

Cage Teams To Start Second Half

Tahoka's basketball teams will begin the second half of district play Friday night in the Tahoka High School gym. All four teams will face the Idalou Wildcats with the junior varsity girls starting play at 4 p.m. The junior varsity boys will follow, and the evening will feature the varsity teams.

The first half of district play ended Tuesday, Jan. 17, in games here against Morton.

Varsity Boys vs. New Deal

Tahoka had waited a year to get revenge on the New Deal Lions, Friday, Jan. 6. Playing in front of a home crowd, the Bulldogs drummed New Deal 95-56.

"The Bulldogs were a little slow getting rolling," said Coach Charles Jurden. However, the Bulldogs were on a roll as junior Charles Jurden played his best game of the season.

Leading scorer was senior Chuck Cate who sunk 25. Senior T.C. Spruiell scored 20.

Senior Mark Vega was the most improved player of the New Deal game, according to Coach Jurden.

Varsity Boys vs. Seagraves

In spite of the brilliant playing of Thomas Glisson, the Bulldogs were edged out of a victory by the Seagraves Eagles here Tuesday, Jan. 10. Seagraves edged the Bulldogs 78-71. Glisson kept Tahoka leading by a small margin as he sunk three 3-point shots and wound up with 17 total points for the game.

Cate, usually a top scoring threat, who has been averaging 20 points per game, was held to 11 points as he fouled out in the second quarter.

Spruiell hit 22 points to take high

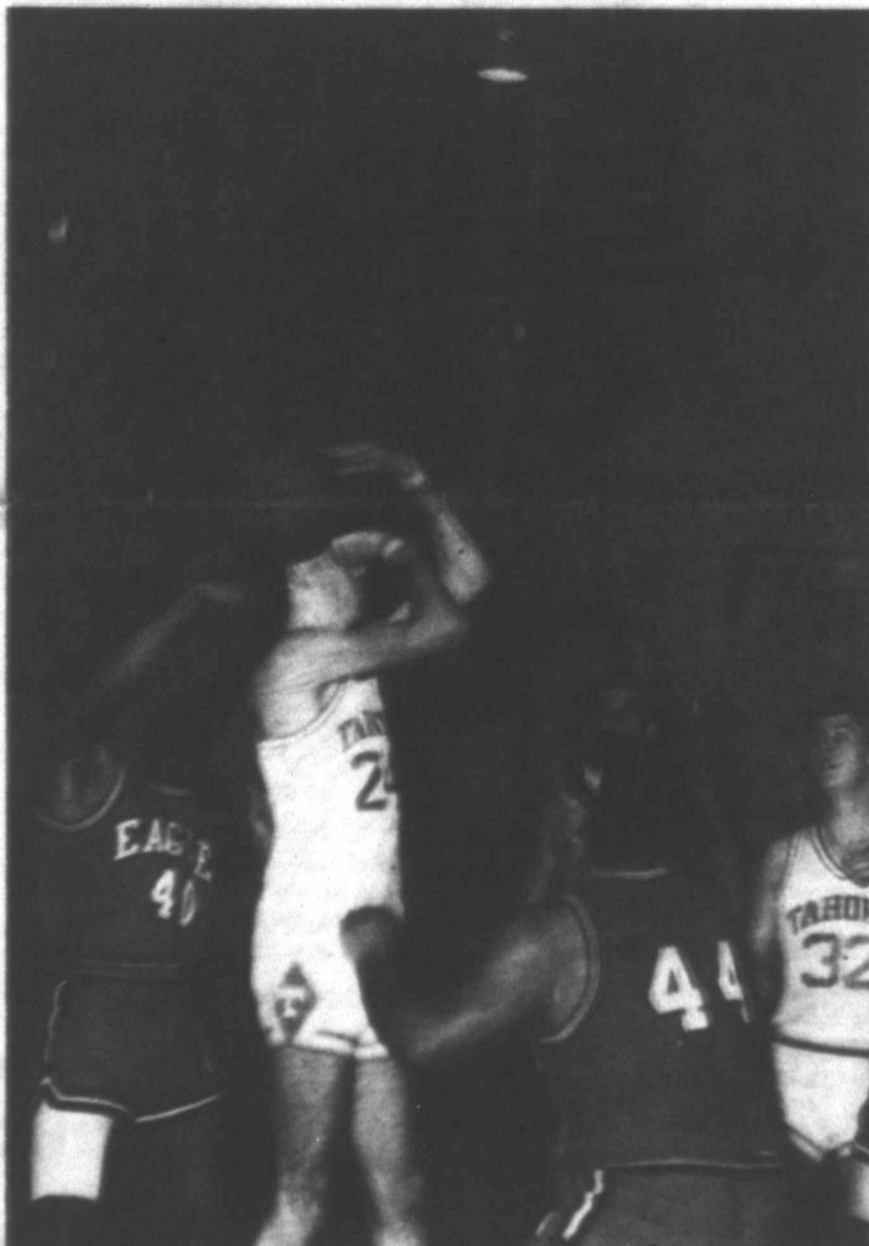
scoring honors. Ramiro Rodriguez scored 9.

Tahoka School Extends Contract Of Dr. Carter

The contract of Dr. Duane Carter, superintendent of Tahoka Schools, was renewed for a period of two years on a unanimous vote of the Tahoka school board last Thursday night.

The new action extends his contract two years from July 1, 1989, with a four percent increase in salary. Dr. Carter was hired in 1987 at a salary of \$42,000 per year. A four percent increase from that figure would be \$43,680 per year.

With some parents present to discuss with the board the school's policy on possession or use of tobacco products on school property, the board discussed the policy at length, but took no action to change it.

Dr. Carter reported to the board on administrative changes made in the manner in which dog handlers would

conduct surveillance of the school parking lot, adding that when the drug-dog alerts to a vehicle, no entry will be made "until the student/parent is present," and said "changes will be made to better document the manner in which parents are notified of student problems."

A drawing of a proposed addition to the Tubb and Gardner elementary buildings was presented and the board voted 6-1 to proceed with plans and start bidding procedure for construction.

A list of seven or more substitute teachers was adopted.

Board President Joe Hays presided. All other board members were present, including Thalia Burks, Billy Davis, Mike Huifaker, Richard Lopez, Delbert McCleskey and Nedra Young.

DOS is a word used when you need help. ("Hey, Joe, hand me DOS manuals over there.")

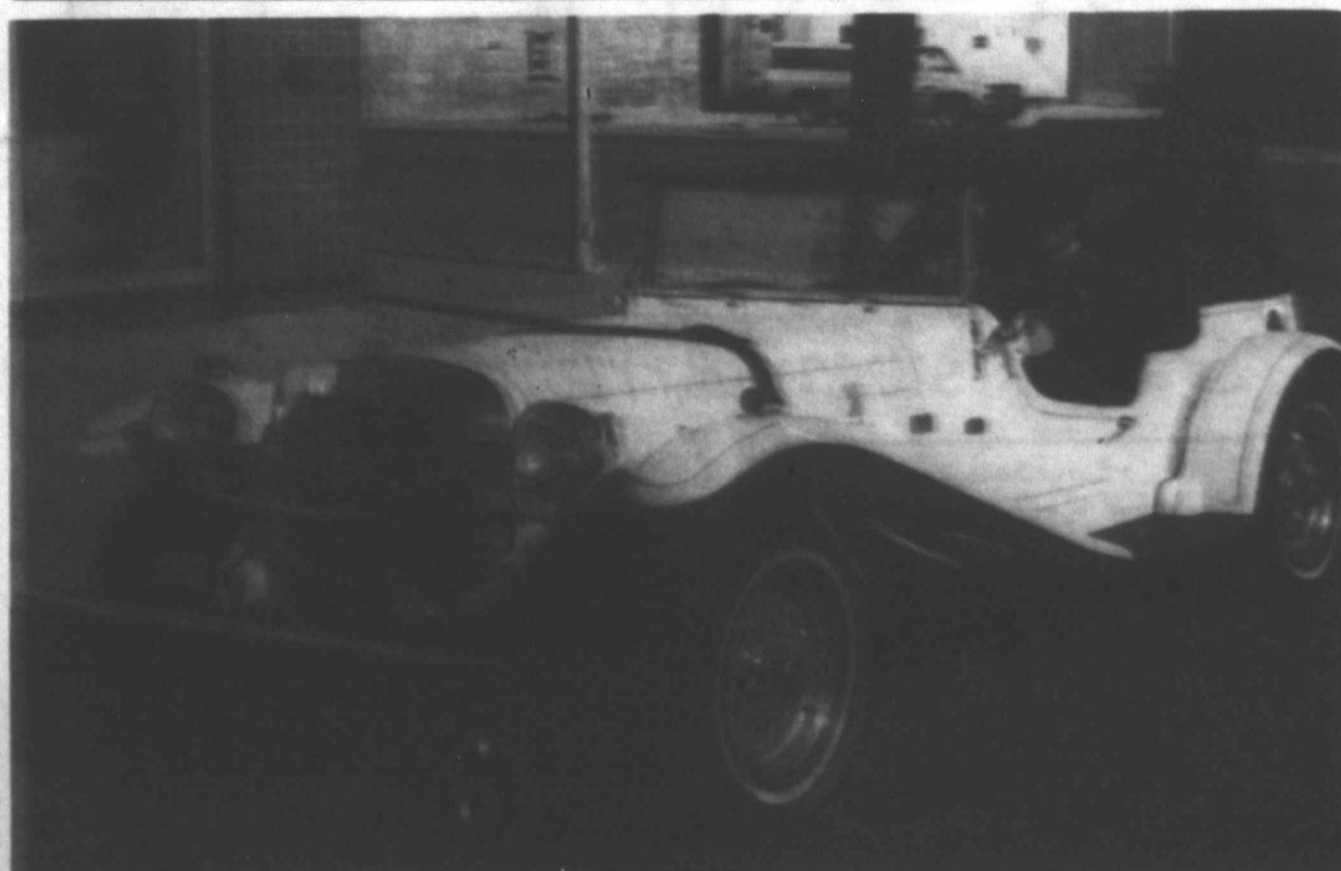
ICON is a phrase which you are supposed to repeat aloud frequently to build your confidence, like "I know ICON do this, ICON, ICON, ICON!"

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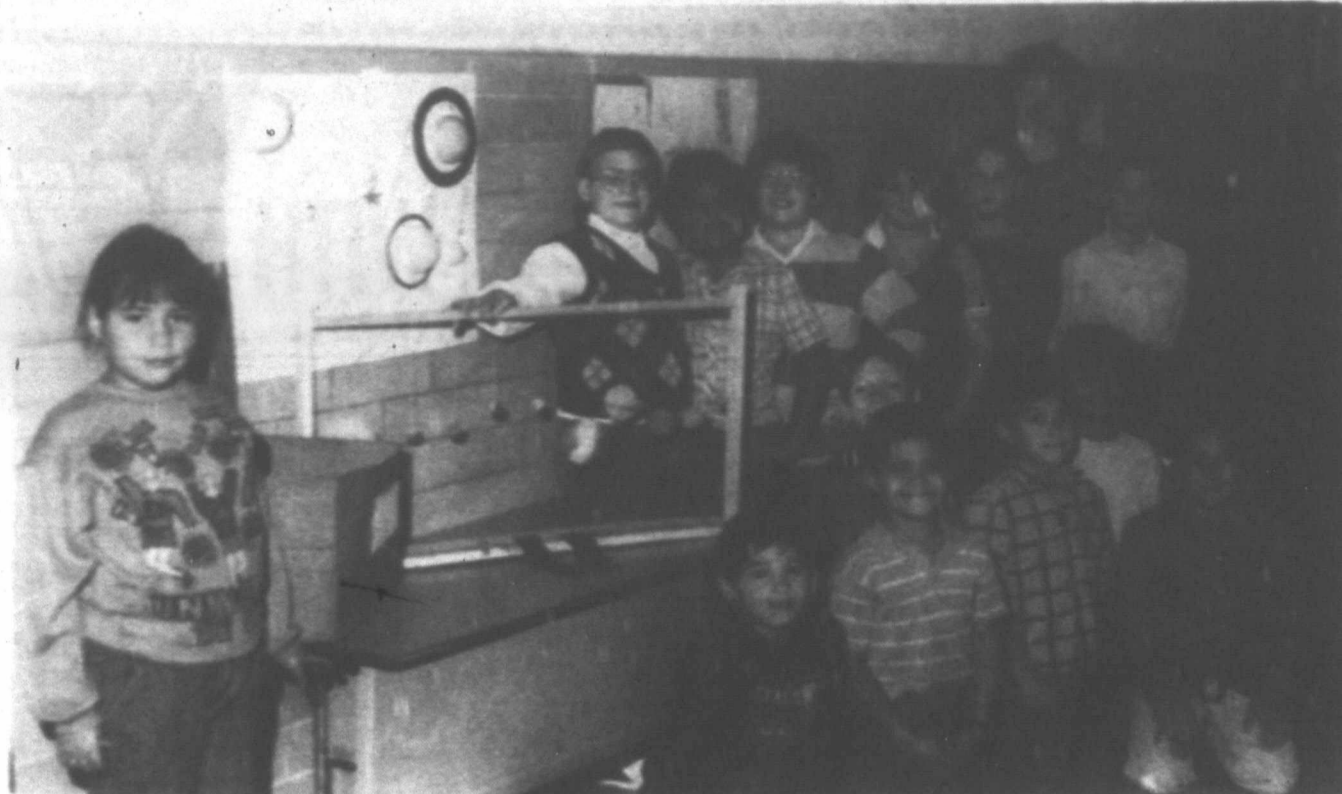
Hooray for our TEACHERS

Try Strategies For Saving

If you're like most Americans, your savings probably look pretty slim. In fact, American households saved only 3.9 percent of their disposable income in 1987—the worst for personal savings since World War II.

Saving—like spending—can be habit-forming. So now may be a good time to get back in the saving habit.

Having adequate savings means you can dip into these funds for emergencies or big-ticket purchases rather than run up large credit card bills or installment payments. That's especially important now that there are fewer tax advantages to borrowing.

One method is to get money directly from your paycheck to your savings. Your employer may have a program that allows you to have a payroll deduction made directly into a savings account. Without having the money in hand, you will be less likely to spend it.

paying a regular bill. By doing this regularly, they will always have set-aside savings.

Or try taking the balance in your checking account at the end of each pay period and transferring it to savings when you deposit a new paycheck.

It may take some creativity and discipline to save from daily living expenses, but it can be done. Consider never spending the change you receive from purchases and putting it into savings.

If you buy something on sale, "pay" the difference between the sale price and regular price to your savings account. Or try saving the money you receive from coupon refunds. There are probably hundreds of small ways to save that add up to lots of dollars over time.
