### **Library Stimulates New Interests** For Tahoka Elementary Pupils

The Texas Bluebonnet Awards Program is intended to encourage Texas children to read more books, to explore a variety of current books, to develop powers of discrimination, and to identify their favorite titles through the voting process.

**Arsenic, Other Pollutants** 

Dept. of Agriculture have found six pesticides, including arsenic, in 44 of 116 wells surveyed in nine counties of Texas, including some in Lynn County, a release from the TDA in Austin said this week.

Although the release said arsenic was found in wells in the West Texas counties of Lynn, Dawson, Martin, Howard and Terry, it did not say how many wells in Lynn County were tested, where they are located, or in how many wells in the county arsenic was discovered.

It did say that picloram was found in one well in Lynn County, and said that picloram is used for brush control along utility rights-of-way, for weed and brush control in pastures and rangeland and for weed control in small grains.

What the findings mean insofar as the safety of drinking water from individually-owned wells in the county is concerned was not spelled out in the TDA release, but officials of the four cities in the county all assured their residents this week that their city water is perfectly safe to drink.

TDA is the lead agency for regulating pesticides in Texas. If a pesticide is found to cause a significant risk to the environment-including groundwater-TDA has the authority to limit

Nitrates, a common pollutant of shallow rural wells, were found in 94 or the 116 wells tested. Water was taken from the wells in 1988, and laboratory work was completed in

late January. "The bad news is that these results are no surprise," said Assistant Agriculture Commissioner Susan Rieff. "This round of tests appears to confirm the pattern shown in our earlier testing, that pesticides can and are contaminating our groundwater re-

sources in Texas." She said that letters explaining the test results have been sent to each well owner whose water was found to have contamination. TDA plans to take additional samples to confirm the presence of pesticides. "These raw data don't provide us with enough information to know if each case of contamination resulted from normal agricultural practices or from poor well construction or if misuse of a pesticide led to the contamination," she added.

If the New Home Leopards felt any pressure in trying to extend a successful season, the heat is likely to be turned up as they enter the state Class A boys basketball playoffs at 7:30 p.m. Friday in Brownfield, taking on Loop in bi-district.

New Home, winner of District 12, is 26-2 after losing to Hale Center 73-56 in a practice game Tuesday night and on Feb. 14 to Aspermont, 59-56. Loop, runner-up in District 11, is 9-19.

The Leopards closed out the regular season Feb. 3 at 24-0 and have played four practice games while waiting for Friday's bi-district round. New Home Coach Jeff Faubion was fearing a letdown from his players during the time off, but the Leopards beat Lakeview 59-40 and Bronte 58-44 before falling to

pesticide contamination. Now that we have that indication, the next step is to carefully explore the extent of contamination and its causes," Mrs.

The laboratory procedures used to analyze the water samples were capable of detecting more than 200

There was one indication in the TDA release which indicated that the arsenic found in a Lynn County well (or wells) was not of a sufficient quantity to be dangerous. This was in a statement which commented that "Arsenic was found in concentrations at or above a safe drinking water level established by EPA...in 27 wells in Dawson, Hidalgo, Howard, Martin and Terry counties." Since this statement did not mention Lynn, it would indicate that the level of arsenic in the Lynn County well

The story did say, however, that health authorities urge caution in drinking water with any level of arsenic contamination, and that "chronic exposure to arsenic-contaminated drinking water poses a serious threat to human health. Long-term oral exposure may lead to an increased risk of skin cancer or nerve damage."

Arsenic-based pesticides have long been used in the production of cotton. Arsenic-based insecticides were used in some areas and arsenicbased herbicides "are still being used to promote the defoliation of cotton prior to harvest. In addition, cotton gin waste containing residual arsenic has frequently been returned to the land as a mulch," said the TDA.

Tahoka City Manager Barry Pittman said that Tahoka's entire water system is tested each October "for everything." A list of things tested for in October 1988 did include arsenic and many other elements, and the city's water was shown to be well within safe limits. Pittman said water samples taken at city hall and sent to Austin for testing last October was mostly Lake

Meredith water which the city uses as a member of the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority. However, the water did include some well water mixed in. The City of Tahoka frequently supplements the Canadian River water with water pumped into the system from three or four of the city's seven water wells, particu-

larly in the summer. The City of New Home is not on the Canadian River pipeline and supplies water from four wells, which also are tested annually and approved by the Texas Dept. of Health. Wilson also uses well water exclusively and their five wells are tested each month. Wilson officials said that city recently received a letter of commendation from the health department on the high quality of its water. O'Donnell is on the Canadian River pipeline and also is tested by the health agency each year.

Of the 116 wells sampled in the recent TDA tests, 96 were used at least in part for household purposes.

"TDA continues to stress that preventing contamination in the first place is the only workable approach to maintaining a fresh, clean groundwater supply," an official said. "Once the well is poisoned, it's too late. Our groundwater sampling program is merely one step toward keeping the water clean."

Nitrates were found in each of the counties surveyed. Of 109 wells tested for nitrates, 94 revealed measurable quantities of the chemical. Fifty-three of the wells had nitrates in higher concentrations than the EPA drinking water standard. TDA said it did not have enough information to conclude whether the nitrates came from the application of nitrogen fertilizers, from the leaching of naturally-occurring soil nitrates, from septic tanks, from animal wastes or from some combination of these potential causes.

TDA was assisted in its sampling program by the Texas Water Development Board. Laboratory work was done by TDA and the Texas Dept. of



# Bullock Asks End To Sales Tax Permit Fee

Bullock said the fee has generated tremendous hostility at a time "the state can ill-afford to tread on the cooperation and confidence of the

He said there may have been reasons why the fee was adopted by the Legislature in 1987, but that it has been more trouble than it was worth in the small amount of revenue it has generated.



Parents need to read with children rather than read to them. Research tells us that parent-child reading is most successful when it involves give-and-take and identifying words

and ideas in a pleasurable situation. Regular patterns of reading with children eight to ten minutes a day for four to seven days a week are associated with both high reading achievement and positive attitudes toward reading in children.

The more that children and parents are actively engaged in "thinking" about the story as contrasted to "listening" to the story, the more successful reading with children becomes in enhancing children's reading achievement.

Sending letters and postcards to grandparents or friends is a way to involve children in the writing process, as well as encouraging them to understand and be thoughtful of others. At first, children can draw a picand dictate a short message Later they can write their own names and gradually add other works and short statements. In this manner, children are encouraged to use writing as a form of communications.

# By Telephone **Bring Warning**

'Prize' Offers

The U.S. Postal Inspection Service has warned the public about the increasing number of "boiler room" scams that use the telephone to pitch a variety of products, usually attached to a "free gift" gimmick.

Chief Postal Inspector Charles R. Clauson said the bogus companies flood post offices with computerized mailings notified people "they've won a prize," usually after offering for sale everything from vitamins to office supplies. "The operators then followup with high-pressure telemarketing," Clauson said, "usually asking for money or a credit card number to cover shipping charges." Clauson suggested that the best way to defend against the scams is to "check out the company and call them back-without giving out your credit card number or any moneyand if still suspicious, get in touch with a postal inspector through the
