Bulldogs Wind Up Season With Loss

The unbeaten New Deal Lions made Tahoka their 10th victim of the regular season last Friday night, but the Bulldogs did score only the second touchdown of the year made against the Lions, and played tough in the second half while losing 48-6.

Tahoka wound up the year 3-7, with all three victories coming in district play, and fullback Rusty Jennings passed the 1000-yard rushing mark Friday.

Four turnovers in the first half cost Tahoka, and the halftime score was 34-6. But in the second half, and with New Deal keeping its first team in the game until the last two offensive series of the game, Tahoka played much better defense in the second half.

New Deal scored on three of four possessions in the first quarter, on a 1-yard run by Alfredo Ramirez, who made four TDs in the game, and on a 20-yard pass to Shayne Boyd and a short run by Ramirez to make it 20-0 at the end of the first period.

New Deal built the lead to 34-0 with 2:22 left in the half. Tahoka fooled the Lions on a fourth down with a half yard to go just before halftime, as QB Ramiro Rodriguez passed to John Aldous who immediately lateraled to Jennings who was trailing the play, and the senior running back broke loose and outran everyone for 43 yards and the touchdown. The try for point was blocked,

and it was 34-6 at halftime. In the third, the Lions' Toby Howell ran 53 to score, and with the score 40-6, New Deal showed a lack of class by going for 2 points, which they made on a pass. New Deal was unable to score again until the fourth period, and after that TD, they tried a kick which failed, to make the final tally 48-6.

Jennings rushed 17 times for 91 yards, giving him a total of 1,088 for the season, an average of 7.1 per carry, Kevin Hood ran 18 times for 83 yards against the Lions.

Any flexible band which can be stretched over my knobby knuckles hangs like a bracelet

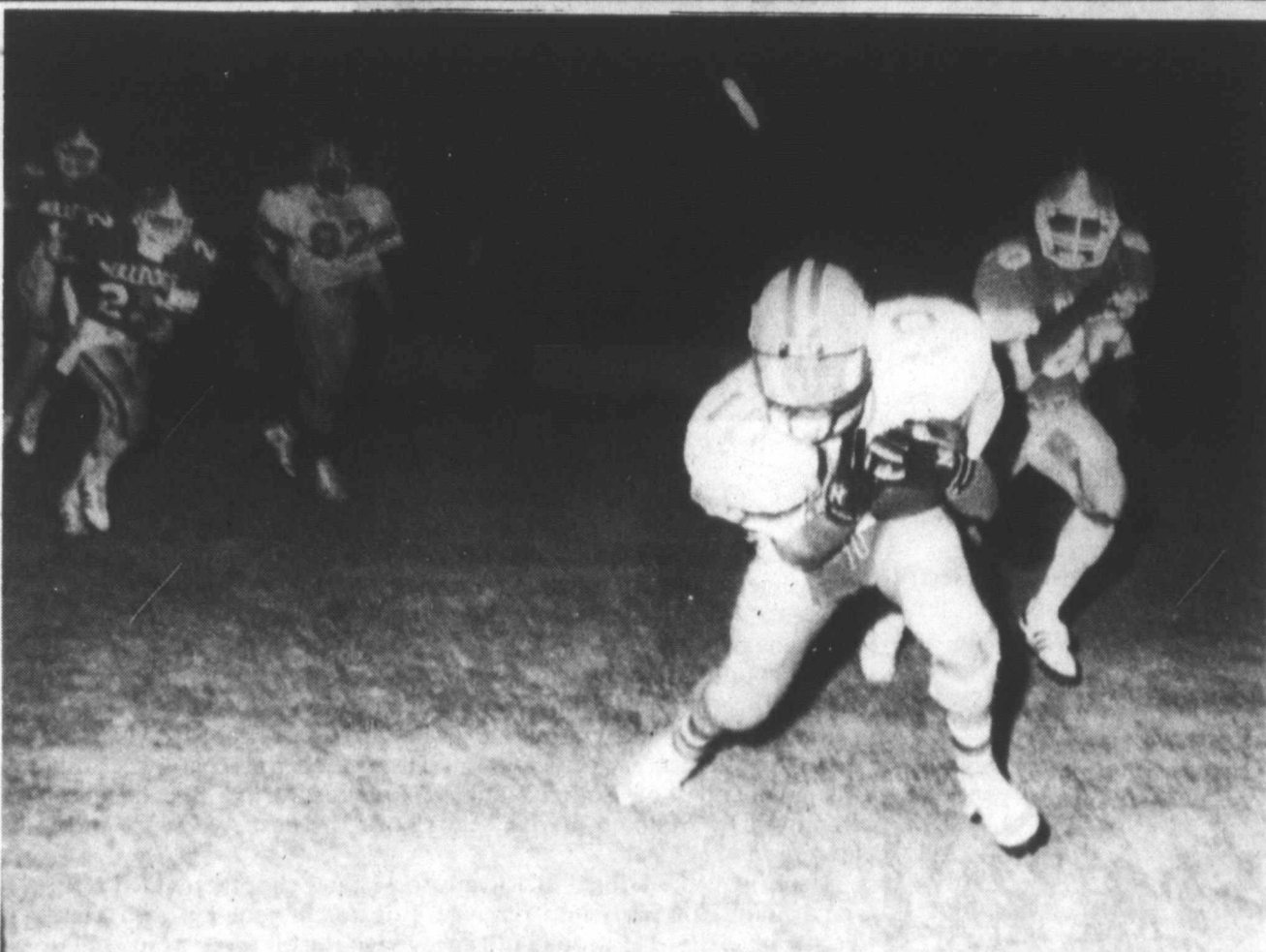

Judge Sentences Five In Felony Cases Here

A 23-year-old Tahoka man was ordered to prison here this week after District Judge George Hansard revoked the man's probation on a prior conviction of felony driving while intoxicated.

The judge ruled that Jimmy Autry had violated terms of his probation of a 5-year term assessed on the DWI charge. Four other defendants pleaded guilty of felony charges before the judge in 106th District Court Monday and all were given probated prison terms. They were:

Robert F. Acosta, 26, of Tahoka, aggravated assault with a deadly weapon involving a knife on March 2, 3-year term.

Narciso Garza (Cecil) Garcia Sr., 60, of Tahoka, possession of unlawful weapon on April 19, five years.

Rebecca Scott, age and address not listed, tampering with a governmental record on Aug. 14, 1985, 5-year term, plus scheduled repayment of \$1020 to the Texas Dept. of Human Services.

Tommy Graves of Tahoka, theft on Aug. 23, 1985, 5-year term, plus payment of \$1500 compensation to St. Pius X Church in monthly installments.

Two probated sentences assessed by Judge Hansard in October also had not previously

been reported. Pleading guilty were:

Rosario Faz Luna, tampering with a governmental record on Feb. 5, 5-year term and repayment to Texas Dept. of Human Services of \$1,329.90.

Bradley Ross Smith, 25, of O'Donnell, felony DWI on Dec. 31, 1986, 2-year term.

New offenses investigated by officers this week included an attempted burglary of a trailer house on U.S. 380 about 7 miles east of Tahoka. Owner David Ehlers reported a door damaged to the extent of \$174.

An attempted burglary at the residence of a farm worker on the E.L. Short farm 9 miles west of Tahoka Monday night was being investigated. Shots reportedly were fired at suspects and one may have been wounded. No other details were immediately available.

Robert Gonzales of Tahoka reported to police on Saturday that someone with a B-B gun had shot out a window on the right side of his 1983 Ford pickup while he was driving north on Avenue E at approximately 10:15 p.m. Value of the glass was set at \$65. No injuries were reported.

Police arrested a 37-year-old Tahoka man on Sunday at All-

supers for public intoxication. In jail during the week were two persons for public intoxication, and one each for simple assault, contempt of court for failure to pay child support, revocation of probation, two counts of burglary of a habitation, and failure to stop and render aid (judgement and sentence).

Basketball Games Start Next Tuesday

Tahoka varsity basketball teams will begin their 1987-88 season next Tuesday night when they host the strong boys and girls varsities from O'Donnell.

The Bulldog boys will be relatively inexperienced with Coach Ron Yancy having only a couple of players who were starters all year, junior Chuck Cate and senior Jim Patterson, plus two who started the last half of the season, John Aldous and George Morin, both seniors.

Other boys working out on the varsity this week were sophomores Percy Rogers and Kenzie Rogers, juniors T.C. Spruiell and Kim Hughes, seniors Jody Woodard and Bruce Lehman, and freshman Kevin Hood.

Coach Elaine Shedd and the varsity Bulldog girls are looking for a great season, with three starters back off last year's team, which won 16 and lost 9 for the best record of a Tahoka girls team since 1968.

Last year's team averaged 59 points and 39 rebounds per game, and in one game, against Spur, scored 81 points, the most for a Tahoka girls team in 40 years.

Leading the returnees is senior Shannon Lawson, who led in

scoring last season with 572 points (23 per game) and in rebounds with 381 (16 per game). She shot 58 per cent from the field and 60 per cent at the

line, according to Coach Shedd. Seniors Tesha Hood and Lacey Jolly also were starters last season. Hood scored 435 points (average of 18) and had 129

steals. Jolly had 208 rebounds last season and was tabbed by Coach Shedd as the most improved player on the squad.

Other girls on the varsity this year include seniors Olga Sastre, Johnna Phillips and Staci Milton, juniors Jackie Hays, Elizabeth Hernandez and LaDonna Tillman, and sophomore Stephanie Isbell. Hays, Tillman and the three senior girls were also on the varsity last season, and Coach Shedd says she expects good things from Phillips, Hays and Tillman this year.

The varsity girls have made changes in both offensive and defensive strategy this season.

Among the stated goals of the girls team this season is to win district for the first time in more than two decades and to advance to the state tournament.

Coach Shedd also is working with a 10-member junior varsity team, which includes junior LaShunda Hughes, freshmen Tavia Lawson and Jennie Wells and these sophomores: Connie Parker, Kim Ingle, Lanae Monk, Amy Holland, Katrina Milton, Lana Tekell and Shelly Martin.

Women's Protective Services To Serve Lynn County

Residents of Tahoka and the surrounding area will be among those benefitting from recently approved grants for crime victim assistance programs announced through the office of Gov. Bill Clements.

Lubbock's Women's Protective Services (WPS) will receive \$40,324 for its regional victim and volunteer outreach program for a 12-county area surrounding Lubbock.

Funds for the grant were made available in Texas for fiscal year 1988 through the federal Victims of Crime Act. Money collected from federal fines and forfeitures is distributed throughout the state for victim programs.

The fact that the money comes from criminals and helps victims should not be overlooked.

Angela McGranahan is the coordinator of the regional victim volunteer program which served the Tahoka area.

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

Sales Tax Rebate Told

State Comptroller Bob Bullock sent checks totaling \$105.9 million in local sales tax to 1,039 cities that levy the one-percent city tax. According to Bullock, this year's payments are down by nearly 5 percent overall compared to payments made by November of last year.

November checks represent taxes collected on sales made in September and reported to the Comptroller by Oct. 20. This month's checks also include third quarter allocations, which reflect sales reported to the Comptroller on a quarterly basis.

O'Donnell received \$2,020.66 this period compared to \$1,206.01 for the same period last year and has received \$10,563.13 payments in 1987 compared to \$11,359.52 in 1986.

Tahoka received \$8,347.44 this period compared to \$7,009.62 for the same period in 1986; Payments to date in 1987 were \$55,209.36 compared to \$56,734.03 for 1986.

Wilson received \$115.43 this period compared to \$833.68 for the same period in 1986. Payments to date for 1987 are \$13,685.69 compared to \$4,018.52 in 1986.

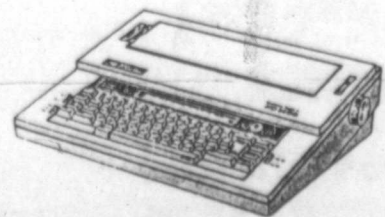

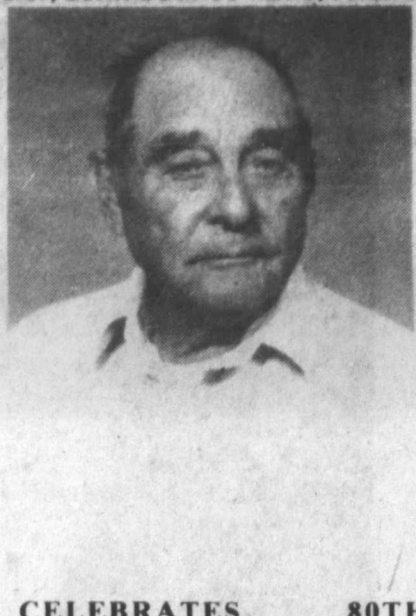

Tahoka Winds Up Football Season With Good Stats

Judging from the offensive statistics compiled by the Tahoka Bulldogs in the 10 football games they played this year, they surely must have been the best 3-8 team in the country.

Statistics released by Coach Ted Wiley, who got his figures from films of all the games, showed that the Dogs gained 3,118 yards from scrimmage, including 2308 rushing, to just 2350 total for all opponents. Tahoka scored 172 points to 224 for the opposition.

Individually, senior fullback Rusty Jennings was tops on offense, as he gained 1088 yards rushing in 153 attempts, and average of 7.1 per carry. In addition

he caught 6 passes for 190 yards, punted 40 times for an average of 34.5, and counting kickoff returns, had 1,621 all-purpose yards. Jennings scored 59 points.

John Aldous was second in scoring with 30, followed by Percy Rogers with 18, Kevin Hood with 14, George Morin with 13 extra point kicks, Ramiro Rodriguez with 12 points. Touchdowns also were scored by Thomas Glisson, Joseph House, Jim Patterson and James Antu, and Kurt Bryan caught a 2-point pass after a TD.

Aldous was the leading pass receiver with 11 catches for 280 yards, and he gained 342 yards in 73 rushing attempts. Counting punt and kickoff returns he totaled 817 all-purpose yards. Junior quarterback Rodriguez had 951 all-purpose yards, as he completed 30 of 82 passes for 780 yards, suffering 11 interceptions, and rushed 71 times for 171 yards.

On defense for the year, linebacker Shannon Clift had 15 solo tackles and 107 assists, and on the coaches' grading system for defenders he led all his teammates with a point total of 164. On the grading total, Aldous, a defensive back, was second with 84 points, having 14 solo tackles and 47 assists. Jennings at defensive end was third, with 12 solo and 38 assists. Turkey Specials Keep Cost Down

Thanksgiving dinner may be one of the most economical you eat this year -- especially if you have a family tradition of serving a whole bird and making side dishes from scratch.

"Most supermarkets use turkey to attract holiday shoppers, so retail prices don't necessarily reflect wholesale prices," says Annis Brown, County Extension Agent, H.E.

Unbasted, store brand turkey could be as low as 60 cents a pound, while basted, national brand turkey will be in the 90 to \$1 per pound range.

A whole bird is the traditional favorite and less expensive than further processed turkey parts or roasts. For example, cooked drumsticks are running about \$1.80 per pound, pre-basted breast about \$1.40 per pound, and boneless smoked turkey about \$4.58 per pound.

"More people are ordering fresh turkeys from supermarkets or meat markets, although they will be somewhat more expensive," says Brown.

There may also be little difference in quality. Turkeys that are frozen immediately and held for sale months later could be fresher than turkeys that are refrigerated for up to two weeks before sale.

The ultimate in convenience -- the stuffed, cooked whole turkey from a deli or restaurant will top the list in cost.

"Some consumers want to trade the expense of a prepared bird for the extra time they can spend with the family, attending a football game, or using their energies to make special side dishes and desserts.

Preparing a Thanksgiving dinner from scratch is instructive, since it underscores the amount of money that goes toward convenience.

The basic ingredients of a Thanksgiving feast, like corn meal, bread, celery and onions for stuffing, cranberries, plain canned or frozen peas, white potatoes and yams are relatively inexpensive foods, but if you choose instant potatoes or stuffing mixes, prepared cranberry relish and frozen peas in special sauce, the cost will go up by half or more.

Americans can be thankful for the fact that our food prices are among the lowest and our food quality among the best in the world.

Congressman Charles W. Stenholm has announced that applications for the 1988 summer internships in his Washington, D.C. office are now available.

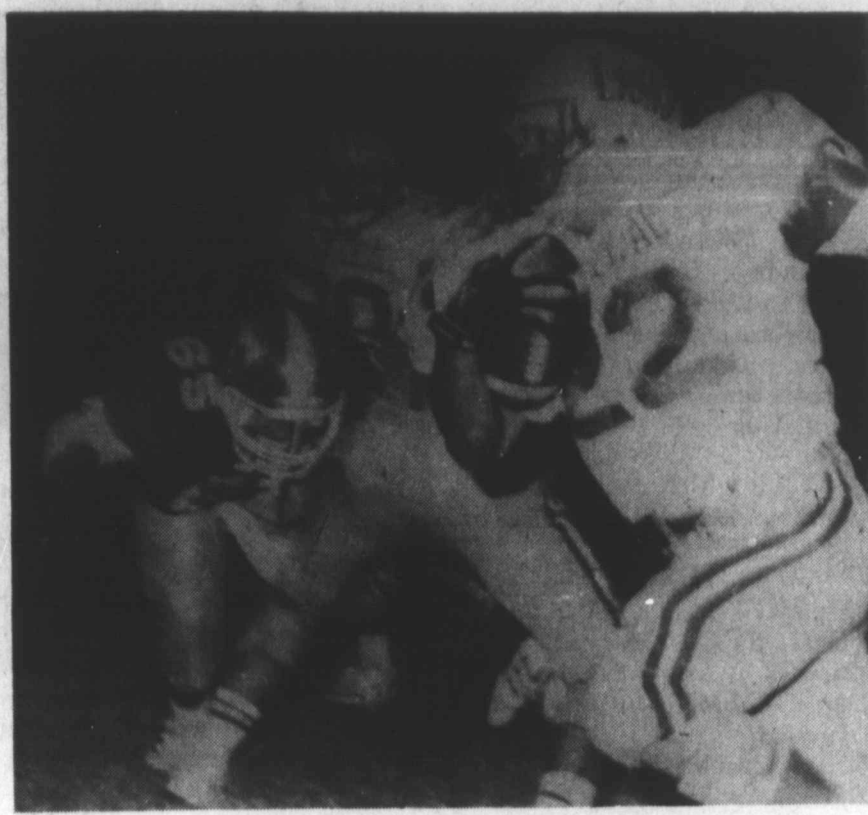

Cottonseed Marketing Loan Study Ordered: National Cotton Council staff economists have been asked to make a feasibility study of a cottonseed marketing loan program that would help cottonseed remain competitive with soybeans and other seed commodities.

The panel, which met Thursday at Council headquarters here, agreed the program should incorporate the National Cottonseed Products Assn.'s price support proposal for cottonseed oil and a non-recourse loan for cottonseed in approved storage. The panel also agreed an inventory protection program would be needed for holders of seed in inventory.

Aven Whittington, Council president, Greenwood, Miss., moderated the panel comprised of Roy Noble, president, National Cotton Ginners Assn., Vienna, Ga.; Jack Francis, Peoria, Ariz.; Seymour Johnson, Indianola, Miss., producer; and Wayne Martin, Lubbock, Tex., crusher. Allen Ater, NCPA executive vice president, Memphis; and Bobby Greene, president, American Cottonseed Assn.,

Courtland, Ala., served as advisors.

THAWING FROZEN MEAT
It is not safe to thaw frozen meat or poultry on the countertop. Room temperature encourages the growth of bacteria. To safely thaw meat, take it out of the freezer and refrigerate it overnight. For quick thawing, use a microwave oven, or put the meat in a watertight plastic bag and immerse it in cold water, changing the water often. The cold water will control bacteria growth on the outside while the inside thaws.

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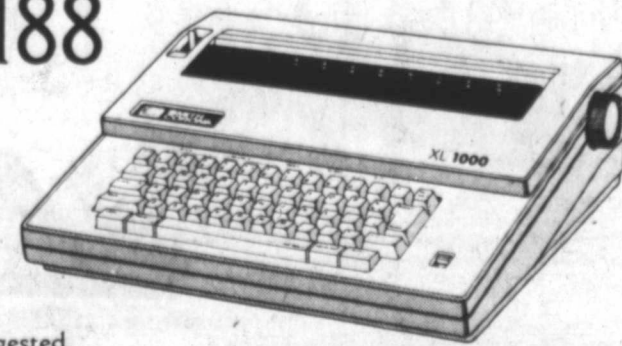
