BARRELING Down The Orange-Barrel Highway:Everybody knows about the Pennsylvania Turnpike, Turner Turnpike, LBJ Freeway, Airport Expressways, and such, which are names given locally to major highways, usually interstates. I now have a suggestion for a new name for $1-$ 20, particularly the section from Roscoe to Fort Worth, which is the only section I really know much about.
It should be renamed the Orange-Barrel Highway. From It should be renamed the Orange-Barrel Highway. From
Sweetwater to the far side of Fort Worth it is almost solid Sweetwater to the far side of Fort Worth it is almost solid
orange barrels, with just about every other mile under construction. This means that you drive at least half the time in one-lane traffic, and on $1-20$ that's no fun at all.
Much of $1-20$ is $65-\mathrm{mph}$ zone; it may be 55 or less in the construction stretches. But whatever it is, if you drive 65, a bunch of ginks in black hats and new pickups, and sometimes in monstrous 18 -wheelers, will crowd right up on your back bumper, mad as heck because you're not driving 80 like they want to. And I don't like to drive that fast, especially in those little narrow construction lanes.
But to get back to the orange barrels, there must be literally thousands (maybe millions) of them out there (and in Lubbock, just about anywhere you try to go). Of course, everyone would like to have the highways in good repair, but on I-20 I really couldn't see that they were doing that much. What they did was realize that there are not enough Pentagon-sized storage buildings in each of those highway districts to even begin to take care of all those barrels, so they just stick them out in the middle of the road to harass the motorists until they can find some place they really need them.
In Fort Worth, I discovered the other day that not just the interstates, but also Loop 820 is under construction. To tum off $1-20 / 30$ to ge north on the loop at the east side of Cowtown, you now have to go about a mile or two south and then cross over and head back north.
Anyway, the construction problem is the same in every major city, on every major highway, and still the people trying their best to fix the roads can't keep up. I can remember a time when you could take a trip and otten you would never run into any construction. Now I don't know of anywhere you can drive more than 200 miles without running into the dreaded orange barrels or the dangerous conorete guards which can't be seen at night.
Every year The Wizard of Oz shows up on TV. But there is a rumer that next year, Dorothy will not be ahle to get to the wizard and all the wonders of Oz , because the Yollow Brick Road is under construction, and the impatient drivers of 18 -wheelers are pushing all the little people off inte the Brown Mud Ditch.
