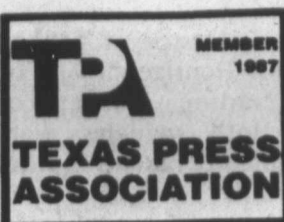
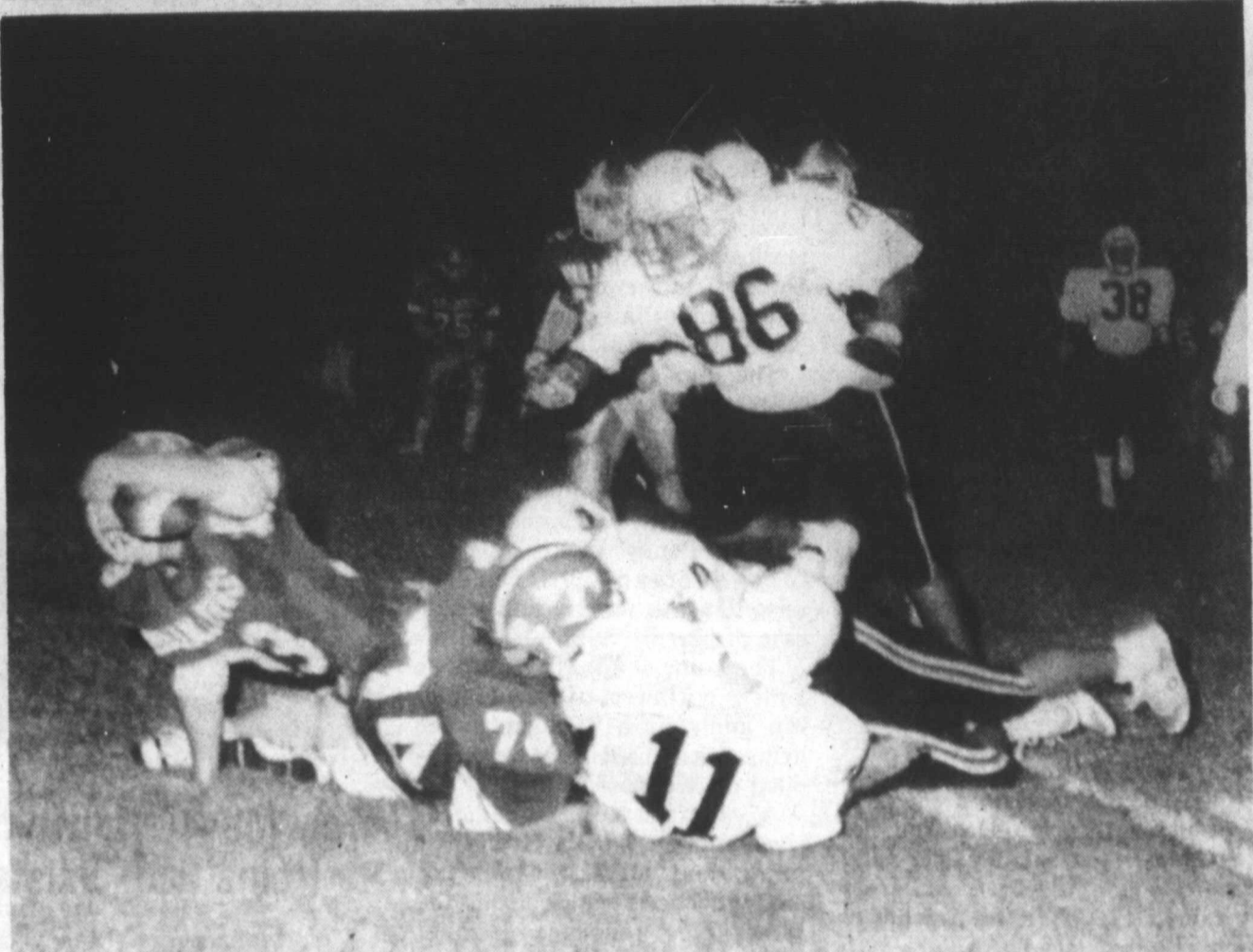

Bulldogs Give Mustangs Fits Before Bowling 34-26

 The Shallowater Mustangs no doubt were glad to get out of Tahoka alive Friday night after a swarming, scrappy group of Tahoka Bulldogs gave them all kinds of fits before finally losing the district shootout 34-26, and the game was lots closer than that.

Shallowater was a definite favorite before the game, but the aroused Bulldogs showed them they were just as tough as anybody around, forcing eight turnovers and scoring on long plays.

It was the best effort of the year for the Bulldogs, with just about everybody on the team doing their jobs well, and an appreciative hometown crowd was delighted at the strong play of everyone. On offense, fullback Rusty Jennings was especially outstanding, as he caught two passes for touchdowns and scored a third running.

Tahoka fans lined up after the game near the exit as players left the field, to let them know they were proud of the Bulldogs for the tremendous effort.

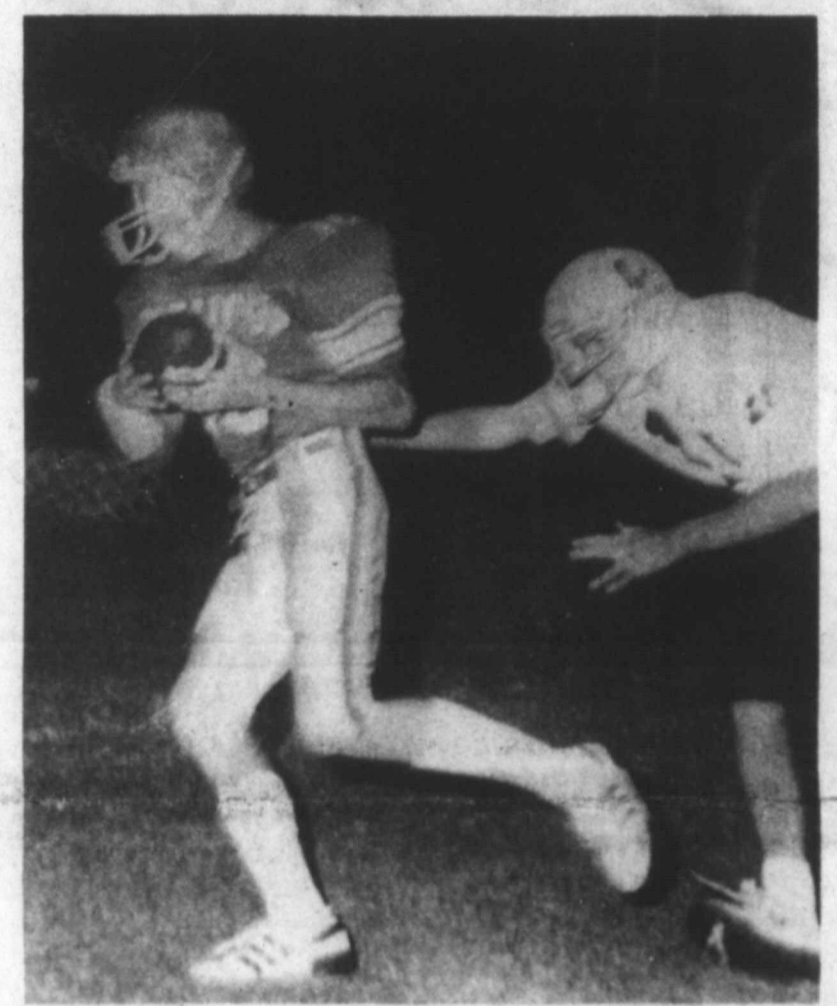
Tahoka twice took the lead in the game, and the score was tied three different times. It was tied at 20-20 in the fourth period when Shallowater finally went up 27-20 and even then Tahoka came back to score and trailed by just a single point at 27-26 until the Mustangs put a score on the board with 46 seconds left.

First score for the Bulldogs was an exciting play with QB Ramiro Rodriguez throwing a pass intended for Kevin Hood. The ball hit Hood in the chest about 15 yards downfield, bounced off, and was caught on the run by Jennings, who was trailing the play. He outran everyone for the 65-yard scoring play and George Morin kicked the extra point to leave stunned Shallowater on the short end of a 7-0 score.

Anti-Drug Abuse Contest To Offer Students Prizes

Tahoka merchants, organizations and individuals this week joined in a campaign to fight drug abuse, offering prizes to be awarded locally in a contest designed to increase drug awareness by youngsters.

In connection with the nationwide drug awareness contest for school children called "HealthSmart", local participants are donating funds and prizes to be awarded to winners in the Tahoka community.

Sponsored locally by Dayton Parker Health Mart Pharmacy with the full cooperation of Tahoka schools, the contest invites school age children to express their ideas on the topic of drug abuse through original drawings, posters and essay or short stories.

Assemblies were conducted at the schools here Monday explaining the contest and showing

some of the top prizes which will be given.

There will be a "Drug Awareness Fair" at the Tahoka School cafeteria starting at 7 p.m. next Tuesday, when student entries in the contest will be displayed, winners will be announced and prizes awarded.

It's Time To Do Something To Your Clock ...

Lynn County residents are reminded that Daylight Time ends at 2 a.m. Sunday, at which time everyone is supposed to turn the clock back to 1 a.m.

Actually the operation can be done before retiring Saturday night; just set the clock back an hour and enjoy the extra hour of sleep that was lost last April.

All interested parents and other citizens are urged to attend.

A total of 21 prizes will be awarded to winners in three age-group categories: grades 1-3, grades 4-6 and grades 7-10. The three first place winners in each category will be eligible for the national "HealthSmart" competition which offers three grand prize visits to Washington, D.C. Two prizes--\$75 cash for first place and \$50 cash for second--will be awarded locally in a category of juniors and seniors in high school, but these winners do not qualify for the national competition.

Each finalist will receive a prize, according to Dayton Parker, owner of the Parker Health Mart. "The purpose of the HealthSmart contest is to mobilize our community against drug abuse," Parker said. "We welcome the involvement of our friends and neighbors in this important campaign."

School administrators will choose three finalists from each grade, and from this list community judges will select winners in each age category. The community judges will not know the names of the contestants whose work they are judging, Parker said.

On the national level, first, second and third prizes will be given in each category, including color TV sets for third places, personal computers for second and grand prize trips to the nation's capital.

"We hope this contest will get our young people thinking about the ways they can be an influence against abuse of drugs," said Parker. "We want them to know there is something positive they can do in this area."

Weight Watchers, for example, has mailed this newspaper a release which says in effect that if we don't take care, we'll pig out at Thanksgiving and ruin our diets.

'Cheese And Butter' Program Threatened

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's food commodity distribution to low income persons in Lynn County may be discontinued unless the county agrees to pay \$400 per month for delivery costs, which previously have been paid from federal funds.

The county has been told it must pay the \$400 monthly starting immediately or there will be no distribution next month from the several places in the county where the products are distributed by volunteers. A public hearing on the matter has been scheduled by Lynn County commissioners at 1:30 p.m. Monday at the courthouse, with interested persons invited to give their opinion on whether the county funds should be used for this purpose.

According to a letter from Howard Maddera, executive director of South Plains Community Action Assn. in Levelland, which supervises the area

distributions, the \$400 per month will pay for only a third of the cost of delivering the commodities to Lynn County outlets.

When first approached on the matter, Lynn County commissioners questioned the implied cost of \$1200 for delivering the products to the county distribution points once a month, and decided not to pay the \$400. But they will reconsider the matter at the meeting Monday.

The letter from the association indicated that Lynn County has averaged distributing 13,235 pounds of commodities each month to county residents in the period from October 1986 to May 1987. The SPCAA is asking each of eight counties in the area to contribute on a basis of 3 cents per pound. This does not pay for the products or for distribution workers who are volunteers, but purportedly only for the delivery costs.

New Home Area Hit By Burglars

Four residences in the New Home area were burglarized during daylight hours Tuesday and Lynn County Crime Line, 998-5145, is offering a \$500 reward in the cases, all of which are believed related.

Mrs. J.B. Edwards, a mile south of New Home on FM 1317, reported her home burglarized between 10 a.m. and 6 p.m. after the back door was forced open. A list of stolen items had not been completed Wednesday, but among the articles taken were two Remington shotguns, two .22 rifles and two pellet guns, several jewelry boxes containing costume jewelry, and a Panasonic radio. Some of the jewelry boxes were found empty in a ditch north of New Home later.

The Jim Garner residence, 4 miles northwest of New Home on FM 1730, was burglarized between 1:30 and 3:30 p.m. Among items stolen were an Olympus video camera, Olympus 35mm camera, Penny VCR, .22 rifle, .410 shotgun, brief case, miscellaneous jewelry and a half case of beer.

The home of Lit Moore, about 5 miles northwest of New Home, lost guns and a VCR and other items, with the list not yet compiled on Wednesday.

A 35mm Kodak camera, jewelry including a string of pearls and a .22 pistol were among articles stolen from the James Key residence 2 miles southeast of New Home.

Lynn Cook reported to Tahoka police that someone had broken out two windows at his business located at 1400 Main on Sept. 13.

Police reported that the set of tires and wheels stolen from a Chevrolet last week owned by Dan Taylor valued at approximately \$600 were recovered this week.

Dennis Lee of Post reported that someone had broken a side glass out of his Ford pickup while parked on the north side of Tahoka football stadium during a football game on Friday night.

Police investigated an accident on Sunday at the intersection of Ave. L and Lockwood that involved a 1985 Pontiac driven by

Betty Hanes Harston of Tahoka and a 1985 Pontiac driven by Frances Nadine Dunlap of Tahoka. Both vehicles were heavily damaged but no injuries were reported.

In jail during the week were three persons for public intoxication, three for possession of marijuana and narcotic paraphernalia, two for driving while intoxicated, one for theft by check and one for bad check plus running a stop sign, plus failure to appear.

Mrs. Money Honored By Home Economists

Mrs. Idalia Wood Money of Odessa, daughter of Mrs. N.E. Wood Sr. of Tahoka, and the late Mr. Wood, was recently awarded the National Distinguished Service Award, by the National Association of Extension Home Economists at their meeting in Louisville, Kentucky.

This award is the highest honor which the professional association awards to Extension Agents. It was awarded for "dynamic leadership and creative implementation of educational programs and for personal professional growth."

Mrs. Money initiated the Permian Basin Health Fair in Odessa in 1984 with 40 agencies and 2,000 participants. The Health Fair grew in 1986 to 107 agencies working with 20,000 participants and 975 volunteers working to make the Health Fair a success. Evaluations showed a savings of \$357,000 in health care costs to area residents through the free screenings.

Mrs. Money lived in Tahoka and graduated from Tahoka school before attending Baylor University. She has been a County Extension Agent-Home Economics for 18 years, the last ten of which have been in Ector County.

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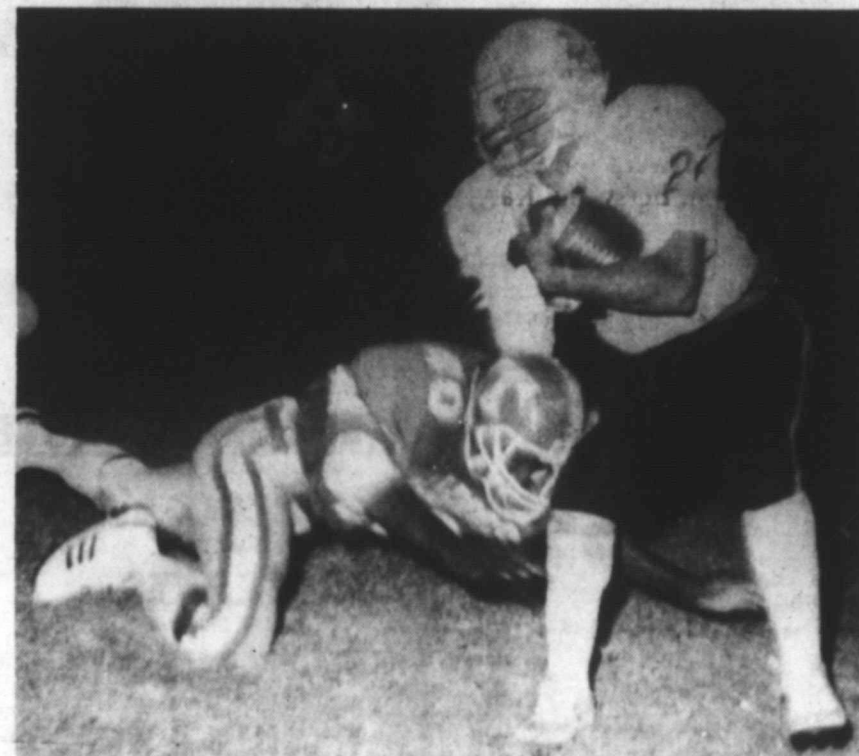
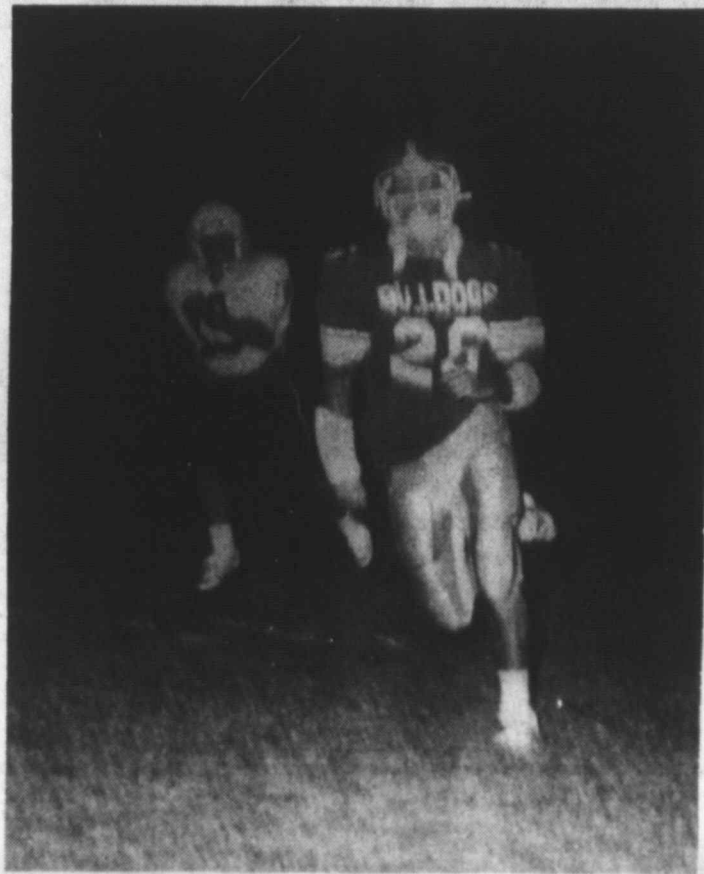

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Cotton Today

CBO Smiles on Cotton Bill: Congressional Budget Office has informed House Agriculture Committee chairman Kika de la Garza (D-Tex.) that passage of a proposed amendment to the Cotton Research and Promotion Act would save \$3 million in farm program payments in 1989 and \$5 million each subsequent year.

The report came after the National Cotton Council staff provided data to CBO showing a government cost-savings could be expected from amending the current law to (1) apply the same research and promotion assessment which cotton growers are now paying on each bale they produce to the cotton content of textile and apparel imports, and (2) disallow the present refund option for all assessments. CBO's cost-savings determination qualifies the cotton amendment to be included in the budget reconciliation measure, a move that would greatly increase chances for the cotton bill's passage. The budget reconciliation measure is slated for mark-up Oct. 13.

NCC Files Immigration Lawsuit
The National Cotton Council has filed a federal court suit in Lubbock, charging USDA is depriving farmers of hiring foreign workers with temporary resident status for cotton production and harvesting because of its "arbitrary" interpretation of immigration law.

The Special Agricultural Workers (SAW) program established under the law allows producers of "fruits" or "perishable commodities" to hire these seasonal workers. The Council's suit says USDA erred in excluding cotton from these categories, stating that cotton is botanically defined as a fruit and is subject to critical and unpredictable labor demands.

Joining as plaintiffs in the suit

were Plains Cotton Growers and Texas producers Jimmy Bragg, Tahoka; Wayne Nixon, Seminole; and T.W. Stockton Jr., Crosbyton. The government has 60 days to respond to the suit.

Dunavant To Address Beltwide Conference: William B. Dunavant Jr., Memphis cotton merchant and a National Cotton Council vice president, will describe the U.S. and world outlook for cotton in the first session of the 1988 Beltwide Cotton Production Conference in New Orleans on Jan. 4. An address by conference chairman Bruce Brumfield, Inverness, Miss., producer, will open the meeting.

Among other reports will be a comparison of cotton production costs in the United States and competing countries by Dr. Don Ethridge, Texas Tech University agricultural economist, and a look at present cotton mechanization technology and future development by Dr. Lambert Wilkes, Texas A&M agricultural engineer.

Ten technical sessions will be held Jan. 6-7 in conjunction with the conference. Richard Mountfort, the Environmental Protection Agency's fungicide and herbicide products manager, Washington, D.C., will update progress on re-registration of cotton herbicides at the weed science session. Some 20 other reports will be heard at the session, with topics ranging from weed control systems for no-till cotton to experimental herbicides for morning glory control in cotton.

1980 Maid of Cotton To Be Judge: Former Maid of Cotton Melissa Mock will head a panel of five judges that will select the cotton industry's new goodwill ambassador in December. Originally from Altus, Okla., she now resides in Salt Lake City where her husband, Dr. Scot Brewster, is doing his residency. They have an infant son.

Other judges will include Nick Hahn, Cotton Incorporated executive vice president, New York; Bob Appleby, president of the Fort Worth division of Dillard's

Department Store; and Dorothy Roberson, director of communications for the National Cotton Council. An industry judge will be announced later. Deadline for submitting Maid of Cotton applications to the Council's Memphis headquarters is Nov. 9. The selection dates are Dec. 26-28 in Dallas.

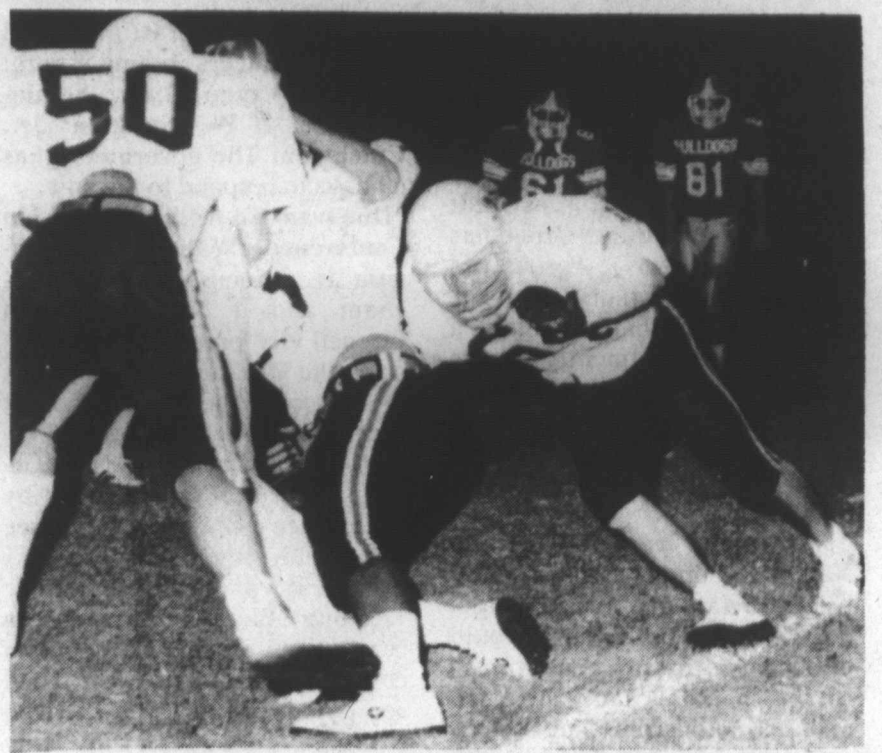

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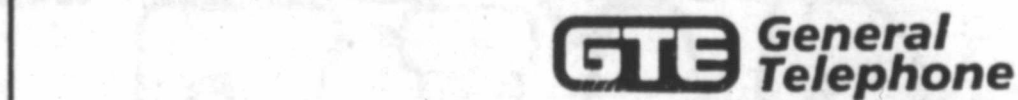
