Lynn County voters who failed to register to vote by the Feb. 7 deadline may not vote in the primary elections March 8, but still can register in time to vote in the runoff primary April 12, Lynn County tax assessor-collector George McCracken said this week.

Eligible voters may cast ballots in the runoff primary of their choice, and in the general election in November if they register to vote before midnight March 13, McCracken said.

# Sheriff, Commission Races In Spotlight

A two-man race for Lynn County Sheriff and contests for two Lynn County Commissioner jobs will command the most interest in the county Tuesday as voters cast ballots in primary elections.

Presidential preference votes in both the Democratic and Republican primaries are new on ballots here, but those national races will be of secondary interest to most of the voters. There are no county candidates running on the Republican ballot, so most voters as usual will go to the Democratic primary ballot, where nomination is the same as being elected at the county level.

Incumbent Sheriff Clifford Laws, elected to fill out the unexpired term of resigned Sheriff Stanley Krause, is seeking election to a full term, and is being opposed by Jack Miller, longtime Tahoka Chief of Police before retiring from that job.

Also on the Democratic ballot are two contested races for Lynn County commissioner. Precinct 1 Commissioner Eldon Gattis is facing the challenge of Gerald (Jerry) Gerner for the nomina-

Five candidates are running for the nomination (and election) for commissioner of Precinct 3. which includes the south part of Tahoka and the south part of the county, including O'Donnell. With so many candidates, there is a strong possibility of a runoff in this race for the position now held by Bart Anderson, who is not seeking re-election. Seeking the nomination are Bobby Cox, Kenneth Eaker, John Chapa Jr., Bobby Knight and Don Blair.

If a runoff is necessary, it will be on April 12.

On the Democratic ballot for presidential preference in Texas are 11 names, including some candidates no longer considered in the race. The list includes Al Gore, David Duke, Michael Dukakis, Dick Gephardt, Norbert Dennerll Jr., W.A. Williams, Gary Hart, Jesse Jackson, Bruce Babbitt, Lyndon LaRouche Jr. and Paul Simon.

On the GOP ballot are six

presidential hopefuls, and a couple of those already have dropped out. Names on that ballot are Pat Robertson, Alexander Haig, George Bush, Bob Dole, Jack Kemp and Pete du Pont. There also are four candidates for the GOP nomination for senator from Texas, one of whom, Wes Gilbreath, campaigned in Tahoka.

The Democratic ballot includes a referendum on whether Texans should continue to elect their judges rather than change to a system of having them appointed by the Legislature.

On the Republican ballot will be a referendum as to whether voters favor or oppose establishing English as the official language for the state and nation. All Lynn County voters in the Republican primary will cast their ballots at the Wharton Building in Tahoka, on Main St.

across from McCord Motor Co.

The whole idea sounds dumb to me, although I've been enjoying living room picnics for years, at all seasons. But not with others; it's a lot better if you do it by yourself, so your wife won't know Hopefully, those winter days you're eating all that stuff. Here's how it works: You wait until everyone else in the house has gone to bed. You turn on the TV. You fix a monstrous glass of ice water or Coke and place it on the floor near the couch, which you lean against when you sit on the floor. You fix three grilled cheese sandwiches, place them on the floor along with a package of potato chips and a can of Vienna sausages. You eat these while you're watching TV, and you only have to get up to take the plates and things to the trash and get a bowl of ice cream with chocolate syrup and nuts.

All this makes for a pleasant evening of television, even when the programs are lousy. And, as a current popular diet points out, the calories don't hurt you if nobody sees you eating them.

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Thalia and Melvin Burks of Tahoka reported this week that they "were certainly glad to get home" last Wednesday, Feb. 24, after being part of a cruise which put all passengers off in strifetorn Panama Feb. 21.

The Associated Press on Feb. 27 reported passengers telling of a mutinous crew, poor food and fisticuffs aboard ship "as their vacations became a seagoing nightmare."

For the Burks couple, the story began last October when Thalia went to San Antonio with the Tahoka School Board for a state meeting. Melvin went along and with time on his hands took the

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opportunity to book a "Luxury Cruise" - 12 days aboard ship that would take them through the Panama Canal. (Melvin had gone through the Canal during World War II but Thalia had wanted to

go for years.) Their cruise was supposed to start on Jan. 9 but when the Burks returned from the Cotton Bowl game on Jan. 3, they had a letter that the cruise had been postponed because of problems with the ship. At that time the booking agent, Golden Cruise Tours of San Antonio, admitted having problems but assured the Burks that the tour would be rebooked and that their accom-

modations would be upgraded. The 12-day cruise was rescheduled for Feb. 11 to leave from Acapulco, Mexico with stops in Guatamala, Costa Rica, passage through the Canal, Cartega, Columbia, Jamaica stops and debarkation at Can-

The Burks' accommodations were upgraded as promised. They were assigned a better cabin and a nicer hotel in Acapulco. In fact, everything went as promised until time to board the ship. The Burks left Dallas on Feb. 9 and spent two nights at the Hyatt Continental in Acapulco. They saw the cliff divers and many interesting sights, Thalia went parasailing and they had a wonderful time.

On Feb. 11 when they boarded the ship (MV Galaxy) there was no air conditioning and things were in complete disarray. The ship's captain called a meeting and announced that buses would take all passengers to the Delmar Acapulco Hotel for the night. He promised meal money for breakfast and lunch the following day and that a bus would return them to the ship at 2 p.m. the next day. No bus came, but at 4 p.m the tour director came to the hotel. She said that only one-half of the air conditioning could be repaired and that only 60 passengers could be accommodated, and that those who wanted to go home could leave and get money refunded. (As far as the Burks know, no one has received any refund.) Over half of the passengers left the ship at that time.

The Burks' purpose of the trip was to go through the Panama Canal so they stayed aboard. Although the cruise director said that only 60 people could go, about 120 remained aboard.

When the Burks went back aboard ship on Feb. 12, Melvin got a cabin boy that he had talked with the previous day to show them a cabin that had air conditioning. Many passengers had no air conditioning in their cabins. The lounge and the dining area did have some air conditioning.

The ship left Acapulco on the night of Feb. 12 and headed to Guatamala. On the way there was mutiny on the ship, and a man threatened to kill the ship's captain. The first mate intervened and was stabbed in the back. Feeling in the crew was polarized. The ship docked in Guatamala and the passengers were taken on a nice bus tour of the Old City of Antiguia. Next stop for the ship was Costa Rica where passengers were taken by train and bus to the Capital City. While passengers were off the ship about 45 members of the crew were fired. This included all the cooks and all but two of the waiters. A few people were hired in Costa Rica.

As the ship prepared to sail from Costa Rica, the Seaman's Labor Union, led by the Communist wing, in support of the discharged crewmen held a very vocal rally on the dock and refused to permit anyone to let loose the lines that moored the ship to the dock. The ship's captain ordered the crew to cut the lines and headed toward the Panama Canal.

Several passengers had left the ship in Guatamala and more left in Costa Rica. The ship had been a day late leaving Acapulco and the engines were not performing sufficiently to maintain desired speed and it was evident that the ship would be three or four days late getting to Cancun. Some people left because of time committments while others left in

The Burks stayed on as they were determined to get Thalia through the Panama Canal. By then, only 80 passengers remain-

ed aboard. After leaving Costa Rica, one Casino card dealer went to the kitchen as head cook and a Jamaican boy came up from the engine room to be the Burks' waiter. Food and service were actually better than previously. On Saturday, Feb. 19, the ship finally went through the Panama Canal and Thalia said that she

was thrilled. On Saturday night the ship docked on the Atlantic side in Panama and the captain announced that the ship's engines were so bad that the cruise was ending there. At 6 p.m. on Sunday morning buses came and took all passengers to a nice hotel in Panama City. The Burks were apprehensive of the situation in Panama and did not leave the block where the hotel was located. At 1 p.m. that day a Panamanian travel agent came to the hotel and told passengers that a plane had been chartered to take them to Mexico City on Monday morning. He said a representative of Golden Cruise Tours would meet them there. The flight materialized as promised but no tour host was there to meet the passengers.

Since everyone had airline tickets from Cancun and not from Mexico City and everyone was on their own, there was quite a bit of unhappiness.

Since being elected Sheriff, November 10, 1986, I have made several changes within the Sheriff's Office, in the best interest of the Department and for the citizens of Lynn County. If re-elected I will continue to the best of my ability to serve all citizens of Lynn County in all

The past several weeks there has been misinformation of over-expenditures in the 1987 Sheriff's Office budget. The 1987 budget was adopted by the Commissioners Court in September 1986, prior to me taking office. Due to a Texas Commission on Jail Standards inspection, additional jailers and new jail lighting had to be implemented to meet state standards. Commissioners Court approved the hiring of 3 part time jailers and jail lighting.

The following is a comparison of the 1985, 1986 and 1987 Sheriff's Office budgets:

When I took office, November 10, 1986, the 1986 budget was already way over budget. I was the fourth Sheriff that year and inherited a big budget problem. I am responsible for the last 51 days of the 1986 budget, but not responsible for the rest of 1986 budget or any of 1985 budget.

The 1987 budget was amended in November 1987 with additional \$42,400.00. This amount was needed for salaries for the 3 part time jailers, which were hired February 1987, and 1 full time dispatcher/jailer hired August 1986 and other expenditures that was not in the original 1987 budget of \$191,565.00. The original 1987 budget, of which I had no input on, was adopted in September 1986. After the original 1987 budget was amended and then approved by Commissioners Court, I was then fully responsible for the 1987 budget.

This is not the 1987 audit report, but it is the end of 1987 budget report on file at the Courthouse. The 1987 audit report is not completed yet, however the figures shown will not vary that much from the 1987 budget report.

The City of Tahoka pays a portion of the salaries and communication expenses for dispatching, handling phone calls and teletype messages for Tahoka Police Department. City of Tahoka and Lynn County entered into this agreement in mid-year of 1985. The money received from the City goes into the General Fund of the County, it does not go back into the Sheriff's Office

These records are available for public inspection any time. I have strived to control all expenditures in my Department and will continue to do so.

# Water Levels In Lynn Wells Highest Ever

Water levels in wells in Lynn County are currently at the highest point ever according to records kept by the Texas Water Development Board (TWDB). In January, staff from the TWDB measured water levels in 40 wells in the southern threefourths of Lynn County. These wells draw water from the Ogallala and Cretaceous Formations that underlie much of the Southern High Plains of Texas.

One well with a record extending back to 1937 indicated the highest water level ever measured at that site. Four wells have measured water levels showing rises in excess of 20 feet between 1983-1987. The average rise in the water level over the past four years is 10 feet. All wells which were measured last year and this year show waterlevel rises, with the average being about six feet. Each one-foot of water level rise in Lynn County amounts to approximately 40,000 additional gallons of water under each acre of land surface.

The High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 measures the water levels in the north one-fourth of the county. The results of their

measurements will be published in the Cross Section later this

Water-level rises are mostly likely the result of a combination of factors including above average rainfall, a decrease in ground-water pumpage, and a decline in irrigated acreage. According to the Texas Water Development Board Report No. 288, Evaluating the Ground-Water Resources of the High Plains of Texas, most of the water in storage is located in the northern portion of the county.



The past several weeks there has been misinformation of over-expenditures in the 1987 Sheriff's office budget, the 1987 budget was adopted by the Commissioners Court in September 1986, prior to me taking office. Due to a Texas Commission on Jail Standards inspection, additional jailers and new jail lighting had to be implemented to meet state standards. Commissioners Court approved the hiring of 3 part time jailers and jail lighting.

The 1987 budget was amended in November 1987 with additional \$42,400.00. This amount was needed for salaries for the 3 part time jailers, which were hired February 1987 and 1 full times dispatcher/jailer hired August 1986 and other expenditures that was not in the original 1987 budget of \$191,565.00. The original 1987 budget, of which I had no input on, was adopted in September 1986. After the original 1987 budget was amended and then approved by Commissioners Court, I was fully responsible for the 1987 budget.
