THE ALASKAN oil spill has created some interesting situations, with the main one, of course, being the pollution effect and threat to fish, otters, birds and other wild life, and the economic loss to those who catch fish for a living. However, according to news reports, the cleanup campaign has brought a temporary economic boom to the Alaskan area, as Exxon is paying people \$17 an hour or so to work on the cleanup (and apparently more than that to the oilfield workers from Lubbock and elsewhere who have headed that way to assist.
An Alaskan cannery, for example, had to shut down operations because most of the workers quit to go to work for Exxon during the cleanup. The cannery and other businesses such as grocery stores and restaurants could no afford to pay that much, so they are all winding up shorthanded.

took a big jump, and although the companies (so far as I took a big jump, and although the companies (so far as I
know) never said it was because of the oil spill, there was know) never said it was because of the oil spill, there was a hint that this could be a factor. That, of course, is silly,
since nobody would believe that one tanker load of oil lost since nobody would believe that one tanker load of oil lost
would make any dent in the total amount of oil used by people all over the world.
In Lubbock, some oil distributor said the jump at the pump was because some refineries have not been operating Anyway, the general public has a pretty strong suspicion that the oil companies use any excuse they can to raise prices. Incidentally, don't blame your local service station operator; he didn't raise the prices, and he probably doesn't make any more for himself than he did at the lower prices.

Some protesters also demanded an end to oil spills, not bothering to explain how anyone can stop oil spills. I'm not defending Exxon, but do those people think Exxon ran its tanker into a reef and spilled all that oil on purpose?
