To Provide

Night Landings

Tahoka city council Monday night voted to implement a new airport lighting control system allowing planes to land here at night, authorized seeking bids on sealcoating part of the city's streets, and approved measures related to a recently-approved plan to refinance \$231,000 in revenue bonds to save the city and taxpayers future interest charges.

Runway lights at the city airport have not been left on recently, following repeated vandalism and destruction of some of the lights. But a system approved Monday night will allow pilots to key in on a frequency which will turn the lights on for 15 minutes and permit them to land at the airport.


Consulting engineer A. C. Bowden of Lubbock met with the council and advised that he had selected about 12 blocks of city streets which need sealcoating the worst, and the council voted to seek bids on approximately that much sealcoating.

The city approved an adjustment to the overtime pay sched-

ule for city policemen. Refinancing the revenue bonds will allow a 1979 bond issue to be paid off 16 years ahead of time, with payments about \$3000 higher each year in the interim, but saving approximately \$240,000 in interest charges by paying off the issue

The article, written by Larry Binz of Texas Agriculture, is reprinted here in part:

TAHOKA - Jimmy Bragg has been a cotton grower for about as long as he can remember. A pecan producer? Now, that's something different.

And, says Bragg, that difference just might help keep him in agriculture for several more years.

Bragg got onto the idea of raising pecans about four years ago. He visited the Del Cerro operation in the El Paso-Las Cruces, N.M. area. What he learned changed his thinking about the business.

"I found out that you could raise several rows of cotton right between the pecan trees," Bragg said. "They do it out in the El Paso area.'

With the counseling of Dr. George Ray McEachern, a noted Extension horticulturist from Texas A&M University, Bragg put out 38 pecan trees about three years ago. He added 400 trees the second year and put out over 660 additional trees

With more than 1,100 trees at his place about 14 miles west of Tahoka, Bragg is hopeful he will see some lucrative years

"As the trees grow and the roots spread I know that I'll have to cut back to six rows of cotton, then four rows and finally

two rows," Bragg said. "Heck, I might go into the (pecan) shelling business if things really get good," Bragg said.

Bragg has planted several varieties of pecans, but the primary one is the Western Schley. The trees also serve the purpose of providing better protection from wind erosion.

Cotton Still The Mainstay While pecans may one day be a big

moneymaker, Bragg hasn't forgotten that cotton has been the crop that has provid ed him with a consistent income through

Bragg has about 1,700 acres planted to cotton, virtually none to grain sorghum since prices are so low, and the rest of the acreage involved in the pecan venture. His cotton yields generally run between







Pressure Canner Clinics Set

Home-canning season is at hand, and consumers should be sure their pressure canner produces a product safe to eat.

A temperature of 240 degrees F. is necessary to destroy bacteria spores present in low-acid foods, which include vegetables other than tomatoes and rhubarb and most fish and poultry.

If the bacteria is not destroyed, it grows in jars or cans of food in the absence of air. It produces a toxin that causes the deadly botulism poisoning.

There will be several pressure canner testing sites scheduled in June. The public is invited to attend any of these testings. You need to bring your canner lid for

building, New Home Many free publications will be available. These include information on canning, freezing, storing, jellies and jams.

When selecting a pressure canner, look for features that assure adequate pressure that can be safely reached and maintained.

Look for these features: •an adequate dial or weighed gauge that gives 10 pounds at sea level and up to 15 pounds in areas of Texas with 2,000 feet and above sea level.

•rubber gasket that enables the canner to be airtight to help maintain pressure.

•a vent tube or petcock for exhausting air from the canner prior to sealing. Air is a poor conductor of heat.

Pupils Doing Better In Basic Areas

AUSTIN -- Statewide TEAMS results released last week showed marked improvement in test scores and the percentage of students mastering the reading, writing and math exams at grades 3, 5 and 7.

Almost one million students in grades 3, 5, 7 and 9 were tested in February on the state-mandated Texas Educational Assessment of Minimum Skills tests.

Sixty-nine percent of third graders mastered all tests taken in 1988, compared to 63 percent in 1987 and 52 percent in 1986. Grade 5 passing percentages increased from 57 percent in 1986 to 60 percent in 1987 to 72 percent in 1988. At grade 7, 73 percent mastered all tests taken in 1988 compared to 65 percent in 1987 and 57 percent in 1986.

The improvements show that nearly three-fourths of students in grades 3, 5 and 7 mastered the reading, writing and math tests in 1988 compared to just more than half in 1986.


