# WOODWORK By Dalton



ALL YOU PEOPLE who have poems that I wouldn't publish in the paper now have a chance to get someone to read them, and maybe even win a bunch of money at the same time.

We've always had a policy that we will not print poetry written locally. If someones brings a poem by or mails it in, we just explain that we do not publish amateur poetry, no matter how good it is. That way we can reject all the really terrible poetry along with the good stuff without hurting anyone's feelings too badly, and also we don't have to set ourselves up as poetry critics to determine whether something is good enough to print.

A woman once brought us a three-page poem praising the good works of a minister who moved away, after 15 years or so of service to the local church. It was not very good, but it was better than another long one brought in by a woman whose pet dog had died, all about how cute he was and how she was going to miss him so much. In both cases, I told them of our policy, and said I sure was sorry, and this is really a great work, but we have to stick

with our policy because the next person might bring in something bad, and we can tactfully reject it. (Is it wrong to lie to spare someone's feelings?)

On a couple of occasions, someone really did have some poetry that sounded pretty good to me, but we still turned it away.

Now, however, comes the American Poetry Assn. sponsoring a contest awarding \$10,000 to undiscovered poets. Contest entry is free, everyone may enter, and "poets who are new, littleknown or not yet recognized are just the ones we are looking for," said a representative.

Poets may send up to five poems of no more than 20 lines each, with name and address on each page, to American Poetry Assn., Dept. CN-52, P.O. Box 1803, Santa Cruz, CA 95061-1803. They should be mailed by June 30.

# Methodists Getting New Hymn Book

United Methodists in Texas should be singing from a new hymnal starting next year as a result of action by the church's top policy-making body.

The 1988 United Methodist General Conference, meeting April 26-May 6 in St. Louis, adopted a new song and worship book.

That was one of more than 2,600 decisions made by the 994 elected delegates to the church legislative assembly, which meets every four years. Seventy-six delegates represented United Methodists in Texas at the 11-day meeting. That included eight from Northwest Texas. More United Methodists live in Texas than any other state-nearly 800,000 in more than 2,150 congregations. That includes some 85,000 in nearly 250 Northwest Texas congregations. The book, first official hymnal adopted by the 10-millionmember United Methodist Church since it was formed in 1968, is to begin appearing in local congregations in October 1989 The hymnal is to include 675 songs, both traditional and contemporary. Lyrics drop most exclusively male words for God and humanity. For example, "Good Christian Men Rejoice" becomes "Good Christian Friends Rejoice." Three newly written hymns use metaphors that play up God's "feminine" attributes. "The Care the Eagle Gives Her Young" compares God to a mother caring for her children. "How Can We Name Love?" and "Wonders of Wonders" describe God as both mother and father.

\* Adopted a revised statement of doctrinal standards. Among other things, that statement asserts the "primacy of Scriptures"-as interpreted by tradition, reason and experienceas the foundation of the Christian faith.



# **Rotan Tennis** Tournament **Entries Sought**



#### **DRY WEATHER HURTS MESQUITE CONTROL**

**COLLEGE STATION -- Dry** conditions over Texas are not only limiting forage growth but are also putting the damper on mesquite control with foliar applied herbicides.

With below normal rainfall over most of the state since last fall, trying to control mesquite with foliar herbicides may be a questionable practice this year, said Dr. Tommy Welch, a range specialist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service.

## **Testing For Swine**

**On New Sulfa** 

New testing procedures for detecting sulfamethazine and other sulfa products in slaughter hogs will be discussed at a series of educational meetings in the coming weeks.

The meetings will be conducted by the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service to brief swine producers and veterinarians on a new sulfa screening program that uses the sulfa-on-site (SOS) test, said Brett Cypert, county Extension agent. The SOS test is a quick, inplant urine screening test.

By May 28, federal meat inspectors in each major U.S. packing plant will use the SOS test to screen urine from up to six hogs per day. The new testing procedures will effect most Texas producers who sell market-weight hogs, said Cypert.

Sulfa residues can be a par-


sulfa products stay in the environment for years. In addition to the new SOS test, information will be presented on proper methods for using sulfa products and on procedures for dealing with positive SOS tests. Extension Service Veterinarian Dr. Bruce Lawhorn will be on hand to lead the discus-

sion and to answer questions. 

# **Checks Sent**

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Wednesday sent checks totaling \$120.7 million to 1,041 cities and 81 counties that levy local options sales taxes.

In Tahoka the sales tax total was \$27,170.65, in Wilson \$2,952.02, O'Donnell \$6,657.97, an overall total of \$36,780.64.

This month's allocation bring the year-to-date increase over 1987 to 10.13 percent.





#### SAVED BY FAITH OR GRACE, **OR WORKS?**

Some churches stress the great importance of faith and the grace of God. They will emphasize faith to such an extent that they seem to overlook almost everything e'se the Bible teaches. Men will teach that faith-only or faithalone is all that is required for salvation. Although the Bible certainly teaches the importance of faith, it does does not teach faith-alone. The only time the scriptures speak of faith-alone, it is condemned as being dead. "Faith, if it hath not works, is dead, being alone." (James 2:17).

When other churches teach, in addition to faith, the importance of obedience and the necessity of good works, they are accused of teaching that one earns salvation by his good works. But this is not so. No, we do not earn salvation, for a lifetime of good works could not earn one day in heaven. "For by grace are ye saved through faith; and that not of yourselves; it is the gift of God: not of works lest any man should boast." (Eph. 2:8, 9).

So obedience to God's commands and the doing of good works is not prompted by the earning motive, but by the love for God for his abundant grace extended to us. Jesus said, "If ye love me, ye will keep my commandments." (John 14:15), and James said, "I will show thee my faith by my works." (James 2:18). Real faith is expressed in obedience. When we hear men claim that certain of God's commands are non-essential, we immediately know that they do not have faith. Our obedience proves two things, the reality of our faith, and the reality of our love.

The true relationship of faith, works and love is given in the phrase, "faith working through love." (Galatians 5:6). Faith is the great primary essential, demonstrating its reality by work (obedience), through the motive of love. Men classify faith as "intellectual faith," or "saving faith" but the Bible speaks of working faith.

Here is the test for the person seeking salvation. Jesus said, "He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved." (Mark 16:16) and Peter said, "Repent and be baptized -for the remission of sins." (Acts 2:38), then "walk in newness of life." (Romans 6:4). Do you have real faith in Christ? If so, you will gladly obey these commandments, because you love him.

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




