Taking laxatives? Try this simple, natural remedy. (I can't say any of the things that come to mind.)

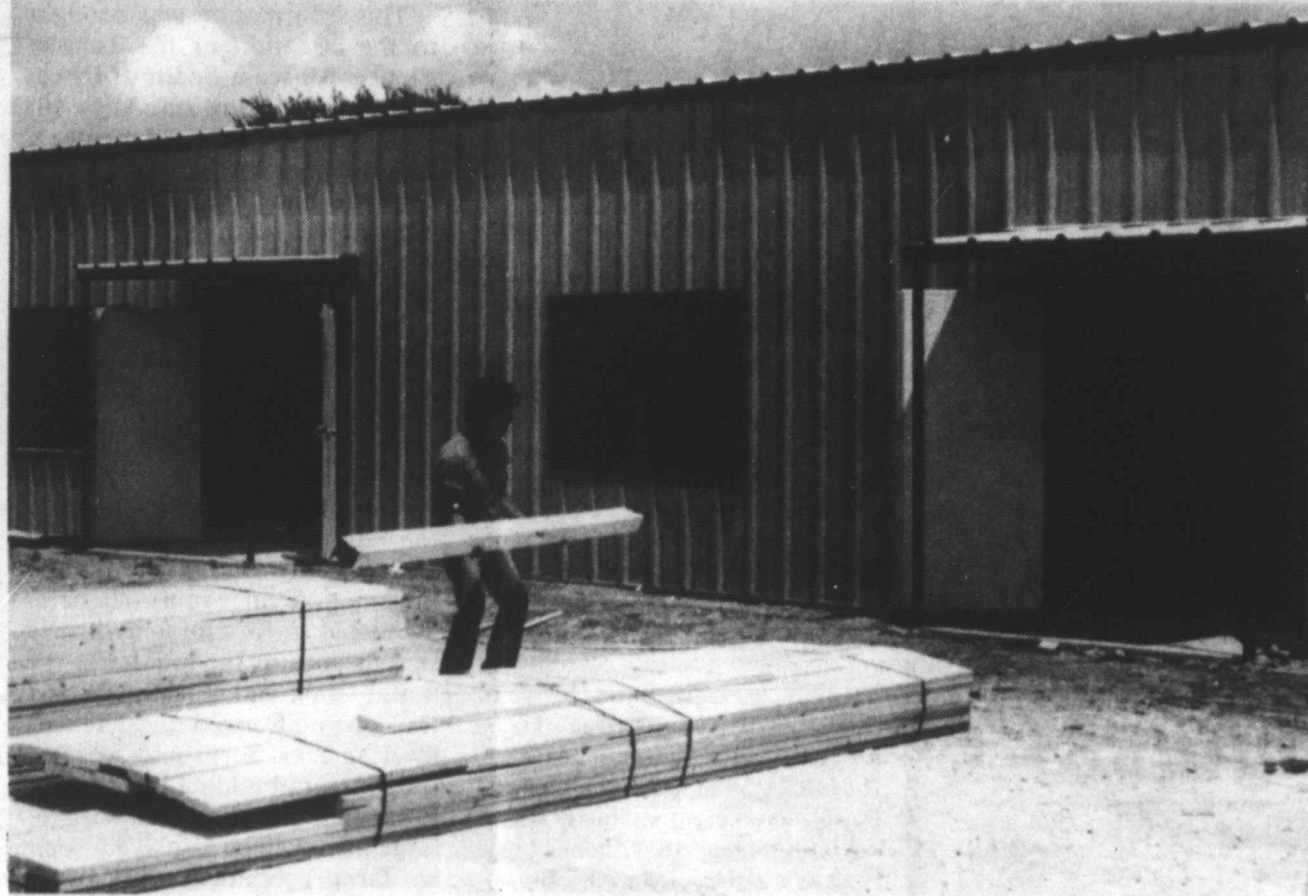
See how a tennis ball can stop your mate from snoring. (Cram it into his/her mouth.)

Burglaries, Vandalism Reports Are Investigated

Tahoka police investigated a burglary at Higginbotham-Bartlett Lumber Co. located on Ave. H, reported by manager Jimmy Huckabey on Monday. It was reported that unknown person(s) had entered the building on Sunday by breaking two window glasses in the east bay door. Reported stolen was a green money bag (FNB of Tahoka) that contained \$490.39 cash, and checks totaling \$578.36. Damage to the windows totaled \$8.40.

The KLS radio tower about six miles west of Tahoka was in the news again this week as someone shot two transformers near the tower, apparently with a .22 caliber weapon, sometime in the five days before last Thursday, when the damage was discovered.

The transformers belong to Lyntegar Electric Co-Op. The tower, with its brilliant flashing strobe lights which have been the subject of some complaints, was the target of a bomb scare a couple of weeks ago.

Crime Line, 998-5145, has offered a \$200 reward in shooting of the transformers, and is offering a \$300 reward in a pickup burglary and \$500 reward in a Wilson home break-in and in the Higginbotham-Bartlett burglary.

At Wilson, the home of Joe Zavala, 1107 Vanham, was burglarized on Wednesday, Aug. 5, between the hours of 7 a.m. and 11 p.m. Missing were a bag of candy, a photo album and two or three dollars in change.

A pickup owned by Wendell Morrow of New Home was burglarized while it was parked in front of Morrow's home on Smith St. sometime before 7:30

a.m. last Friday. Taken from the vehicle were a Pioneer AM-FM cassette system, Sony speakers and a JSE booster-amplifier. Total value of the stolen items was listed at \$700.

Sheriff Clifford Laws said this week that from now on, persons giving bad checks will be dealt with summarily. He explained that in the past the sheriff's office has allowed a grace period for offenders to pay off the bad checks, but that because of the increased number of check warrants, the department no longer can give this grace period.

In jail during the week were two persons on charges of no liability insurance and failure to appear on traffic warrants, and one each for speeding and failure to appear, public intoxication

and criminal mischief and resisting arrest plus public intoxication.

Police found a man lying face-down on the street at approximately 2:30 a.m. on Sunday next to his bicycle on Highway 380 by Tejada's Cafe. The 33-year-old Tahoka man was arrested for public intoxication and was booked into Lynn County Jail.

Police investigated an accident at Loop 472 and South 2nd on Tuesday that involved a 1974 Ford driven by Trejo Lasaro of Tahoka and a 1987 GMC pickup driven by Randal Joe Terry of Brownfield. No injuries were reported.

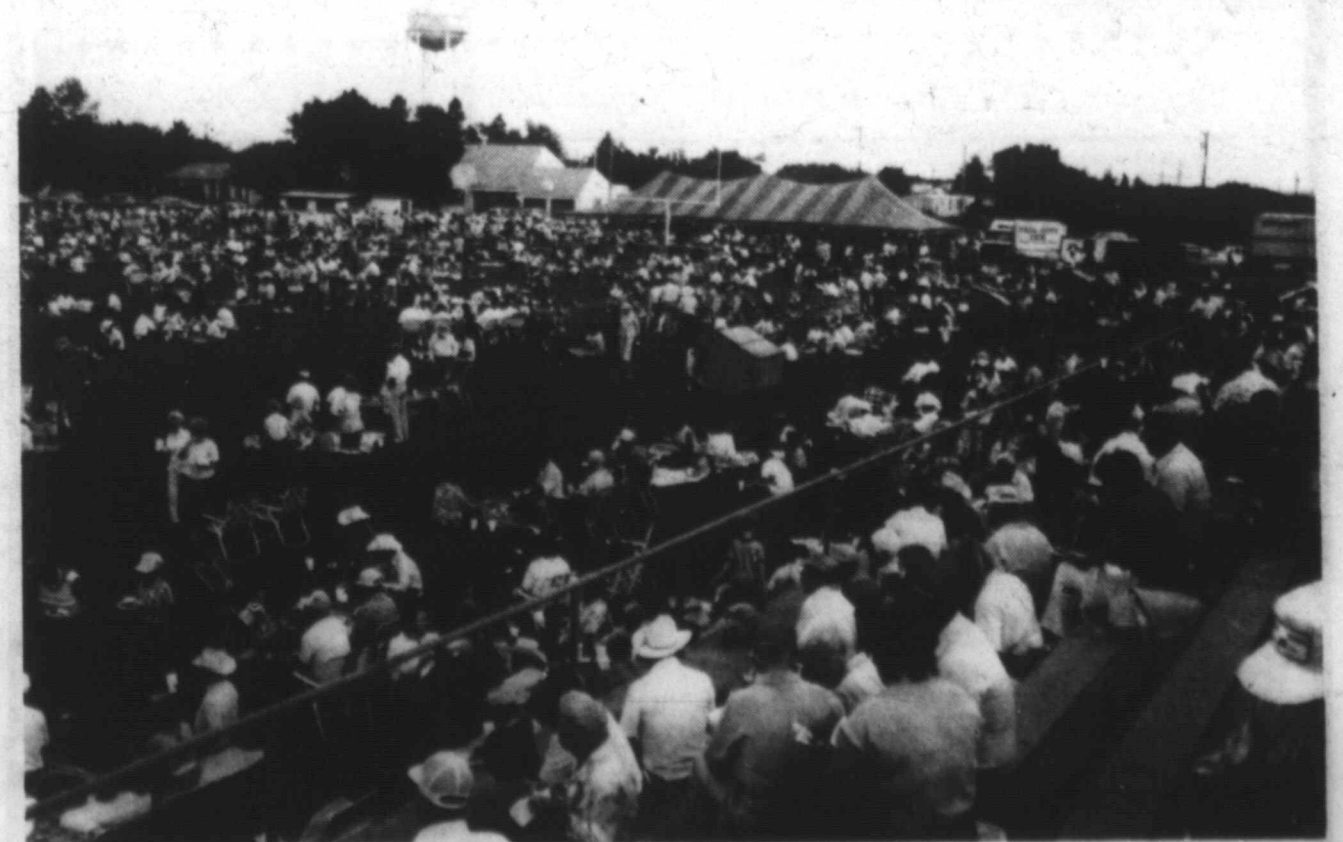
Lyntegar Re-Elects Directors

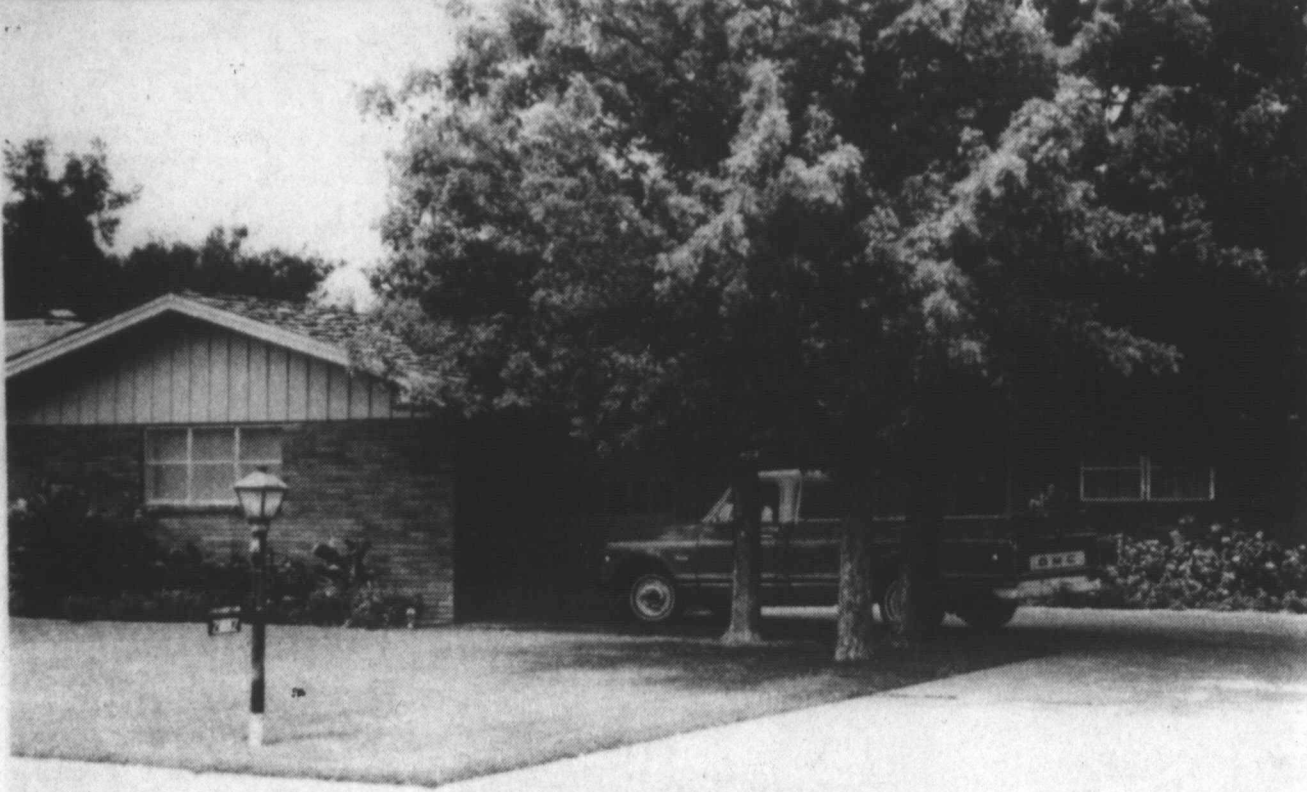

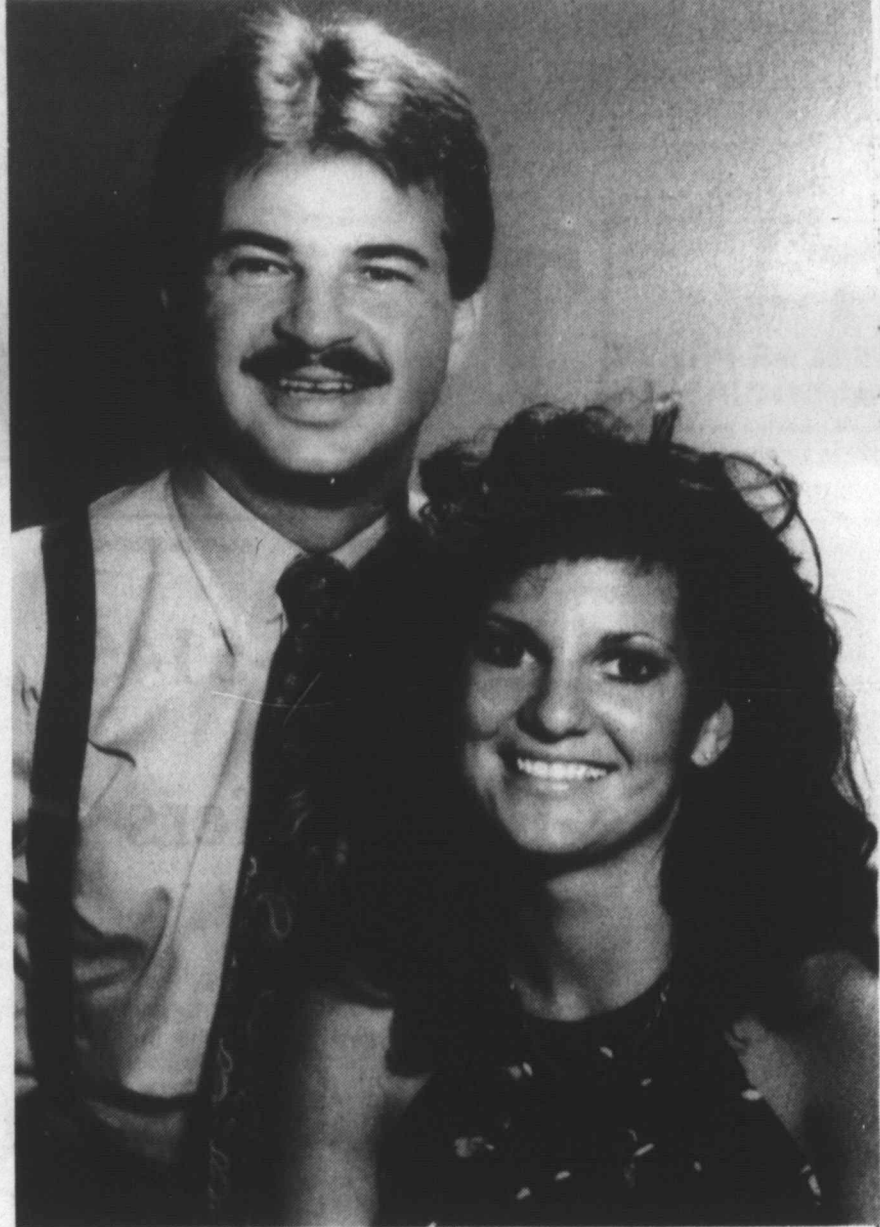
TAHOKA MAN HOSPITALIZED

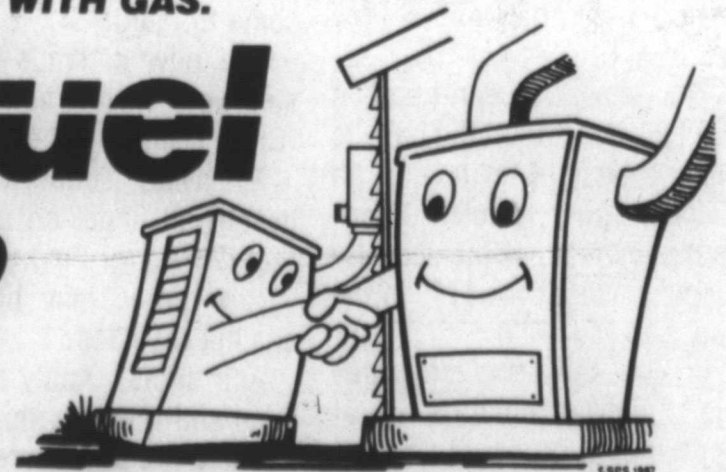

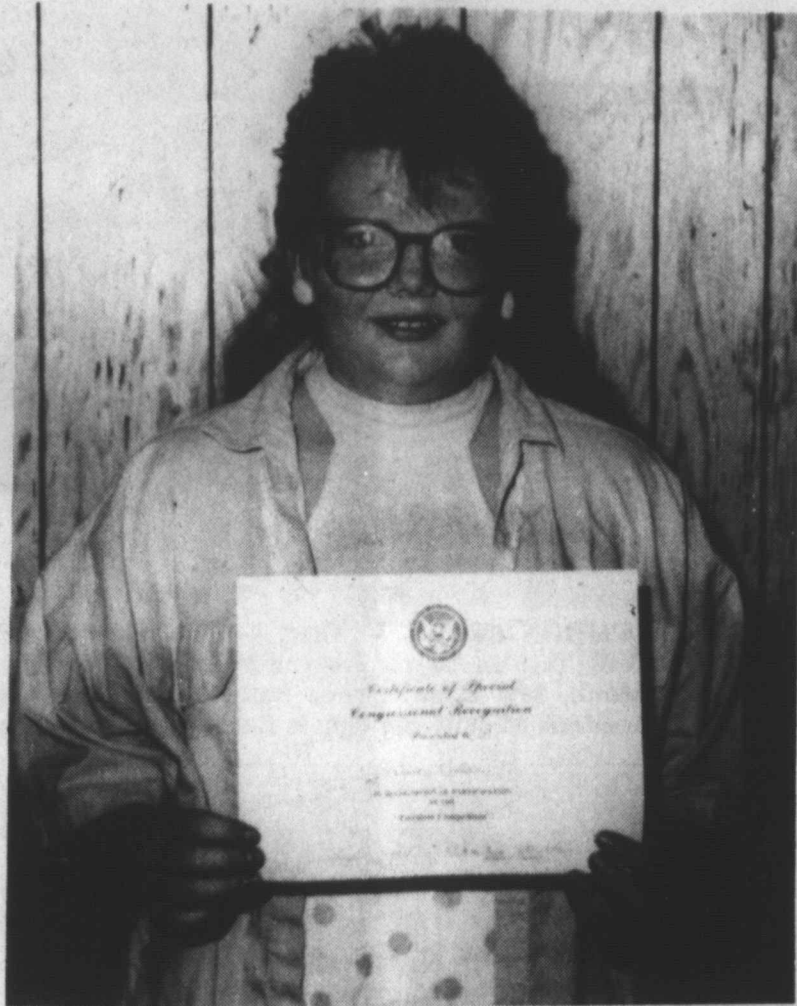

Cities Receive Sales Tax Checks

State Comptroller Bob Bullock has sent checks totaling \$99.7 million in local sales tax payments to the 1034 cities that levy the one percent city tax.

Bullock said the monthly allocations were down 7.4 percent in August compared to the 1986 August allocations.

Tahoka's net payment this period was \$7,497.57 compared to last year's \$6,967.80. The 1987 payments to date total \$39,618.21, down 2.87 percent from last year's total of \$40,790.69.

Wilson's net payment this period was \$259.33, down from last year's \$735.53; however, the 1987 payments to date showed a 12.10 percent increase from last year's payments to date with a total of \$3,570.26 this year, and \$3,184.84 last year.

O'Donnell's net payment this period was \$1,648.47, down from last year's payment of \$2,629.66. The 1987 payments to date totaled \$7,633.30, down 20.55 percent from last year's total payments to date of \$9,608.14.

Lynn County's total net payment this period was \$9,405.37, compared to \$10,332.99 last year at this time. The 1987 payments to date of \$50,821.77 is down 5.15 percent from the 1986 payments to date of \$53,583.67.

Houston received the largest check, \$16 million, bringing Houston's total 1987 payments to \$91.2 million, down 8.4 percent over last year.

August checks represent taxes collected on sales in June and during the second quarter and reported to the Comptroller by July 20th.

Most lawns can survive an occasional drying out. The important thing is consistency. If you decide to water, water regularly. If you let the lawn go dormant, don't water. A little water now and then often is more harmful than no water at all.

In a dry spell, water the lawn early in the morning so grass blades can dry before evening. Also, mow the grass a little higher than usual to shade the soil from the sun. Control weeds that are competing with your grass for the available water.

A "golden rule" for watering your lawn anytime: water deeply but infrequently and *only* when the lawn really needs it.

Dear John: My lawn has more craters than the moon. What can I do about this?

Dear Lumpy Lawn: Besides being unsightly, holes in a lawn can cause problems when mowing. To prevent turning an ankle, fill any holes or ditches in your

lawn with soil and sow new grass seeds.

Dear John: What are some signs of insect and disease damage in my flower garden?

Dear Disease Detector: Early signs of disease damage are spots or discolorations on flower stems and petals. Other signs of disease are mushy-textured leaves and a noticeable loss of foliage.

Insect damage may first appear as curled or chewed leaves, either with obvious bites or tiny pinprick holes. You'll probably notice these trouble signs before seeing the insects themselves, especially if the insects are very small or feed at night.

If you spot the early signs of a disease, start by cutting off the affected parts of the plant. Use a fungicide to prevent the disease from spreading to healthy portions of the plant.

At the start of an insect problem it's best to pick off large insects by hand. If the problem persists, pull out one or two badly infested plants. It's better to lose a couple of plants than risk infesting the entire garden. If all other measures fail, use an insecticide.

Contact a county extension agent for advice when selecting a fungicide or insecticide.
