## LOTS OF ICE COVERS BAILEY

On returning this courier fell flat but you will be delighted to know he was uninjured so you can all plan on many more weeks of drive! and The Journal will keep right on printing.

By the way there wasn't any mail worth going for.

If this cold weather keeps on you can plan to hear more from this flatland tourist on that subject. Already have a reputation for being cold all the time but it's going to get worse unless the weather gets better.

While ramblin' around our town last Friday, yours truly ran into a man with a story to tell. He was M. A. Benson from Topeka, Kans.

A lot of people saw Benson last Saturday and didn't know it. He was driving the miniature Santa Fe Train on which Santa Claus rode in the Christmas parade.

The train was built in 1926 in the Santa Fe shop in Topeka and has been Benson's baby ever since. Benson and the train saw their first parade in Topeka in September of '26 and have been in so many parades since that he won't even try to remember them all. He will say that he has been in about every town on the S. F. system and many of them several times.

Albuquerque To Muleshoe. Benson came from a Santa parade in Albuquerque to the parade in Muleshoe and left Saturday afternoon for Kiowa, Kans., for another Santa parade.

Don't think from this however that he will get home to Topeka to be with his wife until next Christmas. No-sir-re-bob he also exhibits the train in rodeo parades, fair parades, and just plain parade parades. Benson actually feels lucky to be home for more than a day or two at a time except during his annual three week vacation, which is also being threatened this year.

Train Rides Train. The train composed of engine, tender, freezer car, box car, stock tank, coal car, and caboose (oops it's not a caboose in RR talk it's a way car) rides in a box car all its own. This car is equipped with complete maintenance shop for the little train and had to be enlarged to contain the train itself.

The wooden parts of the train are like glass and Benson likes to keep them that way. Benson said they used to paint them twice a year until their engagements got so heavy that they had to paint it and put two coats of outside varnish on them. It hasn't been painted in five years now which is indicative of the kind of care Benson lavishes on the train.

No V-8. The 7-ton train is propelled by a 1923 4 cylinder Model T engine which is the same one originally built into the train. Henry Ford, Sr., tried to give Benson a V-8 when they were produced but was flatly refused. As a tribute to the Ford Co., Benson states there isn't an engine in the world that could get as hot and work as well as the Model T.

The train also has suspended pedals that were introduced in 1957 to our family autos. Benson devised the same apparatus for his train, but he did it in '26.

### Activity Slowed But Not Stopped

Wednesday Dec. 7—In spite of the fact that it got cold around here this week, activity hasn't stopped, however it has slowed down a bit.

Mr. and Mrs. Gaede were taken to West Plains Hospital where they were reported to be recovering satisfactorily.

To add to the enjoyment of the brisk weather, the Muleshoe doo-doo is in the air.

According to David Miles, of the Five County Labor Association, the cotton harvest was about 95% complete when the bad weather came along.

The moisture of the snow, sleet and ice will however be beneficial to wheat, barley and rye crops which received no measurable rainfall thru out the month of November.

## Cotton Referendum Set December 13

College Station, Dec. 7 — All that all upland growers should receive prior to the referendum, official notice of the 1961 farm acreage allotments. Notices will come from the county ASC offices, Davenport said. The allotments determine the marketing quotas or the individual farm. In a change from the programs in effect for 1959 and 1960, each farm operator will receive only one allotment for 1961. This will represent the farm's share of the national upland acreage allotment of 18 1/2 million acres, Davenport added.

Marketing quotas have been proclaimed for upland cotton as required by law. However, pointed out Davenport the quotas do not become operative unless approved by at least two-thirds of the farmers voting in the referendum. Any grower engaged in cotton production in 1960 is eligible to vote, Davenport said.

The state chairman added that all upland growers should receive prior to the referendum, official notice of the 1961 farm acreage allotments. Notices will come from the county ASC offices, Davenport said.

During the past two years, farm operators had a choice between regular allotment and price support rate and a larger allotment at a reduced rate of support. However, the state chairman said, the law that provided this special program applied only to the 1959 and 1960 crops.

Local voting boxes for Bailey County were announced by the ASC office last Wednesday. Boxes will be located at: the Bailey County ASC office in Muleshoe; Beck Gin at West Camp; Maple Coop Gin at Maple; Stegall Gin at Stegall; Claunch Gin at Bula and Needmore Coop Gin at Needmore.

Supt. Neal Dillman reported this morning that Muleshoe schools would be closed Thursday. Dillman was unable to say when the schools would reopen but he hoped they would be open again Friday morning. It will just be a day to day thing and officials are unable to say when they actually will reopen.

Another Thursday development was the cancellation of the Chamber of Commerce Yule Buck drawing scheduled for today. Chamber manager, Carol Pouncey, said the drawings would be held Saturday, December 10, if the weather permitted.

Highway patrolmen got a report that a pickup was turned over on Highway 1760. Patrolmen investigated but could not find the owner. They assumed the truck had been there all night.

Harvey Elliott slipped and fell at the corner of Ave. B and Main. Singleton ambulance took him to the West Plains Hospital where he was discovered to have multiple bruises and head lacerations. There were no broken bones and hospital spokesmen said he would probably return home today.

## M'shoe Child Fatally Hurt In Accident

Homer Brown, Jr., 4 of Muleshoe, died Saturday night, in Clovis, N. M., of injuries he received when he was struck by an automobile during a light rain storm. The boy was killed while he and his father were hitch-hiking to Muleshoe, according to Clovis police.

The boy was pronounced dead on arrival at Memorial Hospital in Clovis. The attending physician said the child suffered a brain injury.

The driver of the automobile that struck the boy was Guy Rideout, 18, member of the Cannon Air Force Base Fire Department. Police said the accident occurred at about 5:24 p.m. in the 1000 block of Mabry Drive.

Rideout told police officers that he saw the boy as he was driving east on Mabry. He swerved to the left, attempting to miss the child. The boy was thrown 85 feet by the impact of the collision, according to the police.

The boy's father, Homer Brown, Sr., reported to the police that he and the boy were hitch-hiking back to Muleshoe from Elida, N. M.

The child is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Homer Brown, Sr., his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Lester Brown of Muleshoe, and two sisters, Mae and Dorothy Brown.

Funeral services were held Tuesday, Dec. 6, at 10 a.m., at Van Alostyne under the direction of Fleisher Funeral Home. Local arrangements were under the direction of Singleton Funeral Home.

### Police Are Not Amused By DWI's Antics

City police officers were led a merry chase last week by a tipsy driver. When officers attempted to stop the man, he stopped—only to wheel around and drive off in the opposite direction when the policeman got out of his car. After several attempts to stop the man Highway patrolmen were called in also and helped to force the driver into a ditch.

## Cotton Allotments Increased In Bailey

Cotton allotments for Bailey County next year will permit the planting of 107,150 acres, according to Charles Daniel, ASC representative.

Daniel said this represents a 15% increase over this year's allotments for Bailey County. Allotments for the 23-county Plains area amount to 2,419,084 acres representing a 16.7% increase over the 1960 acreage.

The program followed in 1959 and 1962 allowing an alternate program and known as the "A" and "B" program goes out of effect this year. There will only be one program next year.

In 1959 and 1960 cotton farmers had a choice of taking their regular farm allotment with higher price supports under the "A" program or they could, under the "B" program, accept lower price supports in exchange for about a 40% acreage increase.

In 1961 all eligible growers will plant under the same plan and receive the full available price support. The support level will probably be announced in January.

Cotton growers will vote in a referendum on December 13 to determine whether or not marketing quotas will be in effect on the 1961 crop. Allotments will remain in effect as a means of determining eligibility for the available price support, regardless of the outcome of the voting.

A two-thirds favorable vote in the referendum would mean quotas for the 1961 crops, marketing penalties on any "excess" cotton and price support at not less than 70% of parity.

Opposition to the quotas by more than one-third of the voters would mean no quotas or penalties for 1961 and price support at 50% of parity to growers who complied with their acreage allotments.

ASC officials stated that individual cotton allotments were mailed to county growers last Friday afternoon.



Bliss, Los Alamos, Santa Fe, Albuquerque, White Sands, and Alamogordo congregating there for the purpose of participating in the sport of sky diving and attending social gatherings to give the parachutists an opportunity to get acquainted.

Breakfast was served to the visiting sky divers and the public by the Ruidoso Lions Club in a hangar at the Ruidoso airport.

The jumping event was hampered throughout the day by high winds.

George Mulchay, sky diving instructor, who made parachute jumps at the Muleshoe

airport last summer, was among those attending the Ruidoso meet. Mulchay has made 447 jumps and is a rigger at Holloman AFB.

Mr. and Mrs. Locker went from Ruidoso to Alamogordo where Locker completed his ground school training, learning various jumping and landing procedures. He helped to pack the parachute that he used in making his first leap Sunday afternoon. He said "across an altitude of 3000 feet usually the ground school training was "rougher than the actual jump."

Sky diving is becoming America's fastest growing sport, according to officials of the Alamogordo Club. The term sky diving actually refers to confining the body during free fall, or during the period which treading the body during free fall, the parachute is not open. Sport parachutists have delayed opening their parachutes for as long as 140 seconds. During the free fall, the sky diver will attain a speed of 120 miles per hour. Experienced jumpers do not spin or tumble but fall under complete control, executing turns, loops, rolls and glides at will. The art has advanced to the stage where two or more jumpers leave the aircraft one after the other and

pass a baton between them as they glide toward earth before opening their 'chutes.

Each jumper is required to wear a helmet, boots, and coveralls for protection. Sport parachutists wear two 'chutes, the main one on the back and the reserve on the chest. The main 'chute is sleeve deployed to reduce opening shock and prevent tangling of the 'chute. Holes of various shapes are cut in the rear of the main 'chute to give the parachute forward speed and turning ability. Thus they are termed "steerable."

Student pilot Clifford White, Instructor Harold Locke, Mrs. T. R. White, and Mrs. E. A. Platt flew to Big Spring Sunday and family, the Joe Pat Wagnons, with whom they spent an enjoyable day.

They were met at Hamilton airport there by the Whites' After the flight, which was young White's third, dual cross-country, Instructor Locke said that White was now ready to fly solo cross-country.

Mrs. White said that flying with her son at the controls was indeed a thrilling experience.



## County Agents Corner

### GRAIN SORGHUM TESTS

If we had all of our irrigation grain sorghum produce comparable to the top yielding hybrid in the Shorty Walker test, we would be ahead of Martins milo by 180 million pounds.

Of course most farmers have quit Martins in favor of a hybrid sorghum but it is well for us to run a demonstration with Martins in the middle to check up on the value of our hybrid sorghum research. This increase amounts to \$2,700,000 in favor of our best producing hybrid as compared to Martin milo.

Perhaps the Verney Towns' farm has a little bit better than average soil but the 16 rows of Martins was growing only a few feet away from Pfisters 6655 which topped the 14 variety test with over 4 tons of threshed grain per acre, 8,136 pounds to be exact.

Row lengths and row widths were measured by use of a 100 ft. steel tape and elevator weights, and moisture tests were taken a s official. All moisture was under 13% except the winner and it was below the 15% allowed by elevators.

Seven of the fourteen hybrids in the test exceeded 6,000 pounds per acre yields. The remaining hybrids and Martins exceeded 5,000 pounds per acre.

## Driving Tips

In 1956 the death toll reached a total of 30,400. Most of the deaths occurred on state and national highways. The problem is that people need to learn to give constant attention and obey all traffic rules.

When you come to a high-way always come to a complete stop. Hesitate, and yield the right of way even if the other driver may be at fault. When you come to an intersection always slow down. Give a signal before you make a turn.

Before you pass a car make sure there is plenty of room ahead and never pass a school bus that is stopped unless you stop, then make sure it is safe and pass at not more than 10 mph.

Before entering a curve, brake, and reduce your speed. Obey all the speed limit signs. When driving at night, always drive slower because of reduced visibility. Use your headlights beams properly. Everybody who drives should learn the shape of all signs.

Never drive after drinking or if you get sleepy. If you have a flat tire or blowout, don't apply brakes suddenly. Also if your wheels get off the road don't apply your brakes suddenly. Don't allow more than three people in the front seat or where your vision can be obstructed. Do not leave the scene of an accident in which you are involved until you have given all the information required by the law. Also, don't stop at the scene of an accident if there is already sufficient help.



## BABSON DISCUSSES

### Mr. Kennedy

Babson Park, Mass., Dec. 8—This is not an article on the election, as its outcome has been covered fully by the newspapers, the broadcasting companies, and the magazines during the past two or three weeks. This is a column strictly on the personality of Senator Kennedy. Being a Massachusetts man, like him, and knowing his father, I can write frankly about him personally at the present time.

**SENATOR KENNEDY A DISAPPOINTED MAN**

Senator Kennedy is a tremendous worker and very few rich men would make the sacrifices which he has personally made to secure this selection.

His industrious effort started four years ago when he came near getting the nomination for the Vice Presidency on the Democratic ticket.

He then laid plans and built up an organization unequalled in any Presidential campaign. The great crowds which he attracted, and his personal advisers, led him to believe he would win by a landslide. On the strength of this, he made many statements as to what he would do during the "Kennedy" honeymoon of one hundred days.

Although Senator Kennedy is naturally pleased to be elected President and move into the White House next January, yet in his heart he is a much disappointed man. He will have the honor and prestige of being President; but will not have the influence and power which he had expected. Other than making appointments, both in the diplomatic service and at the head of Commissions, about the only real power he will now have will be that of the veto, and even Congress may pass legislation over his veto.

**ELECTION WAS TOO CLOSE**

Although Senator Kennedy won a majority of the electoral votes, these were not even unofficially confirmed until many hours after the polls closed. His greatest disappointment was the very close popular vote, which has not yet been officially determined. I will not discuss the legal aspects of the electoral versus the popular vote, but I do wish to make an important statement. Although the popular vote in the recent election has no legal status, it has a great moral influence. It surely will cause Mr. Kennedy to remodel

the Democratic Party and the Presidency. It is probable program is outlined in the Wall Street Journal of November 8, Page 10. He may now be sorry he made certain of his statements during his campaign, as he may be forced to back track on many of them.

His influence with Congress will be much less than if he had won with a fairly good popular margin and were taking office with a mandate from the people. Therefore, after the tremendous crowds which met him at every city, he is especially disappointed by his failure to capture a majority of the popular vote. It will be very difficult to persuade Congress to pass any radical program, even though the Republicans are in the minority. A Congressman takes his clue from what the people in his district think. Every Congressman has figured out carefully what the popular vote shows as to Senator Kennedy's popularity in his respective district.

**WHAT OF THE FUTURE?**

Senator Kennedy's campaign speeches said that if Vice President Nixon were elected, we would have a "do nothing" Congress during the next two years, and perhaps during the next four years. Unless something happens which cannot now be foreseen, the next four years under President Kennedy could record a "do nothing" Congress. Hence, the great disappointment to him, as well as surprises to most Democrats. This is why Mr. Kennedy will go into the White House restrained somewhat by the noticeable absence of an "unrestricted franchise" from the people.

Unfortunately, what happens during the next two years or more may be very largely in the hands of Mr. Khrushchev. One cannot tell whether he is serious or merely bluffing about Berlin and his relations with China and other countries such as Cuba. He surely does not want a nuclear war; furthermore, he may be replaced by Mr. Molotov, or by someone else either more or less radical than Mr. Khrushchev. On the other hand, as Mr. Eisenhower pointed out in his famous Pittsburg address, a war could start from some accidental and unwanted incident due to the unpremeditated psychotic action of some flyer. As World War II made Mrs. Roosevelt, so another World War might make Mr. Kennedy; but I am sure he does not want it to happen in

## Governor Daniel Sets Safety Sunday

Governor Price Daniel has designated Sunday, Dec. 11, as "Safety Sunday" in Texas to mark the opening of the Christmas-New Year's holiday traffic safety campaign throughout the State.

In a special proclamation, the Governor urged each citizen to "join in this united religious campaign to awaken the conscience of every driver to the understanding that negligence at the wheel is a transgression of God's Own Command, 'Thou Shalt Not Kill.'" The Governor added: "I respectfully encourage the pastor of every church in Texas to remind each member of his personal and moral responsibility to drive carefully and obey the traffic laws as a means of protecting the sanctity of human life in our State."

The Governor said the official traffic safety campaign, in which participation has been assured from many statewide organizations of all kinds, would last throughout December, although special emphasis would again be focused on the holiday period itself. These exact dates will be announced by the Texas Department of Public Safety when its Statistical Service issues the number of traffic fatalities expected during the Long Christmas-New Year's holiday period.

Governor Daniel said he believed, along with officials of the National Safety Council and an increasing number of church organizations and leaders, that "all our efforts to halt death and destruction on our streets and highways cannot be successful until every driver in Texas comes to realize that


traffic safety is truly a matter of spiritual concern . . . and useless loss of life and infliction of human injury is a violation of each individual's moral responsibility for driving safely and in accordance with the laws."

Numerous organizations have already announced their support of the Governor's annual campaign to reduce the holiday highway slaughter. Overall planning was conducted throughout the Texas Traffic Safety Council, the State's official coordinating group, the Governor's Highway Safety Commission, the Texas Safety Association, Texas Department of Public Safety, and Texas Highway Department.

Statewide organizations which have already promised their support include the Outdoor Advertising Association of Texas, whose members are providing about 800 giant billboards, as they have for the past two years; the Texas Press Association and the Texas Daily Newspaper Association, whose member-newspapers annually devote hundreds of columns of news, editorial and feature space to the campaign; and the Texas Association of Broadcasters, whose member-radio and TV stations are again arranging for their "Drive Lighted and Live!" campaign and other special traffic safety programs and promotions during the holiday season.

Governor Daniel issued his proclamation at the request of J. Lloyd Evans of Dallas, state vice-president for religious activities of the Texas Safety Association, and associate director of the National Conference of Christians and Jews,

Inc. Mr. Evans said copies of the Governor's proclamation and other information would go to all TSA district officers, and the Association would make a statewide effort to secure the cooperation of as many local pastors and churches as possible.

Governor Daniel concluded: "For the past three years, our statewide holiday campaign

has been saving lives over the official predictions of the number of deaths expected. Throughout this year, the number of traffic deaths has been smaller, month by month,

than last year. However, since December is one of the deadliest months in the year in Texas traffic, we must continue our efforts to stop the slaughter. Human life should be more precious to us because of the special nature of the holidays just ahead."

### Green-Thumber Says: Plant Roses and Bulbs in Winter

You can have a beautiful garden of summer roses by setting your bare-root roses in December and January. Right now is a good time for planting next summer's rose bloomers.

Select a spot which gets ample winter sunshine. Be sure that when next year's shade trees put on leaves they do not shade your roses. Select your spot accordingly right now.

When you purchase your roses soak them overnight in a solution of water and liquid fertilizer. Dilute the mixture to less strength than the directions call for in garden application.

It would help to water your plants at least once a month during the winter when this season is dry. Cold temperatures and high winds dehydrate the soil considerably and hamper the normal growth of plants. It should be customary to insure that your plants receive at least one good soaking every month throughout the year. If the soaking is not provided by nature, take these measures into your own hands. For best results tulips, daffodils, lilies and such bulbous plants should be in the ground in the first half of December. Those wishing such flavors in the spring should tend to this planting now. After December 15 you should buy bulbs which your dealer has already

To set your roses in the ground, dig a hole about 18 inches deep. Insert roots of rose bush and fill with a mixture of one-fourth peat moss or decayed leaves, one-fourth manure and one-half top soil.

Soak the roots of your rose bushes with water and allow to adapt themselves. If conditions are very dry during the winter months, it would be advisable to water again in about three weeks.

It would help to water your plants at least once a month during the winter when this season is dry. Cold temperatures and high winds dehydrate the soil considerably and hamper the normal growth of plants.

It should be customary to insure that your plants receive at least one good soaking every month throughout the year. If the soaking is not provided by nature, take these measures into your own hands.







## H-D Club Clatter

One of the most popular bulletins in the Extension Service office at this time of the year is "CHRISTMAS TIME AT HOME". It is written by extension foods and nutrition specialists and is filled with ideas for Christmas menus,

Christmas food gifts, and lots of tested recipes for cakes, cookies, holiday breads, candies and even holiday beverages, that will be sure to please family and friends.

The home demonstration agent has 21 of these bulletins left. It is free—just call or write the agent's office in Muleshoe.

Don't wait longer to make fruit cake. It should age some before eating. Recipes for light and dark fruit cake, and for uncooked fruit cake are given

in the above mentioned bulletin. You will also find in this bulletin directions for decorating, glazing, canning and storing fruit cakes.

If you like a fruit cake that is all fruit and nuts be sure to try the Magic Fruit cake

recipe:  
1 pound candied pineapple  
1 pound candied cherries  
1 pound pitted dates  
4 ounces dry coconut  
4 cups nuts  
1 can condensed (not eva-

porated) milk  
Mix all ingredients and pack in lined and greased cake pans and bake at 300 degrees. Bake loaf cakes 1 hour, small cakes 45 minutes and large cakes in tube pan 1 and one-half hours.  
Mrs. W. H. Eubanks of the Three Way Community says that this fruit cake is the preference of her family.

I have many bulletins containing recipes using cranberries. They contain a recipe for Cranberry Fruit Punch that is just right for parties. These

bulletins are free. Ask for one.  
Of course, Christmas time is Turkey time and the extension service bulletin "Let's Eat Turkey" tells you just how to prepare and cook the festive bird and also tells you how to use the left over turkey. Be sure to bake the turkey according to the time and temperature chart on page 6. Remember that high temperature will toughen the protein in meat so keep the temperature according to instructions in the bulletin.

### KEEP THE CHRISTMAS TREE FRESH

Keeping the Christmas tree fresh and green will add not only beauty to your tree but will also add to the safety from fire. Remember that a green tree will not burn as readily as a dry one. First, select a tree that is fresh. When you get it home put the trunk of the tree in a bucket of water for two or three days to let it drink all the water it can take. If you have a tree stand that holds water keep water in the

stand all the time the tree is in the house. The tree can be placed in a bucket of sand and rock to which water can be added. I have nailed cross boards to the tree trunk and placed it in a dishpan with large rocks to hold it in place. The dishpan held plenty of water. I covered it with plastic then with a sheet to hide the pan. Keep your Christmas tree watered, it will give you much more pleasure for it will not

shed its needles and will not be as great a fire hazard as a dry one.

Be sure to check the electric lights that go on the tree. See that they are safe.
