

There's certain terminology in every sport that only persons who are very familiar with that particular sport will know what you are talking about. However, being an active and sometimes not-so-active tennis player, I thought I had heard of just about every term or phrase that pertains to tennis. I'm just learning about golf.

In tennis, there's a saying "big enough to drive a Mac truck through" meaning that a player has an easy shot to put away the winner in a big opening of the court and if you miss it, you really "choked" that point. Now I already know how to "choke" in golf after playing only a couple of years. That's when you are leading your foursome and then get a 13 on the last hole to finish dead last. I actually did card a 13 on the number nine hole at T-Bar.

Another saying that I just recently became aware of is "Put on the Goggles and Flippers". This is something that Andre Agassi has done in his tennis matches. This is where you win the first set and then get too far behind in the second set to have a realistic chance to come back, so you "take a dive" and just tank the second set and then go ahead and give it all you can to win the third set and match. Agassi is good enough to pull that off, but very few others can do it. One I "put on the goggles and flippers" and then sunk to the bottom.

"Sandbaggers" and "sandbagging" is synonymous in tennis and golf to the point of being ridiculous. The only true level in either sport is the championship level - all other lower levels are filled with sandbaggers. A sandbagger is someone who knows he can't win the tournament among the elite players so he or she plays in the lower flight or division so that they can win a trophy or prize. The problem worsens, however, because everyone else is doing the same thing. My goal in golf is to become a much better player so that I can become a sandbagger in the next Sandbag Open.

There's a scale to rate tennis players that goes from 1.0 as a person just starting to play tennis, to 7.0 as a world class player measured by computer rankings - Agassi for example. There's also the ".5" player who does have some problems. Some characteristics are:

1. Has trouble distinguishing between ball and racket;

2. Consistently bounces ball off foot during service motion; and

3. Loses from one to two pints of blood when attempting. to open a new can of tennis balls. This person would never be accused of sandbagging and could honestly enter the lowest division and be truthful of his rating.

I know most tennis sandbaggers around, but among the golfers, I've not yet learned their tricks.

Golfers normally tee off in order of their score on the previous hole (the winner of that hole tees off first, etc.). played a year and a half before I found out they weren't teeing off in alphabetical order.

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





Hall was born on April 22, 1937 in Hawley and moved to Lynn County in 1942. He was a graduate of Tahoka High School. He married Patsy Jean Lindsey in Colorado City on Feb. 4. 1960. He was a farmer and construction contractor. He was a member of First Born.





Windmills Provide Power For Former Lynn Residents

Upon approaching the Nevill farm in northwest Andrews County, one would think that they had been trans-

ported back in time when electricity was not found on a farm and when windmills supplied all the water.

Most might not notice the unusual on the farm, like the row of solar panels on top of the house or that one of the farm's three windmills has only three huge blades. But, many might not take notice that there aren't any electric lines running to the farm or that none can be found around the main house.

And, the Nevills, Joe Don, Everton and June, don't use kerosene lamps for light, as a matter of fact, they have all the electricity they need for light. Because, the Nevills use wind and solar power to generate and store electricity.

"I've been fascinated with windmills for as long as I can remember," stated Joe Don, a Tahoka High School graduate and inventor who created the independent system. "The electric company was asking around 10 to 12 thousand dollars to install a line to our farm. And that's what gave us the incentive to go ahead and start with this system."

"The line was going to cost us so much, and we would not own it. Also, if anyone connected to it, we would receive no income from it. So, we

The Nevill farm is operated independently of any outside power source, except for propane gas which they have to buy occasionally. Most of their electricity is generated by the free, West Texas wind blowing through a lone windmill. The windmill has three large, airfoil-designed blades that start turning at 5 m.p.h., beginning to generate at 10 m.p.h., reaching its maximum output at 30 m.p.h.

"When we first started, we had to have some sort of electrical system, so we installed a small four cylinder engine that operated on propane," Nevill stated. He pointed out that they used to have to start the 15kilowatt generator just to mix a cake, or illuminate a 100-watt light bulb, making the generator costly and inconvenient, even though it was started by remote control.

Now, Nevill uses energy directly from the wind or from stored energy in batteries. In order to supply the needed 120 volts of electricity to the house, Nevill created a battery bank of 60 two-volt cells connected in series, that weight 300 pounds each.

Theoretically, Nevill added, the stored energy in that one bank would last approximately one month. He also has a second bank that would double the time to two months, without being recharged by the wind or from generators.

All of the Nevill's appliances and workshop equipment are operated with power from the batteries. They have a special power inverter that changes the direct current of the batteries into alternating current for the household appliances.

The solar electric bank also charges a set of battery cells that provides power to operate the air conditioner after sundown. Nevill stated that he normally couldn't have afforded the solar panels but, they had cosmetic or superficial damage, so he picked them up at a less expensive price.

Nevill, 31, has been studying electricity since he was a child. "It fascinated me that we make things work with something in these wires that we can't see," Nevill stated, "I owe a lot of my interest in this to my parents, they encouraged me to learn along the way. I was always building," he added

Hindered in the past with taking . care of the farm, Nevill is finally getting to expand his vast knowledge of electricity and mechanical devices. Nevill started this semester as a freshman at Texas Tech University in Lubbock. And, of course, he is studying engineering.

Midyear Crop, Stock Reports **Being** Sought

Beginning June 1, representatives from the Texas Agricultural Statistics Service will be contacting farmers and ranchers across the state to help set the 1989 planted acreage estimates and midyear livestock inventories.

"Information from these surveys will provide Texas producers with solid facts and figures they can use when making their production and marketing plans for 1989," state statistician Dennis Findley explained.

"The continued dry weather this spring and the changes in the national farm program may have altered producers' plans for 1989, and this survey will be the first accurate measure of midyear livestock inventories and acreage estimates." Findley added. Individual reports will be combine with other reports to set state estimates. Results of the confidential interview, conduct by telephone or in person by field enumerators, will be published later this summer. The 1989 acreage forecast will be published July 12, and the midyear cattle inventory will be published July 28. "Remember, these are sample surveys, so if you are contacted it is important to provide the requested information, since your one report represents similar operations of the same size and type. Our estimates can be no better than the numbers producers provide," Findley said.

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"The purpose is to stress the need for mailboxes that are conveniently located, safe to use, neat in appearance and designed to protect the mail from the weather," Mr. Dunn said. Postal regulations require that mail

carriers must have access to mailboxes on rural routes without having to leave their vehicles. Such boxes must be located on the righthand side of the road in the carrier's direction of travel .

"It's modern."

Since pest problems differ from

area to area and the gin is usually the local gathering point for area producers, the program has been selectioned off into gin communities.

The committee voted on and approved a \$.10 bale assessment to be required for a gin community to participate in the 1989 Texas Agricultural Extension Service Dawson/ Lynn County Pest Management Program. This money will go to fund scouts to survey fields in participating gin communities.

The number of bales to be assessed will be based on each gin's past four year average or if open less than four years, the average of years since open for operation.

For this bale assessment, each participating gin community will receive the following services:

1. Adult Bollworm Monitoring: Early season bollworm (Heliothis) moth traps will be placed in area to monitor moth activity. This will help us to make predictions on peak bollworm egg lay. This will act as an early warning system for your producers. Knowing ahead to time, when treatment might be needed, will allow producers to budget time and money to adequately treat these pest

2. Fields scouted weekly in your area: Certain fields will be scouted weekly in your community by trained field scouts. The amount of acres to be checked will be prorated based on each gin's 4 year ginning average. A total of 7,000 acres will be checked in the two county area. Due to a high participation these acres will be very well scattered, therefore we will have a good handle on what

Chamber Warns Citizens To Be Alert For Scams

Tahoka Chamber of Commerce President Danny Preston and board member Gail Faries this week warned citizens of possible fraudulent approaches, including two companies which the chamber has been warned against as trying to get corporations to let them try to claim refunds on franchise and other state taxes.

Also, it was noted, some older persons have been contacted by telephone in this area by someone seeking to get information about how much money the elderly persons have on certificates of deposit, and others have requested credit card numbers by phone.

"Never give a stranger information on how much you have in CDs, nor should you give out your credit card numbers to anyone on the phone unless you initiated the call," said the chamber representatives.

Two companies, one from St. Louis and one from Illinois, have sent letters to some corporation officers claiming they can get large refunds of state taxes. Preston said the chamber office, open in the mornings, 998-4761, may be contacted if someone is approached by an individual either personally or by phone or receives a suspicious letter claiming to do something great for the recipient.
