## THS Seeking Two Basketball Coaches

Tahoka High School is in the market for new head coaches for both boys and girls basketball teams, following the resignation last week of Elaine Shedd, who coached the girls teams to successful seasons in the last two years.

Coach Shedd said she was resigning to accept the head coaching position for girls basketball and track at Cross Plains. Tahoka school board last Thursday accepted her resignation during the regular meeting of trustees.

A head coach for boys basketball also is needed, because Coach Ron Yancey, who directed the team last season, only did so because no basketball coach was available, and prefers to devote his team to coaching other sports, primarily football.

the lengthy meeting last Thursday (adjournment was at 3:40 a.m.) were approval of salary schedules for administrators and their assistants, for maintenance personnel, federal program employees and cafeteria workers.

Dr. Duane Carter's salary for 1988-89 was approved at \$43,890; five other employees will be paid more than \$30,000 per year, including administrators Charles Cate, Tom Culbertson, Gaylon Gassiot, Minnie Lou Ash and Counselor Molly Helmlinger.

A career ladder schedule for 41 teachers was approved.

The board also voted to repair the two existing tennis courts at a maximum amount of \$4,900 and to seek bids on the cost of building another court, includ-

ing backstops, windscreens and backboard.

Business manager Loretta Teckell reported a balance in all funds on March 31 of \$2,201,633, and said the 1987 tax collection at that time totaled \$578,860, less discounts of \$10,579, and that collections were at 91 per cent of the total 1987 tax roll.

A parent addressed the board regarding qualifications for an athlete to receive a letter jacket. Supt. Carter and Athletic Director Ted Wiley explained the requirements and it was noted that the student in question did not meet those requirements.

Board members present were Thalia Burks, Billy Davis, J.E. Nance Jr., Robert Smith, Joe Hayes and Nedra Young.

## Burglars Ransack Two Homes North of Tahoka

Burglars kicked in rear doors at two homes on U.S. 87 north of Tahoka on Sunday and Monday, taking a large number of items from each home.

Crime Line, 998-5145, has offered \$500 rewards in the two burglaries, where the losses ran into the thousands of dollars. The home of Jim Lane, 12 miles north, was burglarized between noon and 3 p.m. Monday. Clothing was taken from the closets and among other things stolen were a microwave oven, jam box, jewelry box, Sony 15-inch color TV, and men's and women's clothing.

The home of Dr. Deryl Jay, 8 miles north and about a half mile east of the highway, was

burglarized Sunday between 2 p.m. and 8:30 p.m. Among the items stolen were a Panasonic 21-inch color TV, Bell and Howell movie projector, Sony VCR, rings and other jewelry, razor, clock, .22 rifle, camera and clothing.

Crime Line has offered \$300 rewards in the theft of a Sears lawnmower valued at \$506, from the home of Servando Benavidez in Wilson April 6 or 7, and in the theft of a Sanborn air compressor and accessories from the back of a pickup owned by Wendell Morrow, while the pickup was parked at Morrow's home in New Home.

Lynn County deputies Friday morning arrested two brothers from Mississippi in a car about 12

miles north of Tahoka after being notified the vehicle had left a Lamesa service station without paying for gas. It then was determined that the two were wanted in Mississippi for burglary. The suspects, Jim T. Criddle, 25, and Jerry Criddle, 17, were jailed and on Wednesday Mississippi officers came for them.

Three county prisoners who had been sentenced to state prison terms were taken to the state facility during the week. They were Manuel Garcia and Perry Denzy of Tahoka and Gilbert Hinojosa of Anton.

## Encounter Crusade Starts Here Sunday

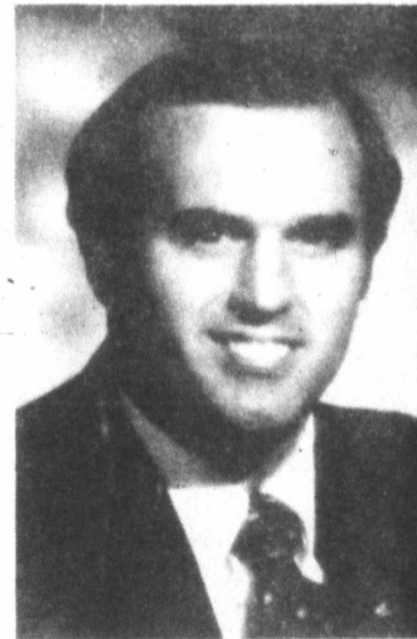

### Jack & Jill Open Scramble Tournney Set

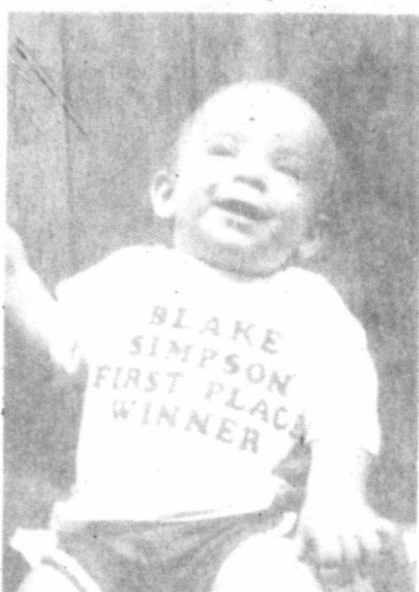

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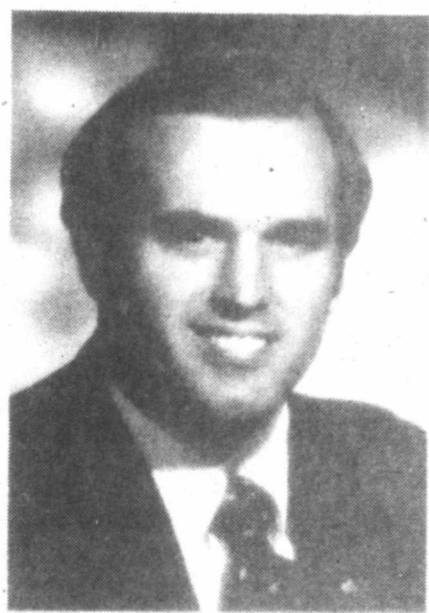

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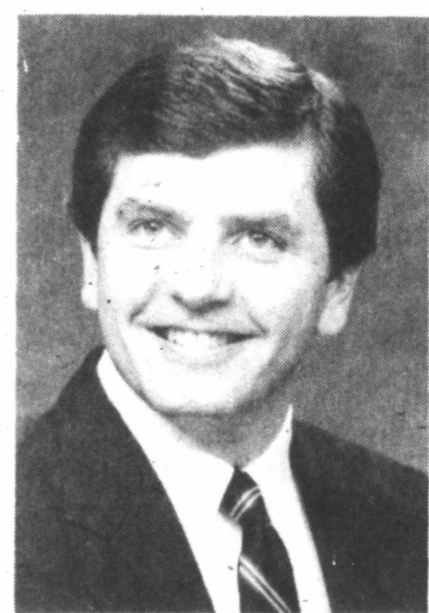

The District Improvement Plan Committee will meet on Tuesday, April 26 at 4:30 in the school cafeteria.

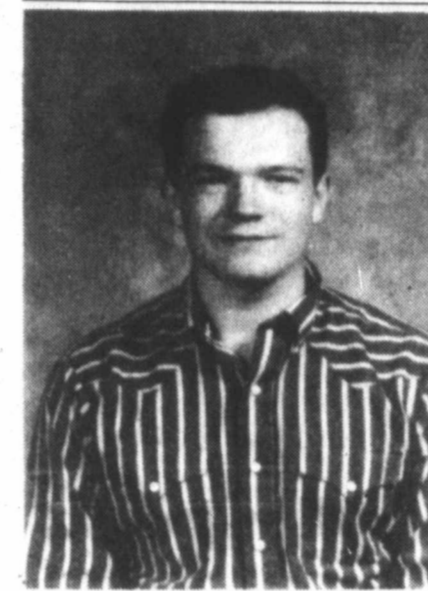

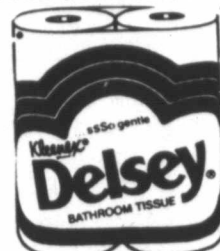

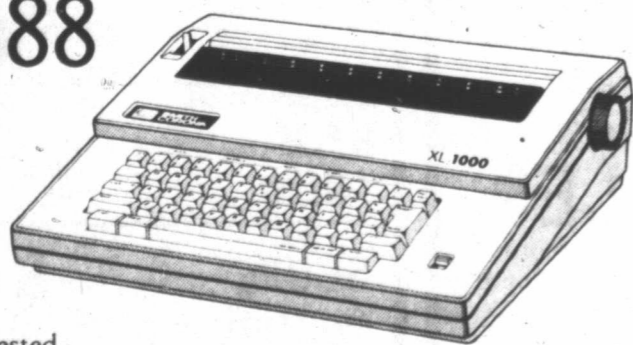

### A Visit With Your County Agent

Spring rains and temperature variations make it critical that cotton farmers pay close attention to the five-day weather forecast, says a cotton agronomist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Proper moisture, aeration and temperature conditions are essential for good germination and emergence of cotton, said Dr. James Supak, Extension cotton specialist.

If fields are too dry at planting, it hinders germination and seedling development; if they are too wet, it restricts the oxygen needed for germinating seed, Supak noted. And cottonseed are highly vulnerable to chilling injury for approximately five days after planting, he stressed.

Ideally, soil moisture levels at planting are at or near field

capacity," Supak said. "This not only assures adequate moisture for seed hydration, but also sufficient oxygen to support the germination."

Inadequate moisture slows the germination and seedling development and may even be fatal to stands if fields "dry out" too rapidly, the Extension agronomist said. "Waterlogged conditions, on the other hand, restrict free air movement to germinating seed and the lack of oxygen may also cause stand failure," he noted.

The ideal temperatures for cotton germination are around 75 to 80 degrees Fahrenheit. Because of the short growing season on the Texas High Plains, Supak said, most cotton is planted into much cooler soil.

The earliest recommended date for planting occurs when

the 10-day average of the minimum soil temperature at the eight-inch soil depth reaches 60 degrees Fahrenheit," Supak said. Cottonseed requires about 100 hours with temperature above 64 degrees at seed level for germination and initial emergence.

For about five days after planting, cottonseed are highly vulnerable to chilling injury, the Extension specialist emphasized.

Seed zone temperatures of 50 degrees Fahrenheit or less aren't uncommon in late April and early May, Supak warned.

"Delaying planting until the 10-day average minimum temperature at eight inches reaches 60 degrees Fahrenheit provides some assurance that temperature in the seed zone won't drop to these critical levels," he said.

To minimize chilling injury, the agronomist urged producers to also consider extended weather forecasts when selecting a planting date. "Keep in mind that the five days after planting are critical. Plantings just ahead of a wet cold front are likely to encounter periods when soil temperatures in the seed zone fall below the critical 50-degree level."

### POISON ANTIDOTE

'Activated charcoal' is a better antidote for poisoning than syrup of ipecac, and should be kept in every household. Unlike ipecac, which makes the victim vomit up the poison (twice irritating the throat and mouth), charcoal deactivates poisons by binding them to its particles, thus preventing absorption. The charcoal-poison complex is then passed harmlessly down the intestines and evacuated. Adding sorbitol to activated charcoal (trade name CHAROID) speeds up the transit time to one hour from mouth to rectum. Always call a poison center first - perhaps there is something else that should be done.

### American Cancer Society Funds Are Well-Spent, Says Local Chairman

"The breakdown of how American Cancer Society funds are spent in Texas represents one of the best returns on the dollar that I know of," said Nadine Dunlap, Chairman of the 1988 educational and fund raising Crusade in Tahoka. In preparing for the April Crusade, Dunlap feels it is important for the community to realize ACS expenditures. "It is one part of the ACS we're most proud of and I think our friends and neighbors will be more willing to give to cancer control if they know how well their money is being spent," she said. The following represents the breakdown of how each dollar raised in 1986-87 by the ACS

was invested during the last fiscal year (September 1, 1987-August 31, 1988) in Texas:  
Cancer Research \$.37  
Professional Education .10  
Public Education .10  
Service / Rehabilitation .24  
Program Development Administrative .05  
Crusade .13  
The total comes out to \$1.19. This 119 percent expenditure reflects increased research allocations to Texas by our National Society.

"The ACS is currently sponsoring research investigations in 11 major Texas hospitals, medical schools and universities totaling over \$6.9 million," said Dunlap. "Because Texas has so many research institutions, the National society allocates additional funds here." "Programs that help people are our priority. We keep a tight control over our administrative costs and keep them within acceptable limits as this breakdown indicates," Dunlap commented.

ACS programs such as patient service and rehabilitation (Reach to Recovery, volunteer transportation, etc.), public education (film, pamphlets, exhibits, the Great American Smokeout) and professional education for the medical community are mainly administered through the Society's volunteer system. (Note: Unit may wish to add any local programs here.) "Volunteers help maintain these impressive figures," said Dunlap. Residential door-door will begin Tuesday, April 19 and will conclude Tuesday, May 3 with Benefit Golf Tournament to be held Saturday, May 7.

## Adopted children reunited through central registry

AUSTIN—A 1984 state law has resulted in two reunions of adopted children with their biological families, however, is small compared to the 8,116 adoptions reported to her office last year, she said.

Applicants for registration must be 21 years old and born or adopted in Texas. Adoptees are registered through the private agency in Texas that placed them with adoptive parents if that agency maintains its own registry. Forty-seven adoption agencies operate their own registries, but no record is kept of the number of matches established. Agencies which have gone out of business send their records to the central registry.

Birth parents may register through one or more registries. Biological brothers and sisters may register through the central registry only.

O'Hara said that each registrant must provide proof of age and identity and pay a \$5 inquiry fee to determine whether to register with the central registry or a specific adoption agency. Further, each registrant must pay a \$15 filing fee and furnish a report to verify receipt of one hour of counseling from a social worker or mental health professional with expertise in post-adoption counseling.

O'Hara said information may be obtained by writing the Central Adoption Registry 132-W, Texas Department of Human Services, P.O. Box 2960, Austin, Texas 78769.

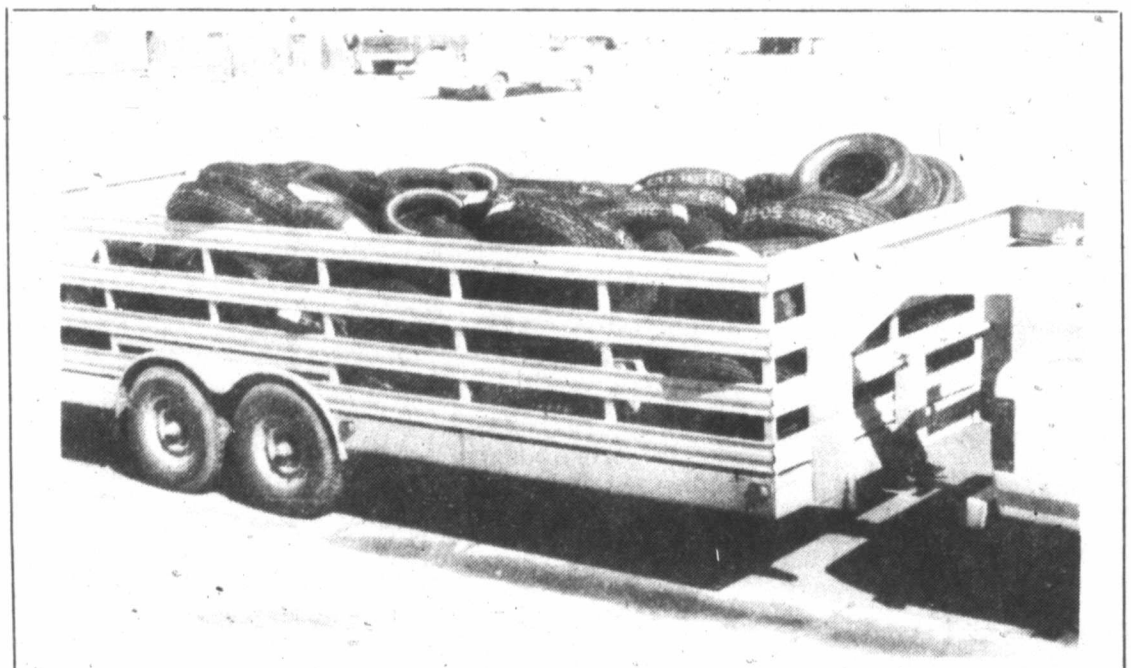
