



Jackie Jo Hays Wins State In Ready Writing

State Champion in Class AA Ready Writing.

That's the title now belonging to Tahoka High School senior Jackie Jo Hays, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Hays of Tahoka, who won the state championship last weekend at Austin as she delivered the paper judged best in state. She wrote on the subject of Oliver North.

Miss Hays, who will return to state competition in June in trombone solo, chose the quote of Oliver North as one of two possible subjects offered the competitors at Austin. She competed with 12 other regional winners. The contest lasted two hours.

She also competed in literary criticism.

Jailing Federal Prisoners Nets County Profit

Lynn County commissioners Monday were advised by Sheriff Jack Miller that the county made a profit of more than \$4000 during the month of April by housing federal prisoners under a new program which allows persons awaiting federal court action to be held temporarily in county jails.

Miller's report said 14 federal prisoners were housed for a total of 229 days during April at the established rate of \$22 per day, bringing in \$5038. The report said expenses were increased because of the federal prisoners by a total of \$942 for the month, leaving the county a profit of \$4095.

Commissioners Monday also approved purchase of a new air conditioner for a basement room and agreed to a request from members of the Tahoka Garden Club to level and help get grass growing on the triangular park area where the monument to Lynn County servicemen is located. Appearing for the Garden Club were Mrs. Clifford Tankersley, Dorothy Kidwell, Mildred Abbe and Dorothea Weaver.

Judge J.F. Brandon advised the commissioners that no bids had been received on a pickup for the county agent.

New City Council Members Sworn In

Mayor Jim Solomon was sworn in for another term and two councilmen were sworn in at Monday night's regular meeting of the council, at which time the results of last Saturday's election were confirmed.

Carl Reynolds and incumbent Milt Uzzle were sworn in for new terms on the council.

An ordinance allowing Southwestern Public Service to implement a rate decrease was approved.

TERRY'S WOODBOX

There's certain terminology in every sport that only persons who are very familiar with that particular sport will know what you are talking about. However, being an active and sometimes not-so-active tennis player, I thought I had heard of just about every term or phrase that pertains to tennis. I'm just learning about golf.

In tennis, there's a saying "big enough to drive a Mac truck through" meaning that a player has an easy shot to put away the winner in a big opening of the court and if you miss it, you really "choked" that point. Now I already know how to "choke" in golf after playing only a couple of years. That's when you are leading your foursome and then get a 13 on the last hole to finish dead last. I actually did card a 13 on the number nine hole at T-Bar.

Another saying that I just recently became aware of is "Put on the Goggles and Flippers". This is something that Andre Agassi has done in his tennis matches. This is where you win the first set and then get too far behind in the second set to have a realistic chance to come back, so you "take a dive" and just tank the second set and then go ahead and give it all you can to win the third set and match. Agassi is good enough to pull that off, but very few others can do it. One I "put on the goggles and flippers" and then sunk to the bottom.

"Sandbaggers" and "sandbagging" is synonymous in tennis and golf to the point of being ridiculous. The only true level in either sport is the championship level — all other lower levels are filled with sandbaggers. A sandbagger is someone who knows he can't win the tournament among the elite players so he or she plays in the lower flight or division so that they can win a trophy or prize. The problem worsens, however, because everyone else is doing the same thing. My goal in golf is to become a much better player so that I can become a sandbagger in the next Sandbag Open.

There's a scale to rate tennis players that goes from 1.0 as a person just starting to play tennis, to 7.0 as a world class player measured by computer rankings — Agassi for example. There's also the ".5" player who does have some problems. Some characteristics are:

1. Has trouble distinguishing between ball and racket;
2. Consistently bounces ball off foot during service motion; and
3. Loses from one to two pints of blood when attempting to open a new can of tennis balls. This person would never be accused of sandbagging and could honestly enter the lowest division and be truthful of his rating.

I know most tennis sandbaggers around, but among the golfers, I've not yet learned their tricks.

Golfers normally tee off in order of their score on the previous hole (the winner of that hole tees off first, etc.). I played a year and a half before I found out they weren't teeing off in alphabetical order.

"She has chaired the Fun and Food Festival every year and has always done a super job of it," stated fellow charter member of the Auxiliary, Mrs. Ann Roberts. The Hospital Board presented Mrs. Dunlap with a spray of fresh flowers showing their gratitude for her contributions to the hospital.

While the Auction was in progress, the United Blood Services of Lubbock collected 20 pints of blood and 18 people participated in the blood

cholesterol screening test. Five classes from Tahoka Gardner Elementary participated in the poster contest sponsored by the local chapter of the American Cancer Society. The following 4th and 5th grades had first place posters from their respective classes: Felicia Davis, Blanda

School Board, City Voters Make Choices

Lynn County voters in four school districts and four municipalities went to the polls Saturday and made their choices, and also voters across the county confirmed four candidates for the Lynn County Hospital board who were running unopposed.

Tahoka School Board President Joe Hays was re-elected to the board with 232 votes. Also elected were Gary McCord with 284 votes and Clint Gardner with 265. Other candidates for the three available posts, and their vote totals, were Wesley Boone 211, incumbent Billy Davis 167, Mitch Raindl 156 and Steve Greer 150.

In the Tahoka city council election, former Tahoka City Manager Carl Reynolds received 298 votes and incumbent councilman J.M. (Milt) Uzzle had 219 to be elected to the two council seats available. Other candidates were Joe Calvillo with 197 votes, Winston Wharton 154, Mike Rivas 63 and Rudy Tejada Sr. 28.

In Wilson, Donald Klaus, Victor Steinhauser and Randy Moczygemba won two-year terms on the city council. Klaus had 52 votes, Steinhauser 46 and Moczygemba 45. Unsuccessful candidates included Charlene Webb with 42 and Lowen Young with 16 votes.

In the Wilson school board election, three persons from a field of five candidates won seats. Elected were Robert E. Abbe Jr. with 79 votes, Roy Isham with 67 and Woody Follis with 71. Ricky Yowell had 29 votes and Nan Wied 51.

In New Home city and school elections, there were no contests, and all the candidates were elected. Roy Blevens was chosen mayor and Lee Roy Nettles and C.G. Kieth were chosen to the council. School district voters elected Leland Zant, Larry Durham and Eddie Askew, with only 25 ballots cast.

At O'Donnell, school board members elected were Kenneth Baker with 134 votes, Mickey Hughes 112 and Kenneth Vestal with 121.

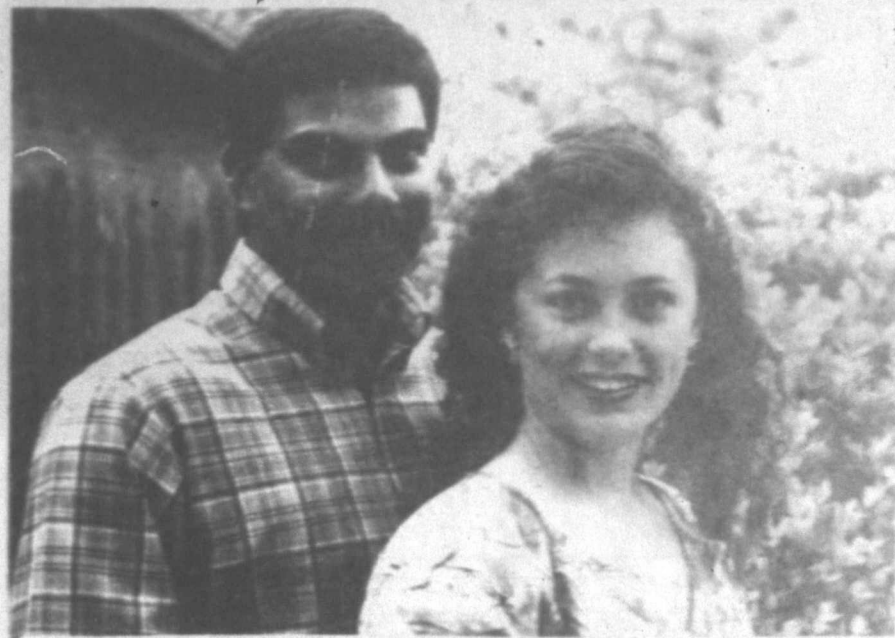

A replica of a doll from the early part of the Century, made by Annie Belle Stice, Museum Attendant, was donated by the Museum to the Fun and Food Festival sponsored by the Hospital Auxiliary, and was auctioned off to raise funds for the Lynn County Hospital.

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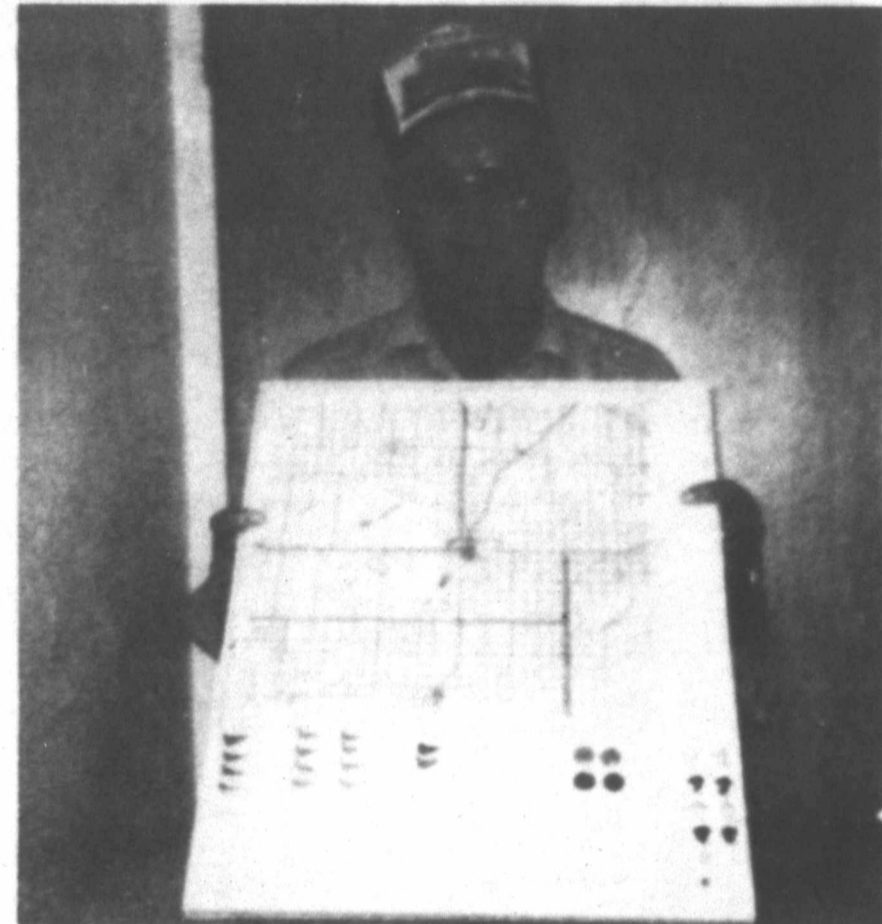

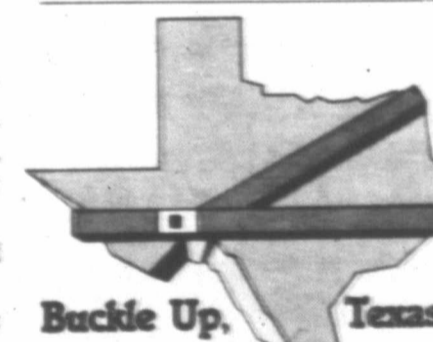

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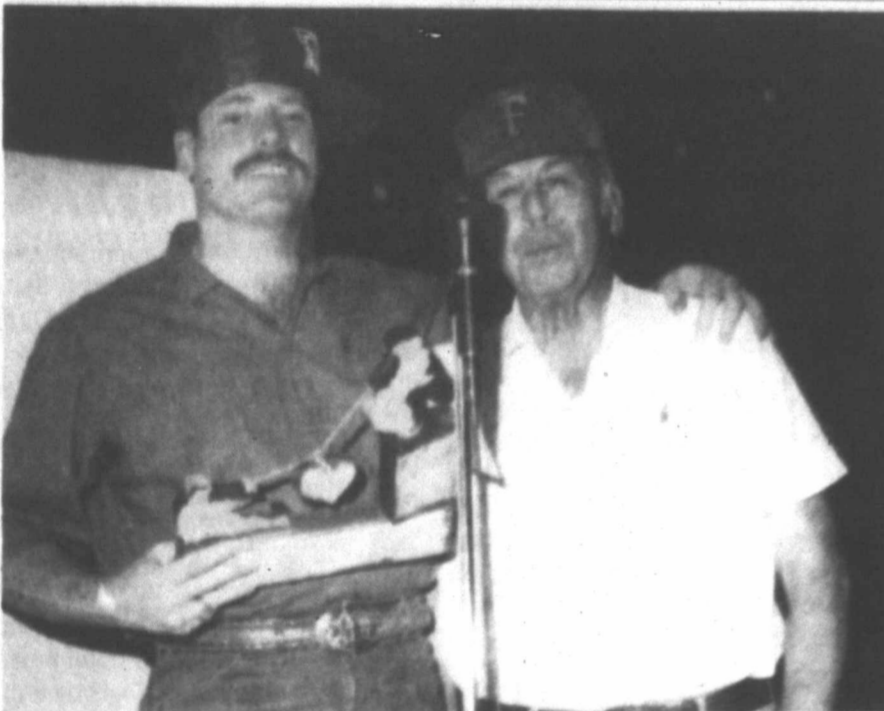

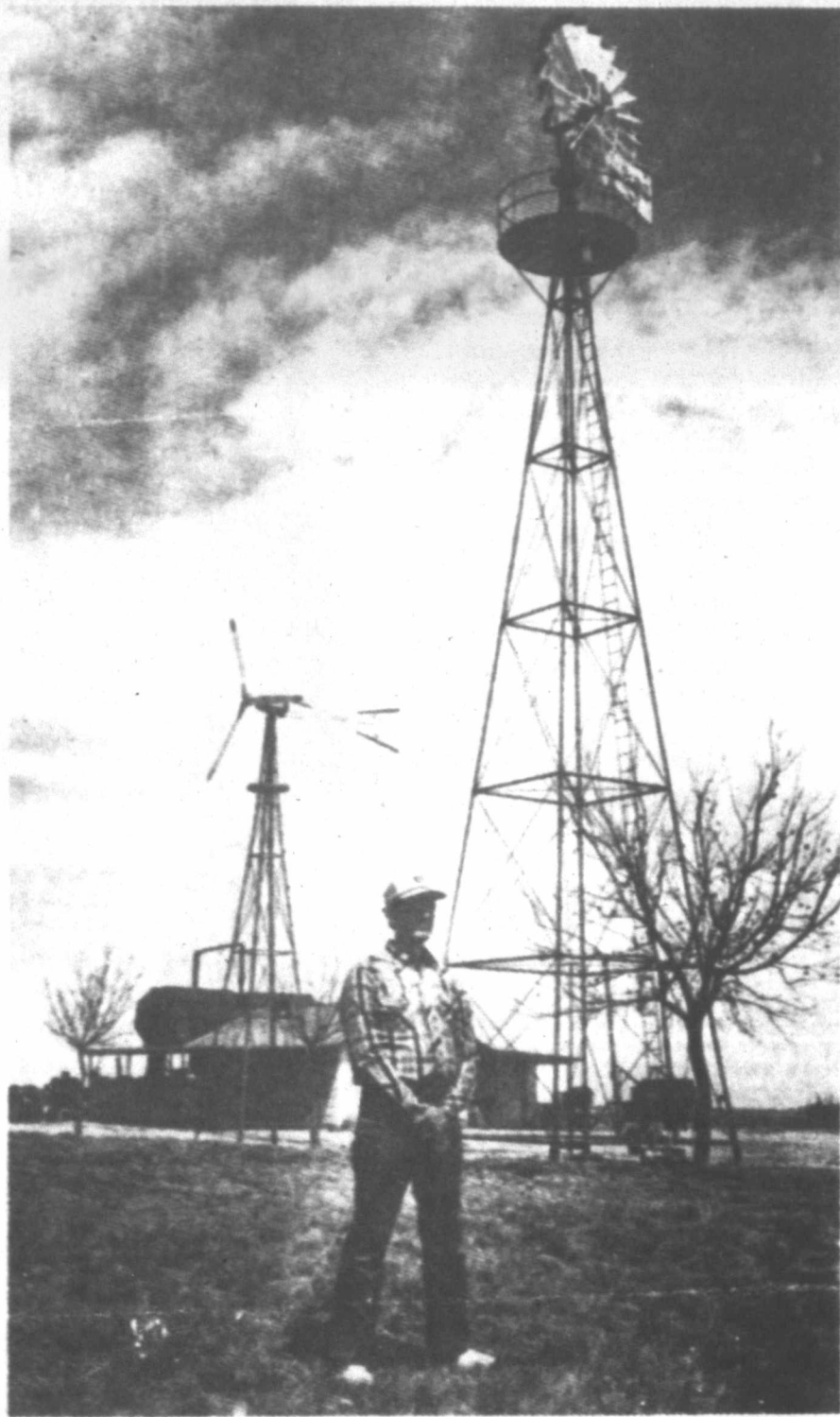

Postoffice Urges Mailbox Upgrade

The U.S. Postal Service has designated May 15-19 as "Mailbox Improvement Week," a time set aside each May to remind customers on rural, city motorized and contract routes to examine and improve, if necessary, the appearance of their mailboxes, according to Tahoka Postmaster Leonard Dunn.

"The purpose is to stress the need for mailboxes that are conveniently located, safe to use, neat in appearance and designed to protect the mail from the weather," Mr. Dunn said.

Postal regulations require that mail carriers must have access to mailboxes on rural routes without having to leave their vehicles. Such boxes must be located on the right-hand side of the road in the carrier's direction of travel.

Windmills Provide Power For Former Lynn Residents

Upon approaching the Nevill farm in northwest Andrews County, one would think that they had been transported back in time when electricity was not found on a farm and when windmills supplied all the water.

Most might not notice the unusual on the farm, like the row of solar panels on top of the house or that one of the farm's three windmills has only three huge blades. But, many might not take notice that there aren't any electric lines running to the farm or that none can be found around the main house.

And, the Nevills, Joe Don, Everton and June, don't use kerosene lamps for light, as a matter of fact, they have all the electricity they need for light. Because, the Nevills use wind and solar power to generate and store electricity.

"I've been fascinated with windmills for as long as I can remember," stated Joe Don, a Tahoka High School graduate and inventor who created the independent system. "The electric company was asking around 10 to 12 thousand dollars to install a line to our farm. And that's what gave us the incentive to go ahead and start with this system."

"The line was going to cost us so much, and we would not own it. Also, if anyone connected to it, we would receive no income from it. So, we

decided to investigate being independent," he added. The Nevill farm is operated independently of any outside power source, except for propane gas which they have to buy occasionally. Most of their electricity is generated by the free, West Texas wind blowing through a lone windmill. The windmill has three large, airfoil-designed blades that start turning at 5 m.p.h., beginning to generate at 10 m.p.h., reaching its maximum output at 30 m.p.h.

"When we first started, we had to have some sort of electrical system, so we installed a small four cylinder engine that operated on propane," Nevill stated. He pointed out that they used to have to start the 15-kilowatt generator just to mix a cake, or illuminate a 100-watt light bulb, making the generator costly and inconvenient, even though it was started by remote control.

Now, Nevill uses energy directly from the wind or from stored energy in batteries. In order to supply the needed 120 volts of electricity to the house, Nevill created a battery bank of 60 two-volt cells connected in series, that weight 300 pounds each.

Theoretically, Nevill added, the stored energy in that one bank would last approximately one month. He also has a second bank that would double the time to two months, without being recharged by the wind or from generators.

All of the Nevill's appliances and workshop equipment are operated with power from the batteries. They have a special power inverter that changes the direct current of the batteries into alternating current for the household appliances.

He also has a solar electric bank

that provides electricity for the air conditioning unit that cools the home. The solar electric bank also charges a set of battery cells that provides power to operate the air conditioner after sundown. Nevill stated that he normally couldn't have afforded the solar panels but, they had cosmetic or superficial damage, so he picked them up at a less expensive price.

Nevill, 31, has been studying electricity since he was a child. "It fascinated me that we make things work with something in these wires that we can't see," Nevill stated, "I owe a lot of my interest in this to my parents, they encouraged me to learn along the way. I was always building," he added.

Hindered in the past with taking care of the farm, Nevill is finally getting to expand his vast knowledge of electricity and mechanical devices. Nevill started this semester as a freshman at Texas Tech University in Lubbock. And, of course, he is studying engineering.

Beginning June 1, representatives from the Texas Agricultural Statistics Service will be contacting farmers and ranchers across the state to help set the 1989 planted acreage estimates and midyear livestock inventories.

"Information from these surveys will provide Texas producers with solid facts and figures they can use when making their production and marketing plans for 1989," state statistician Dennis Findley explained.

"The continued dry weather this spring and the changes in the national farm program may have altered producers' plans for 1989, and this survey will be the first accurate measure of midyear livestock inventories and acreage estimates," Findley added.

Individual reports will be combine with other reports to set state estimates. Results of the confidential interview, conduct by telephone or in person by field enumerators, will be published later this summer. The 1989 acreage forecast will be published July 12, and the midyear cattle inventory will be published July 28.

"Remember, these are sample surveys, so if you are contacted it is important to provide the requested information, since your one report represents similar operations of the same size and type. Our estimates can be no better than the numbers producers provide," Findley said.

New Pest Management Program Is Created

An integrated Pest Management Program has been created for Dawson and Lynn Counties by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Craig Forbis, Extension Agent-Entomology, came on board March 1 and will coordinate the program. This program has been set up to help Dawson and Lynn County producers, through assistance and training, to become more aware of the pest problems that exist in this particular area and how they can most efficiently and economically treat them. A Steering Committee is made up of

five people from each county to set guide lines for the Dawson/Lynn Counties Pest Management Association.

Since pest problems differ from area to area and the gin is usually the local gathering point for area producers, the program has been selected out into gin communities.

The committee voted on and approved a \$.10 bale assessment to be required for a gin community to participate in the 1989 Texas Agricultural Extension Service Dawson/Lynn County Pest Management Program. This money will go to fund scouts to survey fields in participating gin communities.

The number of bales to be assessed will be based on each gin's past four year average or if open less than four years, the average of years since open for operation.

For this bale assessment, each participating gin community will receive the following services:

1. **Adult Bollworm Monitoring:** Early season bollworm (*Heliothis*) moth traps will be placed in area to monitor moth activity. This will help us to make predictions on peak bollworm egg lay. This will act as an early warning system for your producers. Knowing ahead to time, when treatment might be needed, will allow producers to budget time and money to adequately treat these pest.

2. **Fields scouted weekly in your area:** Certain fields will be scouted weekly in your community by trained field scouts. The amount of acres to be checked will be prorated based on each gin's 4 year ginning average. A total of 7,000 acres will be checked in the two county area. Due to a high participation these acres will be very well scattered, therefore we will have a good handle on what

3. **Weekly Newsletter:** Each week a weekly newsletter will be sent to your customers. In this letter they will receive information on insect and crop activity in the Dawson/Lynn County area. Pest problems for the week will be discussed, as well as recommendations of how to treat the problem pest. As you are well aware of, the same pest may act differently on a week to week basis, thus establishing a need for a weekly newsletter. It will enable producers to stay on top of their crop's pest and to treat them in the most economical way.

This letter will be sent out from a customer mailing list provided by each participating gin. If a producer's gin does not participate, he may subscribe to this newsletter for a fee of \$10.00 per year.

4. **Turn Row Meetings:** Each gin community will have access to locally based Extension personnel as well District specialist, as needed. As insect problems build, we will have turn row meetings in your area to aid your producers in learning how to find and identify pest so that you can more accurately make treatment decisions.

5. **Field Demonstrations:** There will be field demonstrations conducted to hopefully help find a better way to economically treat pest in this area. There has been very little data collected on pest management techniques in dryland cotton areas.
