

More Thefts Reported

More thefts and burglaries in the City of Tahoka and out in the county were reported to officers during the last week, while the Crime Line reward on an earlier cattle theft in the county was increased to \$1000.

Thefts of aluminum pipe continue to plague farmers and law officers in the county. Leroy Nettles reported about 90 or more joints of six-inch aluminum pipe

stolen from his farm about 2 miles northeast of New Home sometimes in the last several days. Crime Line, 998-5145, has offered a \$500 reward in the case.

Crime Line also is offering a \$300 reward for information clearing theft of 16 tractor weights off a John Deere tractor owned by Natt Park, when it was parked at an employe's residence four miles southeast of West

Point off FM 179. The theft occurred Sunday, July 10, between noon and 5 p.m. The weights were valued at a total of \$960.

At the owner's request, the reward of \$500 previously offered for information on a June 5 cattle theft has been increased to \$1000. Fourteen calves, various breeds, all unmarked, were stolen on a Sunday from a pasture four miles north of U.S. 380 and just west of FM 179. Owner Robbie Gill of New Home estimated their value at \$5825.

Four men who pleaded guilty of various offenses and were sentenced by 106th District Judge George Hansard here have been transported to the state penitentiary. They include Omene Montano Jr. of O'Donnell, seven years on revocation of probation on a prior burglary conviction, plus 25 more years on a sentence from Terry County involving a slaying; Scott Hargrove of Amarillo, aggravated robbery of Allsup's in O'Donnell; Sylvester Jones of Lubbock, four years for theft of aluminum pipe; and Efrain Castro of Brownfield, five years for felony theft involving money he received and failed to pay farm hands on a crew he was in charge of.

Rachael Huffaker reported to police on Monday that the Tahoka Chamber of Commerce building was burglarized between noon Friday and 9 a.m. on Monday. Entry was gained through an opening in the roof. Reported missing were two hammers, two wrenches, three screwdrivers and three one dollar bills totaling \$53. Crime Line is offering a \$500 reward in the case.

Police investigated two family disturbance calls during the past week including one that involved placing a Tahoka man under arrest for public intoxication and criminal trespassing.

Lonelle Brown of 2009 N. 4th reported to police on Wednesday, July 13 that someone on a motorcycle had damaged her picket fence during the early morning hours.

Barry Pittman reported to police that someone had stolen four Chevrolet five-bolt wheels and four Goodyear Vector tires from a city vehicle parked at the city compound — a 1978 Chevrolet Malibu. This was believed to have occurred during the night on Tuesday, July 12. Value was estimated at \$200. Crime Line has offered a \$200 reward in this case.

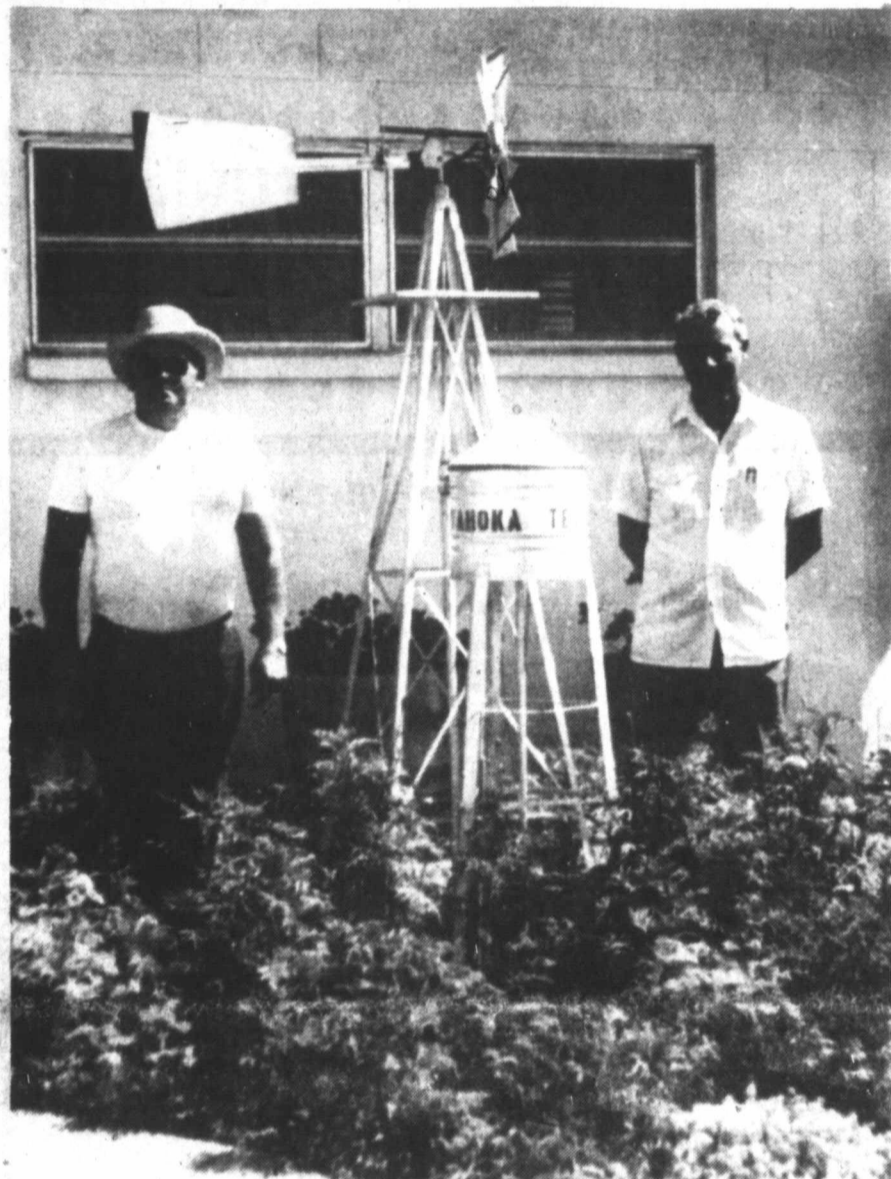

Former Tahoka Resident Dies In Truck Collision

Two tractor-trailers collided Monday morning, July 18, on Interstate 27 north of Plainview, killing one of the drivers, A. Lyndell Wood, 51, of Odessa, formerly of Tahoka.

Wood was killed when his flatbed trailer broke loose and crushed the cab of the tractor-trailer rig he was driving.

Wood was northbound when his rig collided with another tractor-trailer driven by George Estrada, 55, of Brownfield, according to police reports.

After the collision, Wood's truck ran off the roadway into the center median where his flatbed trailer broke loose from the couplings and twisted into the cab Wood was in, reports indicate.

Wood was pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of the Peace Frank Curry. Estrada was treated at Central Plains Regional Hospital and released.

Services for Wood were to be at 2 p.m. Wednesday in First Baptist Church of Tahoka were the Rev. Jim Turner, Baptist pastor from Azle, officiating.

Burial was to be in Tahoka Cemetery under direction of

White Funeral Home.

He was born Oct. 12, 1936 in Colorado City and moved to Lynn County in 1946. He moved to Odessa from Tahoka in 1982. He was a truck driver for Shorty Hall Rig Co. in Odessa. He was a veteran of the armed forces. He was a Baptist.

Survivors include two daughters, Cindy Goldston of Brownfield and Tammy Wood of Odessa; two sons, Randy of Tahoka and Brian of Odessa; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Luther Wood of Tahoka; two sisters, Mary Bell Mahurin of Odessa and Arnetta Miller of Tahoka; and three grandchildren.

County Farmers May Take Part In Futures, Options Marketing Program

Farmers in Lynn County will be able to take part in a U.S. Dept. of Agriculture pilot program with the use of futures and options contracts as marketing tools.

This program, mandated in the 1985 Food Security Act, will be a joint effort of ASCS and the Extension Service. Brett Cypert, Lynn County Agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System, explains, "The pilot program is available only to farmers in 40 selected counties throughout the country who are participants in 1988 or 1989 corn, wheat, or cotton programs and

also to soybean producers. Other Texas counties designated to operate under the new program are Hansford, Hidalgo, and Lubbock.

Farmers wishing to become eligible for participation in the pilot marketing program must first attend an educational program which will be conducted by the Extension Service in each county. Guidelines of the pilot program and use of futures and options trading in preparing marketing plans will be discussed. In Tahoka, Cypert says a meeting will be held Monday, July 25 at 7 p.m. in the Lyntegar Electric Cooperative meeting room.

Once a farmer takes part in the educational program, he can sign up for the pilot effort at the County ASCS Office.

In the pilot program, participants will be limited to three contracts each for 1988 and 1989 crops, but not more than 50 percent of expected production before harvest and 100 percent of actual production after harvest. Futures contracts may be sold, and put and call option contracts may be purchased.

The USDA will guarantee producers who participate in the program a net return at least equal to their respective Commodity Credit Corporation loan rates.

This pilot program results from farm legislation intended to assist farmers in relying more on pricing tools of the market and less on government loan programs. Cypert points out that following a marketing plan that minimizes price risk and maximizes returns may boost income substantially and improve lending arrangements.

The worldwide nature of crop markets will continue to cause erratic and wide price swings. Farmers can capture some favorable price gains during price rallies using commodity futures and options markets, adds Cypert.

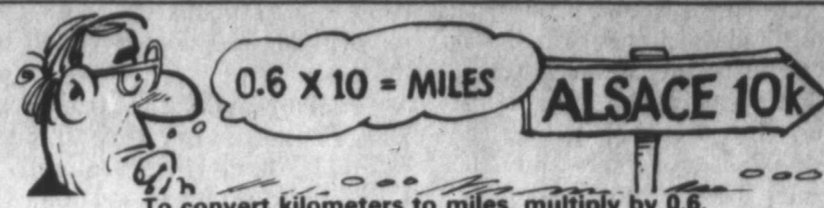
