggest load of mail on Monday morning, since the postoffice people stay busy all weekend cramming our box full of stuff addressed to us. And we suspect they also put into our box all the things addressed to "Boxholder" that they have left over after everybody else gets one.

Well, I'm told by my resident postperson that they don't do any such thing, but it sure seems like we get a lot of unnecessary stuff, especially on Mondays. (Congratulations, you may have won five million dollars if you'll just send us these numbers and let us mail you a \$29.95 autographed photo of Cindy Lauper...or, You have been selected to receive one of our major prizes, a 1987 Yamasaki boat, or \$2,000 cash, just call us in Las Vegas in the next 48 hours...or Buy this Medigap insurance...).

Not everything we get in the mail is useless; sometimes we get checks and often we get material which is interesting to read. For example, on Monday we received Bob Bullock's monthly publication, Fiscal Notes and in it was a report on how many acres of Texas farmland is owned by

foreigners. The total is about a million acres, which is a lot of land if you have to hoe weeds on it, but which represents less than one per cent of the state's 134 million acres in farm production last year.

Lubbock County has a few acres owned by foreigners, but most South Plains counties showed none. Quite a bit of land in the Big Bend region is owned by foreigners (who probably bought it sight unseen).

DPS Estimates 40 Will Die Over Holiday Weekend

The Department of Public Safety estimates that 40 persons will die in traffic accidents in the state during the upcoming Fourth of July holiday period.

For counting purposes, the National Safety Council has designated the 78-hour period from 6 p.m. Thursday, July 2 through midnight Sunday, July 5, as the holiday period.

Last year, during the Fourth of July period, 41 persons were killed in Texas traffic accidents, with four others subsequently dying of injuries suffered during the time

Though the number of holiday vehicle deaths varies from year to year, the causes of fatal accidents

"Last year, slightly more than 6 out of 10 traffic fatalities resulted from accidents in which either speed or driving while intoxicated were listed as contributing factors," Gossett said. "The message is clear--high speed or driving under the influence of alcohol, and often a combination of both, can kill motorists. It's also very important to remember to wear that safety belt and make sure very young children are in child safety seats."

Horwoods Hope London Trip To Settle Residency Issue

The Bruce Horwood family now expects to have to make a trip to London to deal with the American Embassy there, with the hope that they can obtain a classification as "permanent U.S. residents" that will enable them to continue living Tahoka.

The family which has lived in Tahoka for six years except for a three-month period messed up the five-year residency requirement for applying for U.S. citizenship has been ordered to leave the country by July 4.

In recent weeks, concerned neighbors and friends in Tahoka have been bombarding the offices of Sens. Phil Gramm and Lloyd Bentsen and Rep. Charles Stenholm with letters and phone calls supporting the Horwoods in their fight to stay in Tahoka.

"People have done so much for us," said Dorothy Horwood Tuesday. "The senator's office called us yesterday and told us how many calls and letters they have had...we want everyone to know where we stand, and right now we're waiting for word on when we will have to go to


She explained that an earlier plan to go to Canada to work things out had fallen through because their papers have already been sent to the U.S. Embassy in London. "If we waited for them to transfer our papers back, it might be a month or longer, and we're facing this July 4 deadline." Mrs. Horwood added that the family is seeking an extension on that deadline, however.

At any rate, as of Tuesday, the family was expecting to make a trip to London and was waiting word on just when they need to be there before trying to get airline reservations. In Britain, said Mrs. Horwood, they hope to get their passports stamped as 'permanent U.S. residents," which would allow them to stay in Tahoka, although the trip outside the U.S. would mean they have to start all over again on a five-year continuous residency plan before they can apply for U.S. citizenship.

Savings Bond Sales Up 23 Percent

Sales of U.S. Savings Bonds for the first half of fiscal year 1987 in Texas amounted to \$232,781,413, an increase of \$44 million or 23.3 percent over the same period of 1986, T.J. Morrow, District Director for the U.S. Savings Bonds Division in Dallas, announced recently. These sales represent 60 percent of the state's 1987 assigned dollar goal of \$388 million.

Sales of Series EE Bonds amounted to \$1,887 during March 1987 in Lynn County, F.B. Hegi Volunteer County Chairman, said. The October 1986-March 1987 total for the county was \$22,023.



People are the only creatures on earth who survive by serving each other, adds Young. It is in serving each other that people can find the satisfaction and reward they require for successful living. This fact is one of the basic principles upon which the 4-H club program is built.

Another way to say it is that "people get what they want in life by helping others get what they want," notes Young. Individuals cannot succeed or even survive for long without the resources they receive from other people, and vice versa. Today's 4-H program fosters a spirit of cooperation and creativity; a feeling that it is important to help other people develop their potential as human beings.

Opportunities for youth and adults to fulfill this basic need in life are almost without limit in 4-H, says Young. It's called leadership development, citizenship and community service. Everybody helps everybody else in 4-H, and therefore everybody comes out a winner.

In 4-H, 50 percent of the value of a youth's 4-H work is devoted to leadership of others and in citizenship and community service projects, Young points out. The other 50 percent of a member's work is devoted to his or her own projects.

Not only do people who are 4-H members, parents and volunteer leaders benefit from 4-H, but so does the community in which they live. 4-H families are devoting more and more of their time and energy to citizenship and community service projects. They want to literally 'Make the Best Better" in their own communities.

To find out how to become a part of the 4-H team, contact the county Extension office. Young people enrolled in the third grade through 19 years of age can join as members. Adults of any age can be a part of 4-H as project leaders, activity leaders, club leaders or help in many other

If you see a need for help in your community, tell someone in 4-H about it; 4-H can also be of service to you, says Young.



Avoid Preventable Tragedies With Fireworks On 4th

The Texas Safety Association warns that July Fourth festivities often turn into unnecessary tragedies each year for thousands who suffer serious injuries as a result of improper use of fireworks.


Statistics indicate that more than 8,000 persons are treated annually in hospital emergency rooms across the U.S. for fireworks related injuries.

"We strongly recommend that our Texas families and friends attend community-sponsored fireworks displays. Home displays are illegal in many communities throughout the state, and too often result in second and third degree burns, partial or total loss of sight, lacerations, and fractures. We want to see everyone return from a relaxing Fourth, not a harrowing one spent in a hospital emergency room," explained George R. Gustafson.

He also warned that small

children should not be permitted to handle any kind of fireworks, noting that approximately 45 percent of fireworks-related injuries occur among children aged 14 and younger.

While most states vary on their fireworks-control laws, Texas Safety Association says that a total ban of all fireworks, except those used by professional pyrotechnicians under controlled circumstances, is the best way to minimize fireworks-related in-



Dear John:

John Deere Answers Your Lawn and Garden Woes



Money-Wise Mowers

Dear John: I'm counting my pennies, so I want to get the most from my purchases. How can I tell if a walk-behind mower or riding mower is best for me?

Dear Money-Minder: Buying a mower takes dollars and sense. Your purchase depends on how much lawn you have to mow and how much time you want to spend mowing it. For example, if your lawn is less than a third of an acre, a walk-behind mower can be a good investment. If you mow more than a half-acre of grass, or you're spending more than an hour to do the job, you should think about buying a riding mower. If your lawn is more than two acres, count on a lawn and garden tractor to suit your needs.

In general, most people prefer to spend less than one to two hours per week mowing. A mower that's too small for your lawn will mean you have to spend more time mowing, and—as you know-time is money!

Dear John: My daughter asked me what she should do if she runs over a rock or other hard object while mowing. What should I tell

Dear Dumbfounded Dad: If your daughter runs over an object while mowing, it can damage the mower or mower blade. If she detects any difference in

the sound or operation of the mower, she should shut it off and seek your advice. Make sure to repair any mower damage before continuing to cut the grass. If the mower hasn't been damaged, remove the object from the lawn and continue mowing.

Also, advise your daughter on how to prevent this kind of mowing situation from happening. The mower blade, whirling at about 200 miles per hour, can fling objects at high speed. To prevent rocks or sticks from becoming missiles, walk around the yard and pick up sticks, stones, dogbones-whatever might be thrown by the mower blade - before mowing.

Dear John: Some of my flowers are starting to look like weeping willows. How can I perk them up?

Dear Weeping Wanda: Generally, plants with a mature height of more than 18 inches need staking. The stakes should be 6 to 8 inches shorter than the height of

the mature plant or flower. You can use twigs from autumn or late summer pruning as stakes to perk up your flowers on lazy summer days. Pound the stakes at least 6 inches into the ground early in the season so the maturing foliage will obscure them. Add twine when the buds form.




