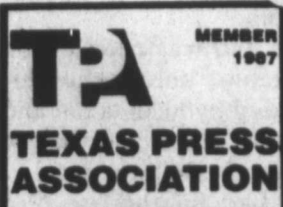
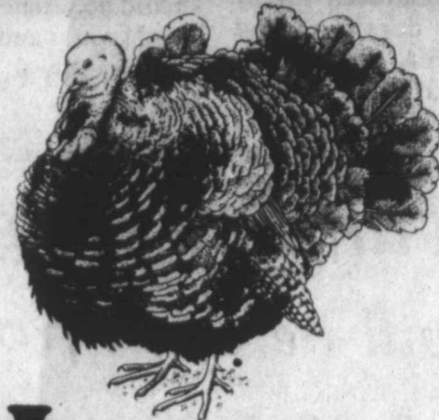

### Annual Moonlight Madness Sale Slated Friday, Dec. 4

The annual Moonlight Madness Sale will be held as usual on the second Friday after Thanksgiving this year and will be on Dec. 4, when Tahoka merchants will offer special bargains during a 3-hour sale period and many also will have drawings for free gifts.

Santa Claus has been in contact with the Tahoka Chamber of Commerce and has promised to arrive that night and visit the stores which will stay open from 6-9 p.m., and Santa said he hopes to talk with lots of youngsters.

Tahoka businesses which plan to be open from 6 to 9 p.m. and offer special buys next Friday are Furniture Olé, Jolly Time Video, The Cake Palace, Murray's Florist, Thriftway, Balloons and Flowers, The Tahoka Daisy, Summitt Venture Foods, Tahoka Drug, Paris Cafeteria, Genny's, Perry's, Jennings of Tahoka and the Lynn County News.

Most of the stores will be

giving away merchandise items or turkeys or some kind of gift at drawings to be held in each store at the close of the three-hour period. Persons who register for the free gifts must register during that sale period; also merchants have requested that all registrants be at least 18 and that no name be entered in the box more than one time.

Bernice Phipps, president of the sponsoring Chamber of Commerce, said merchants have been encouraged to offer especially good bargains during the three-hour period to demonstrate to shoppers that local purchases are of equal or better value than items purchased for Christmas gifts out of town. "Many of the items will be sold

at cost or below cost during the sale," she said.

### Tahoka Cage Teams Open With Wins

Tahoka varsity basketball teams opened the season here against Southland Friday with both the boys and girls winning.

Coach Elaine Shedd's girls beat Southland 56-35. Shannon Lawson led the scoring with 24 points, followed by Tesha Hood with 21. Lawson had 22 rebounds and Lacye Jolly, 12. Top scorers for Southland were McGehee, 10, and Araya, 11.

The boys team, coached by Ron Yancy, got the season started right with a 49-28 victory, as Chuck Cate hit 6 out of 6 field goals for 12 points and Kenny Rogers had 11 points. Jody Woodard had 12 rebounds, and Rogers and Tim Young had 3 steals each.

As a team, the Bulldogs out-rebounded the Eagles 65-41.

The junior varsity girls also won their game with Southland, 33-22. C. Hood led the scoring with 12 points.

The varsity teams and both junior varsity teams were scheduled to play Lubbock Christian High School Tuesday night.

### Lynn County Names New Extension Agent

A new county Extension agent for agriculture has been named for Lynn County. The appointment of Brett Cypert was announced Tuesday by Lynn County Judge J.F. Brandon and Bob Robinson, district director with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Cypert has served more than three years as an Extension agent in Hockley County, conducting demonstrations and educational programs in livestock and crop production, as well as providing leadership for 4-H youth programs in agriculture, Robinson said.

"We are fortunate to have such a well trained and effective educator ready to continue the strong Extension program in Lynn County," Robinson said. Cypert replaces Stanley Young, who recently transferred to Lubbock County.

Robinson noted that Cypert has conducted demonstrations in Hockley County to assist producers there in reducing the bark content of stripped cotton, scouting insects in cotton and grain sorghum, and in farm management. For the past four years, Hockley County's 4-H livestock judging teams have advanced to state competition and there have been several state winners in 4-H record book competition.

### Leopards Lose In Playoffs

It was close but no cigar for the New Home Leopards Friday night in Rule as the Leopards scored 14 points in the final two minutes of the game as Vernon Northside held on to win 25-20 in bi-district.

The Leopards received the opening kickoff and drove down the field to set up a 14-yard scoring run by Leo Torres. A missed PAT made it 6-0 New Home.

Brian Railsback caught the first of his three TD passes on a 28 yarder from Cody Alexander to tie the game with five seconds remaining in the opening period. The game was tied until the fourth quarter.

Vernon Northside regained the lead with 7:43 remaining on a 7-yard pass from Ricky Chavez to Railsback and the PAT no good made it 12-6. The same pair got another TD on a 26-yard

pass play with 6:28 left in the game. A good PAT made it 19-6. Northside increased their lead with 3:31 left on a 25-yard TD run by Guy Wilhelm to make it 25-6.

Then New Home staged a comeback as Darrell Paul scored on a one-yard run with 1:41 remaining and a good PAT kick by Torres made it 25-14. The Leopards recovered the ball on an on-side kick and quickly drove down the field for another score as Torres got in the end zone on a six-yard run with only 54 seconds remaining.

The Leopards tried another on-side kick but was unsuccessful as Northside came up with the football and was able to run out the clock.

Northside will play Jayton in the regional round of the playoffs. Torres led the Leopards with 16

carries for 138 yards and Darrell Paul had 12 carries for 125 yards. Quarterback Lloyd Caballero was 8-15 passing for 136 yards.

Leading receivers for New Home included Darrell Paul with four catches for 47 yards, Gaylon Paul with 2 receptions for 21 yards, Jerry Speckman caught one pass for 24 yards and Tyrone Watkins had one reception for 44 yards.

Don't let convenience, lack of time or a favorite family recipe get in the way of following safe food handling practices this Thanksgiving. Because a large frozen turkey can take several days to defrost in the refrigerator, people start to take short-cuts like putting the bird on the kitchen counter

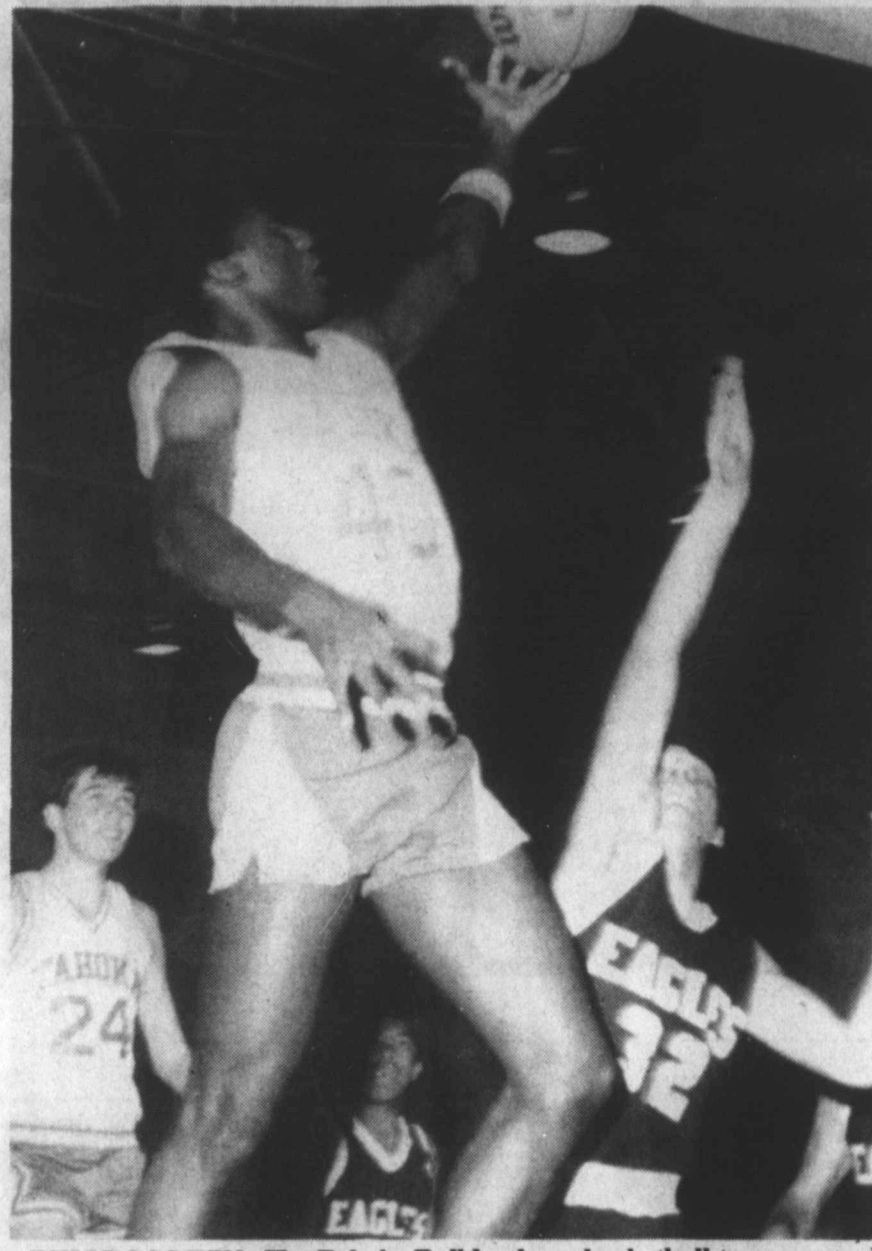
to thaw. This practice allows salmonella bacteria to flourish. "The only safe way to thaw a turkey in a hurry is to use a microwave oven or to thaw in cool water in the sink, changing the water every 30 minutes." "If you don't want to bother with thawing, you would be better off buying a fresh turkey, which can be kept refrigerated for 1-2 days before cooking." Both frozen and fresh turkeys should be washed inside and out in cool water and patted dry with a paper towel before stuffing and cooking. Then wash in hot soapy water

all cutting boards, pans and utensils that have come in contact with the raw turkey. It might seem like a convenience to stuff the turkey in advance, but it could be dangerous. "When the turkey is stuffed it creates ideal conditions for the growth of bacteria in the cavity. In a home refrigerator, it's very difficult to keep the stuffing inside a pre-stuffed turkey below 40 degrees F, which is cold enough to keep most bacteria from growing."

**Sales Tax Added To More Services**

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Texas businesses and residents should remember that if their offices and homes are sprayed for fleas, termites and other pests, they'll pay state and local sales taxes on the service.

"Same goes for garbage and waste collection. These services and others have been taxable since the first of October," Bullock said.

All pest, control services are taxable, including the identification, control and elimination of insects, nuisance birds and animals, and weeds, Bullock said. The tax applies to the service when performed both indoors and outdoors.

Garbage and waste collection is also taxable, unless the service is funded by local taxes and is provided as a basic service by a city or county, Bullock said.

Fees charged for the use of a landfill are not taxable, unless the fee is included in or billed as a charge for garbage collection.

Bullock said fees for some garbage collection services are exempt from the sales tax. These include removal of hazardous wastes, Domestic sewage such as septic tank waste and waste water, and waste material produced from oil, gas and geothermal exploration or production.

Pest control and waste removal services businesses must have a sales tax permit. Applications are available from the Comptroller's office or by calling 1-800-252-5555, ext 3-4600. The fee for a permit is \$25.

**PREPARING TENDER VENISON--** The key to preparing tender venison is to cook it as you would lean beef, says home economist Marilyn Haggard. "Most game has little fat and so is very similar to lean beef. The naturally more tender cuts, such as the loin and rib can be pan fried or roasted. But round steak, mat from the leg and the less tender cuts are best when

cooked by braising, stewing or pot roasting," she says. Haggard cautions against overcooking game meat. "It has short fibers that toughen quickly if overcooked or cooked at too high a temperature. Plan to serve it medium-to-well-done rather than rare or overcooked." Marinating venison for stir-fry or fajitas and before pan-frying or roasting will also make it

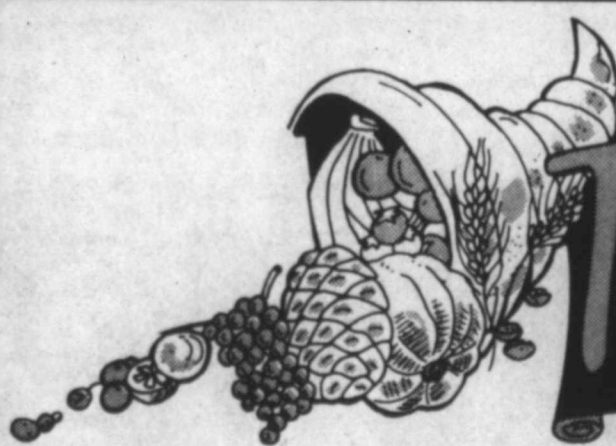

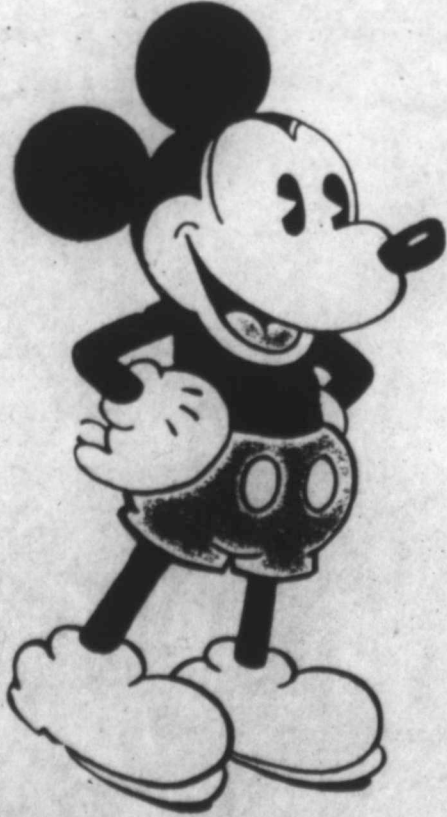

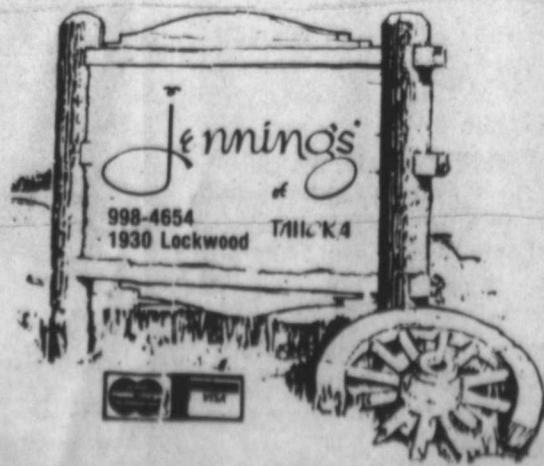

### SPS Files For Fuel-Cost Credit

Southwestern Public Service Company (SPS) has filed with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUCT) for approval to credit its Texas retail customers about \$11 million for fuel-cost savings. The "typical" residential customer, based on monthly usage of 600 kilowatt-hours, will receive about a \$10 credit.

The proposed refund includes interest at an annual rate of 11.7 percent. Most SPS customers will receive the one-time credit in their December bills. The remaining consumers will receive their refunds in January.

"Several factors made this refund possible," said Sam

Hunter, SPS vice president of rates and economic research. "We purchased coal and natural gas, which are major costs in generating electricity, at lower prices. Additionally, the mild summer allowed us to operate only our most efficient power plants, and SPS has continued to improve the efficiency of its generating units."

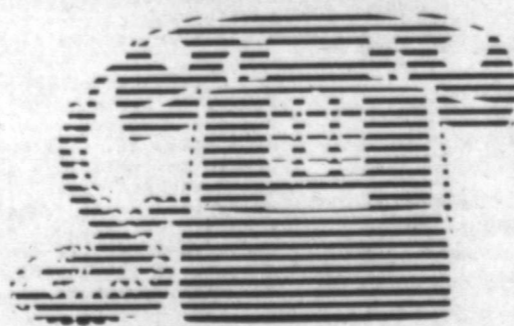

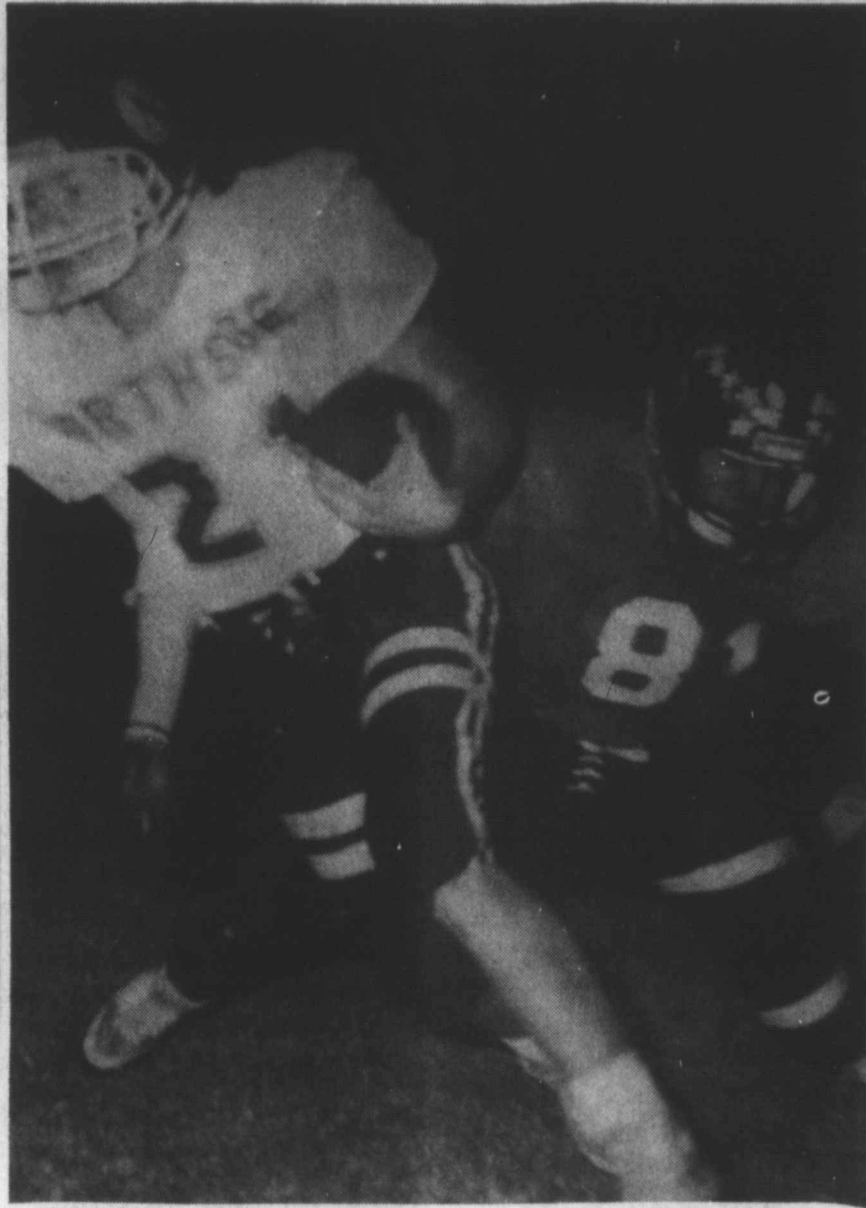

4. Any class member who does not request to be excluded from the class may enter the case with his own lawyer if he or she so wishes.

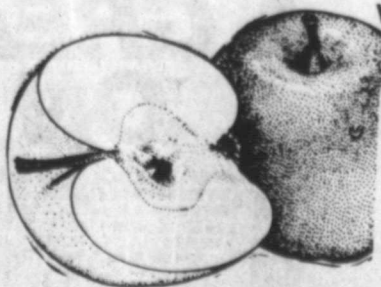

# Eagles Bop Wink To Win Bi-District

(By Seminole Sentinel Staff)  
The O'Donnell Eagles had the perfect formula for winning against the Wink Wildcats in a Class A bi-district game in Region I in Seminole's Wigwam Stadium Friday night.

The Eagles fumbled the ball, let Wink drive the ball and fail to score after the turnover and then O'Donnell would take the ball over and drive for a touchdown. The formula worked wonders in the first half, resulting in two early O'Donnell touchdowns that signed the death warrant on Wink's playoff hopes and eventually led to a 25-14 win for O'Donnell.

O'Donnell, now 9-1, the runner-up of District 3-A, moves onto the next round of the Class A Region I playoffs against Vega at 7:30 p.m. Friday at Sudan.

Wink, the winners of District 4-A, ends their year at 9-2.

O'Donnell began its unorthodox march to a touchdown in the first quarter, with runningback Charles Sanchez, the leading ballcarrier on the night, fumbling and Wildcat George Ramirez claiming the ball for Wink at the O'Donnell 32 with 9:08 remaining in the first period.

Wink scored on its drive, but an illegal procedure wiped out the score and three plays later Jesse Perez claimed a Jeff Jones fumble at the O'Donnell eight.

O'Donnell marched the 92 yards in eight plays, with run-

ning back Kelly Sanders culminating the drive with a 46-yard scamper with 3:51 remaining in the quarter. Sanders was the workhorse on the drive, carrying for 62 total yards.

Sanders was good on the PAT and O'Donnell, the visitors in the game, held a 7-0 lead.

The script repeated itself moments later as Wink defender Ronald Bishop grabbed another Sanchez bobble at the O'Donnell 21.

The Wildcats gained just eight yards in four tries, and turned the ball over to the winners, who were led defensively by Sanders and defensive back David Eaker.

This time the Eagles went 87 yards in 14 plays to make the score 13-0.

Mike Rodriguez scored from 12 yards out to end the march, but Sanders missed the PAT attempt.

In the third quarter, Wink went 59 yards in 11 plays after an O'Donnell punt. Jones ended the drive with a three-yard plunge with 4:59 left in the quarter and Wink trailed 13-7 after a successful conversion by Junior Cobos.

O'Donnell answered in the third quarter, taking advantage of a Wink turnover, one of four on the night by the losers, to march for an insurance score.

O'Donnell took over on the Wink 12 after an interception by Eaker, one of two interceptions

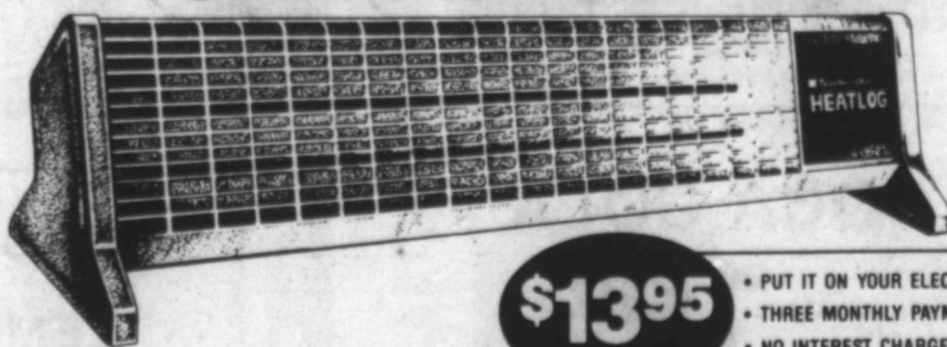

### Crime Line Working; Funds Getting Low

Since Lynn County Crime Line began operations in May of 1982, 53 suspects have been arrested on tips from callers, clearing 56 offenses and resulting in a total of \$7,175 in rewards being paid out.

These are among statistics released by the Crime Line board headed by president C.T. Louder following an annual meeting last week.

"We do need more donations," Louder observed, "to keep on fighting crime in the county. Contributions are tax deductible and may be made through the sheriff's office or by mail to Box 295, Tahoka 79373."

The money paid out since 1982 has resulted in recovery of \$65,619 in stolen property and confiscation of \$12,980 worth of

narcotics.

In the current year, 10 suspects were arrested on tips to Crime Line (998-5145), with \$1100 in rewards paid and \$38,050 in stolen property recovered.

Over the years, most of the calls (27) have been on narcotics, closely followed by residential burglary tips (24).

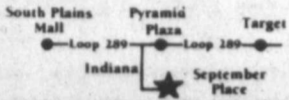

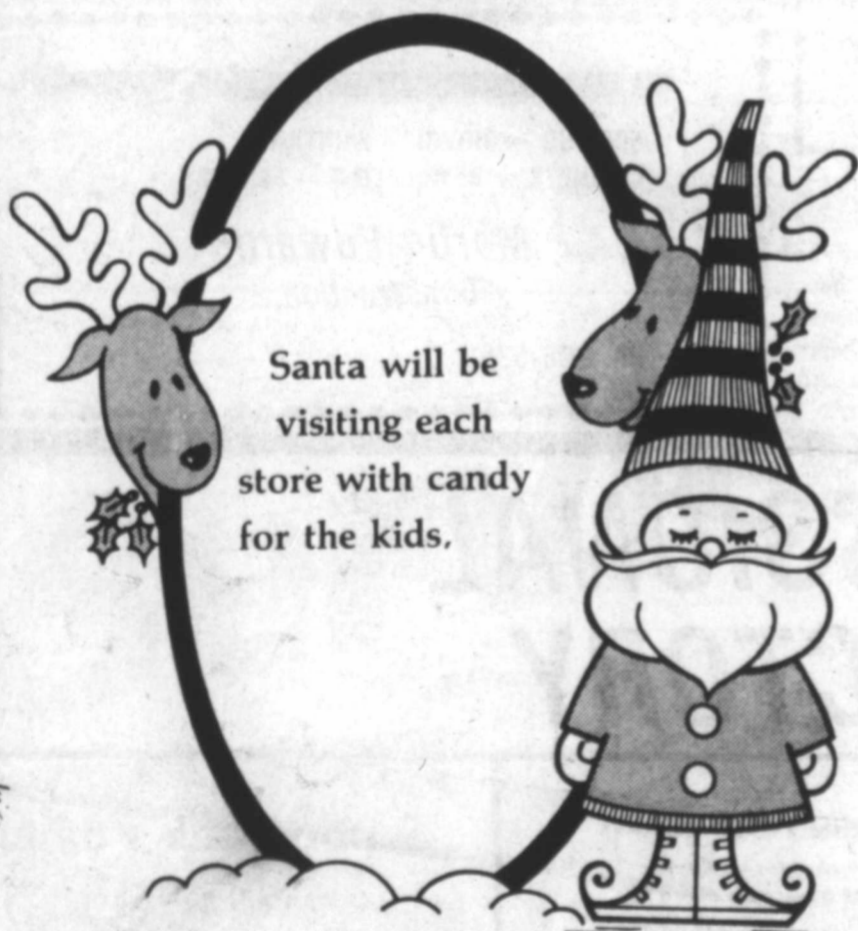
