Sales Tax Payments Still Increasing

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Friday that payments to cities and counties that collect local sales tax increased again this month.

"The Texas ecomony is steadily improving," Bullock said. "Cities and counties across the state are still seeing the benefits."

Bullock sent checks totaling \$113.5 million to 1,043 Texas cities that collect local sales tax at either one or one and one-half

Checks totaling \$10.4 million were sent to 81 Texas counties that collect one one-half optional county sales tax, Bullock said.

Net payment this period in O'Donnell was \$2,248.38, last year it was \$1,648.47; Tahoka was \$8,707.88, last year it was \$7,497.57; and Wilson was \$767.03 and last year it was \$259.33.

August's checks represent taxes collectd by monthly and quarterly filers in June and reported to the Comptroller's Office by July 20.

1988 Bulldogs To Start With Tough Scrimmage

The 1988 edition of Tahoka Bulldogs will get their first action against another team Friday night as they journey to Denver City to scrimmage the Mustangs, a highly-rated Class AAA team.

Coach Ted Wiley said the junior varsity No. 1 group would

scrimmage at 5:30 p.m., followed by the JV No. 2 unit against the comparable Denver City group, with the varsity squads to scrimmage after that.

Running the spread and wishbone attack for the Bulldogs will be senior quarterback Ramiro Rodriguez, 160, who was a starter last year, and who has been looking good in practice, Coach Wiley said. Snapping the ball to him will be Ronnie Dunn, 185-pound senior who has been a starter most of the time since he was a freshman. Other experienced offensive players include right guard Mark Vega, a starter last year; Kurt Bryan at right end, a starter last season; and Thomas Glisson, left end who was a starter early last season.

"Our tackles, both on offense and defense, need experience and work," Wiley said. At present Ricky Saldana, who was a starter at defensive end last season, is working at offensive right tackle as well. Chris Jurden, a 240-pound freshman, plus sophomore Gabriel Lopez, 180, and junior Dallas Williams, 180, are working at tackle on offense.

Wiley explained that the tackles and guards have to be able to protect the quarterback long enough to get the offense going. The guards especially must move well to pick up the pass rush, he said.

Other probable starters on offense include Mike Ramirez, a part-time starter at right halfback last season, and either Shannon Clift, 149-pound senior, or Cory McCleskey, 165-pound junior, at the fullback spot vacated by premier running back Rusty Jen-

nings, who graduated. Possibilities at the left halfback spot are Charles Jurden, a junior, and seniors Greg Deleon and Angel Hernandez.

Junior Timothy Young also has been working at quarterback.

Wiley expects to make some changes on defense after scrimmages against Denver City and Abernathy help coaches decide on the best alignments. But at present the defensive ends appear to be Dunn and either Saldana or Danny Calvillo, with Hernandez or Chris Jurden at nose guard, Williams and Valentin Deleon at defensive tackles, Clift and Mc-Cleskey at linebackers in the 5-2 setup, with Glisson, Rodriguez and Ramirez among the secon-

The Bulldogs open the season against Class A Plains here on Sept. 2, then play Class AAA teams Cooper and Coahoma before getting into a 7-game district schedule. Gone from the district is Spur, replaced by Idalou.



An attorney may develop a specialty of public speaking touching the law profession and how it affects our daily lives. Law enforcement officers are usually giving safety courses of one kind or another.



According to the American Cancer Society, one out of ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

The American Cancer Society has established guidelines for mammography in asymptomatic women. (Women who have no symptoms of disease). Those the American Academy of Family Physicians, American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, and The American College of Radiology. Those guidelines are:

I. 35-40 years of age - One baseline mammogram.

II. 40-50 years of age - A mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.

III. 50 years of age and over -An annual physical examination and annual mammogram.

IV. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of

V. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes of unexplained breast pain. A screening mammogram is an

x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

SAFETY BELTS:



SENSE

You've heard the reasons that some people give for not wearing safety belts.

Most people don't realize that there is more myth than fact to these reasons. When it comes to safety belts, it's important to know the difference between sense and

"I don't need to wear a safety belt when I'm driving Just a short distance and I'm not going fast."

The fact is that all driving can be dangerous. Three out of four crashes causing death occur within 25 miles of home. And more than 80 percent of all car crashes occur. at speeds of less than 40 miles per hour. Individuals who were not belted in cars have been killed when the car was going as slowly as 12 m.p.h.

"I'll be safer if I'm thrown clear of a car in an Your chances of being killed are 2.5 times greater if you are thrown from the car. The forces in a collision can be

great enough to propel you up to 150 feet — half the length of a football field!

Safety belts can protect you from:

Plunging through the windshield;

Being thrown out the door and hurtled through the air;

 Being crushed by your own car.
In almost any collision, you're better off being held inside the car by a safety belt. "I'm afraid that I could be trapped in a burning or

"I'm afraid that I could be trapped in a burning or submerged car."

Less than one-half of 1% of all injury-producing collisions involve fire or submersion. But if either does occur, wearing a safety belt can actually save your life. If you're involved in a crash without your safety belt, you may be stunned or knocked unconscious by striking the interior of the car. Then your chances of getting out of the car would not be good. But with a safety belt, you're more likely to be unhurt, alert and capable of escaping quickly.

"My baby is safe in my lap."
In car travel, your lap is the most dangerous location

for your baby. In a crash, your child could be thrown from your arms or crushed between your body and the dashboard,

"I'm a good driver. I don't need a safety beit because I won't be in a crash."

No matter how good a driver you are, you can't control the other car or other driver. On the average, you can expect to be in a crash once every 10 years. For one out of every 20 persons, it will be a serious crash. For one out of every 60 persons born today, it will be fatal.

Since you can't avoid a collision, your best protection is a safety belt, which cuts your chances of death or injury

"I don't need a seat belt when I sit in the back You can be seriously hurt if you are thrown from a back seat onto other passengers or you are thrown out of a

"I don't need a safety belt because I have good reflexes. I can protect myself by holding onto the steering wheel or by bracing myself with my arms and legs."

Collisions usually occur too fast for you to protect yourself, and the forces involved in most collisions are usually too great to withstand, even at a moderate speed. In a 30-mile-per-hour accident, the impact on unbelted passengers is the same as if they had fallen from a three-story building.

"I'm pregnant and I'm worried that using a seat belt might harm my baby in an accident."

There is no evidence that properly worn salety belts increase the chance of injury to the fetus, no matter how severe a collision. However, the leading cause of fetal injury is closely related to the amount of injury to the mother. Doctors strongly recommend that a mother reduce her own risks and those of her unborn child by wearing a safety belt.

"We are confident that the cost-efficient transportation program for this district will meet the needs of the school district and parents," said Putman.

The New Home district had previously provided its own transportation services to students in this rural farming community. Ever-expanding budget constraints, however, prevented the purchase of new buses, which increased concerns for the children's safety.

Durham predicts that it will actually be able to improve services while saving the school district thousands of dollars over the life of the contract.

To ensure the children's safety, Durham is investing \$90,000 to purchase three new buses and is implementing its extensive driver training and bus maintenance programs.

Four buses will be used to transport students in the New Home district, with new buses to be added in the first, second and fourth years. Current employees, as well as those joining the Durham staff, will undergo an extensive driver-training program to ensure the safety and wellbeing of the children.





Tahoka I.S.D. will begin serving nutritious meals on September 1, 1988.

The prices for meals are as follows:

Breakfast Lunch Regular Reduced 50¢ Regular \$1.00 Teachers 75¢ 1.50 Teachers Visitors\$1.00 Visitors

Children from households that meet Federal Income guidelines are eligible for the free and reduced meals. Registration for the Free and Reduced Lunch Program will begin August 17, 1988 at 9:00 a.m. in Tahoka School Cafeteria. Bring the necessary papers to complete your application. These are: W2 Form, check stubs, employment sheet from your employer, notice form the Welfare Office, and/or information sheet from the Food Stamp Office.

Dear Parent or Guardian:

School serves nutritious meals every school day. Students may buy and breakfast for .50 . Children from households that meet Federal Income guidelines are eligible for free meals or reduced-price meals at 40 for lunch and .30 for breakfast. To apply for free or reduced-price meals, complete the enclosed application, sign it and return it to the school.

FOOD STAMP/AFDC HOUSEHOLDS: If you currently receive Food Stamps or "Aid to Families with Dependent Children" for your child, you only have to list your child's name and food stamp or AFDC case number, print your name, and sign the application. Since you have already given income information to the welfare office, the school can confirm your eligibility.

ALL OTHER HOUSEHOLDS: If your household income is at or below the level shown on the enclosed scale, your child is eligible for either free or reduced-price meals. To apply for meal benefits, you must provide the following information and sign the appliation: (1) list the names of everyone who lives in your household. Include parents, grandparents, all children, other relatives and unrelated people who live in your household, (2) list the social security number of each adult age 21 or older. If an adult does not have a social security number print "None", (3) list total monthly income and amount of income (BEFORE deductions for taxes, social security, etc.) each person received last month and where it is from, such as wages, retirement, or welfare. If you have a household member for whom last month's income was higher or lower than usual, list the person's expected average monthly

VERIFICATION: The information on the application may be checked by school officials at any time during the school year.

REPORTING CHANGES: If you list income information and your child is approved for meal benefits, you must tell the school when your household income increases by \$50 or more per month (\$600 per year) or when your household size decreases. If you list a food stamp case number of AFDC number, you must tell the school when you no longer receive food stamps or AFDC for your child.

FOSTER CHILD: Your foster child may be eligible for meal benefits. If you wish to apply for meal benefits for a foster child, contact the school for help with the application.

NONDISCRIMINATION: Children who receive free or reduced-price meal benefits are treated the same as children who pay for meals. In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, national origin, age or handicap. If you believe you have been discriminated against, write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250.

FAIR HEARING: If you do not agree with the school's decision on your application or the result of verification, you may wish to discuss it with the school. You also have the right to a fair hearing. This can be done by calling or writing the following official:

Travel Fraud Scheme Brings **Indictments**

Roger Allen Sylvester, Nancy Alton Sylvester, and Richard Paul Nichols were charged with mail fraud, aiding and abetting, and conspiracy in a 50-count indictment returned by a federal grand jury in the western district of Oklahoma, Oklahoma City, on Aug. 2. The maximum sentence for conviction on all counts is 250 years custody of the attorney general and/or a \$12.5

million fine. The three defendents operated Titan Travel during 1986, and sold vacation packages for travel to Mexico and Hawaii. More than 7,000 customers purchased packages that grossed the operators in excess of \$2 million. customers in 40 states, including Texas, purchased vacation

packages. Tital Travel conducted business by placing advertisements with radio stations concerning a four day/three night vacation to Mexico or Hawaii. Prospective customers were asked to call a toll-free telephone number answered in Oklahoma City. Callers were told that for \$338, they would receive three nights lodging and round-trip airfare for two. Payment could be made by either cashier's check or major credit card. Customers who purchased the vacation later learned that Resort Vacations, Canoga Park, Ca. was the trip provider. Customers also later learned of several qualifications that had to be satisfied prior to taking the trip.

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

Infant Needs \$30,000 For Heart Transplant

Relatives of 7-month-old Rebekah Cadena are racing to raise \$30,000 for a heart transplant for the Grand Prairie infant.

Family members, including the child's aunt, Irma Hernandez of Tahoka, were told Aug. 7 that Rebekah, who has an enlarged heart, would not leave Children's Medical Center in Dallas until the transplant.

By the next day another aunt, San Garcia, was printing flyers and contacting newspaper and broadcast media.

A trust fund with the Children's Transplant Association has been set up and various fundraisers are being planned.

The family needs \$30,000 up front for the transplant, which will cost between \$50,000 and \$56,000, Mrs. Garcia said.

Rebekah's father, Salvadore Cadena, is a construction worker and has insurance which will pay only 80 percent of the medical costs. However, the insurance

\$30,000 deposit for the transplant.

Her mother, Christina, is a homemaker and has been at the hospital every day since Rebekah was admitted. Rebekah is the Cadenas' only child.

The second New Year's Day baby born at Arlington Memorial Hospital this year, Rebekah appeared to be a healthy normal girl until her fourth month checkup.

"The doctor noticed something wrong," her aunt said. "She was breathing funny, and her whole chest would move when she breathed."

Physicians determined she had an enlarged heart, and the infant has been in and out of the hospital since then, Garcia said.

When she entered the Children's Medical Center doctors told the famiy that Rebekah would have to stay in the hospital until a transplant could be performed.

On Aug. 2, both lungs collaps-

ed, and she is now in stable condition in the Intensive Care Unit. Rebekah is kept sedated

because her heart is so large, her aunt said.

"None of us want to be responsible for the death of a young child, so remember to slow down in the school zones in the mornings and again in the afternoons.'

Cawthon added, "Just because most of the children will be in school, we must not forget the preschooler who will still be playing in the residential areas. Remember, slow down as you are driving through school zones, playgrounds, and in and around school areas."

Financial Counseling Offered To Area Farmers, Ranchers

Help in assessing the financial situations and options for the families in Lynn Co. It is offered through a new project, Texas Volunteers for Rural Families, conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The project provides trained volunteer counselors who will help farm and ranch families assess the financial situation in their operation, identify problem areas and offer alternative strategies to improve profitability, explained Annis Brown, County Extension Agent-H.E. It is funded by a grant from ACTION- Center for Volunteers, Inc., which administers domestic volunteer programs sponsored by the federal government, announced earlier this year by U.S.

Senator Phil Gramm (R-Tex.). Volunteers for Lynn County are Larry and Becky Moore. The Moores have backgrounds in agriculture and related business and have undergone extensive training by professional specialists of the Extension Service, an arm of the Texas A&M University System, Brown said.

Larry and Becky Moore know how to help you look at your business figures and determine what they really mean to you. They're not going to tell you how to run your business, but they will suggest your options.

Brown said the Moores have been trained in procedures to follow for family budgeting and for financial planning of businesses of farming, ranching or which are agriculturally related. This includes financial

structuring, debt restructuring and reorganization of business to maximize the resources which are available. It's a hands-on process, it isn't theoretical, and it is completely confidential. Our goal is to help rebuild rural Texas, one family at a time, Brown said.

The project resulted from a national competition to find ways to assist financially distressed rural families, Gramm said. Texas A&M won an \$84,000 grant to conduct the effort.

"These funds are important because they apply the resources of Texas A&M and ACTION to the real problems faced by many Texas farmers," Gramm said. The senator said he hopes the Texas volunteer network will serve as a model for other industries confronted with financial difficulties.
