I'M TRYING to get the right side of my brain to start doing its stuff, but the dumb right side just stays in its place, doing nothing.

Not until I read an article about it in Readers Digest did I realize that my brain was in two parts, and never mind the cracks about how can anything so tiny be separated. Readers Digest said that most of us just use the left side of our brains to get by, but that really creative people use both sides. According to the article, the left side organizes things well and the right side analyzes and creates.

Most folks, said the article, are half-brained, although maybe it didn't put it just like that. Artists, musicians and top executives use the right side of their brains, it said. And, it said, while the left side does valuable service, we need to use the right side to really get things done.

So far as I could tell, the article never really did tell us how to use both sides of our brain, although it did sort of beat around the bush on the subject. What we apparently need is a little switch installed between our eyes, or maybe in the back of the head where it's not so noticeable, with settings for right, left, full brain-power, and neutral (so we can sleep at night). Scientists,

however, are mostly not working on anything that useful.

I remember reading years ago that most people use only a small percentage of the potential power of the mind, and as teenagers we used to sit around and stare at some object, trying to move it with our brainpower. It never did work for us, though. Later I learned to stare at a blank sheet of paper in a typewriter until Monday turned into Tuesday, but I never could see any practical use for such a talent.

If anybody ever comes into my office and finds me lying on the floor unconscious, they'll know I have been struck by a thought. Especially on Mondays in the summer, when it's too much effort to think, with either side of the brain.

This reminds me of the story about the farmer who bought a dozen shiny new robots to do all the work around the farm, but I can't tell that story here. Stolen were candy and cigarettes, and there was damage to a window broken to gain entry.

Neighborhood Watch Program Suggested

A neighborhood watch program for the City of Tahoka was suggested by a Lubbock crime prevention officer who spoke to the Tahoka Rotary Club recently, explaining how the program works in Lubbock and other communities where it has been implemented.

Usually a city or community is divided into districts, with someone in each district responsible for reporting to police any suspicious activity, the officer explained.

Police Chief Ray Woodall said that if anyone in Tahoka is interested in organizing such a program they may call 998-5295 and leave their name and phone number and someone will return their call.

Woodall also said that the Rotary Club recently was presented a program by two men from the U.S. customs office in El Paso, providing information on child pornography and the extent of its operation in the nation. They also cited types of activity which characterize deviate behavior.

The chief also added that anyone with evidence or suspicions of mailing of child por-

nography should report it to the police department.

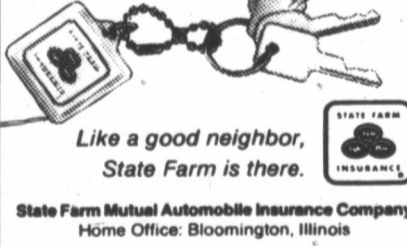

PLAY IT SAFE AROUND ELECTRICITY

REMEMBER THESE SAFETY TIPS

- Watch for power lines when climbing in trees.
- Do not climb electrical poles, towers or structures.
- Do not trim trees near power lines.
- Do not set ladders or scaffolds near power lines.
- Do not shoot at insulators on poles, towers or structures.
- Never climb on or go inside a substation fence. Call SPS to help you retrieve anything thrown into the substation or caught in its fence.
- Avoid using electrical tools like lawn mowers or hedge clippers when grass and leaves are wet.
- Be careful when digging. Call SPS to find out if there are any buried electrical lines in the area.
- Electrical cords should not be spliced or taped. Repair by shortening them or replace them entirely.
- Beware of exposed wires.
- Don't touch portable appliances (coffee makers, radios, hair dryers, etc.) with wet hands or while standing or sitting in water.
- Don't post signs on utility poles. A lineman hitting a nail with his cleat could slip and fall. Also, nails can snag protective gloves and destroy their insulation value.

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and a 90% 10 year survival rate.

A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, even before it can be felt.

The Mobile Breast Cancer Detection Unit will be in O'Donnell on Tuesday, June 28th

The American Cancer Society has established guidelines for mammography in asymptomatic women. (Women who have no symptoms of disease). Those guidelines have been adopted by the American Academy of Family Physicians, American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, and The American College of Radiology. Those guidelines are:

- I. 35-40 years of age - One baseline mammogram.
- II. 40-50 years of age - A mammogram, every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.
- III. 50 years of age and over - An annual physical examination and annual mammogram.
- IV. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals.

The Mobile Breast Cancer Detection Unit will be at the Community Bldg.

These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.

V. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

The charge for the screening mammogram is \$50.00. The Unit accepts cash, check, Visa, MasterCard and American Express.

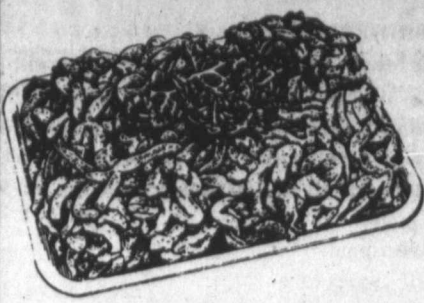

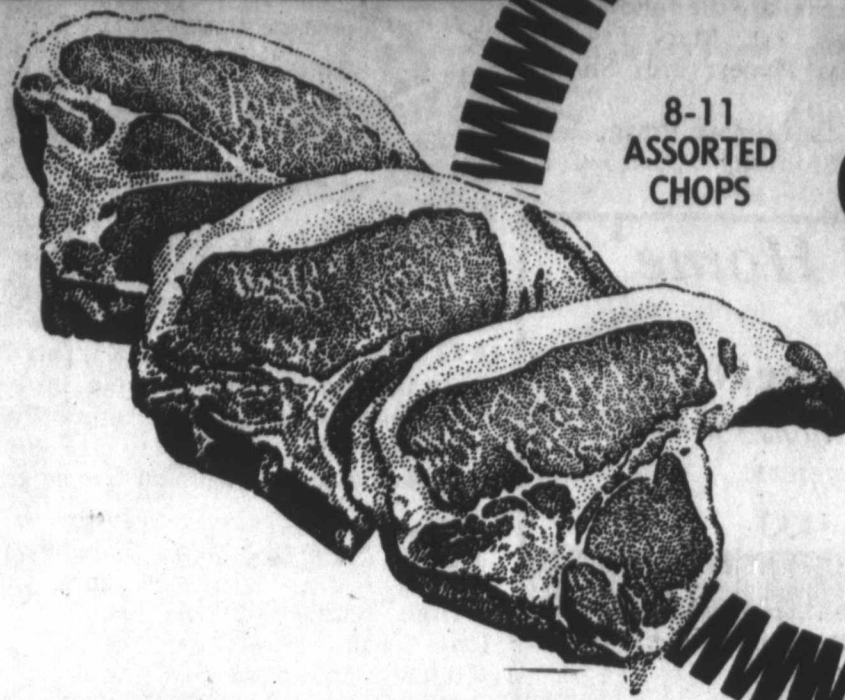
