Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. The American Cancer Society has established guidelines for mammography in asymptomatic women. (Women who have no symptoms of disease). Those guidelines have been adopted by the American Academy of Family Physicians, American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, and The American College of Radiology. Those guidelines åre:

I. 35-40 years of age - One baseline mammogram.

II. 40-50 years of age - A mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.

III. 50 years of age and over -An annual physical examination and annual mammogram.

IV. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with significant high risk factors should be ex-

amined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of

V. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

Arm and leg muscles, exercised regularly, tend to grow and expand in thickness. To maintain that improved body tone, your body uses more calories - eventually drawing on reserves of body fat. As the fat deposits gradually decline, the contours of arm and leg muscles become more attractive. The reverse, unfortunately, is also true. For health, and a handsome figure, limit calories consumed, and exercise regularly.
