boys' season at 31-3, the finest season ever for a New Home team. Moulton then lost in the finals Saturday to Ladonia Fannindel.

As in any close game, there were several times when a little bit of luck could have turned the tide in favor of New Home, but it just was not to be, although the shorter Leopards led by one point after the first period, by two points at halftime, and with 4:38 left in the third quarter, led by five points, 38-33, before Moulton came roaring back to take a 41-40 lead at 2:38. It was a lead they never gave up, although New Home pulled within 2 points several times after that.

Senior brothers Gaylon and Darrell Paul played excellent games, with Gaylon scoring 25 points and getting four rebounds, hitting 10 of 15 from the field and 5 of 7 free throws. Darrell had a team-high 10 rebounds and scored 18 points, hitting 7 of 10 field goals.

It was the last part of the third quarter and first part of the fourth that did New Home in, as the Bobkatz pulled away to a 52-43 lead with 6:31 left in the game. New Home pulled up to 56-58 on a driving layup by Juan Munoz, but that was as close as the Leopards could come.

Moulton, which sounds like something that happens to chicken feathers, put a lot of eggs in the basket in the third quarter, at least when compared to the points scored in that period by New Home. After the Leopards led at halftime and early in the third, the Bobkatz pushed harder

with their man-to-man coverage and the pressure plus the periodic big-game jitters caused some Leopard turnovers.

"We didn't play any defense," said Gaylon Paul after the game. "We were told how to do it, but we just didn't do it."

A disappointed, but proud Coach Jeff Faubion said "Both sides came in sort of big-eyed, and their man-to-man defense was tough...But Moulton has a great team."

The coach also commented that "their defensive adjustment in the second half stopped our outside game."

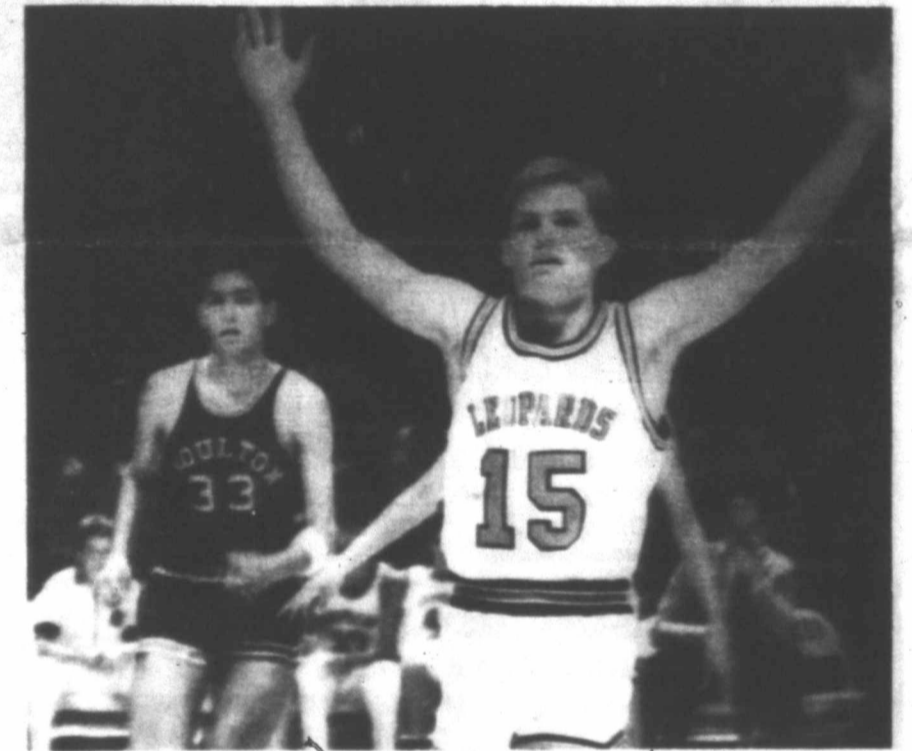
Moulton's Edward Nieto, a 6-3 post, tied Gaylon Paul for game scoring honors as he also scored 25 points. And the Bobkatz' freshman Patrick Henke scored 22 points.

A large group of New Home fans made the trip to Austin, and after the game waited outside the "Super-drum" to let the emerging players know they are very proud of the team for its season and for its state tournament effort.

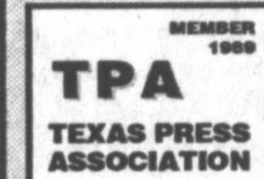
Meeting Set To Discuss Annual Stock Show

Two Head Coaches, Band Director Resign

Tahoka School trustees are looking for people to fill several key positions in the school system, following resignation of head coaches for football and boys basketball and the high school band director.

Ted Wiley, who has coached in the Tahoka system for six years and who has been head football coach and athletic director for the last three

years, submitted his resignation which was accepted by the school board at last Thursday's regular monthly meeting.

Resignations also were accepted from head boys basketball coach Charles Jurden, who has been here one year, from Band Director Tony McGowan, who has been with the system for three years, and from

Brenda Tidwell, high school English teacher for one year.

The school also will be looking for a new elementary principal to succeed Gaylon Gassiot, whose resignation had been accepted previously.

Head coach for girls basketball Steve Qualls and assistant coaches Joe Paradis and Gregg Tabor were among a large list of teachers and school employees who were voted new contracts by the board Thursday.

The board already had voted to combine the athletic director's position with the job of assistant high school principal, and this means that the new athletic director will not be coaching, according to Dr. Duane Carter, superintendent. The new AD will have the assistant principal's job as well as administrative duties related to all athletics. Head coaches for boys basketball and boys football will be hired, and they will also teach in the classroom, Dr. Carter said.

The board also voted 5-2 to reduce pay for teachers who have been with the system in order to pay for part of a recently-adopted insurance plan replacing an insurance program which went bankrupt statewide last year, leaving many teachers, including some in the Tahoka system, holding unpaid claims, reportedly totaling about \$75,000 for those in the Tahoka system.

Thursday's vote was to reduce the local increment to be paid in 1989-90 by \$550 for teachers, and to eliminate scheduled 4.5 per cent raises for other school personnel, up to \$550 per employee, and to pay no local bonus at all for new teachers hired for next year. The school has been paying \$1300 per year above state-mandated salary levels for classroom teachers.

Dr. Carter said the new insurance program requires 100 per cent participation by all school employees, so the school board recently voted to pay all the premiums for employees, which amount to about \$1400 per year per employee. In the past, the school has paid \$300 of this amount, so the district now will pay the entire \$1400, or about \$1100 more per employee, which means the \$550 salary cut will pay for about half of the additional amount the school will have to pay.

Some teachers and other school personnel have objected to having to take part in the insurance program, pointing out that they have coverage elsewhere, but the plan could not be accepted by the insurers unless everyone participates.

County Finances Reported Okay

Lynn County finances were reported in good condition by auditor Joe Hays as he presented the annual audit report to the commissioners Monday.

The county approved payment of several periodic bills, including workman's compensation insurance premium of \$9,325 for three months for county employees; a payment of \$254 to the legal firm of Bickerstaff, Heath & Smiley; and \$50 for membership in the Texas Good Roads Assn.

Representatives of the South Plains Assn. of Governments (SPAG) were on hand to explain their functions to the newest members of the county commissioners court. And a new switchbox for the Lynn County jail intercom system was approved.

County school construction project were presented by Dennis Clayton of AC Associates, and the board voted to give Clayton authority to advertise for bids on the project.

Bookkeeper Loretta Tekell reported that the 1988 tax collection had reached almost 90 per cent completion as of Feb. 28.

A textbook list was approved as presented by a textbook committee, and a parent spoke to the board objecting to action taken in a recent incident involving his son.

The school board election was officially set for May 6, with terms of trustees Billy Davis, Joe Hays and Mike Huffaker scheduled to be up for vote. The election will be in the Tahoka School Cafeteria, with absentee voting to be held at Tahoka City Hall.

Davis has filed for re-election, and three other persons had filed for the school board by Tuesday afternoon. They are Gary McCord, Wesley Boone and Clint Gardner.

Wine From Lynn County Grapes Takes Top Prize

Teysha Cellars, a new Texas winery just south of Lubbock, won a gold medal in *The Dallas Morning News* 1989 National Wine Competition, the Dallas newspaper announced Monday March 6, noting that "It was the first time in the five-year history of the competition that a Texas winery took one of the top prizes."

The grapes used in the top-rated wine were from the Casa Nueva Vineyard of Dr. Richard Wright of Tahoka, who said this week that last year he sold to the Teysha Cellars 22 tons of the particular variety of grapes used in making the gold medal winning wine.

He added that during the last year he harvested a total of 78.6 tons of grapes in eight varieties from the vineyards on FM 211 between U. S. 87 and New Home.

The competition in Dallas drew 1,448 entries from 348 wineries in 23 states. Teysha Cellars won the award for its just-released 1988 Gewurztraminer, a wine which Dr. Wright said could be purchased at the winery for \$8 per bottle starting next Monday.

City Sales Tax Rebates Increase Statewide

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Friday that March's city sales tax rebates, which reflect sales made in January, were up by an average of 27 percentage statewide.

"Although consumers usually slow down their spending in January, this is a good sign that the state's economic engine is running strong and steady," Bullock said.

Checks totaling \$61.7 million were sent Friday to 888 cities that collect local sales tax at either one or one and one-half percent.

In O'Donnell net payment this period was \$667.99, compare to prior year \$537.29, 1989 payments to date \$3,932.49 and 1988 was \$4,007.99. In Tahoka, net payment was \$3,749.40, compare to prior year \$1,964.44, 1989 payments to date \$16,721.63, and 1988 payments to date \$15,310.65; In Wilson, 1989 payments to date was \$894.58 compare to 1988, \$1,759.72.

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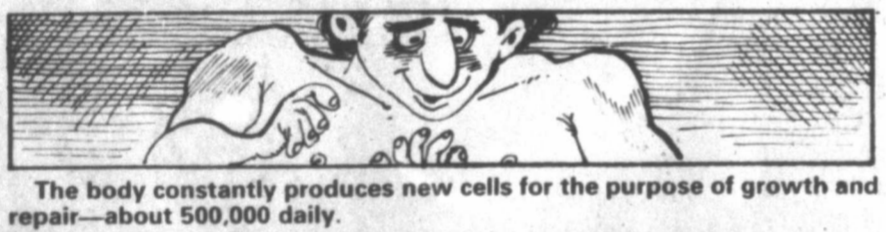

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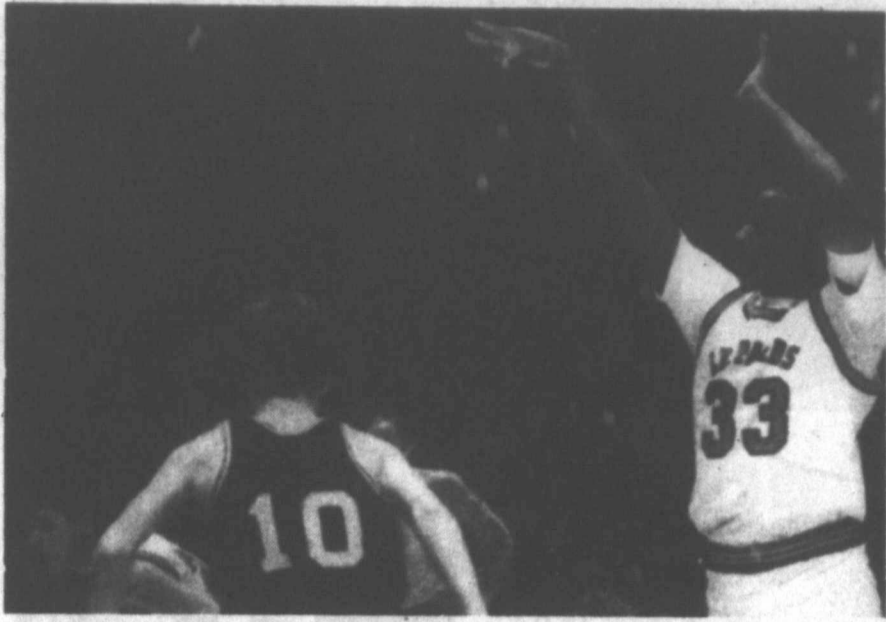

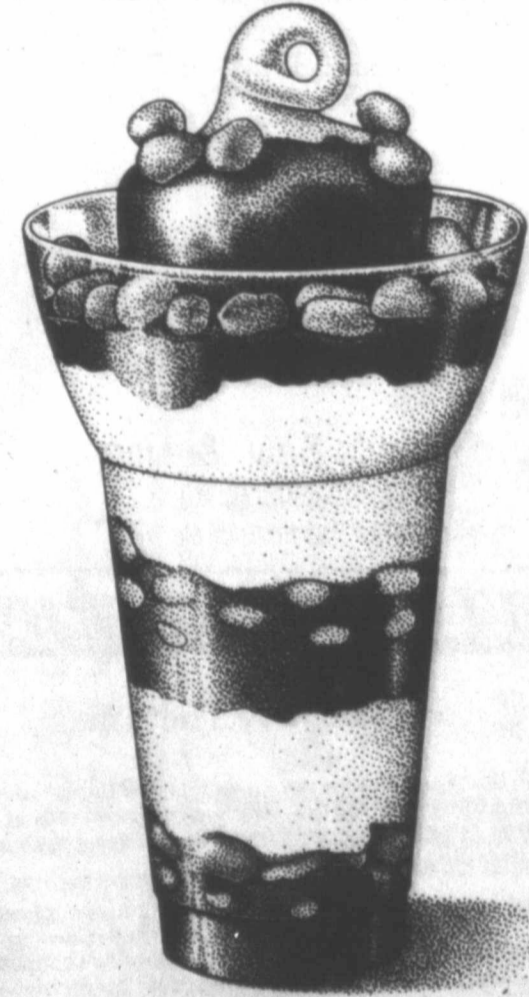

New Rules On Bingo Cards Announced

State Comptroller Bob Bullock announced this week that he is requiring all instant bingo cards to be sealed and clearly marked with an official stamp before he will approve the cards for use in Texas.

"This will stop any trickery with instant bingo games in Texas because customers can see at a glance whether or not the cards being used are approved," Bullock said. Bullock is requiring that each pack of instant bingo cards be sealed or wrapped completely in a clear wrapping material.

The words imprinted on each card— Authorized by the Texas Bingo Regulation Division— must now be a larger type size.

Both changes take effect immediately, Bullock said.

"The public and the charities have a right to fair and honest games in Texas," Bullock said. "I intend to see that those rights are protected."

Bingo games in Texas grossed \$465 million in 1988, Bullock said.
