Most of you out there don't have to collect taxes when you sell things and don't have to mail them in to the state. But for those of us who are supposed to collect the sales taxes, this is a stinking ripoff. Why should people who are in business have to pay the state

Auditor Joe Hays made his annual report to the Tahoka city council Monday night and said the city's finances are in good shape. The council then voted to accept the annual audit.


Paving of several blocks and parking areas in the south part of the city has been completed, and the councilmen approved the first estimated payment on the project, which is being paid by grant money from the state.


Energas official Weldon Self was present, and the council voted to renew the Energas franchise for the city.

The first loss of the season was a close one to Brownfield last weekend in the tournament, and Brownfield girls won the tourna-

Tahoka's boys, meanwhile, lost three games at Coahoma and lost to Sands Tuesday to drop to 1-6 for the year, although they played close in all but one of the games.

Against Sands here Tuesday, Shannon Lawson scored 32 points, Tesha Hood 22 and LaDonna Tillman 12. In the tournament, Tahoka opened with a 58-38 win over Denver City as Hood had 26, Lawson 16 and Tillman 12, and Lawson and Lacye Jolly led in rebounds with 11 and 9.

Charges May Be Reduced

Certain individuals in areas served by General Telephone in Texas who presently do not have telephone service may be eligible for reduced telephone installation charges as part of a national program being piloted in Texas to expand the availability of telephone service.

The program is limited to reduced installation charges and does not include any assistance with monthly phone charges.


