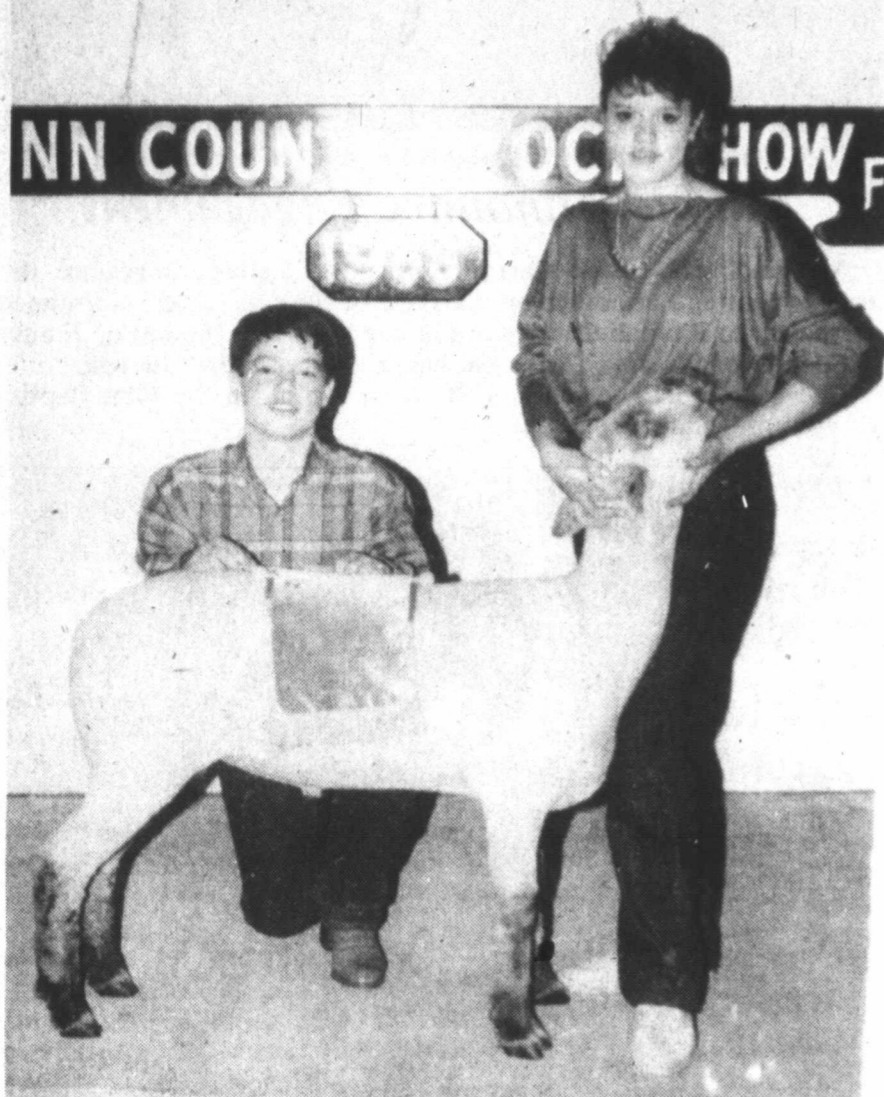

Tahoka Man Found Dead At Residence

Tahoka police investigated the death of a 27-year-old Tahoka man on Monday identified as Martin Gonzales Pesina. Pesina was reported to have died between 2 a.m. and 7:41 a.m. on Monday at his mother's residence at 1214 S. 2nd. Pesina's mother reportedly went in to his room to wake him on Monday morning and found him dead.

The body was transported to White Funeral Home. Actual cause of death will not be ruled until Dr. Ralph Erdmann of Amarillo can perform an autopsy. Police suspect no foul play in this incident.

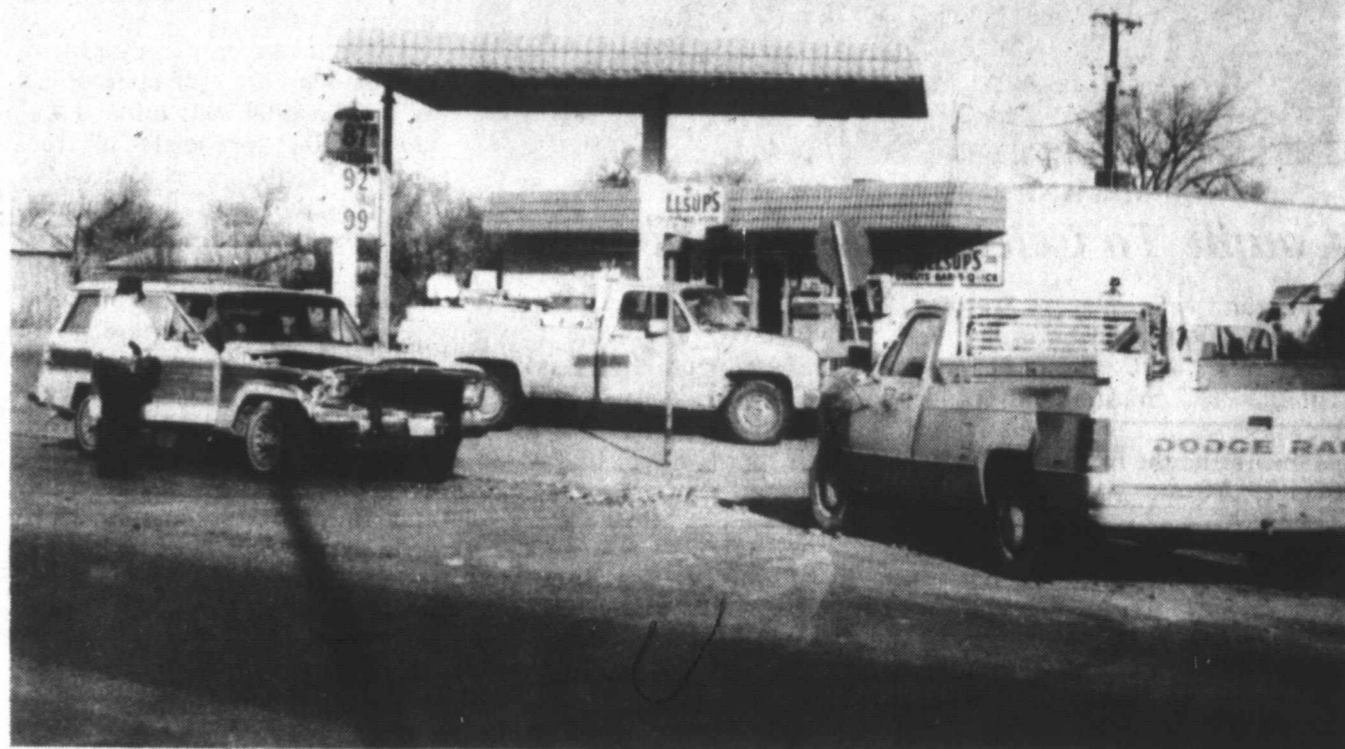
Bertha Lawrence reported to police on Sunday, Jan. 30 that her mobile home, located at 1812 S. 2nd, was reported burglarized sometime between Jan. 11-30. The trailer, used as a storage building, was ransacked and reported missing was a man's FFA ring, an unknown number of old coins and some costume jewelry.

Police investigated an accident on Thursday, Jan. 28, at Lockwood and Ave. L that involved a 1985 Dodge pickup driven by Johnny Cruz of Lubbock and a 1988 Jeep Wagoneer driven by Fred B. Hegi of Tahoka. Both drivers were taken to Lynn County Hospital for treatment of injuries and released.

Billy Tomlinson of Tahoka reported that a radiator was stolen off a 292 Chevrolet irrigation motor sometime early Thursday, about 4.7 miles northeast of Tahoka. The radiator was valued at \$300 and Crime Line, 998-5145, has offered a \$300 reward in the case.

A \$300 reward also has been offered in the theft of an air compressor and 5-hp 3-phase motor, stolen from the middle gin plant at Farmers Co-Op Gin of Tahoka. Manager Earlon Shirley said it was not known when the items were stolen, as that particular plant had not been operating.

In jail during the week were eight persons, including one on a charge of hunting without the consent of the landowner. Other charges for those jailed included public intoxication, speeding and failure to appear, revocation of probation, expired registration, speeding (two counts) and failure to appear, and failure to maintain financial responsibility.

Cage Teams Hammered By Mustangs

Tahoka's varsity basketball teams were walloped by Shallowater Tuesday night and against Ralls last week, the boys lost and girls won.

Ralls beat Tahoka boys 55-38 as Chuck Cate scored 13 and Ramiro Rodriguez 12 points. Cate also had 12 rebounds. Coach Ron Yancy commented, "We expected to win this game, but we shot the worst we've done all year... we've hit a cold spell both offensively and defensively in the last two games. We hope to pull out of our tailspin and start making our shots." In the last two games, Tahoka's percentage from the field has been 24 and 30 percent.

Against Shallowater, who won 93-48, Rodriguez scored 21 points and Cate 10. But the Mustangs scored 32 points in the second quarter alone.

Tahoka's girls took a big 17-3 lead against Shallowater after the first quarter, but the wheels came off after that, with the Fillies scoring big in the last three quarters.

Rabies Clinic Slated Feb. 12

Tahoka City Manager Barry Pittman announced today that a rabies clinic will be performed by Dr. Geslin of Dawson County Veterinarian Clinic on Friday, Feb. 12 from 1:30 to 5:30 p.m. at the Tahoka Fire Department. City tags will be available for pets with the rabies shot.

Council Moves To Keep City From Going To Dogs

Dog owners whose dogs are picked up by the city from now on will be fined \$25 plus impounding fee of \$5 per day. Tahoka city council Monday approved an amendment to the city ordinance establishing those fees in effort to cut down on the number of dogs running loose in the city.

Previously there has been no fine for owners, and the fee for impounding has been only a dollar per day. The current stipulation that dogs or cats will be destroyed after 72 hours of being impounded still holds true.

City ordinance says that no dog will be allowed to run loose in Tahoka, regardless of whether

they are tagged, according to the City Manager Barry Pittman. "All dogs are supposed to be peened in the yard or on a leash," he said.

Council members considered changing their regular meeting date but decided to leave it on Monday.

Opening of Nevils Memorial Cemetery will be as soon as legal paperwork is completed, expected to be within the next day or two. At that time lots will go on sale to the public, Pittman said.

Approved by the group was a contact with the county for dispatching services for police and fire department.

All council members were present.

Dayton Parker Observing 25th Year In Pharmacy

Dayton Parker, owner of Parker Health Mart Pharmacy, this week is observing his silver anniversary as a pharmacist in Tahoka, celebrating by having a 25th anniversary sale to mark the occasion.

In 1963 when Parker joined the firm, it was owned by Wayne Collier, located at the same place it now is, on the corner of S. 1st and Ave. J. Parker, a native of Crosby County, had just graduated from the University of Texas School of Pharmacy in January 1963 and immediately was employed by Collier.

Collier died in 1964 and in January of 1965 the store was incorporated with the name of the store being changed to Collier Parker Pharmacy with Wayne's widow, Coye Collier, Wynne's brother, Bob Collier, and Dayton Parker being the shareholders. Five years later, in 1970, Parker became the sole owner of the corporation and the store name became Dayton Parker Pharmacy.

For 85 years this coming October, there has been a drug store on these same lots at the

northwest corner of the public square in Tahoka.

Until April 15, 1903, the site of Tahoka was prairie land grazed by cattle and antelope. That was the officially organized and Tahoka established. Within a few weeks about 40 businesses, residences, tents and dugouts sprang up.

By October, 1903, Blake Brothers of Lubbock had built a frame store building in which W.E. Gilmore & Son had opened a drug store on one of the lots now occupied by Dayton Parker's business. It sold a year or two later to Dr. S.H. Windham, one of Tahoka's two first physicians. A.S. Coughran also had a drug store there in 1906, and records are not clear as to whether or not this store was the same as the Windham store.

But at any rate, A.I. Thomas, who had come out to Lamesa in 1906 to establish a drug store, bought out Coughran and Dr. Windham on July 1, 1907. C.A. (Cliff) Thomas, a few days later came up from Lamesa to join his brother, A.I., and the firm's

name was changed to Thomas Brothers Drug. Still later, W.O. (Otho) Thomas came here from

Old Mexico, and bought A.I. Thomas's interest, and the firm name held until 1936.

In the meantime, the Thomases influenced their brother-in-law, R.H. Collier, to come up from Ennis in the winter of 1908-1909 and operate a store they established at the new town of Post.

Thomas Bros. frame store building burned in the disastrous fire of December 30, 1915, that consumed all 13 buildings on the north side of the square in Tahoka and the new large brick Lynn-Hotel.

Almost immediately, Thomas Bros. in 1916 began erection of the present two-story brick structure occupied on the corner by the drug store, a barber shop in the east half of the present building and a meat market on an addition to the north. For many years, doctors, lawyers and others occupied the second floor office rooms.

Deciding to retire in 1936, C.A. and W.O. sold the drug store to their nephew, Wayne Collier. In 1945, Wynne remodeled and enlarged the store, taking in the east half to double the store's floor space. In 1967 the first carpet was laid and the

pharmacy department was remodeled with fixtures manufactured by a private firm in Fredricksburg. This was all installed in one day, December 10, 1967.

In 1982 Parker Pharmacy became Parker Health Mart Pharmacy, as the firm joined the Health Mart organization in order to have better access to a wider range of quality products at reasonable prices to the customer.

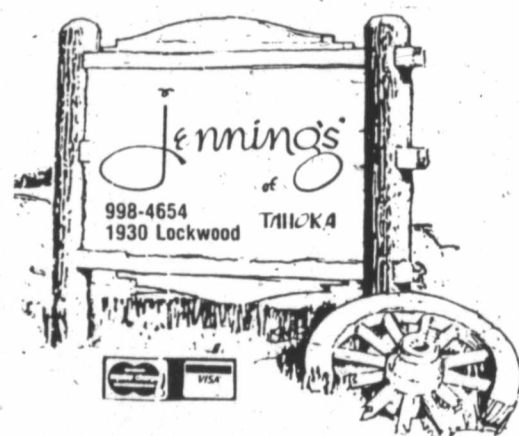

OUT OF THE WOODS

LET'S INDULGE in a little daydreaming. Instead of working at the office today, you know where I'd like to be? Well, first of all, I'd like to be in the body of somebody like the gorgeous Jaclyn Smith, with a voice like Barbra Streisand, and on a tropical beach on some remote island with some "hunk" like Robert Redford or Tom Selleck.

No? Okay, I'll settle for my definitely un-gorgeous body, with a voice like ... uh, like ... well, let's face it, my dog howls when I sing. And I guess I'll have to settle on being stuck in my drafty cracker-box house with a loving, caring husband (See? It's not all bad.) I guess I've got a case of the winter blahs.

Oh, I've got it bad, too. Lately I remember how nice it was to lounge on a chair in the back yard and watch the kids splash in their pool ... what fun it was to camp out in the mountains of New Mexico during the summer ... what a great feeling it was to get all sunburned at a weekend tennis tournament ... summer evening cookouts on the backyard grill ... the feeling of

the warm sun on your face.

I can't stand it! I detest, dislike and denounce winter time. I don't like cold feet and hands, I don't like snow, I don't like snow-skiing (I know, I'm weird), and I especially don't like slippery icy streets and sidewalks. I don't like to get up in the dark in the mornings and walk into a bathroom with a linoleum floor so cold it turns my little toes blue clear up to my ankles. And I don't like people who like claim they like winter.

Okay, I feel better now that I've got it out of my system. Now if I could get that blasted cold (as in runny nose, stopped up head and bloodshot eyes) out of my system, I could possibly be more optimistic about winter. I might even come to enjoy it...

The condensation that forms inside windows in the winter is usually just a nuisance, but can be a sign of a larger problem with humidity, according to a housing specialist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service. "Foggy or wet windows inside your home shows that the temperature at which water vapor in the air will condense on surfaces," says Dr. Susan Quiring. "Condensation may not be damaging to your home if it is temporary and vaporizes as the surface warms during the day," she explains. "But moisture which lingers on the surface and eventually pools on the window frame could damage the frame, especially if it's wood."

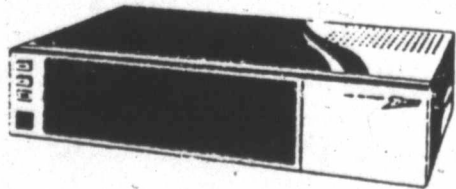

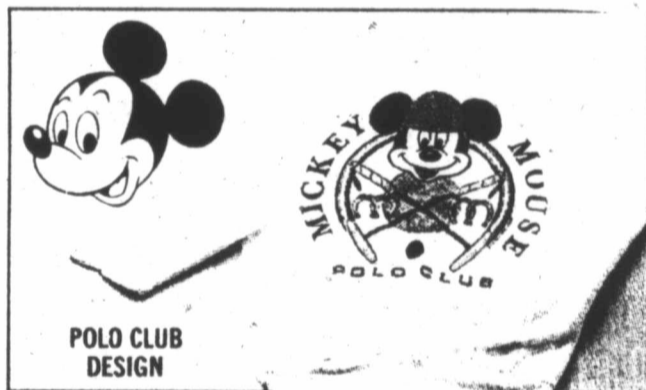

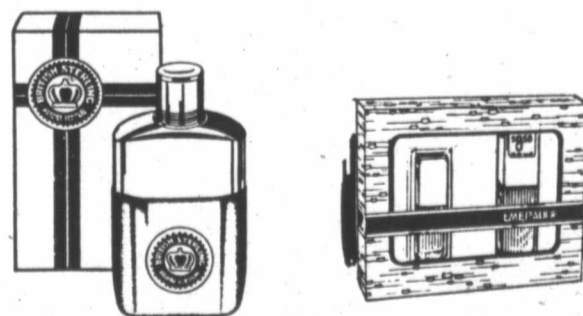

Phebe K. Warner Club News

In an election year with so many candidates seeking the office of President of the U.S., wouldn't matters be simplified if a name such as Abraham Lincoln appeared on the ballot? In reply to the roll call directive, "Name your most admired statesman, past or present," members of the Phebe K. Warner Club mentioned Lincoln's name far more than any other. The roll call was part of a program presented by Mrs. Thalia Burks on the U.S. Constitution and the American government. The club met Jan. 26 in the home of Mrs. Lois White, with Mrs. Zuma McWhirter serving as co-hostess. Mrs. Burks presented each member with an explanatory booklet about the Constitution.

Her brief review of the book brought out the nature of that special document that is both simple and complex. In simple, she said, in that it is based on the premise that a government which derives its powers from the consent of the governed shall protect those rights which we have called inalienable-Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness. It is complex, in that this government, which is the product of various compromises, is based on a system of checks and balances which is intended to forever "keep a bridle on each of the three branches of federal government so that no one branch ever races off too far in any direction without the consent of the other two." These are the things that Americans are stopping to take note of in this bicentennial year of the Constitution's adoption, Mrs. Burks added, "lest, by taking them for granted, they should fail to carry our nation through the next 200 years." "Write your congressman," and "Get out and vote," campaigns may seem trivial, but the Phebe K. Warner Club urges its members and fellow citizens to practice these responsibilities of citizenship, as they are, in large part, what makes ours a government "of the people, for the people, and by the people."

Mrs. Burks also presided over the club's business meeting in the absence of Mrs. Edna White, club president. Present were 19 members and 1 guest. A collection of supplies for the M.D. Anderson Hospital was made and will continue to be made at the club's Feb. 9 meeting.

County Gets Money From Bingo Taxes

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday sent fourth quarter 1987 checks totaling \$1.6 million to 100 cities and 66 counties that have legalized charity bingo and levy the two-percent local gross receipts tax on the game.

Lynn County received \$2454.97 an increase of 55 per cent over the \$1579.38 received for the same period last year.

As of Friday, a total of 1,668 non-profit organizations were licensed to hold bingo games in Texas.

In 1987, bingo games in Texas grossed over \$345 million, awarded \$253 million in prizes and contributed over \$46 million or 50.95 percent, of their adjusted gross receipts to Texas charities.

In addition to local taxes bingo generated \$2,071,962.71 in state taxes last year.
