New Home Boys, Wilson Girls Win In Playoffs

The New Home boys basketball team, led by a whopping 40 points poured in by Gaylon Paul, bombed Plains 72-58 at Brownfield Tuesday night to advance to sub-regional play against Whitharral.

Another Lynn County boys team, the Wilson Mustangs, lost to Loop in the playoffs at Brownfield Tuesday night, after a fourth-quarter surge by the Loop team cost the Mustangs the game.

With Craig Morton scoring 29 points and Greg Spears 14, the Mustangs had a 4-point lead going into the last quarter, but were outscored 20-12 that period and lost 70-66. Ruben Garcia scored 10 points. Wilson wound up the season 18-12.

The Wilson girls meanwhile,

sailed past Klondike 51-36 Monday night at Texan Dome in Levelland and qualified for the four-team regional, whose winner usually goes on the state championship. In the regional, the Lady Mustangs, now 27-4 for the year, will face Nazareth, 30-2, at 1:30 p.m. Friday in Texan Dome. If they get by Nazareth, they will play in the finals at 7 p.m. Saturday against the winner of Kelton and Sudan, the defending state girls champion. Nazareth beat Wheeler 90-58 Monday.

Against Klondike, Tami Webb scored 14 points and Linda Garcia 10 to lead Wilson in points.

The New Home boys took a 21-12 first period lead over Plains and were never headed, padding the lead to 36-20 at halftime. In addition to Gaylon Paul's 40 points, Coby James had 15 and Darrell Paul scored 11. Shane McMinn scored 21 to lead Plains.

New Home, now 22-6 for the year, will play Whitharral at 8 p.m. Friday night at Texan Dome, following a game between Loop and Sudan. Whitharral beat Petersburg 58-53 in double overtime Tuesday.

Farmers Urged To Join Battle To Keep Diesel Tax Exemption

Farmers will have to pay the federal diesel fuel tax at the retail level and then apply for a refund under a provision in the 1987 deficit-reduction bill.

The new law repeals all provisions permitting exempt, tax-free sales beyond the wholesale level, effective April 1, 1988. Farmers still retain their exemption, but must first pay the tax up front.

Texas Farm Bureau is mounting a statewide campaign for legislation repealing the new rules scheduled to go into effect April 1, and Lynn County Farm Bureau is urging its members and others to get involved, according to county Farm Bureau President Jimmy Bragg.

Texas Congressional leaders are key proponents of bills to increase as would record keeping and tax preparation workload.

"This will go into effect April 1 unless it is repealed," said Bragg. "We strongly urge all farmers and everyone interested in the welfare of farmers in Lynn County to contact Sen. Lloyd Bentsen and urge him to join Sen. Phil Gramm, Rep. Charles Stenholm and others in support of repeal of this legislation." DPS Reports On Accidents

Capt. L.A. Reinhart, District Supervisor of the Lubbock Highway Patrol District comprising of 21 counties said, "For the month of January, our troopers investigated 5 fatal accidents, 67 personal injury accidents, and 93 property damage accidents. There were 6 persons killed and 67 persons injured in these accidents."

Sgt. Lamar Beckworth of Brownfield stated, "In Lynn county, our troopers investigated no fatal accidents, 5 personal injury accidents, and 9 property damage accidents in the month of January. Five persons were injured in these accidents."

Gin Burglaries, Wreck In Tahoka Investigated

Burglaries of two gins in Tahoka and a burglary of a home at New Home were among major activities investigated by city and county peace officers during the last week.

The residence of Pam Estrada at New Home was burglarized Feb. 16, Tuesday night, about 9:45 p.m. Stolen were a J.C. Penney VCR, a Pontiac microwave and a Zenith stereo, all valued at a total of \$720. Crime Line has offered a \$500 reward in this case and also is offering a \$500 reward for information clearing either of the gin burglaries.

Tahoka police are currently investigating burglaries reported at Louder Gin and Haney Gin, reported to have occurred between 7 p.m. Tuesday and 8 a.m. Wednesday. Both gins were reported to have had extensive damage and also an undetermined amount of money was reported stolen from coke machines. A more detailed report should be available later this week.

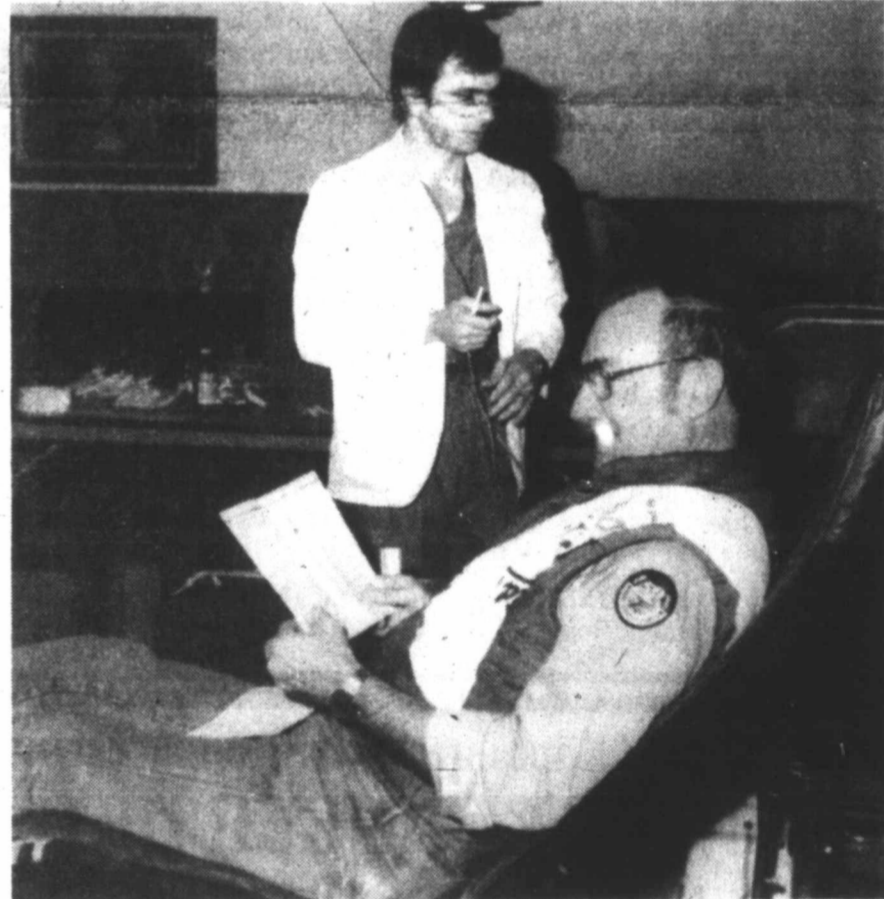

Try Spinach In Place Of Lettuce

If you cringe at having to pay a dollar or more for a small head of poor quality iceberg lettuce, march right on down the aisle of the produce section and pick up some fresh spinach for your salad. "Consumers can find top quality spinach in the markets now," says food marketing expert Marilyn Haggard. "Spinach often has a quality advantage over lettuce in late winter, but it's especially true this year due to an unusually small lettuce crop from California," she adds. "Spinach is coming fresh from the fields in the Winter Garden area of Texas and will be at its peak in flavor and supply through April." According to the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service specialist, spinach also has a nutritional advantage over lettuce. "Spinach has about five times more iron, seven times more vitamin C and 20 times more vitamin A than iceberg lettuce," she explains.

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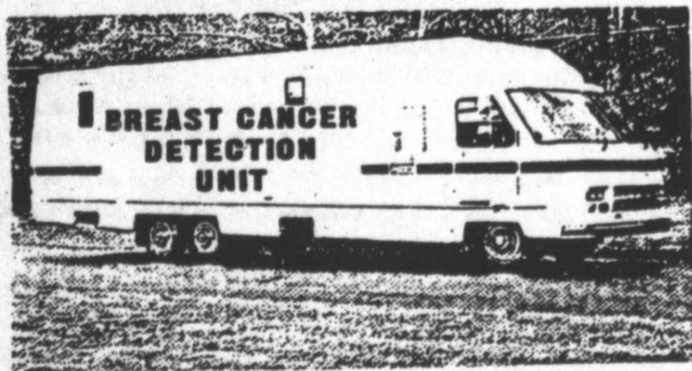

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and a 90% 10-year survival rate.

A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, even before it can be felt.

Appointments can be made by calling 998-4533. The Mobile Breast Cancer Detection Unit will

be in Tahoka on Monday, March 7, 1988.

The American Cancer Society has established guidelines for mammography in asymptomatic women. (Women who have no symptoms of disease). Those guidelines have been adopted by the American Academy of Family Physicians, American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, and The American College of Radiology. Those guidelines are:

- I. 35-40 years of age - One baseline mammogram.
- II. 40-50 years of age - A mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.
- III. 50 years of age and over - An annual physical examination and annual mammogram.
- IV. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with significant high risk factors should be ex-

amined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.

V. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

The charge for the screening mammogram is \$50.00. The Unit accepts cash, check, Visa, MasterCard and American Express.

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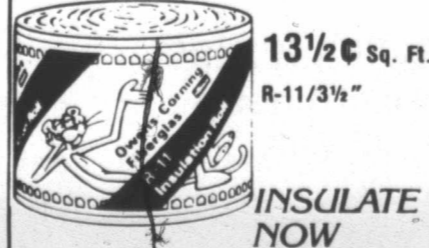
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First Baptist To Host 'Singing Men'

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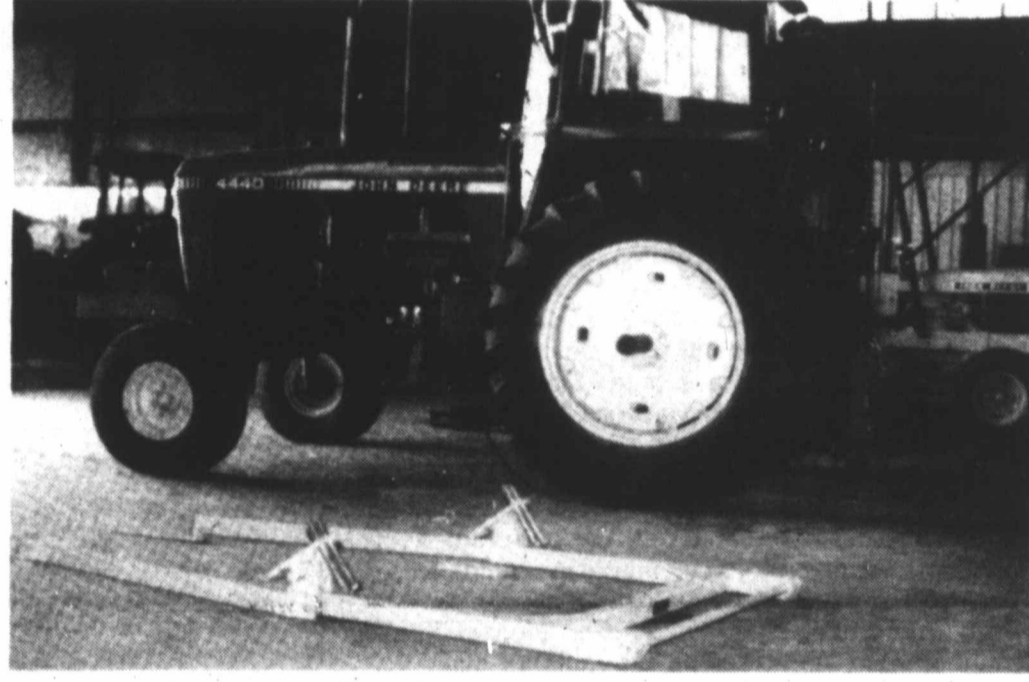
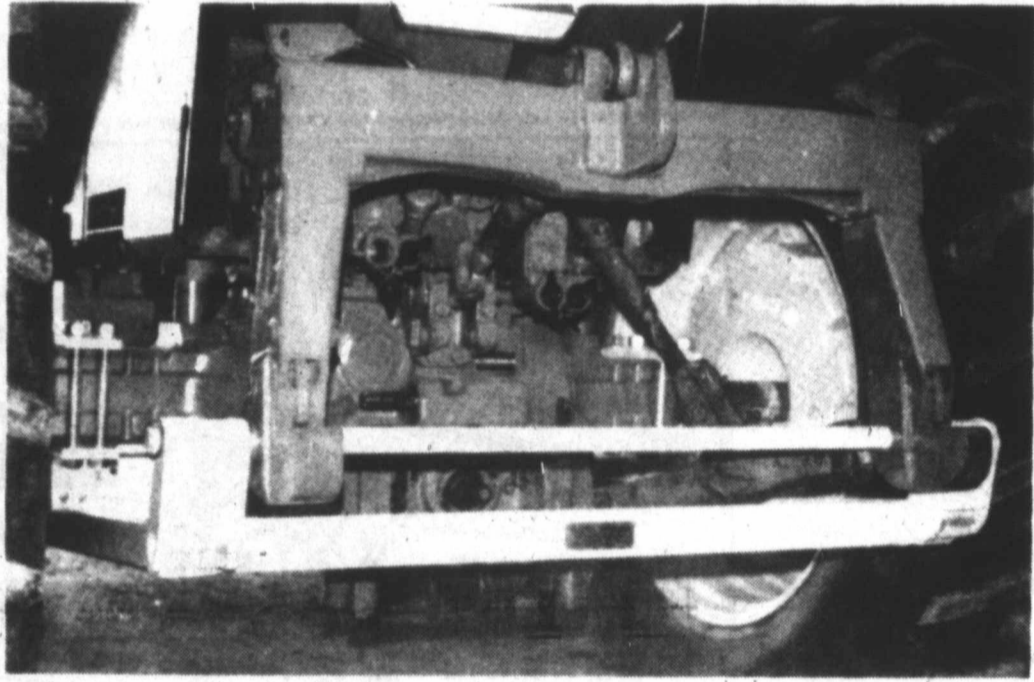

Funeral services were conducted Tuesday in Citrus Heights, CA., for Elmer Richey, 81.

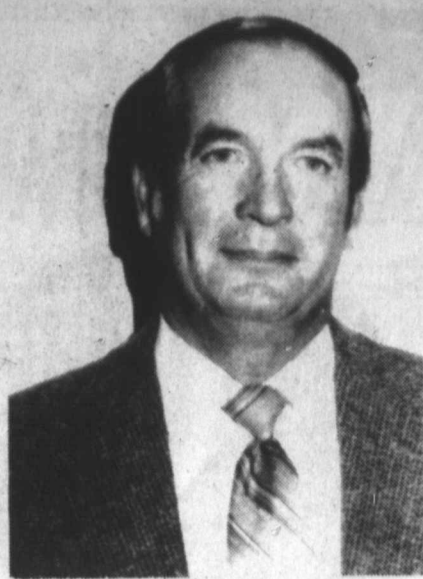
Richey, of North Highland, CA., died Feb. 20. Interment was in Sylban Cemetery under the direction of Price Funeral Chapel, Citrus Heights.

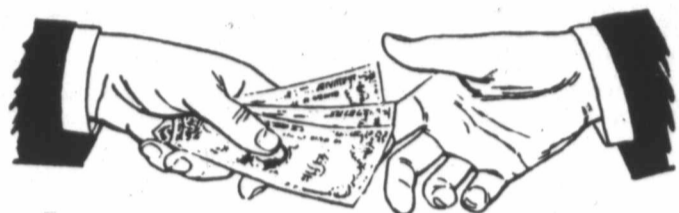
