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
Pool Claimed Safe Despite AIDS Scare

Business was down sharply at the Tahoka Swimming Pool during the last 10 days since a suspected AIDS victim was seen swimming in the pool, but city officials said Tuesday that the pool has been rated absolutely safe by state health officials, and the pool business is slowly building back up.

On July 5, a young man reportedly from Lubbock but with relatives in Tahoka was seen in the pool by someone who recognized him as a possible AIDS patient seen earlier at a medical facility.

"Actually it has not even been confirmed to us that this young man has AIDS," said City Manager Barry Pittman. But on the assumption that he does, the city officials called the State Health Dept. and were told that there would be no chance of anyone catching AIDS by being in the water at the same time or after an AIDS patient had been in the water.

"They told us that there's no way the AIDS virus can survive even briefly in that pool," said Pittman. "We were told that the chemicals in the pool would kill the virus immediately... We did put heavy doses of chlorine in the pool last week just to relieve the minds of some of the patrons."

Draw Church To Mark 80th Year On Sunday

With a decline in so many religions and with so many churches closing their doors, it is refreshing to hear about a church celebrating an anniversary. Draw Methodist Church will be celebrating its 80th year, Sunday, July 19, with special services and remembrances.

"That little church is just as much a part of my life as

breathing," said Brenda Furlow, a Draw resident. "I think about the faithfulness of all the people, the love it takes to keep it going, and what it means to the community. What would Draw be without it? A cotton gin, that's it. IT (the church) is Draw."

Eighty years ago, Draw Methodist Church started out like so many churches in ranching and farming areas. The first services conducted by Rev. J.O. Gore were held in the Draw School House northeast of the present day building in a place commonly called Moore's Draw. The "church" belonged to the Colorado District with Rev. J.T. Griswold as the Presiding Elder.

"When Tahoka Mission was formed (1904) it consisted of Lynn, Dawson, and Garza counties," Rev. Gore wrote in a letter dated April 11, 1951. "There was not one cent's worth of property, nor a roll of members within its bounds. In the three counties, we organized something like 20 churches."

The charter members of this small gathering of Draw Methodists were also members of the first families to populate Draw and the surrounding area: Mr. and Mrs. W.A. Waller and their three daughters, Emily, Sadie and Willie; Mrs. Kittie LeMond and Mrs. E.A. Duckworth, the Draw school teacher's wife.

The Methodist Annual Conference of November 1907 placed Draw on the Post Mission in the Plainview District. In November 1911 Draw joined O'Donnell with Rev. T.A. Knight dividing Sunday services between the churches.

"When my parents moved to Draw on Jan. 10, 1919, we settled and right away went to Sunday school. It wasn't a big crowd. But everyone was glad when Sunday came so we could go to Sunday school and see our neighbors," remembers Mrs. Lula Busby, a Dallas resident since 1960. "Then when we built the church, oh, that was wonderful! And we had more and more to come as time went by."

In 1914, T.J. Williams told Waller: "Let's go outside and talk." And in the conversation that followed, the men decided to build a church building. Williams, Waller and Mr. Givens had all worked as carpenters, so they were naturally selected to head the planning and building committee. The land was a one acre block of land bought from Mr. and Mrs. John Berry for \$30. The present day building is on the same land. The records show T.J. Williams, W.A. Waller, and J.W. Long and their successors as trustees. The church was dedicated in the summer of 1915, free of debt under Rev. W.R. Kirkpatrick's leadership.

In the years between 1915-1927, Lynn County grew rapidly. Out of these 13 or so families to join the Draw Methodist Church, five young men were called to serve the Lord.

"As I look back upon these

much earlier years of my life, I find I owe a considerable debt of gratitude to the Draw Methodist Church," said Dr. Bervin Caswell, retired pastor. "Some of the contributions it made to my life are an elemental but basic knowledge and understanding of the Bible, a fairly substantial grounding in the faith, which came as an accumulation of experiences in the church there."

In 1918, Draw and O'Donnell were placed in the Lubbock District which they both belong to at the present time.

In the fall of 1922, a box supper was held to raise money in order to repair the church building. The supper was such a great success the parishioners decided to use the money to build a new church building. The old building was sold to Green Cook and C.C. Jackson who used it as a store. The new church building was dedicated in the summer of 1924. Rev. E. Robins of Lubbock preached the sermon and Rev. B.W. Dodson presided over the week-long revival that began that night.

According to the Methodist Conference Journal of 1925, Rev. W.C. Hart was named supply pastor to the Draw-Grassland charge. Lynn County had grown enough for Draw to separate from O'Donnell and have its own full-time pastor and share with a smaller community.

But there was still no parsonage and the added comfort of having the work and influence of the pastor living in Draw was sorely missed. Until then Rev. Hart was living in O'Donnell and preaching at Draw and Grassland. The Presiding Elder promised Draw if they would build a parsonage, he'd appoint a pastor to live there. The records show that on Nov. 14, 1927, a half acre of land adjoining the church lot to the north was bought. The people of Draw and Grassland got busy and built a parsonage. Rev. Hamilton Wright and family moved to Draw soon after Christmas '27. In the year that Rev. Wright stayed in Draw, he had 50 conversions.

In 1929, Rev. W.B. Gilliam came to Draw and among his accomplishments was getting the youth of Draw Methodist Church organized into the Epworth League. Two young men, Gerald McCollom and Billy Porterfield, who are now pastors, were Epworth League leaders at Draw which chartered 50 members.

"We had a live Epworth League," wrote Rev. Gilliam. "Billy Porterfield was called to preach under my ministry. He used to accompany me. At one service he had two conversions."

In the days of the thirties, the social life of the youth in Draw was the Epworth League, church services, and school.

"We (the youth) loved coming to Epworth League to visit and study the missionaries in far-

Gunshot Ruled Cause Of Woman's Death

A gunshot wound to the head, apparently from a .22, was reported as the cause of death of Elida Moreno Valdez, 35, whose nude body was found alongside U.S. 87 about 2.5 miles south of Tahoka on July 8.

Sheriff Clifford Laws said an autopsy revealed the gunshot wound. Justice of the Peace H.W. Edwards has ruled homicide as a result of the gunshot wound. The woman's hands and feet had been bound.

Officers have questioned some people in regard to the case, but no arrests have been made, and this week Lynn County Crime Line offered a \$1,000 reward for information leading to clearing of the case.

Services for Mrs. Valdez were held in Lubbock last week, with burial in Slaton. Among her survivors are her husband, Joe; two daughters, two brothers and three sisters.

Law officers from the Tahoka Police Dept., Lynn County sheriff's office and the Department of Public Safety all combined to go to the home of a woman who had a gun and was threatening to shoot the officers in Tahoka Tuesday evening. After some tense moments during which the officers entered the house, the woman was subdued and then taken to a hospital in Lubbock and later released.

Mayor Jim Solomon commented on the incident Wednesday, saying that the community should appreciate the "professional manner in which the officers of all three departments handled the

situation, and especially the way the men from the sheriff's department, Dept. of Public Safety and Tahoka Police Dept. all worked together as a team to bring to a reasonable conclusion a situation which could have been tragic."

A white male driving a white car was a suspect in theft of a paper bag of money from the counter of Allsup's in O'Donnell about 6:30 a.m. Saturday. The manager had just taken the money from a safe when he was distracted by waiting on a customer. The suspect was wearing a brown baseball-type cap, white shirt and jeans. Crime Line, 998-5145, has offered a \$500 reward in the case.

Crime Line is offering a \$500 reward in the burglary of the residence of Michael D. Graves, a half mile south of FM 211 on FM 179, sometime between July 11 and July 13. Taken were two VCRs, a microwave oven, a 19-inch J.C. Penney TV, stereo, a New Home school ring and a 1981 white Chevrolet Silverado pickup.

In jail during the last week were three persons for theft by check, four persons for revocation of probation, two for driving while intoxicated, one each for public intoxication and failure to appear plus public intoxication, and one person charged with speeding and violation of promise to appear, plus another count of speeding and having an expired drivers license.

Lynn County Names New Extension Home Economist

A new Extension agent for home economics has been appointed for Lynn County. Miss Annis Brown, agent in Hale County for the past two years, will assume the post here Aug. 1.

Her appointment was announced by County Judge J.F. Brandon and Dr. Catherine Crawford, district director for home economics with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Miss Brown will fill the vacancy created when Miss Tamara Over-

cast transferred to Lamar County. Miss Brown will work with Stanley Young, county Extension agent for agriculture, and will conduct educational programs in home economics for adults and 4-H Club members.

Under her leadership, Hale County 4-H enrollment increased significantly.

The new agent is a 1984 graduate of Texas Tech University with a Bachelor of Science degree in home economics education. At Tech, she was on the Dean's Honor List, president and project chairperson of the American Home Economics Association, and home economics recruiter for the Home Economics Council. She also was a member of Collegiate 4-H and Zeta Tau Alpha, and received a scholastic achievement award.

A native of Crowell, she was a state 4-H record book winner and earned a trip to National 4-H Congress. She took second place at Texas 4-H Roundup for a method demonstration and received the Gold Star Award, the highest county 4-H honor.

City Officers To Start Crackdown On Junk Cars

Calling junk vehicles "a blight which diminishes property values and constitutes a hazard to public health and safety," the Tahoka city council this week will launch a program to strictly enforce the city's junk vehicle ordinance.

Vehicles which meet the junk vehicle definition under the ordinance will start being tagged with a bright red label by police after which the owners may sign a release allowing the city to pick up the vehicle at no charge or may request a hearing before the city judge.

The ordinance defines a junk vehicle as one which is not running and which does not have an unexpired license plate and inspection sticker, and which is wrecked, partially dismantled or discarded.

If the owner of a tagged vehicle does nothing about it within 10

days the owner becomes liable for a fine up to \$200 per day, and the vehicle may be moved by the city.

The ordinance does not apply to a vehicle kept in an enclosed building or where it is not visible from the street or other public or private property, or is stored in a lawful manner on private property in connection with the business of a licensed vehicle dealer or junkyard.

City officials said the crackdown is part of a continuing effort "to help improve the quality of life of our city. Cooperation by the public in aiding the police department and locating and removing all junked vehicles will be greatly appreciated." Anyone having information about the location of such vehicles is asked to contact the chief of police at 998-4211.

TRLA Files Suit Against 23 Farmers

Texas Rural Legal Aid, Inc.'s Hereford office filed a massive class action lawsuit on July 10 against 23 South Plains farmers on behalf of farm workers who hoed cotton during the past three years near Tahoka, Seagraves and Brownfield.

The lawsuit alleges violations of the federal minimum wage laws, violations of state field sanitation regulations, breaches of contract, violations of the federal Migrant and Seasonal Agricultural Worker Protection Act (AWPA). The lawsuit alleges all these violations were "intentional and in bad faith."

Farmers named as defendants in the case are Gerald Goldston, Bobby Harlan, Scott Hamm, J.W. Hawkins, Laverne Meeks Farms, Doyle Moss, Herbie Marchbanks, Keith Addison, Lynn Addison, Earl Brown III, R.H. Clements, Evans & Clem, Meeks Farms Partnership, P&B Farms, Kenneth Purtell, Roy A. Sexton, T&S Skains Farms, Ralph

Spain, E.H. Wood, Bobby Jack Welch, Goodpasture Inc. PST, and Grady Herron.

The lawsuit seeks maximum penalties against all 23 defendants, including double the unpaid minimum wages, \$500 per violation per person of the AWPA, attorney's fees, and interest.

TRLA attorney Steve McIntyre stated that "This lawsuit is a result of chronic violations of federal and state laws and abuses of farmworkers."

McIntyre warned that TRLA and the plaintiffs "will be watching closely for any retaliation against the plaintiffs or those who cooperate with the plaintiffs. We already have sworn testimony from a witness that some of the defendants have made statements that the plaintiffs are not going to get any more work in the area. If that proves true, we will not hesitate to seek immediate relief from the courts."

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

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away exotic lands," said Etha Mae Caswell. "Of course, the boys weren't always interested in studying the Bible. But we always has lots of fun."

In 1940, the three bodies of Methodism united. The Epworth League continued its work as the United Methodist Youth Fellowship.

Rev. Jesse E. Young came to Draw in 1939 and stayed five years.

Grassland Methodist Church had an ambition to become a full-time charge. Since Draw had a large congregation, they could handle a full-time pastor's salary. So Rev. C.A. Norcross was sent to Draw in 1944 as a full-time pastor and Draw was on its own.

For the years 1942-1957, the Draw Women's Society of Christian Services led every W.S.C.S in the Lubbock District in lifetime memberships. The money donated by the memberships went to missionaries in the field of Christian service.

"The Women's Society meant as much to me as church did," said Mary Sherrill, a former W.S.C.S. district officer. "We had a devout group. We met once a week. We had Bible study, did things for families in need. We didn't have a nursery then. The kids came with us and played outside."

In June 1947, the Conference sent Rev. A.D. Moore to Draw. The church was doing well financially so the congregation installed fluorescent lights, venetian blinds and air conditioning in the sanctuary.

The Draw Methodist Church celebrated its 50th year under Rev. C.Y. Pickens. The church was at its largest attendance. The Sunday school attendance averaged in the 90's.

Rev. J.W. Read and wife were the last pastor family to live at Draw in 1965. As many moved from Draw to larger towns, it was decided the time had come to join with O'Donnell in extended ministry. Robert Brown was the first pastor to travel the road from O'Donnell to Draw since 1925. At that time, the Draw women joined the O'Donnell Women's Society and the youth of Draw joined the O'Donnell M.Y.F.

"Along about the then Draw was feeling hard times," Graham Hensley said. Hensley's family came to Draw in 1916. "The preacher needed more money to live. So we (O'Donnell and Draw) got together. They had the best parsonage, by far, so the preacher wanted to live there. We hated losing the pastor for the community's sake. But joining with O'Donnell is fine and works out well."

In 1983-84, Philip Mack Furlow, from Draw, under O'Donnell's UMYF banner, received many awards and was elected to many offices; including District and Conference President and

Representative to the National Youth Ministries.

"Philip has accomplished a lot," remarked Rev. Elmer Ward, present pastor of Draw-O'Donnell Methodist Churches. "I think it's from the experiences he's had in the Draw Church. Draw is just about the smallest church in the conference, but it has the biggest heart. Draw is unique because of its sense of humor and the people's willingness to work together for the good of the church."

"I think we're unique because we're still here. Through the trials and tribulations, we're still here. Now we're a missionary church with an intergrated congregation, almost half are Hispanic. Draw is proud that they have two Hispanic members of faith and by certificate.

Philip Furlow was once asked by Bishop Louis Schowengerdt why Draw has had such a wonderful success with getting Hispanics to attend church. Philip answered, "We just ask them to join us."

Because of this 80th year celebration, the congregation of Draw and their friends have been working hard to give the church building a face-lift. The paint is brightly white, the new shingles will hold back the rain and the new carpet in the back rooms matches the new venetian blinds.

"When I was five," said Virginia Hensley, who moved here in 1917, "my favorite verse was 'Let us go unto the House of the Lord'. That little church is it."

The Executive Director of the Texas Water Commission has prepared draft permits which, if approved by the Commission, will authorize the operation of these facilities under the terms described above.

Legal Authority: Section 26.028 and 27.018 of the Texas Water Code, as amended, and 31 TAC Chapters 305 and 331 of the Rules of the Texas Water Commission.

No public hearing will be held on this application unless an affected person who has received notice of the application has requested a public hearing. Any such request for a public hearing shall be in writing and contain (1) the name, mailing address and phone number of the person making the request; and (2) a brief description of how the requester, or persons represented by the requester, would be adversely affected by the granting of the application. If the Commission determines that the request sets out an issue which is relevant to the permit decision, or that a public hearing would serve the public interest, the Commission shall conduct a public hearing, after the issuance of proper and timely notice of the hearing. If no sufficient request for hearing is received within 30 days of the date of publication of the notice concerning the application, the permit will be submitted to the Commission for final decision on the application.

A fifth CRP sign up has been announced by the Secretary to begin July 20 and end July 31. Sign up will be at the Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation Service office in Tahoka. In the last four signups, farmers submitted bids on a total of 2.3 million acres in Texas. The Conservation Reserve is authorized by Congress to continue until 1990, a total of five years, as long as funds are appropriated. Currently, funds have been appropriated through September of this year. The U.S. Dept. of Agriculture's Conservation Reserve Program may be farmers' best bet to make a profit on highly erodible cropland and defray some of the cost of conservation.

"According to USDA rules, compliance with the conservation provisions of the 1985 Food Security Act requires farmers who plan to cultivate highly erodible cropland after Jan. 1, 1990, to develop a conservation plan by 1990," said Eual Davis, district conservationist for the USDA Soil Conservation Service at Tahoka. "They must also protect their land against soil erosion with applied conservation practices by 1995 if they want to participate in USDA programs. These practices may include conservation tillage system, terraces, grassed water ways, stripcropping, or other practices."

CRP offers farmers cost sharing and annual rental payments to convert this highly erodible cropland to permanent vegetation, and a chance to bypass expensive conservation treatment, retain eligibility for USDA programs, and ensure a return on this land.

"Most land fitting the highly erodible criteria is not only difficult to protect against erosion, but often produces poor crop yields and has a low profit potential," Davis said. "Most times, payments provided under the Conservation Reserve Program offer farmers greater rates of return to this land."

Under the CRP, farmers receive cost sharing to establish grass, trees, or wildlife plantings on highly erodible cropland. Cost sharing is provided for 50 percent of eligible costs of establishment. Annual rental payments are bid by the farmer and extend for 10 years, the length of the CRP contract. The permanent vegetation must be maintained during this time, and harvesting will not be permitted.

NOTICE OF INTENTION TO CONDUCT WEATHER MODIFICATION OPERATIONS IN THE STATE OF TEXAS

Date of the first of three weekly publications of this Notice: July 9, 1987.

- Notice is hereby given that the Colorado River Municipal Water District has filed an application with the Texas Water Commission for a State permit to conduct weather modification operations to change or attempt to change the natural development of clouds for the purpose, objective, period, and by the method summarized hereinbelow.
- The Colorado River Municipal Water District has a valid Texas weather modification license. The initial license was issued on December 18, 1974, and was renewed in 1976, 1977, 1978, 1979, 1980, 1981, 1982, 1983, 1984, 1985, and 1986.
- The purpose of the weather modification operation is to increase rainfall to affect water resources. The period of the permit is March 1 through November 30 during the years 1988, 1989, 1990, and 1991.
- The proposed weather modification operation is to be conducted for and on behalf of the Colorado River Municipal Water District, P.O. Box 869, Big Spring, Texas 79721-0869.
- The proposed weather modification operation is to be carried out in both an "operational area" and a "target area" to cause the intended effects to occur only in the target area. The operational area is that area described as being the area between an outer boundary which is defined by a line that encompasses the block of counties of Lynn, Garza, Kent, Fisher, Nolan, Coke, Sterling, Glasscock, Martin and Dawson, and an inner boundary which is that of the target area.
- The area to be affected by the proposed weather modification operation is the target area. The target area is that area described as bounded by a line beginning at a point of origin at Big Spring, Texas, and running along Highway 87 in a northwesterly direction to Lamesa; thence, north-northeast on Highway 87 to the north border of Dawson County; thence, east along the northern boundary lines of Dawson, Borden, and Scurry Counties to Highway 84; thence, southeast along Highway 84 to Roscoe, in Nolan County; thence, south-southeast to Marneale; thence, southwest to Silver in Coke County; thence, west-southwest to Highway 87 at a point approximately 13 miles northwest of Sterling City; thence, northwesterly along Highway 87 to the point of origin at Big Spring, Texas.
- The methods and materials to be used in conducting this operation are summarized herein: A licensed meteorologist will select cumulonimbus clouds for cloud-seeding using a weather radar display, standard meteorological analyses, forecast techniques, observations, and pilot reports to direct an aircraft equipped to disperse the seeding particles, silver iodide crystals, into the updraft air at cloud base.
- Persons interested in knowing more about the technical aspects of the proposed operation should contact the applicant or the Weather & Climate Section of the Commission.
- A public hearing on this application may be called by mailing a petition that requests a hearing to the Executive Director, Texas Water Commission, P.O. Box 13087, Capitol Station, Austin, Texas 78711. The petition must contain (1) the signature, full name, address, and phone number of each person requesting; (2) a statement that each person is at least 18 years of age and resides or owns property in the operational area; and, (3) a description of each person's interest and how that interest would be adversely affected. Requests for hearing must be received by the Commission within 30 days of the date of the first publication of this notice. More information on calling a hearing can be obtained through the Legal Division of the Commission.

Dear John:

John Deere Answers Your Lawn and Garden Woes



Likeable Lawn

Dear John: My grass leans to one side as though it's waving to the neighbors. What causes this and what can I do about it?

Dear Wavey Davey: Sounds like you need to give your lawn some excitement. Add more variety to its life—and yours—by changing your pattern each time you mow. Always mowing in the same direction causes grass blades to lean, allowing mower blades to sweep over areas and leave skipped spots. Your gregarious grass will look healthier and you'll be happier if you change your mowing pattern to prevent a waving field of green.

Dear John: I hate to take a chance and divide up my successful perennials. Is it necessary?

Dear Nervous Nellie: The saying "two's company, three's a crowd" goes for plants as well as humans. After a few years in the same pattern, your perennials will welcome a separation. Root crowding makes it difficult for perennials to live harmoniously beneath your garden's soil for more than a few years. The roots become so crowded that they compete with one another for nutrients and growing space.

Divide perennials in the spring so the plants have a long season of warm weather to become established. And don't worry about taking a chance. When you

separate the plants, they can develop new roots and flowers and achieve continued success in your flower garden.

Dear John: Can you give me some advice on when to harvest garden vegetables?

Dear Picky Picker: Harvest most vegetables too early and they'll lack flavor. Harvest too late and they can be woody in texture and taste. Here's some advice on choosing the best time to pick popular vegetables:

Cut broccoli when the buds are compact, but before they turn yellow or open into flowers. Leave 5 to 6 inches of stem attached.

Cut cabbage heads when they are solid, but before they crack or split.

Carrots are ready to pick when they are young, crisp and 1/2 to 1 inch in diameter.

Pick corn when the silk turns dark and starts to shrivel. The kernels should be bright, plump and milky.

Harvest cucumbers when they're uniformly dark green, firm and crisp.

Green onions are ready for cutting when the tops are 6 inches high and the stem is the thickness of a pencil.

Pick tomatoes when they have a healthy pink color and let them ripen indoors.


