City Still Trying To Get Junk Vehicles Off Streets

Tahoka City Council Monday night took action to enforce a junk car ordinance in the city, seeking to improve the appearance of the city by voluntary or mandatory removal of abandoned or non-operable vehicles.

In other action Monday, the council approved an ordinance giving the city's blessing to a rate decrease by Southwestern Public Service Co., and passed a resolunumber for emergency use countywide. The resolution approved continued study of the project to determine costs. The theory is that all citizens in the county would have a single telephone number, 911, to call in any type of emergency. There probably would be a fee of no more than 50 cents per call charged to the user, plus a slight surcharge on customers' bills. County officials also have been looking at the possibility of setting up a 91.1 system. Representing General Telephone at the meeting Monday were Jerry Slaughter and O.D. Hearn. They presented another suggested agreement on a franchise for GTE to continue serving the city. The council plans to study the proposal before taking any action. Also present at the meeting as guests were members of Troop 721 Boy Scouts of America.

Miller Wins Sheriff Race; Gerner Victor

with 27.

Former Tahoka Police Chief Jack Miller defeated incumbent Sheriff Clifford Laws for the Democratic nomination for that job in Lynn County voting Tuesday. Miller had a total of 1,043 votes to 873 votes for Laws.

As results came in Tuesday night, the race was very close until the last voting box at O'Donnell came in, and that box voted heavily for Miller.

Winning the nomination for sheriff is the same as winning the job, since no Republican candidate for the office filed. Candidates elected at the general election in November will take office next January.

In a close race for county commissioner of Precinct 1, two-term officeholder Eldon Gattis was defeated by challenger Gerald (Jerry) Gerner by just 20 votes. Gerner had 239 and Gattis 219. In the five-man race for county commissioner of Precinct 3, John Chapa Jr. of Tahoka and Bobby Cox of O'Donnell will be in a runoff in April. Chapa had 167

votes and Cox 127. Other Democratic candidates in the race were Don Blair, 118 votes; Kenneth Eaker 86, and Bobby Knight

Albert Gore won the Democratic presidential preference race in Lynn County, getting 658 of the total 1971 votes cast. Michael Dukakis was second with 449 and Gephardt third with 276. Jesse Jackson had 152 and Gary Hart 127.

Sixty-eight persons voted in the Lynn County Republican primary, and George Bush led the presidential race with 47 votes. Pat Robertson was second with 11 votes. Beau Boulter of Amarillo led the county in the race for nomination for the U.S. Senate, getting 42 votes to 11 for Gillbreath.

In the railroad commissioner race on the GOP ballot, Sam Ervin led with 18 to 16 for Emmett. Kent Hance got 63 votes for railroad commissioner. In Supreme Court judges races, Barbary beat Murphy in the county and Hecht led. Tom Mason had 4 votes for county chairman and E.L. Blankenship 3.


Republicans voted 58-1 for making English the official language and Democrats voted 1145 to 97 for continuing to elect judges.

The Police Department will begin enforcing the City's junk vehicle ordinance March 18. The ordinance allows the city to issue citations against persons keeping junk vehicles inside the city limits.

A junked vehicle is defined in the ordinance as "one which is inoperative, and which does not have lawfully affixed to it both an unexpired license plate or plates and a valid Texas Department of Motor Vehicle Inspection Stickers and which is wrecked, entirely or partially dismantled, or discarded."

The ordinance terms such vehicles a public nuisance.

When a vehicle defined as "junked" under the ordinance is spotted, it will be marked with a red tag. The red tag, along with a letter sent to the owner or custodian, will serve as notice that the vehicle has been deemed to be junked and that the vehicle is to be removed within 10 days. The owner then has an option to either sign a release which will allow the city to pick up the junked vehicle at no charge to the owner or may, within the 10-day period, appeal by filing a written

the vehicle or filed a written request for a hearing before the judge, the owner becomes liable for a fine not to exceed \$200. Each day after the tenth day constitutes a separate offense, so fines could amount to \$200 per day.

A junked vehicle which has not been properly removed within the time constraints of the ordinance will be subject to removal by the city. The city, or its authorized representative, will remove the junked vehicle to a suitable city storage area designated by the city council. Any such vehicle that has been impounded will be stored in the storage area for a period of not less than 10 days, after which it may be disposed of.

The ordinance does not apply to a vehicle kept in an enclosed building, or where it is not visible from the street or other public or private property, or is stored or parked in a lawful manner on private property in connection with the business of a licensed vehicle dealer or junk yard.

The City will dispose of junked vehicles upon request, with no charge to the owner. City hall

Police Chief Ray Woodall reported on Police Department activities for the month. The statistics also reflected an increase of unlicensed drivers involved in the accidents and other traffic violations. 

Crime Line, 998-5145, has offered rewards in the above case and also in four other crimes reported during the week.



The couple plan to marry June 18 at 3:00 p.m. in Our Lady of Guadalupe Church in Lubbock.




For some senior citizens and the infirmed, the nursing home serves as a haven, often as a last resort. Even the best do not fill the feeling of being snug in one's home.

The boredom and out-of-place feeling is eased somewhat by the work of individuals and groups making regular visits with breaths of fresh air. The activity may be very basic or it can blossom into programs of music and theatrical presentations.

Volunteer work gives a sense of achievement. It can be a wonderful feeling to accomplish something, whether it's teaching as illiterate person to read, filling grocery bags at a food bank or conducting a successful fund-raising drive.

Rather than simply being concerned about drunk driving, drug abuse, historic preservation, new parks or any number of issues, volunteer to become involved in organizations seeking to individual behavior and community action.

"However, practices that require technical design and layout need to be a site specific plan," davis said. "These include terraces, waterways, and grade stabilization dams.'

Davis said he has copies of the county plan as well as a few forms 8645. Producers who use the form certify that soil and water conservation expenses paid or incurred after Dec. 31, 1986, were made according to a plan approved by SCS.

"If anyone needs a site specific plan, we will be glad to try to schedule a date to work out one, "Davis said. "However, we will not be permitted to back date a plan just to help someone claim a deduction."

The deductable amount is limited to 25 percent of the gross income from the agricultural activity during the tax year.




