Tahoka Youth Attends Camp At Kerrville

Cody Wayne Harvick, 10-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Curtis Harvick of Tahoka, attended his second year at the Texas Lions Camp for Crippled Children July 3-16 at Kerrville, sponsored by Midland Lions Club.

At the camp the children are kept busy with swimming, overnight campouts, sports of all kinds, horseback riding and arts and crafts. The camp is designed not only to help a child have fun, but also to help develop self-help skills such as making beds, self dressing, and house cleaning. There is competition between bunkhouses, with an award at the end of camp for the one kept cleanest.

Youngsters are counseled by college students from all over the state, young persons devoted to teaching and caring for handicapped children.

Of 170 children selected this year, Cody was named the outstanding boy in recreation and athletics for his session. Award winners are determined by vote of counselors and are given at the parents night assembly. Cody also was voted most friendly in his bunkhouse and earned a swimming award for fastest turtle racer, plus his adaptive aquatics Red Cross badge.

The Harvicks expressed appreciation to all Lions Club members for the work they do, and also to all Masons for their help with crippled children at Scottish Rite Hospital in Dallas.

Anyone who has a handicapped child is urged to contact any Lions Club about the camp program.

Wrecks Strangely Similar; Man Charged In Shooting

Two wrecks investigated by the same highway patrolman last week were unusually similar, a Tahoka man was charged with attempted murder following a shooting, and a recent burglary of the Tahoka Chamber of Commerce was cleared by confession of two juveniles.

Wrecks Thursday morning and Saturday morning occurred within about a mile of each other north of Tahoka on U.S. 87. In both cases, the driver's first name was Kristi, both were driving small Japanese vehicles, and both vehicles overturned after the driver apparently fell asleep in the morning.

On Thursday, about 5:30 a.m. 14 miles north, a 1986 Mazda pickup driven by Kristi Bullard of Lubbock overturned. Her 1-year-old son, reportedly in a safety seat which officers said was not properly secured, was thrown from the pickup and suffered a broken leg. The driver had a head laceration. Both were treated at Lynn County Hospital and transferred to Lubbock.

At 8:30 a.m. Saturday, 15.2 miles north of Tahoka, a 1979 Datsun driven by Kristi Grisson, 16, of Lamesa, overturned. Miss Grisson and a passenger, Stacie Wilkie, 15, of Lamesa, were treated for apparently minor injuries and released.

Police arrested a Tahoka man, Rafael Garcia of 725 S. 1st, on Saturday and he was charged with attempted murder of Jerbacia Rodriguez, 28, of 2126

Lockwood. It was reported that Rodriguez had been shot once in the back with a .25 caliber pistol and he was transported to Lynn County Hospital and hospitalized. Rodriguez was scheduled to be released on Wednesday.

Police cleared the burglary of the Chamber of Commerce building reported last week as two 14-year-old Tahoka juveniles confessed and both were turned over to juvenile probation authorities. Also, one of the juveniles confessed to a burglary attempt at Tahoka Safety Lane, located at 1919 Main, after police received a call on Saturday at approximately 1:10 p.m. that an apparent burglary was in progress. Upon arrival police arrested the suspect and the boy then confessed to the crime.

The Texaco service station, located at Hwy. 380 and East access road, was reported broken into on Saturday as police on patrol noticed a broken bay window on the northwest garage

door. Nothing was reported stolen, however.

Jeff Jennings of 2400 Lockwood reported to police on Saturday that someone had stolen his go-cart from his yard. The go-cart was described as a red-tube frame with a 100cc Yamaha engine, valued at \$1200.

Mary's Place, 1300 Ave. J, reported one large smoked glass window pane had been broken on Saturday. Value was estimated at \$200.

The residence of Garland Peek, 3 miles west of New Home, was burglarized July 24, and a 21-inch Zenith color TV set was stolen. Crime Line, 998-5145, is offering a \$500 reward in the case.

In jail during the week were one person each for application to revoke probation on a DWI charge, application to revoke probation on a burglary charge, aggravated robbery, attempted murder, speeding and public intoxication plus traffic violation.



New Flying Ambulance Facilities Announced

Methodist and Lubbock General Hospitals announce the unveiling of the permanent Carelink aeromedical helicopter, SA 365-N-1 Dauphin 2, and the opening of the LGH helicopter pad and refueling station and the EMS/Carelink communications center located at LGH.

The newly constructed helipad is located on the northeast side of the LGH/Health Sciences Center complex, approximately 30 seconds from the emergency room. The on-site refueling station, featuring a 10,000 gallon underground fuel cell, will facilitate immediate refueling and enhance the response time for back-to-back flights.

The recently remodeled Communications Center will feature two 24-hour dispatchers and will allow the personnel to communicate with ground EMS and aeromedical services on all FCC authorized medical frequencies. The communications console will also allow physicians, EMS/Carelink supervisors and other authorized personnel to directly communicate through telephone/radio dispatching systems.

Direct telephone link with Lubbock Police Department, Fire Department, Lubbock County Sheriff's Office and Texas Department of Public Safety also will be available. In addition, the state-wide enforcement frequency (Inter City) will allow dispatchers to directly communicate with regional law enforcement personnel via radio within approximately 100 miles of Lubbock.

The SA 365-N-1 Dauphin 2, the final craft of the Carelink venture, is the most impressive aircraft to date exceeding all professional and FAA standards for safety. The helicopter is known

throughout the industry for its avionics technology, advanced speed and range capabilities.

A special feature of the Carelink craft, the 12th Dauphin in the nation to be placed into aeromedical service, is a specially designed tail rotor called the fenestron which adds safety and stability to this aircraft. The medically configured interior is large and roomy, capable of housing a large passenger load. The maximum crew capacity, usually used only in disaster situations, can consist of two pilots, four medical crew members and three patients. The standard flight load, found on most flights, contains two pilots, two medical crews members and up to two adult patients.

The mobile intensive care unit is flown by Lead Pilot Scott Boss and seven pilots. All pilots have accumulated approximately 40,000 hours of flying time.

Heading the emergency response crew is Jaine Moore, R.N., chief flight nurse. She is assisted by Sandy Willis, R.N., Syan Young, R.N. and paramedic, Jeff Ferguson, R.N., Belinda Baros, R.N., Willis Hassell, chief paramedic, and Mike Russell, Bob Pierson, Lloyd Cody and Robert Coker, paramedics. Mark Brock, paramedic/ems director, Doak Enabnit, paramedic communication director and Joe Moore, paramedic training chief complete the emergency team.

The helicopter will now land at both facilities, depending on the trauma care required by the victim. In accordance with the shared agreement, Carelink will be housed at both facilities on a rotational basis.

With a maximum cruising speed of 195, Carelink can travel to cities in a 200-mile radius of Lubbock within minutes.

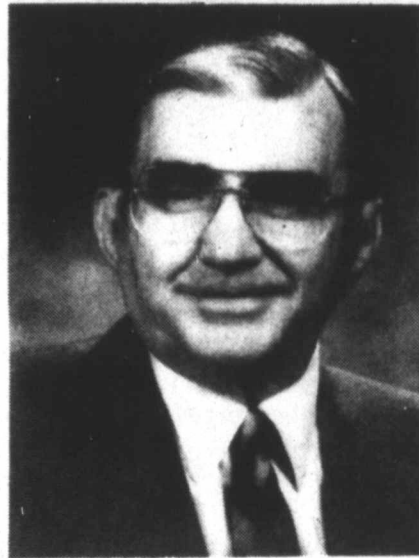

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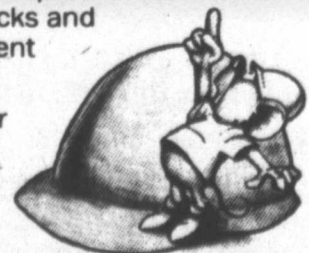
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Out on the JOB WATCH UP FOR POWER LINES

HAVE YOU NOTICED that your parents are never where they're supposed to be? It is so aggravating.

For the first 18 years (or so) of life, children are forced to tell their parents where they've been, where they are, where they're planning to go, with whom, how come, and how late. I did that. I didn't do it very well, obviously, because I was in trouble many times over one of those issues.

Now that I am an adult with a family of my own, can I count on my parents to be where they are supposed to be? No. They think they've been granted their freedom, and go hither, thither and yon (yawn?) without so much as a "Mother, may I" (or Daughter, may I, in my case).

This only happens after the children leave home. Adult brain-waves cannot function properly while providing for anyone under the age of 18 -- they turn into parental brain-waves that all begin with "Did you ... why did you ... and I told you" patterns.

So, now that my parents are finally smart and agreeable, what happens? I can't find them anywhere. Do you think they're trying to tell me something?

The Lynn County Fashion Show Splash 1988 took place July 18 at the Tahoka swimming pool.

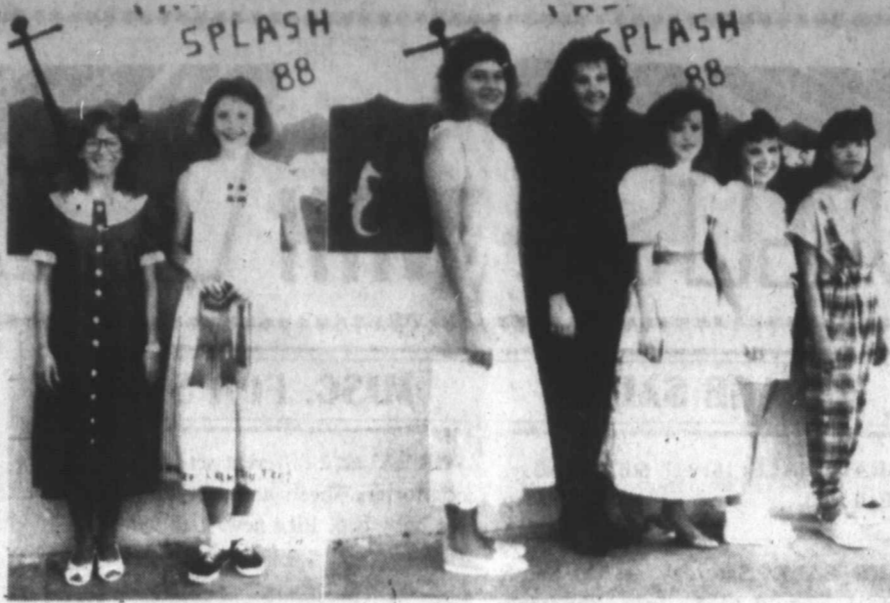

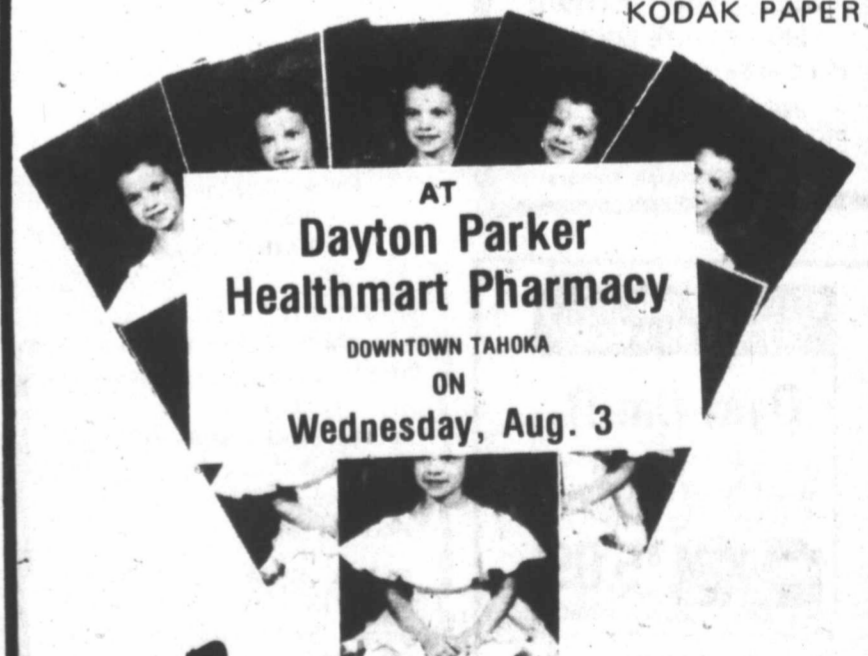
