## County Cotton Harvest Nearing 200,000 Bales

Almost 200,000 bales had been ginned in Lynn County by Tuesday afternoon in 17 gins contacted by the Lynn County News, with at least 25,000 bales still to go.

A 225,000-bale crop would not be a record amount for Lynn County, because in the years before 1981 more acres of cotton were planted. Later the total number of acres planted was curtailed, but this year's crop, according to Jimmy Woodard of the ASC office in Tahoka, "is certainly one of the best in several years, both from a quantity and quality standpoint."

The current crop looks good based on grades, staple and micronaire, Woodard said, noting that "the strength of the fiber is good this year."

Last September, the price of cotton contracted was about 70 cents per pound, the ASC office

manager said, adding that currently the price fluctuates between 55 and 60 cents.

Gins contacted by the newspaper were Farmers Co-op Assn. of O'Donnell, Woolam Gin of O'Donnell, Dempsey Gin, Farmers Co-op Assn. No. 1 of Tahoka, Grassland Co-op, Hackberry Co-op, Haney Gin of Tahoka, Louder Gin of Tahoka, New Home Co-op and Lakeview Co-op, New Lynn Gin, New Moore Gin Co., Paymaster of Draw, Paymaster of Petty, Wells Farmers Co-op, West Point Gin, Wilson Co-op and Wayside Gin.

The total number of bales reported ginned by these plants by mid-afternoon Tuesday was 199,018. Eleven of the gins estimated they still had 21,900 bales to gin, while five gins could make no estimate, and one gin, New Moore, reported they had finished.

"I have been in law enforcement for a little over 30 years as Chief of Police of Tahoka and presently I am with the U.S. marshal's office in Lubbock.

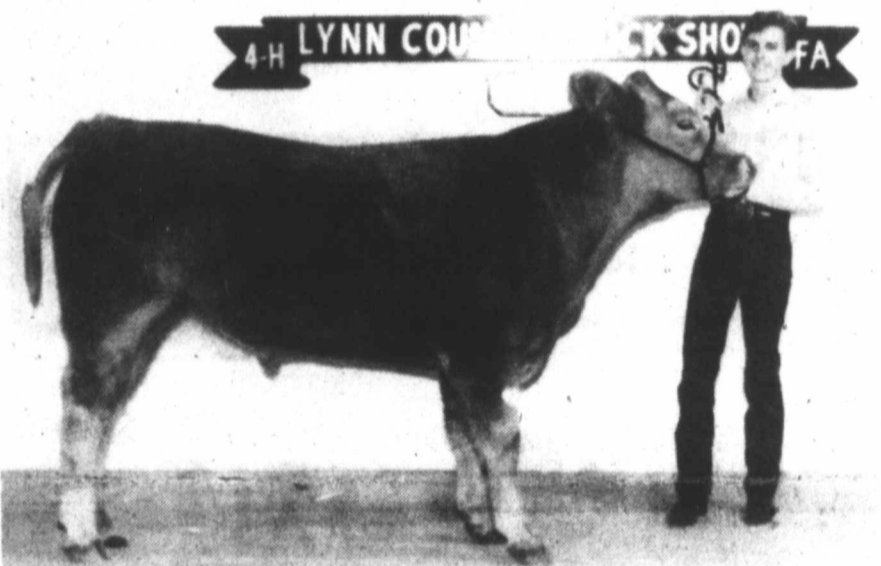
"I have worked in all the courts from the city level to the federal level.

Rick Scarborough has been in evangelism for the last 11 years. He has held meetings across the United States and in various other parts of the world, averaging more than 30 crusades a year.

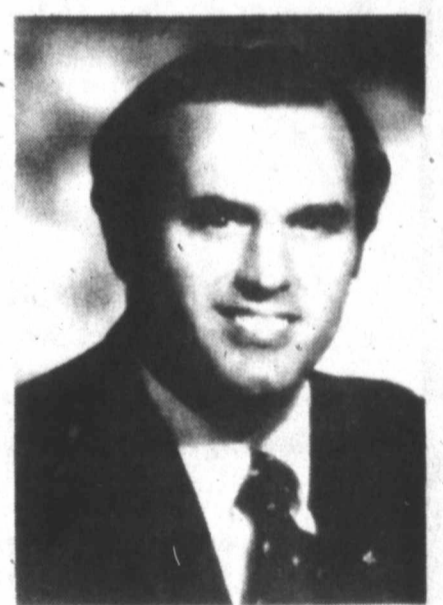

Tahoka's varsity basketball teams lost close games to New Deal in district contests here Tuesday night as both teams lost in the last quarter after holding third-period leads.

The boys played tough against the Lions, who are ranked in the state's top 20, and Tahoka had a sizzling third period in which the Bulldogs scored 27 points. But the output fell to 15 in the final quarter and New Deal scored to go ahead with 4 seconds left on the clock and won 82-80.

Ramiro Rodriguez scored 23 points for Tahoka. Chuck Cate scored 20 and T.C. Spruiell scored 17. Cate also had 10 rebounds and Kurt Bryan had 8. Toby Howell scored 35 points for New Deal.

The girls team lost their second close one in a row to district opponents. Tahoka led 31-21 at halftime and 46-40 at the end of three. But New Deal scored 24 points in the final quarter to 15 for Tahoka and won the game 64-61. For Tahoka, Tesha Hood scored 17 points and Shannon Lawson 25. Lawson also had 15 rebounds and Chasity Hood 10.

Against Crosbyton Jan. 15, the girls were outscored 19-11 in the last quarter and lost 62-55. Tesha Hood scored 21 and Chasity Hood 12, while Lawson had 12 rebounds. Tahoka is now 12-6 for the year, but only 3-4 in district.

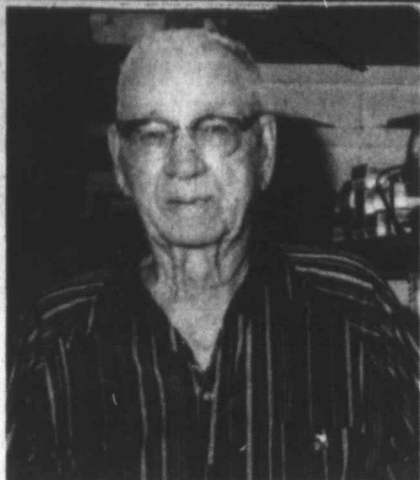
The teams are scheduled to play Seagraves here Friday night.

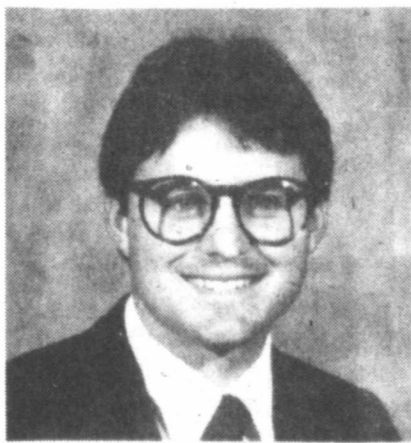

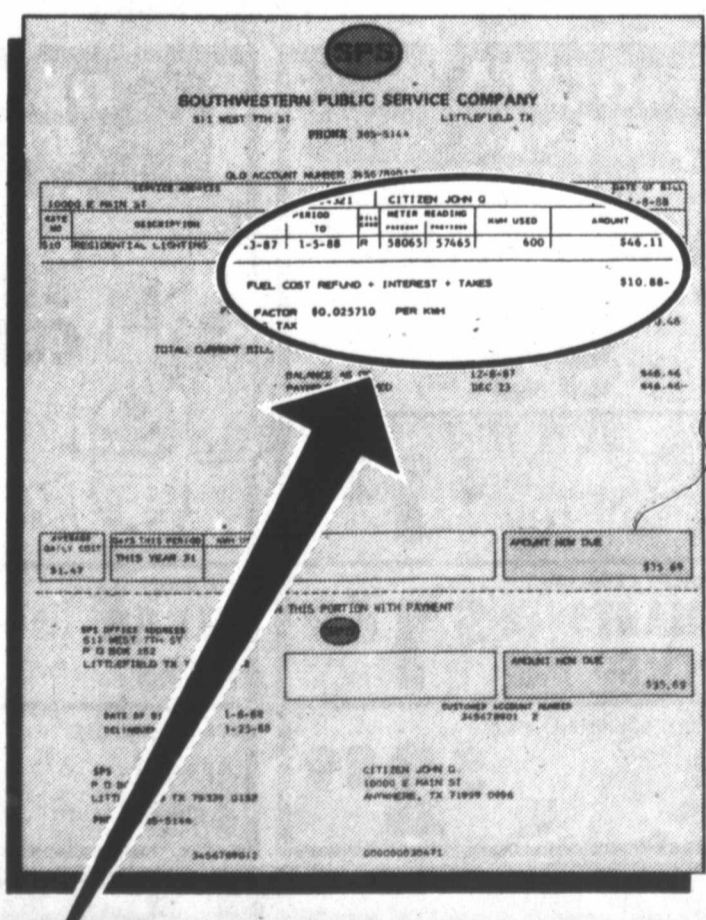
