Start early getting pledges. The proceeds go to the American Heart Assn.

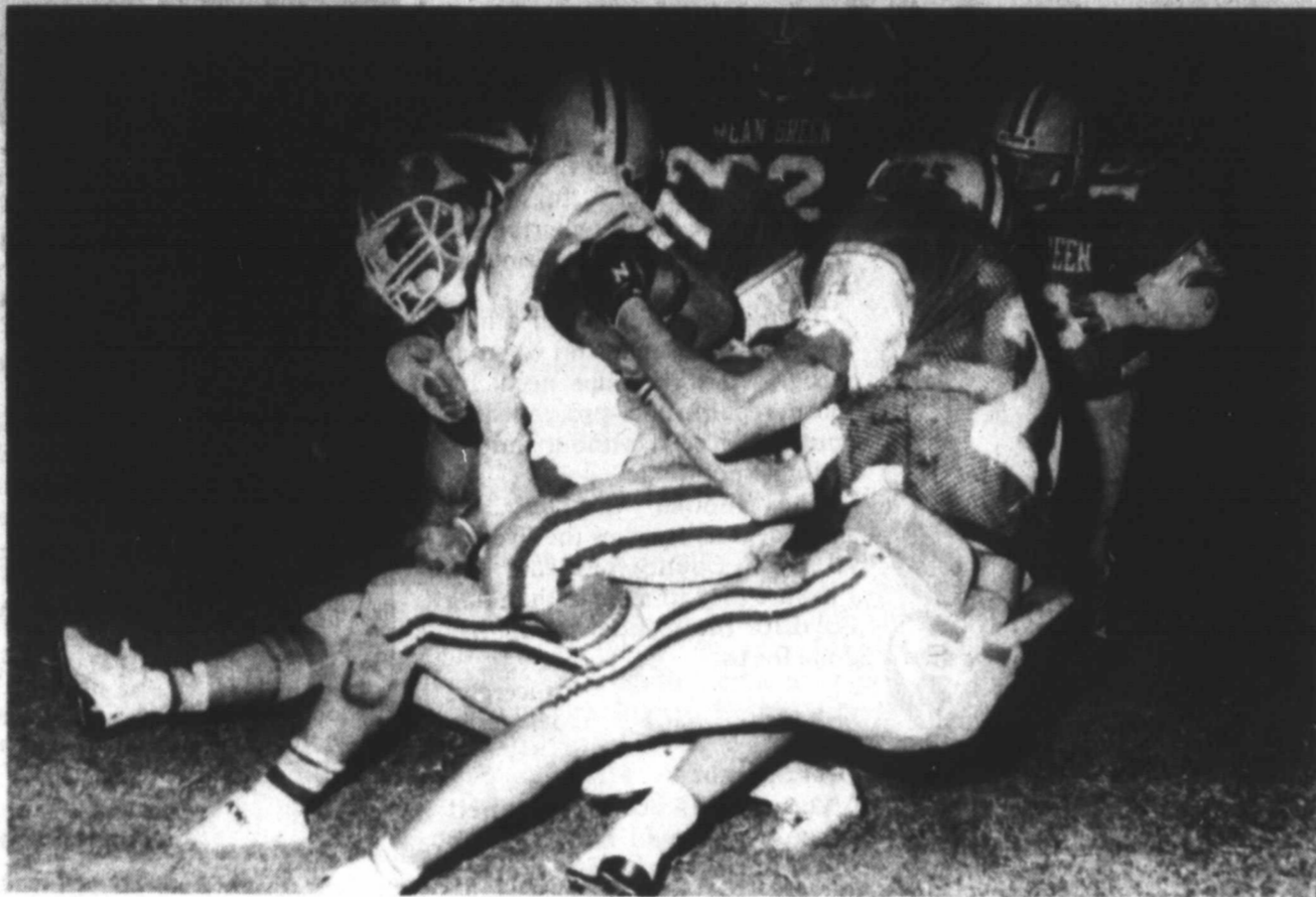
Christmas Cantata Practice Time Changed To 7:00

Bulldogs To Close Season With Eagles Here Friday

The Tahoka Bulldogs will host Seagraves in the final game of the season Friday with a chance to make this Tahoka's first winning season in seven years, thanks to a come-from-behind victory over the Lions at New Deal last week.

After a really sloppy first half which saw Tahoka turn over the ball to New Deal twice on interceptions, three times on

fumbles and two times on fourth down punt attempts which never got airborne, the Bulldogs came back strong in the last half to win the game 21-16.

The win gave Tahoka a 4-4-1 mark for the year, with no chance to make the playoffs, but with a chance to make it a winning year if they can beat Seagraves, a team rated about even with Tahoka. Tahoka's last winning season in football was 1981, when the Dogs were 8-3-0, winning district and losing to Floydada in bi-district. Since then, Tahoka has won just 8 games in the last six years before this season. The most they have won in a season was three, last year and the previous year, so the Bulldogs already have their best record since 1981.

Tahoka fumbled and stumbled in the first half at New Deal, a team they expected to beat handily. There was a bright spot in the first period, though, as running back Mike Ramirez broke loose from his own 5-yard line to go 75 yards to the New Deal 20. A fumble killed this threat, and the first period ended 0-0.

In the second, Tahoka mounted another drive which carried to the Lions' 24 before a fumble, and New Deal came back with a drive which carried to the Tahoka 20 before the defense, led by Michael Isbell and Gerald Antu, stopped them. New Deal's Barry Howell kicked a 39-yard field goal to give the Lions a 3-0 lead. Later in the period the Lions scored a touchdown and

extra point to lead 10-0 at halftime.

Tahoka came back smoking in the second half, with QB Ramiro Rodriguez hitting Thomas Glisson on a 62-yard pass play on Tahoka's first possession. Rodriguez kicked point and New Deal led 10-7 with 10:39 still left in the third.

Howell came back with a 3-yard scoring run for the Lions, however and missed the point to leave it 16-7, New Deal at the end of the third quarter.

Tahoka narrowed the gap early in the fourth as Shannon Clift dived in from the 4 and Rodriguez kicked to make it 16-14.

Tahoka then came back with a drive climaxed by a 1-yard touchdown run by Charles Jurden with 4:25 left in the game, and Rodriguez kicked to make it 21-16. New Deal came back with another good drive, but after a pass completion to the Tahoka 32, the receiver fumbled and Tahoka recovered with 2:30 left and then killed the clock.

Ramirez gained 127 yards in 12 carries and Jurden had 84 yards in 15 efforts. Clift gained 69 yards in 13 carries.

Voters To Settle Issues On Tuesday

Lynn County voters will have their say Tuesday on the bitter presidential election as well as other key races such as U.S. senator from Texas and state representative from this district.

Polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. and everyone in the county will cast ballots at the voting precincts listed on their registration cards.

Locally in addition to the presidential race between George Bush and Michael Dukakis, interest is high in the U.S. Senate race between Lloyd Bentsen, the incumbent who also is seeking the vice presidency, and Beau Boulter of Amarillo, Republican who has been a U.S. representative. There is also considerable interest in the race for state representative from this district (78), and possibly some confusion could result from there being a separate ballot on this race.

State Rep. Steve Carriker resigned his Dist. 78 seat, which was scheduled to expire Jan. 1, 1989, to take a state senate seat. Running for the post vacated by Carriker are Democrat David Counts of Knox City and Republican Rod Waller, formerly of Snyder, now living near Abilene. The two men are on the regular large ballot, which will determine who is elected for the two-year term starting Jan. 1. Another small ballot will be handed to voters for the election of one of the two men for the seven weeks remaining on the

unexpired term of Carriker in the office.

Although it is not likely, one of the two could be elected for the 7-week term ending Jan. 1 and the other for the regular term.

Democrats John Montford, Dist. 28 State Senator, and Charles Stenholm, U.S. representative for Dist. 17, have no Republican opponents on the general election ballot next Tuesday. Montford does have a Libertarian Party candidate opposing him on the ballot, E.A. Ad-dington.

Several county and district officials and new Democratic nominees have no opposition on the ballot, including Dist. Atty. Ricky Smith, County Atty. Jimmy Wright, Jack Miller for county sheriff, George McCracken for tax assessor, Gerald Gerner for commissioner of county precinct 1, and Bobby Cox for commissioner of precinct 3. Also, John Carl Armes is unopposed for justice of the peace of JP precinct 5, which is in the New Home area.

Also on the ballot are three proposed constitutional amendments. Proposition No. 1 would guarantee that highway funds are used for highways and not for other purposes. No. 2 would establish a fund in the state treasury to be used to "offset unforeseen shortfalls in revenue." No. 3 pertains to investing permanent school funds in a growth fund.

Five City Businesses Burglarized Tuesday

Tahoka police are currently investigating five burglaries reported to have occurred during the early morning hours on Tuesday at Higginbotham-Bartlett Lumber Co., Tahoka Auto, Energas Company office, Balloons and Flowers and Spruiell Automotive.

Higginbotham-Bartlett reported that entry was gained through a broken window on a bay door. Reported stolen was \$12 cash, one pry bar and one Hoover vacuum cleaner. Total losses were estimated at \$110.35. Spruiell Automotive reported a door knob was damaged and the pry bar from Higginbotham was found inside.

Entry was gained to Balloons and Flowers through a door between their business and Spruiell Automotive. Reported stolen was a cash register, three checks totaling \$49.57 and \$7 cash. The cash register was later found inside the Energas office, where one door

had been pried open and damaged, but nothing was reported missing.

Tahoka Auto also was reported burglarized as entry was gained through a back door that had been pried open. Reported stolen was \$150 cash from a cash register and a key to the soft drink machine was reported missing.

Crime Line, 998-5145, is offering a \$500 reward for information clearing the Tuesday morning burglaries.

Josephine Rangel of Tahoka reported to police on Monday that someone had stolen a license plate sticker from her 1976 Buick parked at Lynn County Hospital between 8 a.m. and 4 p.m. on Monday.

Police served a warrant on a Tahoka woman during the past week for writing a hot check.

Police investigated an accident on Saturday at Lockwood and Ave. J that involved a 1969 Oldsmobile driven by Charles Ray Jurden of Rt. 4 Tahoka and a 1977 Ford driven by Gilda Gandy Taylor of Rt. 4 Tahoka. No injuries were reported.

On Sunday at 1300 Ave. J an accident involved a 1983 Pontiac driven by Lana Jan Tekell of Rt. 5, Tahoka, and a 1980 Oldsmobile driven by Margaret H. McCullough of 2304 N. 4th of Tahoka. No injuries were reported.

Two persons were taken to Lynn County Jail during the week, one for theft by check and one for no drivers license, plus no liability insurance.

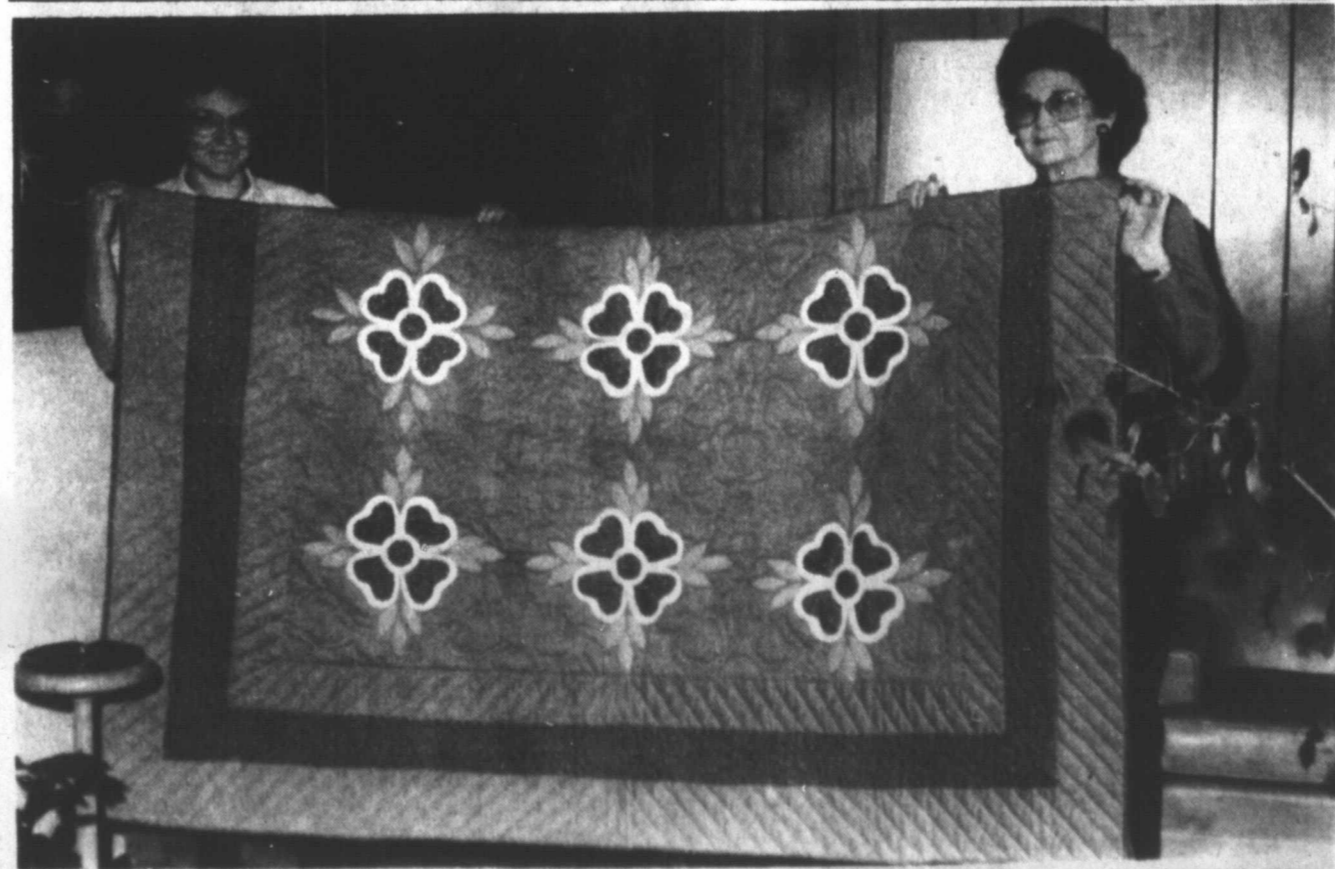

MEMORY PROBLEMS
Acetyl Choline is essential for many bodily functions, including memory functions of the brain. With age, the body tends to produce less acetyl choline, resulting in memory impairment. Drugs taken which interfere with the production make the memory recall worse. These include medications for insomnia, calming the nerves, reducing tremors, decreasing gastric acid - drugs which also produce dryness of the mouth. Therefore, older persons with memory problems should avoid, if possible, drugs that cause such dryness.

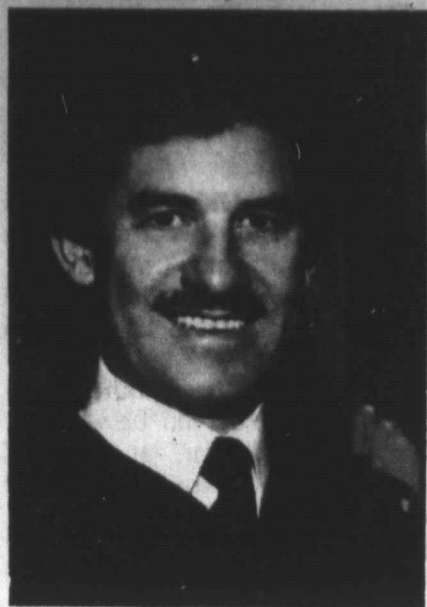

Texas A&M researchers develop software to teach speechreading

TEMPLE — An elderly man's fingers tap frantically across a computer keyboard and the look on his face can only mean one thing — he's winning.

But it's not a video computer game he's beating. He's conquering his loss of hearing with a computer program that teaches speechreading skills, more often called lipreading.

The system was designed for adults with acquired hearing loss, said Dr. Robert Dunlop, chief of audiology at Olin E. Teague Veterans' Center here and a member of Texas A&M University's medical faculty.

Using the laser videodisc technology, the system helps hearing-impaired individuals learn to speechread.

The researchers said the biggest advantage is economic. Patients don't have to pay a clinician to present them with hours of drill and practice. Audiologists can help more patients with the aid of the computer and also have more time available for counseling, testing or hearing aid orientation.

1990 Deadline For Farmers Is Approaching

With the Jan. 1, 1990 deadline approaching rapidly, time is running out for farmers who produce crops on highly erodible cropland. The conservation compliance provision of the Food Security Act of 1985 discourages the production of crops on highly erodible cropland which is not carefully protected from erosion. If a farmer produces crops on such fields without an approved conservation system, he may lose eligibility for certain USDA program benefits. USDA programs affected include the following:

- Price and income supports
- Crop insurance
- Farmers Home Administration loans
- Commodity Credit Corporation storage payments
- Farm storage facility loans
- Conservation Reserve Program annual payments
- Other programs under which USDA makes commodity-related payments

To remain eligible for these USDA program benefits, farmers

must develop and be actively applying a locally approved conservation plan for those highly erodible fields by the Jan. 1, 1990 deadline. The plan must be fully implemented by Jan. 1, 1995.

Local farmers can obtain more specific information by visiting the local Soil Conservation Service (SCS) office located at 1647 Ave. J, in Tahoka. There, SCS employees can help farmers determine whether a field is classified as erodible and help them develop a conservation plan for their farms if one is desired.

With a little over a year left before the Jan. 1, 1990 deadline, there are more than 400 farm numbers which still do not have a conservation plan. Farmers who have not done so already, are encouraged to call (998-4622) or come by the local SCS office to make an appointment, to have an erodibility determination made on their farms. An appointment may also be scheduled for a field visit and development of a conservation plan.

Prussic Acid Poisoning In Livestock

Frost will be hitting Lynn County before long and this could lead to prussic acid poisoning in livestock grazing certain pasture grasses and forage. Although many plants contain the toxic material that causes poisoning, those causing the highest mortality in livestock when grazing after they have been frozen and wilted are Johnson and Sudan grasses and sorghum or hybrids of these says Brett Cypert, County Extension Agent.

The most dangerous time as far as the grazing of the plants is concerned is following frost when the plant material begins to wilt. Livestock should not be allowed access to the wilted material until it has dried completely. This usually takes three or four days of good sunlight. New plant growth usually becomes non-

toxic and can be grazed within 10 days to two weeks following a rain.

As far as prussic acid poisoning is concerned, the poison acts rapidly and can kill animals within minutes. In most acute cases, animals become affected within 10-15 minutes after eating toxic material and can die in two to three minutes. Symptoms may include a brief period of stimulation followed by depression and paralysis. Signs of colic may be present. Stupor, difficult breathing and frequent convulsions may result. To prevent prussic acid poisoning in livestock, Cypert outlines these steps:

1. Allow plant material affected by frost to dry thoroughly before grazing. This may require a week or more of good sunlight.
 2. Feed animals hay or a supplemental before turning them in on plants that may contain prussic acid. Animals that are not hungry will not be affected as seriously by toxic material since their intake will be limited.
 3. Remove all animals from the pasture if one in the herd shows any signs of poisoning.
 4. Call a veterinarian immediately if an animal appears to be poisoned. An antidote to treat affected animals is highly efficient if given early. This product is available from veterinarians.
 5. Have suspect plants checked by the Texas Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Lab at College Station and Amarillo or labs in Lubbock.
- The overall key to prevent prussic acid poisoning is to keep cattle from grazing such plants.

Texas A&M researchers develop new method to administer insulin

COLLEGE STATION — Many diabetics who inject themselves daily with insulin may be able someday to replace their needles and syringes with eyedroppers, scientists say.

Pharmacologists at Texas A&M University's College of Medicine are testing eye drops that they believe will provide insulin-dependent diabetics a convenient, painless and effective alternative to daily injections.

The eye drops carry a solution of insulin that allows the drop to be absorbed through the eyes rather than injected. Tests with laboratory animals indicate the drops get the essential hormone into the blood stream as effectively as conventional injections, says Texas A&M pharmacologist Dr. George C.Y. Chiou, head of the research group that developed the drops and director of Texas A&M's Institute of Ocular Pharmacology.

Chiou says test results have been "very promising" so far, but he cautions that further tests must be completed before the new treatment can be approved by the federal Food and Drug Administration, a process that usually takes several years.

"The main advantage is that it appears to be painless and it's very convenient," he said. Chiou says he expects the insulin eye drops will be administered with conventional eye droppers, much like drops commonly used to relieve eye irritations.

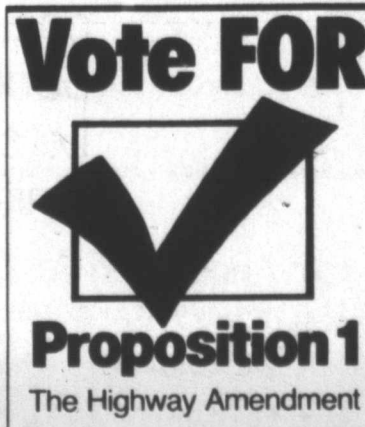

**Rance House Subject
Of Business Feature**

Rance House, a Tahoka High School graduate and son of Mr. and Mrs. J.D. House of Tahoka, was the subject of an article in Tarrant Business, a supplement of the Fort Worth Star-Telegram, in mid-October.

The article, accompanied by a color photograph of House, tells how he has resisted an ailment which afflicts many salesmen who dread facing the telephone after a major market disaster such as occurred in October 1987.

Many salespersons fear "cold-calling" after a market crash, but the article says House has no fears and actually enjoys cold-calling, which is defined as phoning prospective clients who are complete strangers to the broker, in the teeth of a bear market.

In part, the article says of House, who started as a broker at Rotan Mosle in May of this year, seven months after the 1987 wipeout:

A native of Tahoka, House graduated from Texas Tech in 1985 and pointed himself toward a career in brokerage. The selling part of brokerage holds no ter-

rors for House. He sold concert and game tickets at college, and also worked as an intern for E.F. Hutton in Lubbock. It was there that he made his first cold-call.

"I discovered that I liked to sell," he said. "I think I'm good at it."

Few brokerages, however, hire people right out of school. House thus sharpened his selling skills at Scarborough's Department Store in Austin and Cambridge Clothier in Fort Worth, where he moved in February.

The crash occurred while House was plotting his move to Fort Worth and, he hoped, a stock brokerage position. House was briefly daunted, but plugged ahead.

House renewed his enthusiasm for the stock markets and the telephone and by May had signed on at Rotan Mosle. He was enrolled in the company's training program in San Francisco, something akin to boot camp for aspiring brokers.

"We have cold-calling seminars," he said. "A student does cold-calling into a speaker

phone, so the prospect is a hear. Usually the prospect is a trainer." After receiving his license and returning to the Rotan Mosle office to officially begin work on Sept. 1, House has settled into a routine that now includes an average of 200 calls per day to prospect for business.

Mike Williams, the Fort Worth office manager, says that House "is doing the kind of things that will lead to success."

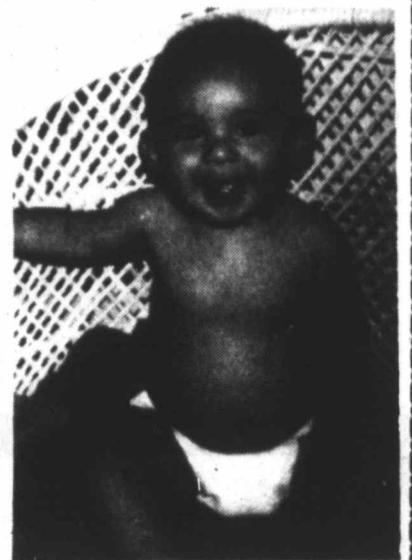

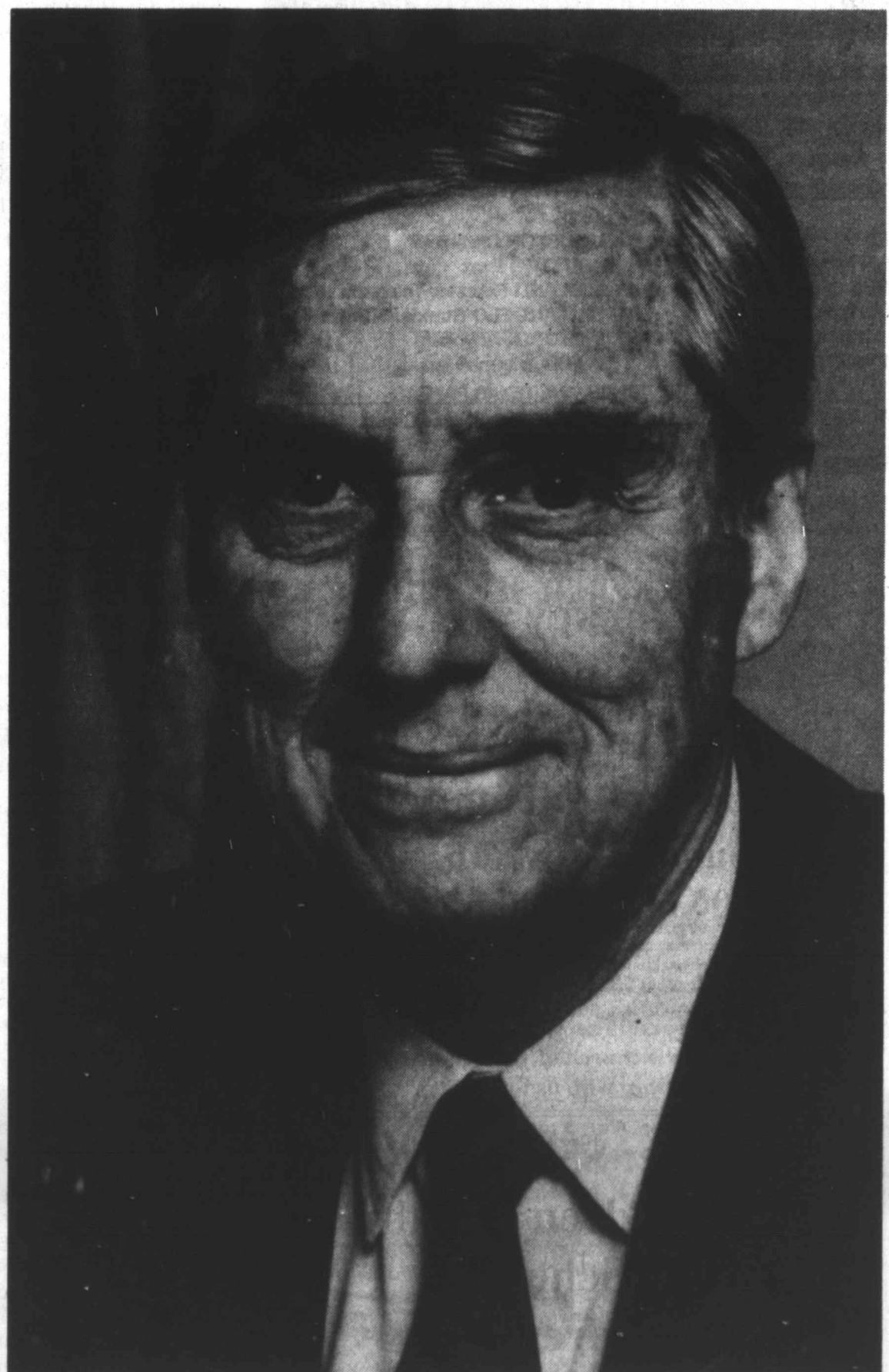

Managing Credit Card Debt

"Just charge it" has become the operative phrase for consumers as they charge their way into making national consumer debt a multi-billion dollar boom. Consumers are bombarded through the mail with applications for all types of charge cards promising automatic approval, low financing, no fees and almost every imaginable perk. Competition is tough and creditors are fighting over consumers.

According to the Federal Reserve Board, outstanding revolving consumer credit totaled \$165.7 billion in March 1988. Americans are charging past their limits and finding themselves deep in credit card debt. Here are few strategies that may help you curb your spending limits and pull yourself out of debt:

1) List your credit cards and the amount of outstanding credit

for each account.

2) If one of the accounts charges higher interest than the others, consider paying that debt off first. If all your creditors charge the same interest rates, pay off the smallest debt first, in full, along with the minimum balance on your other accounts. Reward yourself for one less bill next month!

3) Pay off the smallest remaining bill the next month. If you can't afford to do this, try to increase your monthly payment. This way you'll speed up the process of eliminating your debt.

4) Keep the process going, when you pay off one debt pay as much as you can on the next smallest.

If you're so deep in credit-card debt that there is no possible way to meet your monthly payments, write to your creditors. Request a monthly payments, scheduled that you can afford. Let them know if there is a specific reason for your debts such as illness or recent unemployment.

If you cannot manage monthly payments at all, consider con-

solidating your debt into a single loan. A bank or credit union will most likely offer more reasonable interest rates than your creditors. To prevent further temptations, consider cutting up your credit cards and closing your accounts.

Once you get out of debt don't spend past your personal budget limits. Know how much your credit cards are costing you in yearly fees and interest rates. Use your credit cards for convenience, not as a way of financing purchases.

Only through sitting down and establishing a personal budget can you calculate what you can afford. A personal financial planner can help you set-up a personalized budget and get you on the right track to managing your finances more wisely.

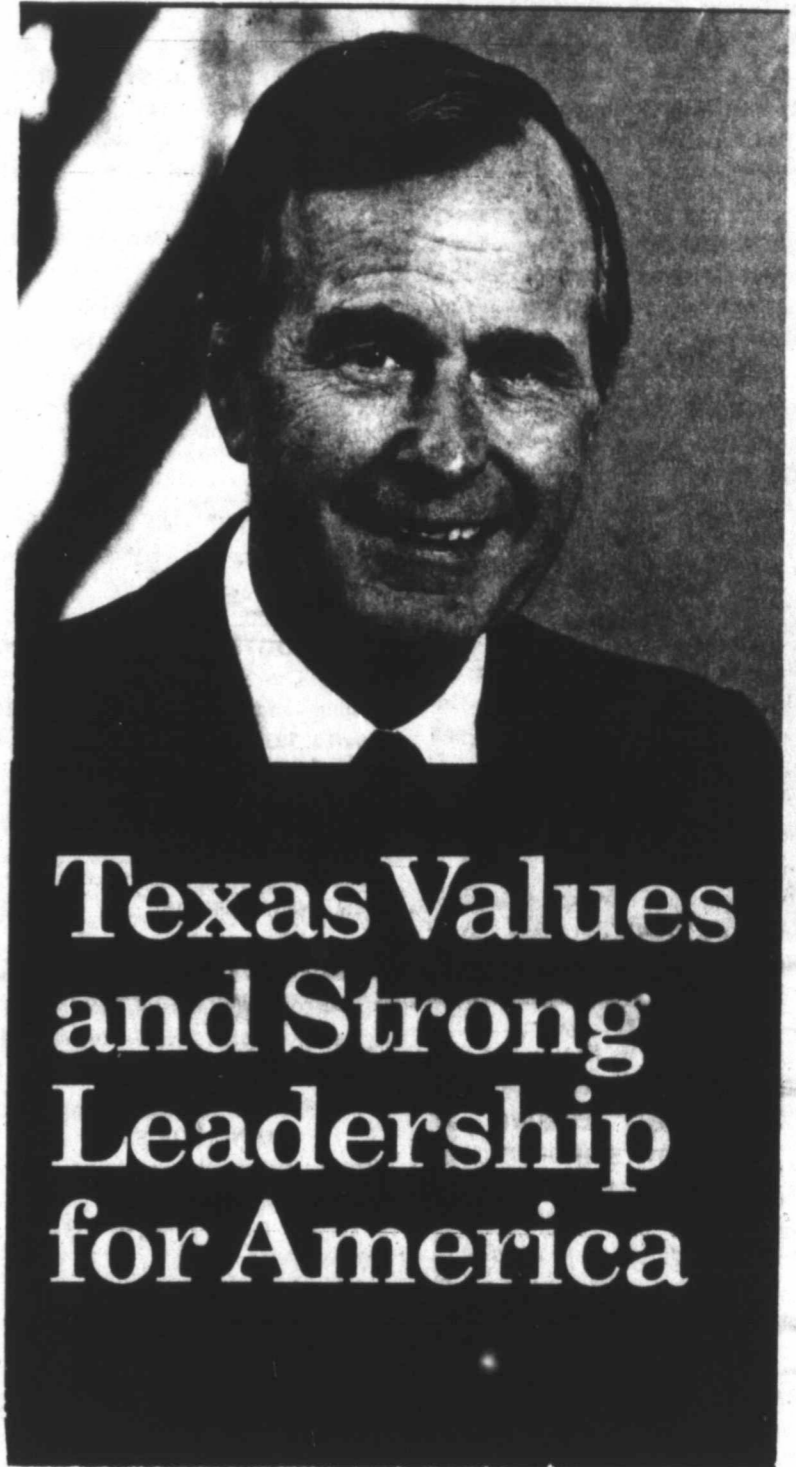
Texas A&M researcher says headache relief may be all in the head

COLLEGE STATION — New research suggests that some relief for your migraine and tension headaches may be in your head because patients can learn skills to change headache-related stresses.

Non-medication treatments such as "Progressive Relaxation Training" combined with thermal-biofeedback and treatment with the standard preventive medication Ergotamine proved equally effective in controlling recurrent vascular headaches, says Texas A&M University psychologist Dr. Karl Hursey.

Relaxation and thermal-biofeedback treatment involves a combination procedure of relaxing muscle groups in the body and relaxing blood vessels, thereby controlling the activation of tension in the body, Hursey explained. Successful manipulation of the blood vessels is evident by the warming of the hands.

"What I'm promoting is an alternative to treating headaches with pain killers and medications used to prevent headaches," said Hursey. "Some people find that their medication loses its effectiveness over a period of time or that continual use of that medication provides too many side effects."
