doubt were glad to get out of Tahoka alive Friday night after a swarming, scrappy group of Tahoka Bulldogs gave them all kinds of fits before finally losing the district shootout 34-26, and the game was lots closer than that.

Shallowater was a definite favorite before the game, but the aroused Bulldogs showed them they were just as tough as anybody around, forcing eight turnovers and scoring on long plays.

It was the best effort of the year for the Bulldogs, with just about everybody on the team doing their jobs well, and an appreciative hometown crowd was delighted at the strong play of everyone. On offense, fullback Rusty Jennings was especially outstanding, as he caught two passes for touchdowns and scored a third running.

Tahoka fans lined up after the game near the exit as players left the field, to let them know they were proud of the Bulldogs for the tremendous effort.

Tahoka twice took the lead in the game, and the score was tied three different times. It was tied at 20-20 in the fourth period when Shallowater finally went up 27-20 and even then Tahoka came back to score and trailed by just a single point at 27-26 until the Mustangs put a score on the board with 46 seconds left.






'Cheese And Butter' **Program Threatened**

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's food commodity distribution to low income persons in Lynn County may be discontinued unless the county agrees to pay \$400 per month for delivery costs, which previously have been paid from federal funds.

The county has been told it must pay the \$400 monthly starting immediately or there will be no distribution next month from the several places in the county where the products are distributed by volunteers. A public hearing on the matter has been scheduled by Lynn County commissioners at 1:30 p.m. Monday at the courthouse, with interested persons invited to give their opinion on whether the county funds should be used for this purpose.

According to a letter from Howard Maddera, executive director of South Plains Community Action Assn. in Levelland, which supervises the area distributions, the \$400 month will pay for only a third of the cost of delivering the commodities to Lynn County outlets. When first approached on the matter, Lynn County commissioners questioned the implied cost of \$1200 for delivering the products to the county distribution points once a month, and decided not to pay the \$400. But they will reconsider the matter at the meeting Monday.

The letter from the association indicated that Lynn County has averaged distributing 13,235 pounds of commodities each month to county residents in the period from October 1986 to May 1987. The SPCAA is asking each of eight counties in the area to contribute on a basis of 3 cents per pound. This does not pay for the products or for distribution workers who are volunteers, but purportedly only for the delivery costs.



CBO Smiles on Cotton Bill: **Congressional Budget Office has** informed House Agriculture Committee chairman Kika de la Garza (D-Tex.) that passage of a

Cotton Today

proposed amendment to the **Cotton Research and Promotion** Act would save \$3 million in farm program payments in 1989 and \$5 million each subsequent year.

The report came after the National Cotton Council staff provided data to CBO showing a government cost-savings could be expected from amending the current law to (1) apply the same research and promotion assessment which cotton growers are now paying on each bale they produce to the cotton content of textile and apparel imports, and (2) disallow the present refund option for all assessments. CBO's cost-savings determination qualifies the cotton amendment to be included in the budget reconciliation measure, a move that would greatly increase chances for the cotton bill's passage. The budget reconciliation measure is slated for mark-up Oct. 13.

NCC Files Immigration Lawsuit The National Cotton Council has filed a federal court suit in Lubbock, charging USDA is depriving farmers of hiring foreign workers with temporary resident status for cotton production and harvesting because of its "arbitrary" interpretation of immigration law.

The Special Agricultural Workers (SAW) program established under the law allows producers of "fruits" or "perishable commodities" to hire these seasonal workers. The Council's suit says USDA erred in excluding cotton from these categories, stating that cotton is botanically defined as a fruit and is subject to critical and unpredictable labor demands.

vant Jr., Memphis cotton merchant and a National Cotton Council vice president, will describe the U.S. and world outlook for cotton in the first session of the 1988 Beltwide Cotton Production Conference in New Orleans on Jan. 4. An address by conference chairman Bruce Brumfield, Inverness, Miss., producer, will open the meeting.

Among other reports will be a comparison of cotton production costs in the United States and competing countries by Dr. Don Ethridge, Texas Tech University agricultural economist, and a look at present cotton mechanization technology and future development by Dr. Lambert Wilkes, Texas A&M agricultural engineer.

Ten technical sessions will be held Jan. 6-7 in conjunction with the conference. Richard Mountfort, the Environmental Protection Agency's fungicide and herbicide products manager, Washington, D.C., will update progress on re-registration of cotton herbicides at the weed science session. Some 20 other reports will be heard at the session, with topics ranging from weed control systems for no-till cotton to experimental herbicides for morning glory control in cotton.


TEAMS Test Set



When they're doing something so positive and working so hard physically and scholastically, our community must support the positive efforts of our kids-football teams, band and cheerleaders.






