Seismograph Work Okayed By Commission

Lynn County commissioners Monday approved seismograph operations on school land owned by Lynn County but located in Gaines County. The action was taken at the request of Geophysical Co.

With all commissioners and Judge J.F. Brandon present, the court also discussed the new computer system in operation at the sheriff's office and approved payment of \$123.90 to the South Plains Community Action for commodities.

Greg Henley, president of Tahoka Rotary Club, was present to discuss the possibility of opening restrooms at the courthouse during the Harvest Festival Sept. 24. No action was taken on the matter.

The commissioners worked on the budget for the coming year and set a budget hearing for Sept. 12.

Pct. 1 Commissioner Eldon Gattis was given permission to construct a maintenance barn in Wilson, and Prec. 2 Commissioner Boyd Barnes was given permission to seek bids on a pickup and equipment for spraying bar ditches.

Judge Brandon warned commissioners that workman's compensation insurance probably will have a substantial premium increase.

Lynn County Health Fair Set Wednesday

The First Annual Lynn County Health Fair will be held Wednesday, Aug. 31 in the First United Methodist Church in Tahoka, from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. It is being sponsored by the Lynn County Extension Office/Home Ec. Committee, the American Cancer Society and the Hospital Auxiliary.

"It should be a lot of fun and very informative too," said Annis Brown, Lynn County Extension Agent/Home Economics. "There will be a skin cancer screening, a cholesterol check, blood pressure check and oral cancer screening and several types of literature available. The Sheriff's Dept. also will be on

hand to do fingerprinting for the kids as well as safety tips."

"We are also excited about having the Mobile Mammogram Unit available. They will be offering mammograms for \$50 and everyone should call our office to sign-up," said Mrs. Brown. Also available will be Cora Brown from the Women's Protective Services, to discuss counseling available through the protective orders. There will also be a blood drive during the day and those who wish to donate should sign up in the County Extension Office.

Odessa Women's and Children's Hospital will sponsor a Nutrition and Exercise Health Assessment for \$30 per person.

"Since we do have so many doctors involved, we have had to set certain time limits in the screenings," said Mrs. Brown. "But it's these types of early detection tests that can help locate a problem before it becomes difficult to treat."

There will also be a poster contest sponsored for children grades second through sixth. All posters will be due at 12 noon at the health fair and will be judged at 4:00 p.m. with the winners being announced at 5:00 p.m.

Also available will be Dayton Parker and Haney Wells to review prescription drugs to anyone who has questions, so bring in any old prescriptions or bottles for advice on proper disposal use or possible dangers of combining prescription medicines.

Air Conditioning Unit Stolen From Building

A Janitrol air conditioning unit was stolen from the Poka-Lambro Telephone Cooperative building at FM 1054 and FM 1313 southeast of Tahoka shortly after midnight Sunday. Officers answering an alarm found that the unit, valued at \$2500, had been stolen from outside the building which houses equipment for the Fletcher-Carter exchange.

Crime Line, 998-5145, has offered a \$500 reward in the case, and Poka-Lambro has offered its own reward of \$300.

Bill Thomas of 5106 56th Street, Lubbock, reported to Tahoka police on Tuesday that while he was traveling north on U.S. 87 in his 1986 Dodge van, someone had thrown a peach from the top of the cemetery overpass which cracked his windshield. Police questioned two Tahoka boys, ages 15 and 17, who admitted to this incident. Damage was estimated at \$389.

Police also answered five family disturbance calls during the

past week.

In jail during the week were three persons for theft by check, and one each for the following offenses: theft under \$20, public intoxication, revocation of probation, traffic warrant plus no liability insurance, escapee, driving while intoxicated, expired sticker plus no insurance plus failure to appear, and one person was jailed on four charges, including outstanding warrant, theft by check in Brownwood, no seat belt and failure to appear.

City Agrees To Close Street By High School

Tahoka City Council voted Monday night to close Ave. P between N. 2nd and N. 4th Sts. during school hours, at the request of Dr. Duane Carter, superintendent of schools.

Dr. Carter mentioned areas of parking for students and teachers. The streets will be closed from 7:30 a.m. to 3:45 p.m. during school days only.

The council voted to continue a lease-purchase arrangement with Yellowhouse Machinery Co. on the city backhoe, which is scheduled to be paid out in five years.

Councilmen then had a budget work session at the special called meeting. All councilmen and Mayor Jim Solomon were present.

All in all, it was just the kind of vacation we needed. We hated to come home to the blistering hot days and television re-runs, but we did.

I guess we can manage to stand it until next year's vacation. I hope you enjoyed yours, too.

Tahoka Teachers Participate In State Inservice Conference

Patricia Rambo and Donna Stone, teachers at Tahoka High School, participated in the State Inservice Conference for the professional development of vocational home economics teachers in Dallas Aug. 15-18, 1988. More than 2,700 teachers from school districts all across the state attended the 3½ day conference.

The conference, coordinated by the Vocational Home Economics Education Division of the Texas Education Agency, focused on new content in the home economics program as set forth in the Master Plan for Vocational Education. The Master Plan, a part of the school reform package, was approved by the State Board of Education earlier in the year. Twenty-three concurrent sessions provided teachers with the foundation to effectively include the new concepts in all area of instruction in home economics education. Content, approaches, background, research and strategies for teaching were covered by well-known experts from across the nation. Topics addressed included Nanny care, a new concept in child care training; computers revolutionizing the textile and apparel industry; help for school-age parents; life management skills; the impact of technology on the housing industry; key developments in the science of

food and nutrition; teaching critical issues; families in transition; and positive outcomes with the at-risk student.

"Vocational home economics hardly resembles the homemaking classes of just a few years ago," said Mary Harrison, president of the Vocational Home Economics Teachers Association of Texas (VHETAT). Harrison said that today's vocational home economics includes courses in life management skills, advanced food science and nutrition, apparel design, consumer economics, interior design, family finance, parenting education, child development, to name a few of the area of instruction. In addition, vocational home economics teachers train students to enter the working world by giving them skills in jobs such as fashion design, hospitality services, child care, and entrepreneurship. Students also learn how to manage the dual role of wage earner and homemaker. Vocational home economics teaches "Skills for a Lifetime." A video by the same title, "Skills for Lifetime" has been produced by the VHETAT to help the public better understand the new face of home economics.

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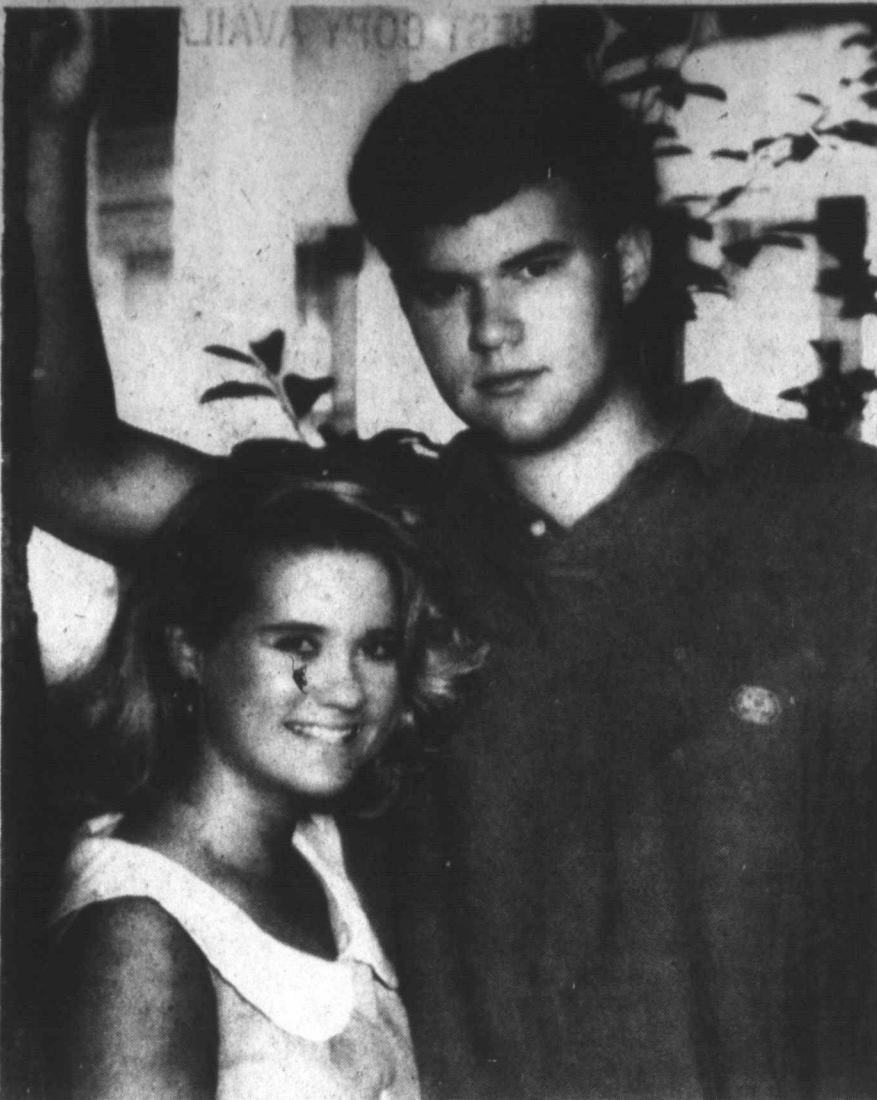

Student Absences In Elem. School

Student absences from school require a parent explanation in writing. The laws of the State of Texas require that an excused absence from school is granted only under the following conditions:

1. Personal illness
2. Sickness or death in the family.

3. Quarantine
4. Weather or road conditions causing travel to be unsafe.
5. Any other cause acceptable to the Principal.

Upon returning to school from an absence, students need to bring a note from the parent, explaining the absence and give it to the Principal. The Principal will determine whether the absence is excused or unexcused and give the student a "blue admission slip."

Pork Referendum To Be Held Sept. 7-8

On Wednesday and Thursday, Sept. 7 and 8, 1988, the nation's pork producers will make what is likely to be their most important single business decision of the year. A vote in the pork referendum, scheduled for those two days, will determine the future of the present pork checkoff which provides funding for the many promotion and research programs that benefit pork producers.

All pork producers and eligible family members are encouraged to cast a ballot in the referendum at their local county extension office Sept. 7 or 8. Any person who has raised two or more hogs for sale since Nov. 1, 1986 is entitled to vote.

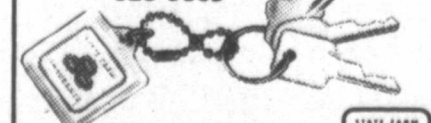
The National Pork Board, is made up of 14 pork producers and one importer, is responsible for the collection and disbursement of funds collected under the pork checkoff program. Acting on recommendations from producer policy development groups, the National Pork Board determines how checkoff dollars are utilized in the areas of pork promotion, research and consumer education. Approximately 70% of checkoff funds are invested in major promotion programs that reach millions of consumers each year. High voter turnout in the referendum will help ensure the continued funding of highly successful programs like the The Other White Meat® campaign and development of the American's Cut™ premium boneless pork chop.

Death in a family causes considerable grief; but the death of a person who has not carefully planned the distribution of his or her estate can cause added trauma to beneficiaries. The new fifth edition of *How to Live-and Die-With Texas Probate* shows how families can avoid excessive taxation and unnecessary legal entanglements resulting from probate.

Marking the 20th anniversary of *How to Live-and Die-With Texas Probate*, this latest edition reflects changes brought about by the 1986 Internal Revenue Code and the most recent acts of the 1986-87 Texas Legislature. Featuring contributions from more than two dozens Texas attorneys practicing in estate planning and probate, the guide tells the reader "in straightforward language" how to protect his/her family's future.

This is the only probate book written especially for Texans and Texas property owners. Topics include when an estate is valued and why, how debts are paid after death, the federal estate tax, the Texas inheritance tax, the

marital deduction, pitfalls in a homemade will, revocable and irrevocable trusts, life insurance as a will substitute, probate and tax saving through gifts, costs of probate, and more.

"There are all kinds of laws, most of which will not affect a person in his or her lifetime. But in every family, probate will happen," said Charles A. Saunders, editor of this book and a partner in the Houston-based law firm, Fulbright & Jaworski.

The cost of the meal is \$6 per person and guest speaker and ride participant will be Connie Carpenter Phinney, 1984 Olympic Gold Medalist in the Womens' 79 Kilometer Road Race. Carpenter Phinney will present a video of her Olympic training, "16 Days of Glory."

Carpenter Phinney, the gold medalist in the 79 kilometer road race at the 1984 Olympic Games in Los Angeles, was the first American to ever win a gold medal in cycling. She is also the winningest cyclist in American history with 12 national titles and four world championship medals.

Carpenter Phinney, the 30-year-old cyclist from Copper Mountain, Colorado, is a life-long cyclist, who began racing after an ankle injury prevented her from continuing a career in speed skating. She is married to Davis Phinney, pro cyclist, who was a bronze medalist in the Olympic games. The Phinneys are the only American couple in history to each win a medal in the same sport during the same Olympiad.

Although no longer racing professionally, Carpenter Phinney hosts summer cycling camps and is currently acting as the national spokesperson for the National Multiple Sclerosis Society, where she is active in promoting MS Bike-A-Thons. She is also writing a book with her husband.

The ride will be held on Saturday at the Lubbock Memorial Civic Center Exhibit Hall. The Adult Division, for riders ages 13 and up, will begin at 7:30 a.m. Riders may participate in 100-kilometer, 50-mile, 25-mile and 10 kilometer routes.

A new event this year is the For Kids Sake Division, which is open to riders ages three to 13. Participants may ride in 2.5-, 5- or 10-mile routes. Mass start for the For Kids' Sake division is 8:45 a.m., with a bicycle safety class beginning at 8 a.m. All participants are encouraged to wear helmets, and children under six must be accompanied by an adult.

All riders will receive complimentary breakfast, lunch and refreshments. Rest stops will be available every 10 miles for adult riders, and children will receive road assistance from the DeWitt P. Thompson Medical Explorer Post No. 911.

Registration for the event is \$15 for adults and \$7.50 for children. Those who register before Aug. 31 will receive a free Golden Cross T-shirt and water bottle.

Traffic Report

The odds are one in five that you will have a traffic accident this year. Are you a gambler? Do you feel these are good odds? For one out of twenty it will be a serious mishap and for one out of sixty it will be fatal. When there are things that can be done to improve these odds, this is a foolish gamble to take.

Good drivers stay aware of the risks and are willing to make responsible choices to protect themselves and others. For instance, in a 30 mph mishap a ten pound infant will hit the dash with a force of 300 pounds. The responsible decision is to use infant or child safety seats. This would improve the odds about 70%.

Alcohol is a factor in nearly 50% of the fatal accidents. The responsible decision, of course, would be not to drink and drive.

Speed is a contributing factor in 65% of our mishaps. The destruction power of your car doubles when you increase your speed from 20 to 28 mph. As speed increases, the need for accurate vision also increases. The driver actually sees less clearly and the field of vision is narrowed. Increased speed proves dangerous, not only because of the potential force of impact, but also because maneuvering to avoid a collision is more difficult. Then the responsible decision would be to adjust your speed to the conditions in which you are driving. Be willing to slow down. It could save your life. Keep an eye on the other driver, improve your odds. Don't be a gambler.

Poor Fishing Reported At White River

White River Marina assistant manager Tim Walker reported last week that fishing, especially black bass and crappie, had considerably slowed down this summer.

Walker said, "Despite usually normal conditions, the crappie, bass, and walleyes have dropped off some the last couple of months."

Lake conditions on White River Lake were reported as follows: Water temperature between 80-85 degrees, clear, and the water level down four feet from normal.

Crappie, although apparently not in abundance, were being caught in deep waters from 16-30 feet using small minnows.

Black bass were reported as fair early in the morning until 10 a.m. using top-water lures in the shallow area of the lake. Walker said that the bass seem to be moving to deeper waters in the afternoon to avoid the heat.

Walleyes, generally northern United States fish, were reported as very slow with the few that were snagged being caught in the east river channels using jigs and night crawlers.

Catfish were the only variety of fish in the lake that were being caught with regularity. Walker said the catfish is excellent this summer. Most were being caught on stinkbait, chicken liver, and night crawlers in an average of 30 feet of water, with each fish averaging four and a half pounds.

Although a seven pound black bass was caught four weeks ago, the large ones have been almost impossible to find and catch, Walker said.

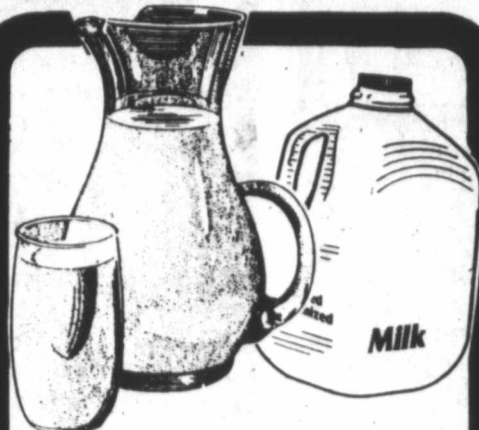

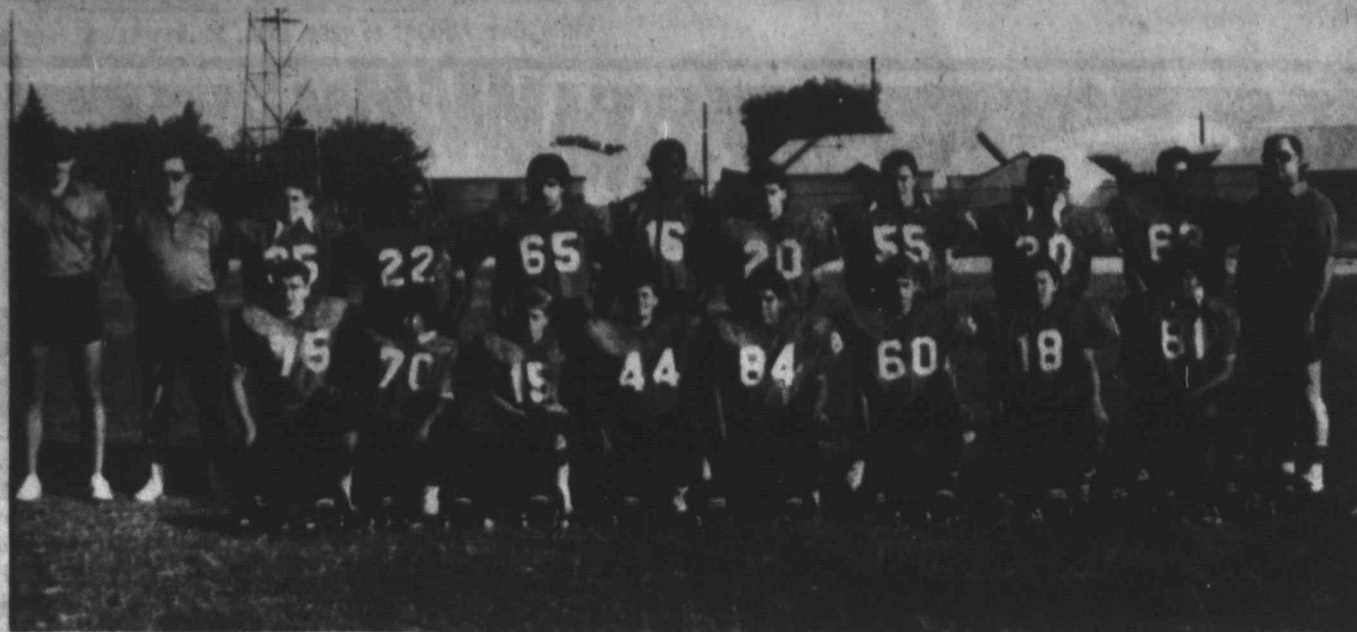

New Home Expects To Continue Winning

The New Home Leopards, under new head coach Dickie Turner, expect to continue their winning ways in six-man football this season, hoping for a repeat of last year's championship.

Turner says he doesn't plan to change the winning formula. "I just plan on continuing on the tradition these kids have started," Turner said. "I've watched every game they've played with the exception of one or two. We've got several that I think are exceptional athletes for a small school, and it's remarkable to have them all at the same time."

"Most of the kids have really good work ethics. A couple of them need improvement, but most of them try hard and give their best, and that's the most you can expect."

The Leopards, who were 10-0 during the regular season last year before dropping a 25-20 decision to Vernon Northside in bi-district, return seven regulars from that squad, including superlative running back-linebacker Darrell Paul.

Offensively, Paul finished as the seventh-leading scorer on the South Plains with 159 points on 23 touchdowns. Paul rushed for 755 yards and 19 touchdowns, and added 332 receiving yards for six more scores.

Paul is back, but Turner will have to find a replacement for Lloyd Caballero, who started for more than three seasons for the Leopards. The main candidates are senior Carey Rudd, who missed the entire 1987 campaign with a knee injury, junior Coby

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and a 90% 10-year survival rate.

A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, even before it can be felt.

The American Cancer Society has established guidelines for mammography in asymptomatic women. (Women who have no symptoms of disease). Those guidelines have been adopted by the American Academy of Family Physicians, American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, and The American College of Radiology. Those guidelines are:

- I. 35-40 years of age - One baseline mammogram.
- II. 40-50 years of age - A mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.
- III. 50 years of age and over - An annual physical examination and annual mammogram.
- IV. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.

V. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

Bilby is an experienced six-man coach, having coached Bryson in that game for five years. He also has coached at Mason, Somerville, Jacksboro and Petrolia.

"I really don't know very much about the team," said Bilby, who was hired in late July. "I do know we have four or five pretty good athletes. Just looking at last year's films, Ruben Garcia looks very good and Jeff Bednarz is probably the best all-around athlete we'll have. I understand Michael Guzman is a very fine player, also."

Bilby won district co-championships at Somerville in 1973 and Bryson in 1983.

"I know that traditionally Wilson has had a pretty strong program. I don't think dropping down to six-man will hurt us at all. I coached six-man five years at Bryson and I think the kids will adapt to it very well," Bilby said.

From a spectator standpoint, I think Wilson fans will see a

much more exciting game. You really don't do a whole lot of different things from 11-man football. The game just goes a little faster."

"I've had good success in increasing the numbers at whatever school I've coached," Bilby said. "I always wanted to coach in this part of Texas and I thought this would be a good opportunity."

"I'm really still trying to get my feet on the ground and I hope I can learn as fast as the players."
