Eleventh Annual Stock Show Activities Now Underway Here

Judging in the Lynn County Livestock Show for 1988 will get underway today (Thursday) at 6 p.m. when the steer judging opens the show, which actually began Wednesday with weighing of steers and lambs. Lamb judging will begin at 7 p.m. the largest segment of the show, the barrow competition, will take place at 9 a.m. Friday. Also at 11 a.m. Friday will be judging in the baked goods division. Baked goods will then go on sale at 2 p.m.

The Pee Wee Barrow Show for children under nine years of age is scheduled 30 minutes after the barrow judging. (Barrows will be furnished.)

At 11:30 a.m. Saturday the popular barbecue luncheon will begin, with serving to continue for at least an hour. The barbecue will be cooked by the Wilson Lions Club.

Immediately following the barbecue will be the annual sale of animals and presentations of awards. The auction is always a big event with the results showing the youngsters how their efforts are appreciated by business and individuals in the agricultural area.

County Restores Amount Cut From Library Budget

Lynn County Commissioners, faced by a delegation of persons concerned about possible curtailment of library services, Monday agreed to restore \$2400 previously cut from the amount budgeted by the county for its portion of the library, supported jointly by the city and county.

The county had cut the \$2400 from the amount that was budgeted in the previous year.

Commissioners also agreed

Monday to pay \$685 annual dues to the Texas Assn. of Counties, \$750 legal fees to the firm of Shelton and Jones, \$824 for a suit filed against the county and later dismissed, with the money going to National Casualty Insurance Co.

Also approved was payment of \$790 for premium on a policy covering the extension office and library. The group also agreed to a figure submitted by the City of Tahoka for the city's portion of expenses in operating the communications system for dispatching police officers, fire

That's also where I learned most of my Spanish; when I was just 13 or so, I knew the difference between a cayuse, a riata and a hombre.

I also remember reading a publication called Spicy Detective, and this was very daring for its day. Some of us guys used to sneak copies of it around, hoping our parents wouldn't see them.

Anyway, if I only had some of those pulp magazines or Big Little Books today, I could sell them off and retire for a couple of months. So, young readers, be sure to save anything you feel might be worth big money someday.

Burglaries, Thefts, Wreck Investigated

Six planter boxes valued at \$200 each were stolen off a John Deere planter parked east of the south roadside park 2.5 miles north of Tahoka between Dec. 25 and Jan. 16, reported the owner, Jake Dunlap of Rt. 4, Tahoka.

Crime Line, 998-5145, has offered a \$300 reward for information clearing the theft of the John Deere metal planter boxes. Crime Line also has offered rewards of \$500 each on two burglaries reported during the last week.

One was a break-in at the home of Juan Trevino Recendes, 6 miles north of Tahoka on the west side of U.S. 87, burglarized between 1 p.m. Jan. 23 and 1 p.m. Jan. 24. The owners returned home to find a front door open and an Emerson TV set and VCR missing. They were valued at \$412.

The other burglary was a trailer home owned by Donald Basinger of Slaton, located 1.5 miles west of Southland. A door had been forced open and stolen were a Panasonic 13-inch TV set and a briefcase containing some checkbooks.

Dorothy Bolten of Lamesa reported a billfold containing \$500 missing Jan. 18, but it later was found in the complainant's vehicle.

A horse owned by a Tahoka man was seized Friday by officers on the recommendation of the Humane Society after it was reported the horse was being starved.

Roy Rogers of 1218 N. 5th reported to police on Friday that persons unknown had entered his residence between 12:10 and 3:45 p.m. by throwing a brick through the back door and had stolen a metal cash box containing \$18 in cash. Also reported damaged was one window valued at \$10. No arrests had been made at press time.

Police investigated an accident on Friday that involved a 1981 GMC pickup driven by Mary Wilkins Grayson of Tahoka and a 1987 Pontiac driven by Autumn Renee Martin of Tahoka. One

occupant was taken to Lynn County Hospital for treatment of minor injuries and released.

In jail during the week were one person each on the following charges: attempted burglary, speeding plus failure to appear, public intoxication plus disorderly conduct plus expired license plate, expired registration, plus no drivers licence, plus speeding and failure to appear, and driving while intoxicated.

Illegal Trash, Grass Fires Cause Problem

In the past two weeks the Tahoka Volunteer Fire Dept. has answered three calls to fires that began when burning grass got out of control.

City Fire Marshal, Jerry Ford, reminds the citizens of Tahoka that it is against city ordinance to burn grass or trash within the city limits. This practice is considered to be a fire hazard and is subject to a fine.

Mr. Moore was born June 8, 1911, in Rannels County, Texas. He was 76.

Mr. Moore married Lawrence Cawood Jan. 7, 1936, in Lubbock, Tx. He served under Gen. George Patton in the Old Calvary at Fort Bliss, Texas, then became commander of the 87th Recon Division in World War II under Patton.

He was wounded in Germany in 1945 and was honorable discharged from Fitzsimons General Hospital Feb. 1, 1946.

Mr. Moore moved in 1956 to Durango, where he was in business until retirement 15 years ago.

He served in the Colorado Mounted Rangers and was a longtime member of the Elks Club.

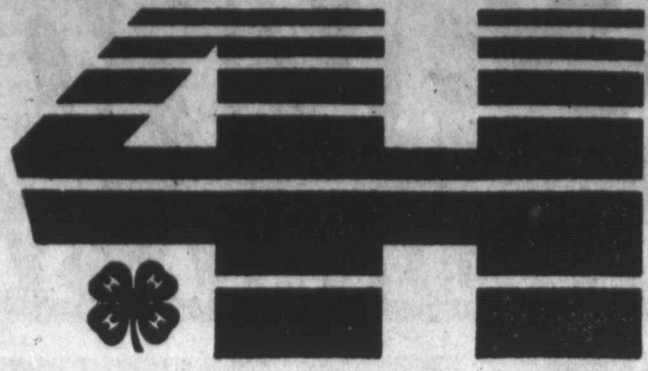

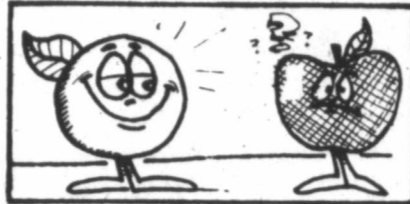

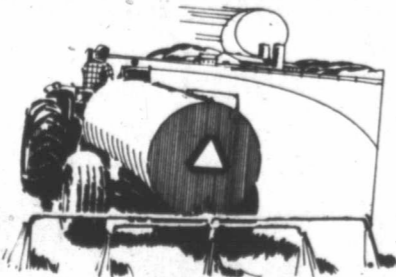

SPORTS MEDICINE CENTER OF THE SOUTHWEST OPENS DOORS FOR INJURED ATHLETES

January 1988 marked the opening of the Sports Medicine Center of the Southwest. This new facility offers a comprehensive treatment program for competitive athletes as well as general sports enthusiasts. With state-of-the-art diagnostic and rehabilitation equipment, the center is designed to care for any sports related condition. 3800 square feet of space houses the Sports Medicine Center of the Southwest, making it the largest facility specifically for sports medicine in West Texas and Eastern New Mexico.

Merac (by Universal) computer diagnostic equipment provides analysis of injuries and predicts weaknesses in athletes on an individual basis. Data for each athlete may be stored on a computer diskette for future comparison. Progression of the rehabilitation process may be fully outlined on a computer printout for convenient record keeping. Eagle (by Cybex) weight training equipment provides conditioning and muscle toning for virtually every part of the human body. Some of these include: pre-season and pre-employment physical exams, body composition and mechanics assessments, sport specific screenings, injury and fitness clinics, back school, physical therapy, diet and nutrition counseling, work hardening, and a variety of others.

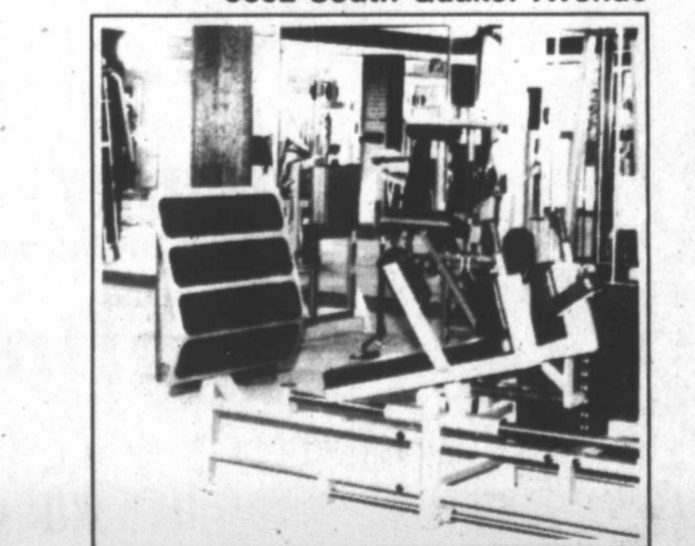


