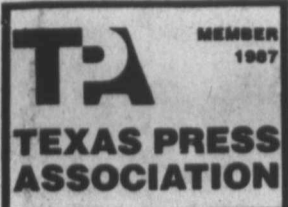

Survey Shows Seat Belt Use Increasing Here

In a survey conducted by John Morehead, project coordinator of the Community Occupant-Protection Program of Texas Tech University in conjunction with the Texas Highway Department, the number of Tahoka drivers using seat belts has increased since last year.

The survey, according to Morehead, showed 35.5 percent of drivers in Tahoka use seat belts, compared to 25.24 percent at this time last year. "This constitutes a big improvement for Tahoka," said Morehead. "Smaller communities in the area have all shown similar increases statistically, while the number of Lubbock drivers using seat belts has dropped from last year." Statewide, he said, the survey showed about 55 percent of drivers use seat belts, which is a decrease from 60 percent last year.

Four Men Charged In Burglary Case

Four Slaton black males were in jail this week after being charged in the burglary of a garage at the home of Lois Jones, four miles north of Wilson of FM 400 last week.

Arrested by Slaton Police Dept., the four were in jail in Tahoka in lieu of bonds of \$25,000 each set by Justice of the Peace H.W. Edwards. Charged are George Lee White, 24; Jackie Cubit, 21; Anthony Busby, 19; and Stevie Woodson, age not listed. A lawn mower, weed eater and items stolen from a refrigerator were recovered.

Two other burglaries in the county during the last week are the subject of \$300 rewards offered by Crime Line, 998-5145. Between June 12 and June 24

someone took a GE microwave oven, evaporative cooler and a go-kart from a house a half mile west of Gordon on FM 2292, owned by Mrs. Jim McMahon of Lubbock. The stolen items were valued at a total of \$650.

The other burglary was of a rural house 15 miles north of Tahoka and then 4 miles west of U.S. 87, owned by John Mann of Lubbock Rt. 1. This burglary was between June 25-30. A large quantity of items in the house were stolen, mostly tools, a TV set, an AM-FM stereo, and meat from a freezer.

Sheriff Clifford Laws this week urged all Lynn County citizens to continue to be alert for unknown or suspicious vehicles in rural areas where they are not normally seen. A citizen should write down license numbers and call the sheriff's office so they can check them out by computer, just in case the information should be needed.

Two forgery cases involving checks paid by Tahoka and Wilson banks were turned over to Lubbock authorities.

Tahoka police were busy during the past couple of weeks including investigations of three assaults involving public fighting, one case of harassment by phone, a burglary of a building, one DWI arrest and five persons were arrested for public intoxication.

On Friday, June 19, it was reported that persons unknown had broken into the senior league baseball park and had stolen several bats, gloves and mask.

Police picked up two aliens who were returned to immigration officials during the past week.

One accident was investigated on Sunday at Loop 472 and Lockwood that involved a 1988 Chevrolet pickup driven by Autumn Martin of Tahoka and a 1980 Pontiac driven by Dianna Flores of Tahoka. No injuries were reported.

In jail during the week were three persons for driving while intoxicated, one for DWI plus no drivers license or insurance, three for public intoxication, one for theft by check and four men for burglary of a building.

Rains Prepare Johnsongrass For Treatment

Abundant rains on the High Plains have contributed to the growth of johnsongrass, always a serious problem for cotton growers. But the rains also have primed the grass for herbicide treatments, said a cotton specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"A combination of mechanical tillage, soil and foliar applied herbicides and hand hoeing are required to effectively eliminate the weed," said Dr. James Supak, Extension cotton agronomist.

"The recent rains have johnsongrass in prime condition for treatments with herbicides, especially the Poast or Fusilade type of materials that can be applied over the top of cotton," he said.

Breaking up the rhizomes and pulling them to the soil surface during chiseling and other fall winter tillage operations helps to set the stage for an effective herbicide control program, said Supak. Desiccation and weathering will weaken or even kill

exposed rhizomes.

Breaking the rhizomes up into fragments limits the amount of food reserves available for the development of new shoots. Supak said the amount of herbicide needed to kill a short root segment is less than that needed to eliminate a large, intact rhizome.

Supak warned that over-the-top applications of DSMA and MSMA on johnsongrass may cause "burn down" and suppression of the grass.

"Such treatments can cause damage to the crop and slow its growth and development," Supak said.

Roundup applied as a spot spray, with wipe-on applicators or with recirculating sprayers provides an effective and economical means for controlling johnsongrass once the height of the weeds exceeds that of the crop, said Supak.

"Permanent control is more likely if the grass is in the boot or early flowering stages of development," he noted. Supak warned that grass in the boot or early flowering stages is often delayed in growth because of weed competition.

Supak said Poast and Fusilade 2000 were introduced as post-emergence herbicides that can be applied over-the-top of cotton to control annual and perennial grasses. These herbicides are applied as broadcast or spot spray treatments to control johnsongrass in its early developmental stages, said Supak.

"A crop oil concentrate or surfactant must be used at designated rates to insure herbicide penetration into grass tissue," said Supak.

Supak warned that in some instances a second application will be needed to control escapes and late emerging plants.

The condition of the grass at the time of treatment with all these herbicides is extremely important in determining the level of control that will be obtained, said Supak. In all cases the grass needs to be actively growing and not be under stress due to drought or other factors.

Dear John:

John Deere Answers Your Lawn and Garden Woes



Heavy Weather Woes

Dear John: We've had some awful storms here lately with gusting winds and rain. Will strong winds affect the produce in my vegetable garden?

Dear Dorothy Gale: Sometimes a hot, dry wind can cause bean blossoms to drop off or fail to form pods. You can try to protect your vegetables from the elements by covering them when you expect heavy weather, but only Mother Nature knows if they will survive.

If weather problems have caused certain vegetables in your garden to become weak and sickly, your best bet is to pull up the plants and sow new seeds. And if weather is a constant problem where you live, you may want to call a truce with Mother Nature by replanting parts of your garden with harder vegetables, like peas, potatoes and carrots.

Dear John: I don't want to drown my flowers or let them suffer from thirst. When and how should I water them?

Dear Mrs. Kind-Heart: Plants vary in the amounts of water they need. Bulbs and perennials are usually able to withstand dry periods because of their deep, water-retentive root systems. But don't ignore their cries for help—

wilting leaves are a sure sign they need a drink.

Annuals need a more constant supply of water than other plants because they have shallow roots and grow and flower all season long. Quench their thirst by watering them each week with about 1 inch of water.

The best way to water your lawn is also best for your garden—deep but infrequent watering. Light, frequent sprinklings don't penetrate soil deeply enough. This may prevent the plants from developing a deep root system, which makes them even more sensitive to drought.

Dear John: I lead a simple life and don't like to spend much time worrying about things like weeds. Can I use one herbicide to kill them all?

Dear Hopeful Herb: One herbicide won't kill every type of weed. Preemergence herbicides work on narrowleaf weeds like crabgrass, killing the seeds as they germinate. Postemergence herbicides control broadleaf weeds, like dandelions, by circulating through the weed to kill it root and all.

CAPITOL JOURNAL

Comptroller Bob Bullock, the
 state's official revenue esti-
 mator, now says that a lottery
 would raise only about \$350
 million for the state over the
 next biennium, down consider-
 ably from earlier estimates. To
 put it in perspective, a lottery
 might bring in 5 to 6 percent of
 the projected \$6.5 billion deficit
 Bullock says the state will face.
 Some Texans support the lottery
 because they believe they will
 win the cash jackpot; other
 supporters honestly believe it
 will eliminate the state deficit
 without need for any other new
 state taxes. Opponents point to
 losses in retail sales, sales taxes,
 and manufacturing jobs due to
 money being spent on ticket
 sales rather than consumer
 goods. How do you feel?

The governor and a recalcitrant
 Panhandle senator have com-
 bined forces to cut off two major
 efforts aimed at rural develop-
 ment. Last week, I told you
 about a bill passed by the House
 and the Senate which would have
 provided for small, low-interest,
 long-term loans to displaced
 farmers, workers, and others
 who reside in rural areas for the
 start-up or expansion of small
 business. Despite his continued
 battle cry of "jobs, jobs, jobs,"
 Governor Clements vetoed this
 legislation on June 20. The law
 would have been supervised by a
 board including representatives
 from Texas Tech and Texas
 A&M. The program would have
 been carried out through such
 institutions as Texas State Tech-
 nical Institute and community
 colleges. The legislation pro-
 vided a significant impetus for
 rural economic development.


