Gin Offices Hit By Burglars

Two gin offices in Lynn County were burglarized and a Wilson man reported his barn burglarized during the last week. About \$145 in cash was stolen from the office of West Point Gin, 15

miles west of Tahoka on U.S. 380 early last Thursday, Jan. 19, after a door was forced open. Lakeview Gin, a few miles north of West Point on FM 179, was entered in the same manner that night, and about \$425 in cash plus a signed check for \$99 were stolen. Officers were checking out suspects.

Walter Ray Steen of Wilson reported his barn a half mile south of FM 211 on FM 1054 was burglarized on the night of Jan. 17. Stolen were a drill press, two face masks and two hammers.

Richard Holder reported his residence about 6 miles northwest of New Home burglarized between 8 a.m. and noon Thursday, Jan. 19. Reported stolen were a Midland TV, RCA and Emerson VCRs, a .22 rifle and a 410 shotgun. Total value of all the stolen items was listed as \$1235.

A 23-year-old Tahoka man was arrested and charged with theft of three packs of cigarettes from Inco-Stant Stop in Tahoka last Saturday afternoon. He posted \$300 bond in county court set by Judge J.F. Brandon on the misdemeanor charge.

Police investigated an accident on Monday at S. 2nd and Ave. M that involved a 1980 Oldsmobile driven by Olga Garcia Solorzano of Tahoka and a 1988 Hyundai driven by Booker T. Thomas of Denver, CO. Solorzano and three passengers from the Thomas vehicle were taken by ambulance to Lynn County Hospital and treated for minor injuries and released.

Police investigated a one-vehicle accident on Saturday at S. 2nd and east service road of U.S. 87 that involved a 1976 Ford pickup driven by Veronica V. DeLeon of Tahoka, who apparently lost control of her vehicle. No injuries were reported.

Lynco Automotive reported to police Saturday that someone had stolen a license plate from a 1977 Oldsmobile registered to Mamie Beard of Tahoka. The vehicle had been parked behind Lynco for repairs.

WOODWORK

IT IS 271 MILES, we are told, between Dallas and Houston, and if you were to drive a car or motorcycle that route, it probably would take about 5 and a half hours. That's allowing a stop for gas and maybe a meal. If you have young children or others who for some reason have to stop frequently, it might take you slightly over 6 hours to make the trip.

But you don't have to drive, and you don't have to fly. You can take Amtrak's Texas Eagle, a three-car passenger train which can carry up to 200 persons.

I didn't read about this train in any Texas publications; I read about it in Grit, one of the nation's oldest weekly tabloids, a family-oriented newspaper published in Pennsylvania. Maybe some Texas newspapers and TV stations have mentioned this new Amtrak service in the state, but if so, I missed it.

The Grit story didn't say how long this train has been in operation, but implied it was new.

The Texas Eagle is designed for people who want to travel inexpensively, who want the experience of riding a train, and who are not in a hurry. This last part is because the train only goes up to 60 miles per hour, and the trip takes about 7 hours, which must mean they stop a lot. Part of the reason it runs 15 mph slower than most passenger trains is because it is running on freight train tracks.

Part of the good news about the train is that it costs just \$31 for a round trip ticket between the two cities. The rest of the good news is simply that there is a passenger train in Texas which we can ride.

There was a time when I would have said that anyone preferring to take the train over driving or an airline flight would be nuts (Confucius say man who ride train bound to have loco motive). But I think it would be fun to ride the train on that route, at least once, although I have no particular desire to go to Houston from Dallas (or from anywhere else).

We rode a commuter train from just outside Washington, D.C. to the Smithsonian a few years ago. Before that, the last time I rode on a train was when they put a passenger car on a Santa Fe freight one time and it ran from Lubbock to Slaton. I forget the reason, but I think it was promotion for a Ben Barnes political campaign. Anyway, I do remember that Bob Lilly and Bubba Smith were on the train, possibly so they could lift the engine back on the track if it jumped off.

Anyway, I am ready to ride a passenger train again, if it would just go someplace reasonable, like from Tahoka to Sudan.

County Okays Plan To Fight Drug Abuse

A program designed to combat drug usage by young persons in Lynn County was presented to county commissioners Monday, when Cra Brown, assistant district attorney from Lamesa, explained to the group that there will be no cost to the county for the detection program.

Commissioners approved this program, then approved payment of \$14,977 annually to the Lynn County Appraisal District, and payments to a law firm of \$54, plus regular budgeted payments to fire departments in the county, to the Soil and Water

Conservation District, to the O'Donnell ambulance fund, and \$300 to Grassland community center.

Pay for jurors on county and justice of the peace courts was set at \$6 per day if called, and \$8 to those serving.

Precinct 4 Commissioner J.T. Miller was given approval to purchase a building in New Home for storage of county equipment.

The new commissioners have agreed to continue to pursue the objective of consolidating the five justice of the peace precincts in the county into two precincts, Judge J.F. Brandon said.

Brandon presided at the meeting, to the Soil and Water

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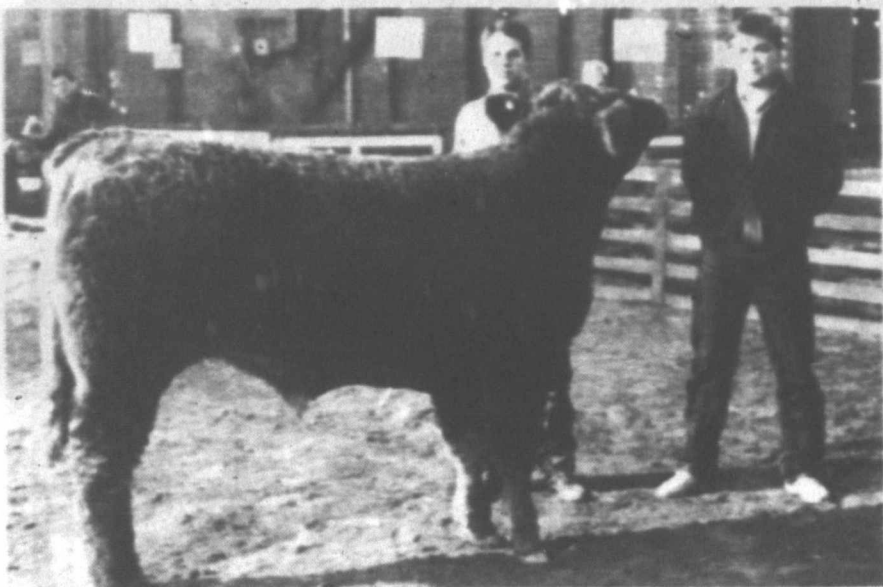
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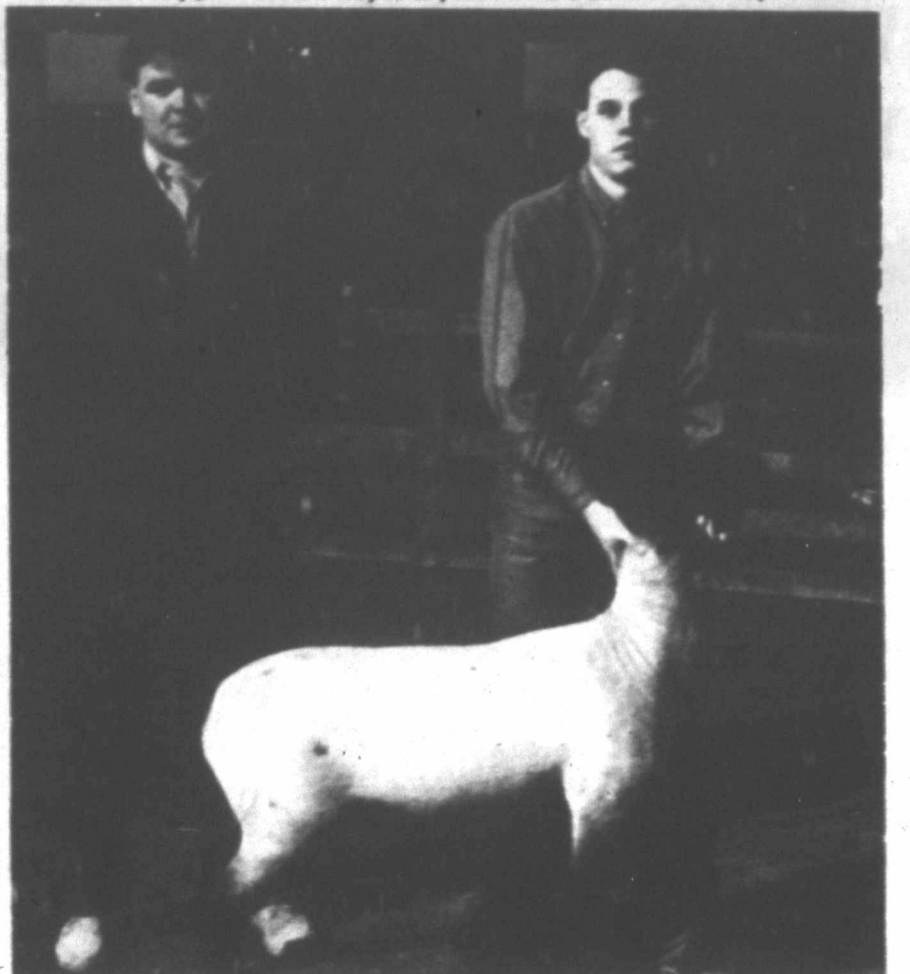
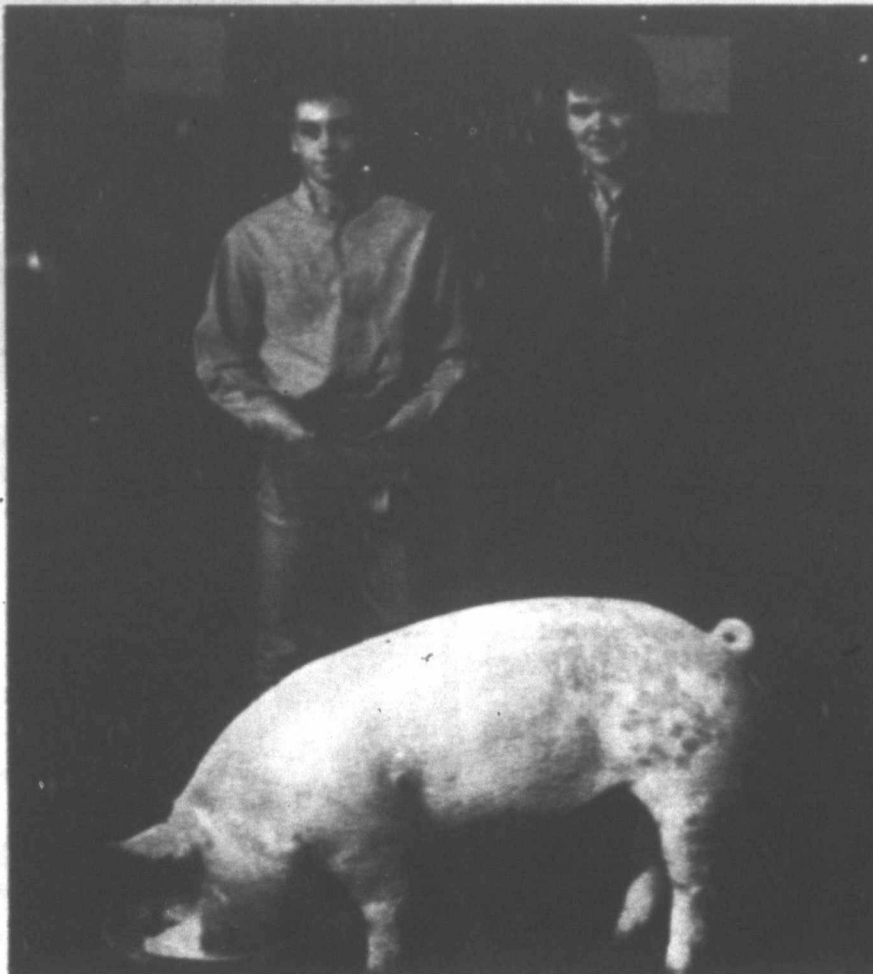

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Wilson Man Killed When Hit By Pickup

James Garza, 22, of Wilson was killed early Jan. 21 when he was struck by a pickup while attempting to cross FM 400 just south of Slaton, according to the Dept. of Public Safety.

ADPS spokesman said the fatality, which was reported at about 12:30 a.m. Saturday, occurred about 1.4 miles south of Slaton.

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In The Mailbox

"Customers with curbside mailboxes have a special challenge when it comes to keeping them in top condition," says Tahoka Postmaster Leonard Dunn.

"The curbside boxes are subject to the weather as well as hazardous drivers, high weeds, parked cars and pranksters. Even so, most customers manage to keep their mailboxes in good shape for proper delivery of their mail.

"The responsibility for these boxes rests with the customer," says Leonard Dunn. "The curbside mailbox must be accessible to the carrier without requiring the carrier to leave his or her vehicle.

Their should be no obstructions, such as vehicles, weeds or snow. The bottom of the box should be 3 1/2 to 4 feet above the ground level, and the address should be clearly printed on the receptacle, facing the carrier, to assure more efficient delivery," says Dunn.

"An old dented box with sharp cutting edges, or a box that is too small should also be replaced, or mail delivery may be withheld." "If you have any questions regarding the placement or upkeep of your mailbox, please call the postoffice," says Dunn. "And thank you for your cooperation here in the Tahoka delivery area."

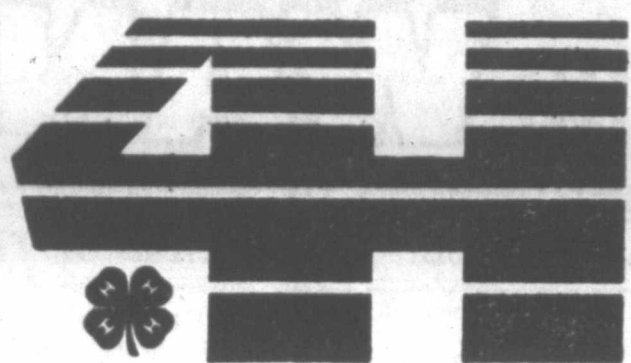
