THE AVERAGE American consumes 128 pounds of sugar each year, says a release from Lubbock Methodist Hospital, which makes

money from folks who eat more than that. Sugar, says the release, has no nutritional value: "refined sugar is 99 per cent pure sucrose and a lot of empty calories. Sugar provides no essential vitamins and minerals."

Nancy Anderson of the I wrote something about hospital's Centre for Cardiac Rehabilitation and Fitness, says many people realize the problems of sugar intake and turn to alternatives such as honey. She said honey provides potassium, calcium and phosphorus, but you need to consume about 16 cups of honey per day to get the daily requirement of all those nutrients. "This adds about 15,872 calories per day.'' So I guess if you did that for about a year you could get your picture on national TV (wide screens only).

> She also said too much use of artificial sweeteners is dangerous. She suggests we get our sugar from fruits, mentioning apricots, cantaloupes, peaches, mangoes, lemons, strawberries, oranges, cherdon't know what a papaya is I thought it was a South American's daddy

> Finally, she said sugar has been linked to many diseases, but the main problem is it makes us too fat.

Farmers Urged To Join Battle To Keep Diesel Tax Exemption

Farmers will have to pay the federal diesel fuel tax at the retail level and then apply for a refund under a provision in the 1987 deficit-reduction bill.

The new law repeals all provisions permitting exempt, taxfree sales beyond the wholesale level, effective April 1, 1988. Farmers still retain their exemption, but must first pay the tax up front.

Texas Farm Bureau is mounting a statewide campaign for legislation repealing the new rules scheduled to go into effect April 1, and Lynn County Farm Bureau is urging its members and others to get involved, according to county Farm Bureau President Jimmy Bragg.

Texas Congressional leaders are key proponents of bills to resolve a provision in the budget reconciliation bill recently passed by Congress that would substantially attect farmers and ranchers, according to S.M. True, TFB president.

The Revenue Act of 1987, enacted as part of H.R. 3545, the budget reconciliation bill, changes the collection point of the diesel fuel tax, forcing farmers and ranchers to pay the tax at the time of purchase and then apply for a refund. This is scheduled to take effect April 1. True said it is hoped that the new legislation can be passed before then.

In a letter to U.S. Rep. Kika de la Garza, chairman of the House Agriculture Committee, and to U.S. Senators Phil Gramm and Lloyd Bentsen, True said the provision would cause an "impending and imminent economic hardship on Texas agricultural producers.'

S 2003 by Gramm, H.R. 3865 by U.S. Rep. Larry Combest and H.R. 3866 by de la Garza would exempt the 15 cents per gallon excise tax being levied on all. diesel fuel used for farming purposes.

According to the new fuel tax guidelines, quarterly refunds would be limited to those for \$1,000 or more. Otherwise, refunded applications would have to be made annually.

True said the up-front would increase as would record keeping and tax preparation work-

"This will go into effect April 1 unless it is repealed," said Bragg. "We strongly urge all farmers and everyone interested in the welfare of farmers in Lynn County to contact Sen. Lloyd Bentsen and urge him to join Sen. Phil Gramm, Rep. Charles Stenholm and others in support of repeal of this legislation.

Gin Burglaries, Wreck In Tahoka Investigated

Burglaries of two gins in Tahoka and a burglary of a home at New Home were among major activities investigated by city and county peace officers during the last week.

The residence of Pam Estrada at New Home was burglarized Feb. 16, Tuesday night, about 9:45 p.m. Stolen were a J.C. Penney VCR, a Pontiac microwave and a Zenith stereo, all valued at a total of \$720. Crime Line has offered a \$500 reward in this case and also is offering a \$500 reward for information clearing either of the gin burglaries.

Tahoka police are currently investigating burglaries reported at Louder Gin and Haney Gin, reported to have occurred between 7 p.m. Tuesday and 8 a.m. Wednesday. Both gins were reported to have had extensive damage and also an undetermined amount of money was reported stolen from coke machines. A more detailed report should be available later this week.

Police investigated a three-car accident on Monday at South 3rd and Ave. M that involved a 1970 Chevrolet pickup driven by Robert Delmas Cook, a 1986 Chevrolet van driven by Martha Gonzales Martinez and a 1975 Chevrolet driven by Erminia Bando, all of Tahoka. 

Try Spinach In Place Of Lettuce If you cringe at having to pay a dollar or more for a small head of poor quality iceburg lettuce, march right on down the aisle of the produce section and pick up some fresh spinach for your salad. "Consumers can find top quality spinach in the markets now," says food marketing expert Marilyn Haggard. "Spinach often has a qaulity advantage over lettuce in late winter, but it's especially true this year due to an unusally small lettuce crop from California," she adds. "Spinach is coming fresh from the fields in the Winter Garden area of Texas and will be at its peak in flavor and supply through April." According to the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service specialist, spinach also has a nutritional advantage over lettuce. 'Spinach has about five times more iron, seven times more vitamin C and 20 times more vitamin A than iceburg lettuce,"
