NEWSWEEK is a magazine which I see on occasion, although I almost always vow I won't waste my time reading it again. Petty was an artist whose drawings were considered super-sexy in

After reading some of the articles in the current Esquire, (still a magazine for men, I guess, although it no longer says that on the cover), I couldn't decide if it was a good publication or not. Some of the stuff was interesting, but mostly the articles seem aimed toward what are called Yuppies (which somehow stands for young executive types with lots of money and time to spend it). After all, I am no Yuppie; I'm more of a Ogsstmp (Older guys still struggling to make payments).

Still, Esquire is more interesting than Newsweek. And Esquire has some really good photography in it. And some expensive ads. 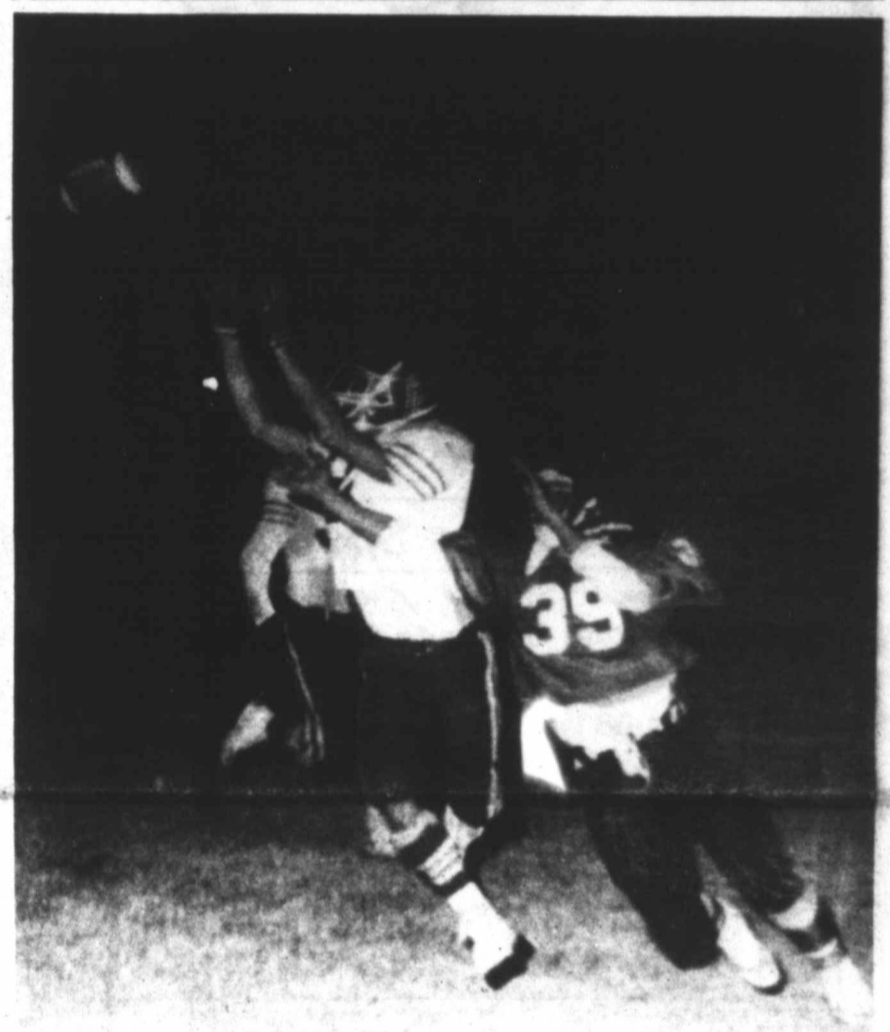

Leopards To Play In Quarterfinals

The New Home Leopards played tough defense and showed enough offense to get the job done last Friday night at Smyer as they walloped Silverton 36-12 in the area round of the state football playoffs for six-man teams.

Now 11-0 for the season, New Home will take on Fort Hancock at 7 p.m. Saturday at Wink in the state quarterfinals. Fort Hancock is 12-0 for the year and mashed Trent 59-14 last Saturday.

In the first half last week, according to a story by Charles Ehrenfeld of the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal, New Home's defense held Silverton to just three first downs and 73 total yards.

The Leopards scored on their possession as Darrell Paul raced 45 yards to a touchdown and Coby James kicked the 2-point conversion. New Home went up 16-0 early in the second quarter as James hit Gaylon Paul on a 55-yard scoring play and then kicked again.

Silverton scored just before the half with Denny Hill going in from the three.

Darrell Paul scored on a 6-yard run in the third and then Gaylon Paul recovered a fumble in the end zone, a strange play which saw a Silverton player intercept a New Home pass in the end zone, start to run out and then was hit by one of his own players and fumbled, resulting in a Leopard touchdown.

Scott Fillingim scored New Home's last TD on a 17-yard run

in the fourth quarter.

"Our defense shut down their offense," said Coach' Dickie Turner. "Our blocking up front gave our runningbacks places to run...It made it an easy game to coach."

Darrell Paul gained 141 yards on 22 carries and Fillingim had 54 yards in nine carries.

New Guidelines Set For Take-Out Meals For Senior Citizens

Due to new guidelines for "take-out meals" set up by the Texas Department on Aging, several changes have been made. You may only take out a meal for a home-bound person if they are unable to prepare the meal or themselves and unable to come to the Senior Center. If the person cannot be left unattended for a long length of time, the spouse may also get himself a meal.

Due to new rules, meals may not be taken out for any other reasons. To qualify for home delivery, you must be unable to prepare your meal because of severe health problems and do not have anyone who can pick up the meal for you.

A need assessment will be done on the take-out and home-delivered meals periodically.

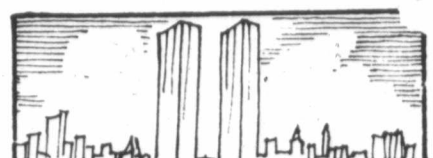

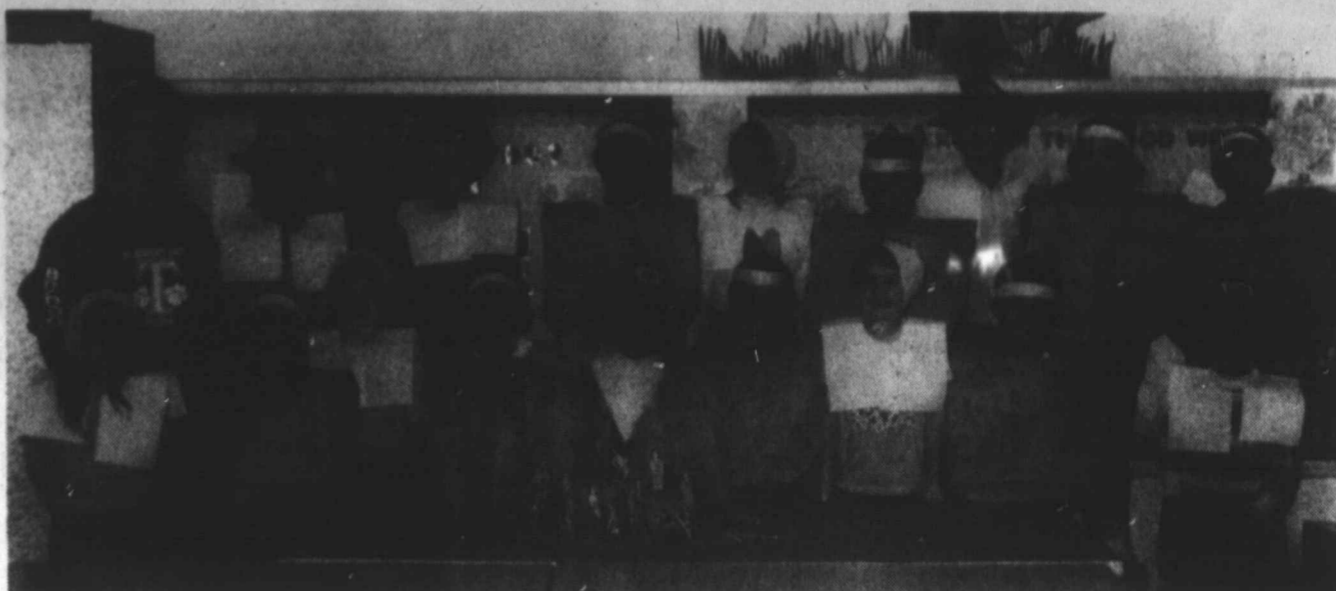

Pecan growers from Dawson County and any adjacent county should save the best nuts from this year's crop for the show. Any grower in the area may enter a sample of 42 nuts from each variety he grows. Growers may enter only one county contest.

Nuts should be selected that are free of insect and disease damage. They should be uniform in size and shell color. Nuts should be cleaned but not altered in shape or color. Any alteration of pecans by marketing, filing or excessive polishing will be disqualify the entry.

Pecan entries must be from this year's crop and must have been raised in Dawson County or any of the adjacent counties. Competition will be divided into three categories: Inshell variety, Native and Shelling variety.

Entries in the pecan show should be delivered to the TU Electric Reddy Room on Thursday, Dec. 1, between 11:30 a.m. and 5:30 p.m. The pecans should be in a paper sack with the name of the grower, the address, telephone numbers and the pecan variety, if known. Anyone that

does not know the variety of his or her pecans is still urged to enter, since variety can be determined by this year's judge, Earnest Kiker, CEA-AG, from Midland.

The food show is divided into six divisions: appetizers and snack, breads, pies, cakes, cookies, and candies. Pecans used in the foods can be from a variety of sources, since they are not required to be home grown. Entries in the food show will also be taken to the TU Electric building, from 8 a.m. to 9:30 a.m. on Friday, Dec. 2.

Plaques will be awarded to the champions of the pecan show and the food show. Ribbons will be awarded for first, second and third places.

Judging in both contests will take place from 9:30 a.m. to noon on Friday, Dec. 2, with all entries on view for the general public from 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. that day.

Less Fat In Thanksgiving Turkey
A beautiful golden roasted turkey is the centerpiece for the traditional Thanksgiving turkey. And even if you're counting calories, it's hard to pass up that succulent meat and the gravy that goes with it.
The good news is that turkey

itself is low in total fat and in saturated fat, the kind that adds cholesterol to our diets. A 3 oz. serving of roasted dark meat has 175 calories, 7 grams of fat and 2.1 grams of saturated fat. The light meat contains 150 calories, 3 grams fat and .9 grams saturated fat. So if you're trying to cut calories and saturated fat, eat the white meat.

The most effective means of cutting down excess fat is the remove and discard the turkey skin and any other visible fat.

But about the gravy? If you plan on having some, try one or more of these methods for reducing the fat content:

- * Using a bulb baster, metal skimmer or long-handled spoon, skim fat from the gravy as it cook.
- * Float a paper towel on top of the gravy to absorb fat.
- * Allow time to refrigerate the gravy. Then remove the congealed fat from the top.
- * If you use canned stock or broth in the gravy, refrigerate the can. When you open it, the fat will be floating on top so you can skim it off.

College students interested in a summer internship in Congressman Charles Stenholm's office and high school sophomores longing to serve as Congressional Pages next school year should apply now for those positions through Congressman Stenholm's Abilene office.

Applications are currently available. Because of the time involved in filling out the forms and gathering recommendations, now is the time to begin work on the applications, said Elaine Talley of Congressman Stenholm's Abilene office. The deadline for completed applications for either program is Jan. 17, 1989. Winners will be named on March 18, 1989 after personal interviews of finalists by a Selection Committee.

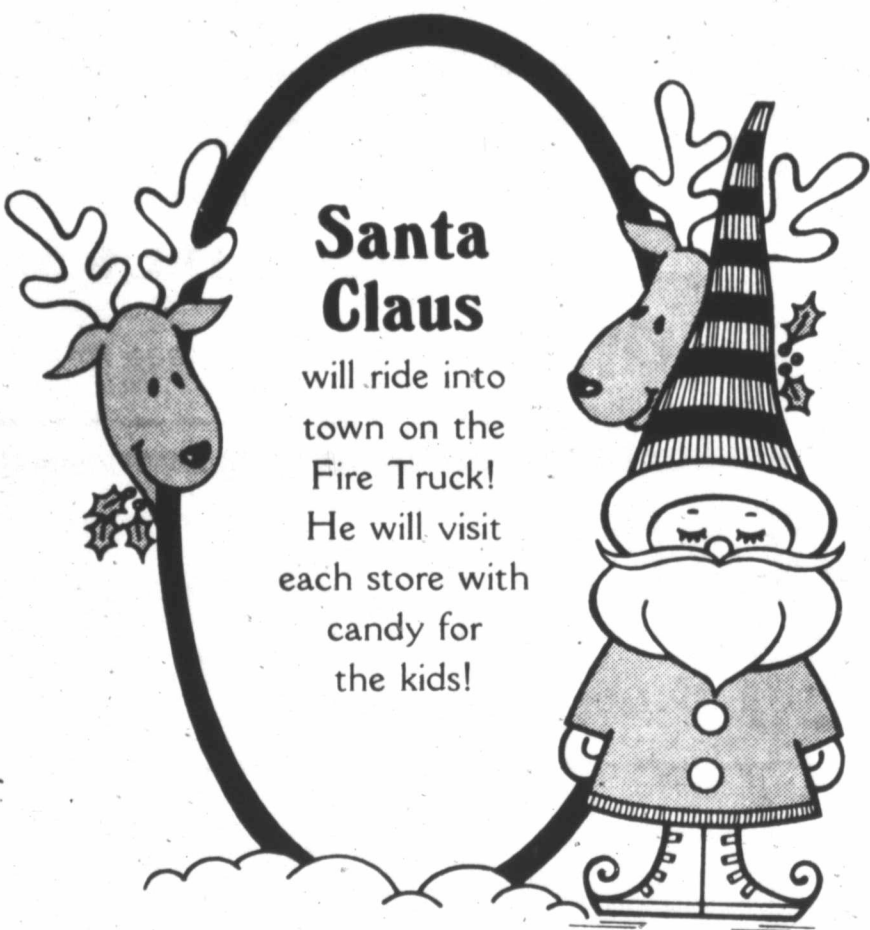
To be eligible for the summer internship program, you must be a college student from the 17th Congressional District, or teach at any level, or be a resident of the district between the age of 19 and 25 and have a demonstrated background in government. Interns are paid a one-month stipend, which helps cover basic living expenses. Four interns work in Congressman Stenholm's D.C. office, two each in June and July. They attend committee meetings, floor debates and a speaker's series as well as assist in the day-to-day operation of Congressman Stenholm's office.

The opportunity for the Congressman Page program is for current high school sophomores in the 17th District who will be juniors in September, 1989 and who have "B" averages in four major courses, excluding electives. Pages perform a variety of duties including delivery of correspondence and packages to Congressional offices, answering phones in the Members' Cloakrooms and running errands in the House Chamber.

Pages attend the U.S. Capitol Page School, which is located in the Library of Congress. A junior year curriculum is offered and students must maintain at least a "B" average while serving. Dormitories are located in the House Office Building Annex #1. Pages are supervised while in their quarters, which are also guarded by the Capitol Police, who are on duty 24 hours a day. Congressman Stenholm is not the page's employer, nor will he have daily contact with the page. Pages answer directly to the Director of Page Services.
