Half-Day Kindergarten Option Has Local Parents Concerned

Kindergarten students met with Kindergarten teacher for four Superintendent Dr. Duane Carter Tuesday evening at the school cafeteria to hear options and express opinions on over-crowding in Kindergarten rooms here.

Sixty-four students attended Tahoka Kindergarten classes on the first day of school this year, just two under the limit of 22 children per teacher in the three K-classes here. By Sept. 18, that number had increased to 71, necessitating two classes of 23 students, and one class of 24. Dr. Carter said that according to Texas state law, that's too many students in all three classes. HB-72 mandates no more than 22 students per teacher in grades K-4th in Texas.

Tahoka school officials- have asked the state commissioner for a waiver allowing the semester to continue as it is now, but a change will have to be made by the spring school semester, according to Dr. Carter. School administrators are now considering ficials, he said, would ask

one of two options: (1) re- teachers which children would be structuring classes for half-day Parents of Tahoka sessions, or (2) hiring another full-day classes.

> Half-day K-sessions would allow about 12 students per teacher in each session, with one group attending in the mornings, from 8-11 a.m., and going to lunch from 11 to 11:30 a.m. Afternoon session students would begin with lunch from 11:30 to 12, and then attend classes from 12-3 p.m. The lunch session would not be mandatory for K-students. Any students who ride the school bus would be required to attend the morning sessions, and a special bus session at 11:30 would take children home. Students would remain with the same teacher they now have.

> With the other option, a new teacher would be sought to teach a fourth full-day K-session. About six students from each of the three present classes would be pulled from those classes and enrolled in the new class, according to Dr. Carter. School of-

best suited to adapt to this change, if it became necessary to add a new class.

"I will not recommend any type of program that I don't tihk is best for the kids," stressed Dr. Carter to a sizeable group of concerned parents. "We will work with the students and parents to try to make this change, whatever it may be, as smooth as possible for everyone," he added.

Working parents present at the meeting expressed concern with the half-day school session because of the interruption of their work schedules required to take and pick up children at school, and some expressed concern that some of the social interraction necessary for K-students would be cut out with the reduced schedule. Others asked whether special consideration would be given to those students diagnosed with learning disabilities, and Dr. Carter assured parents the school would work with parents to see that children requiring speech therapy or special education services would receive the added instruction.

Kindergarten teachers present at the meeting seemed to be in favor of either option, noting that "something needed to be done about the overcrowded classrooms."

Dr. Carter said he would present options to the school board and a decision would be made by the next regular session, which is

These children need to concentrate on social skills, communication skills, learning to listen ... we may need a stronger focus on these skills than reading and writing."

Also, "a full day of classes makes for a long day for 5-yearolds," the superintendent said.

A strong defensive effort held Class AAA Coahoma to 159 total yards, but Tahoka's dogs were unable to pull off a last minute victory losing 14-6 at home last Friday night. With the loss, Tahoka drops to a one win, one tie and one loss record on the

With no scoring in the first quarter, Coahoma got a safety with 2:54 left after a bad snap sailed over punter Mike Ramirez' head and the ball went out of

Tahoka's end zone. Coahoma took a 2-0 lead and the score stood 2-0 at halftime.

Coahoma increased their lead with 2:18 remaining in the third period on a 17-yard pass play from quarterback Ronnie Ruiz to David Molina. The PAT no made it 8-0 Coahoma.

Coahoma made it 14-0 with 11:10 remaining in the fourth quarter from the same combination of Molina and Ruiz on a seven yard pass play for TD. Tahoka got on the board with 7:10 remaining in the game on a one-yard run for TD by quarterback Ramiro Rodriguez. The PAT no good made it 14-6, Coahoma.

Offensively for Tahoka, Rodriguez had 10 rushes for 55 yards and one TD and was 6-16 passing for 58 yards. Charles Jurden had 12 carries for 42 yards and also had three receptions for 42 yards. Cory Mc-Cleskey ran the ball four times for 38 yards and Shannon Clift had three rushes for 23 yards.

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION **NOVEMBER 8, 1988**

PROPOSITION NO. 1

ON THE BALLOT Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment providing that when the federal government reimburses the state for expenditures of state funds dedicated to acquiring rights-of-way and for constructing, maintaining, and policing public roadways, such federal funds must also be used for those purposes

The proposed amendment will apear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment and/or clarification providing that federal reimbursement of state highway dedicated funds are themselves dedicated for the purpose of acquiring rights-of-way and constructing, maintaining, and policing public roadways.'

PROPOSITION NO. 2

ON THE BALLOT House Joint Resolution 2 proposes constitutional amendment to establish an economic stabilization fund in the state treasury. The fund would consist of one half of the unencumbered balance of general revenues at the end of a biennium and three fourths of the difference between the net oil and gas production taxes received in a fiscal year and the net oil and gas production taxes received in the 1987 fiscal year. During any fiscal biennium, the amount in the economic stabilization fund could not exceed 10% of the total deposited in general revenue in the preceding biennium.

The state comptroller and the state treasurer could decide to trans-

fer monies from the fund into the general revenue fund to alleviate a temporary cash shortage in general revenue. The legislature could make appropriations from the fund on approval by a three fifths vote of each house to make up the difference between anticipated general revenue and appropriations. On approval of two thirds of the members of each house of the legislature, the legislature could appropriate monies from the fund for any purpose.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment

establishing an economic stabilization fund in the state treasury to be used to offset unforeseen shortfalls in revenue."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 5 proposes a constitutional amendment that establishes the Texas growth fund. All investments of the Texas growth fund must be directly related to furthering economic growth and employment opportunities in Texas. At least 50 percent of the fund must be invested in equity and/or debt security for the initial construction, expansion, or modernization of business or industrial facilities in Texas. Not more than ten percent of the fund may be invested in venture capital investments. Of the funds available for venture capital investments, not more than 25 percent may be invested unilaterally, and the remaining investments must be matched at least equally by funds from other sources. The Texas

board of trustees consisting of four members appointed by the Governor and one member from and elected by the membership of each of the following: The Board of Regents of the University of Texas System; The Board of Regents of the Texas A&M System; The Board of Trustees of the Teacher's Retirement System of Texas: The Board of Trustees of the Employee's Retirement System of Texas; and the State Board of Education. The trustees may set the investment policy of the fund, enter into investment contracts, and take any action necessary for the creation, administration, and protection of the fund. The amendment authorizes the Board of Regents of the University of Texas System and the State Board of Education, in managing the permanent university fund and the permanent school fund, to acquire, exchange, sell, supervise, manage, or retain any kind of investment, including investments in the Texas growth fund. The fund will be phased out after the tenth anniversary of its creation, but the Legislature may create a second growth fund by a two thirds vote of each house.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

'The constitutional amendment to provide for the investment of the permanent university fund, the permanent school fund, and public employee retirement systems in the Texas growth fund created by the amendment, which will directly create, retain, and expand job opportunity and eco-nomic growth in Texas."

If you are among the numerous people who had a nice crop of winter weeds in your lawn last year, now is the time to begin preparations for control of these unwanted weeds.

Unwanted grasses are the most common winter weed problem occurring in area bermudagrass lawns, according to Dr. John Abernathy, weed and herbicide scientists and resident director of research at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station in Lubbock.

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Several pre-emergence herbicided are available to help control the weed problems. Abernathy says herbicides such as Surflan, Balan and Dacthal should be applied during the late fall or early spring before the weed seed can germinate. He réminds homeowners that these herbicides should be uniformly applied to the lawn and thoroughly watered into the sod.


"Surflan provides the best winter weeds control when it is applied to a healthy, well-covered bermudagrass lawn. This herbicide should last through the following summer," he says. If the bermudagrass has blank areas without grass runner cover. Abernathy says Surflan may inhibit runner growth.

Roundup is another herbicide which may be used to control winter weeds. Roundup should be applied postemergence to the weeds in late winter or early spring before the bermudagrass begins to turn green. If the bermudagrass has any green runners, Roundup can cause injury to them.

Other pre-emergence chemicases such as Atrazine and Simazine are labeled for use on bermudagrass in East and Central Texas. However, Abernathy advises against their use on the Texas High Plains. "Because of sandy soils with low organic matter and high pH values in this area, atrazine and simazine can cause serious injury to bermudagrass lawns," he notes.

Abernathy also remindshomeowners to exercise caution when using fertilizers that contain weed control materials. "It is very important to make accurate applications of the granular material since overlapping application area and high fertilizer application rates will result in grass," he explains.



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

When a plain, untrimn, cotton blouse or a polyester garments are labeled "dry-clean only." it seems to defy common sense. Most consumers are wellaware that these are washable items.

But there is a reason for this direction. Federal Trade Commission laws require that manufacturers provide care labels after testing which are procedures safe for the garment. But they only need to give one method, even if others are safe.

As a result, many manufacturers choose the safest method. which is usually drycleaning, to put on the clothing label. This protects them against complaints and legal claims.

So what's the consumer to do? To avoid large drycleaning bills. you have to use your judgment. If the item is expensive, take it to your drycleaner and ask for advice. The cleaner may want to try wetcleaning, depending on the garment and the type of soil
