Busy Burglars Get Little For Efforts

Five businesses in New Home were burglarized in the early morning hours last Friday, but for their efforts, the burglars got only about \$40 in quarters stolen at one location. Four businesses were burglarized in O'Donnell on June 4, where much damage was done, but again the actual theft loss was small.

A suspect in another burglary of an O'Donnell residence was arrested and charged, three persons pleaded guilty of various felony charges and were sentenced during the last week, and Tahoka city officers investigated four accidents in the city during a week which kept county and city officers on the go.

Catarino Vargas, 36, of O'Donnell, was charged with burglary of a habitation, the residence of Julia Benavidez on 10th St. in O'Donnell on Thursday, June 8, after entry was gained through a window. The stolen items, valued at \$361, included a microwave, antique clock and a Yorx stereo system, which was recovered.

Mrs. Melvin Dutton reported that an apartment building in O'Donnell had two doors damaged when the doors were kicked recently by a suspect who was named.

At New Home Friday burglars took \$40 in quarters from a filing cabinet at Four Star Fertilizer, and stole a bank bag containing some gas pump keys at Eddins-Walcher Co. The keys later were found outside the building. At three other places in New Home which were burglarized the same night, there was damage to doors but no items reported missing. Those businesses were John Edwards Shop, New Home Farm Store and The Lady Bug.

James M. Williams reported that 27 joints of irrigation pipe had been stolen between June 5-10 from a farm two miles east of Redwine.

At O'Donnell on June 4, burglars took some tools from Forbes Motor Co. and used them in attempts to

open safes at the Ford dealership and three other businesses, failing in all four efforts to get the safes open, but doing considerable damage in each instance. No items other than the tools were reported missing. Targeted by the burglars that night were O'Donnell Co-Op Gin, Circle 4 Farm & Ranch Supply, Forbes and O'Donnell Lumber Co.

Isidro Ruiz, 27, of Lamesa, posted two bonds of \$10,000 each in Tahoka this week after he was charged with unlawful use of a motor vehicle plus fleeing from a police officer. He was arrested in a 1988 Ford which had been reported by owner Jesse Ayala as stolen Monday from B-B-Q Express in O'Donnell.

Three persons pleaded guilty of felony charges before 106th District Judge George Hansard in Tahoka Tuesday. Armandina Rodriguez Cantu, 39, of Tahoka pleaded guilty of a charge of tampering with a government record, and was sentenced to 10 years in prison, probated, plus \$2000 fine and restitution of \$171. Mae Linda Hood, 40, of Tahoka, also charged with tampering with a government record, was given a five-year probated sentence, fined \$500 and ordered to pay restitution totaling \$1,644.

Troy Richard Crowell of Pendleton, Ore., was sentenced to five years in prison for a recent burglary of the T-Bar Ranch headquarters building. Crowell, 29, had been arrested wearing several layers of clothing after the house had been burglarized.

Tahoka Police Dept. investigated two separate cases of bicycle thefts Tuesday, June 6. Ted Wiley of 2121 Main reported a White's Auto boy's 12-speed bicycle and a White's

lawnmower stolen from his back yard. Kathy Branson of 1713 N. 2nd reported a girl's 10-speed and also a boy's 10-speed bicycles stolen from her front porch.

Also on June 6, police investigated a collision at S. 10th and Ave. L involving a 1988 Chevrolet pickup driven by Brian Glen Keith of Tahoka and a 1986 Ford driven by Cheryl Hallmark Hogg of O'Donnell. No injuries were listed.

On Thursday, June 8, a 1978 Buick driven by Lupe Montes of Tahoka and a 1979 GMC pickup driven by Meldon E. Leslie of Tahoka collided in the 1600-block of Ave. L, with no injuries reported.

On Monday at S. Ave. J and the cemetery access road an accident was reported, involving a 1980 Buick driven by O.B. Sparks of Tahoka and a 1986 Chevrolet driven by Cecil Roberson Holt of O'Donnell. Holt was taken by EMS ambulance to Lynn County Hospital, where he was treated for minor injuries and released.

At N. 7th and Ave. M a collision Monday involved a 1984 GMC pickup driven by Vernon Truitt Slone, Tahoka, and a 1980 GMC pickup driven by Richard Bush Franklin of Tahoka. No injuries were reported.

Police also investigated one family disturbance and one aggravated assault during the last week.

In jail during the week were two persons for no liability insurance, one each for public intoxication, driving while intoxicated, unauthorized use of a motor vehicle and fleeing, DWI bond forfeiture, burglary of a habitation and the two charged with tampering with a government record.

School Hires New Teachers, Coaches

Two new coaches, an assistant principal/athletic coordinator and four new elementary teachers have been hired by Tahoka schools.

Employed as athletic coordinator and assistant principal for junior high and high school was Mike Smith, who comes to Tahoka from Ropesville, where he was head football coach and athletic director. He will not be coaching at THS, but will be in charge of all athletics as well as his duties as assistant principal.

Smith also has coached at Dumas, Brownfield, Sudan and Levelland. He is a 1982 graduate of Texas Tech and also is a graduate of Lubbock Coronado High School. He is married and they have no children.

New head basketball coach for boys is Hulon Kirkland, who was head basketball and football coach at Clarendon for the last two years. Kirkland coached at Bandera from 1977-80 and at Eagle Pass from 1975-77. He was in the U.S. Marine Corps from 1968-72 and served in Vietnam in 1969-70. He played basketball for Angelo State University, where he graduated in 1973. He also was youth director of the First Methodist Church in San Angelo. A 1965 graduate of Dumas High School, he also will teach history.

He is married and he and his wife, Nancy, have three children.

Kevin Grell, who was head football coach and athletic director at Tucuman, NM High School for the last two years, has been employed as offensive coordinator for football, and as history teacher. He also has coached in Clovis and at Lubbock Cooper High School. He is married, and they have three children.

Grell played offensive guard at Eastern New Mexico University, where he earned bachelors and mas-

ters degrees, and played guard for Phoenix (Ariz.) Community College. He also graduated from high school in Phoenix.

Four elementary teachers were hired by the school board at the group's regular monthly meeting last Thursday night. They are Brenda Cannon, Mizzi Bruton, Kathy Druessdow and Calene Newman. The classes they will teach have not yet been specified.

Bookkeeper Loretta Tekell reported that as of May 31, the tax collection totaled \$592,042, less \$9,291 in discounts, which is 95.3 per cent of the total tax roll.

The board agreed to amend the school calendar to start school a week earlier than originally specified, so classes for students will begin on Aug. 28.

Dr. Duane Carter, superintendent, advised the board of a recent Supreme Court ruling prohibiting prayer at athletic events, which means there will be no prayer on the public address system before football games next season.

Woodwork... By Dalton

FATHER'S DAY comes up Sunday, sandwiched neatly on the June calendar between Flag Day, which was Wednesday, and the first day of summer, which is next Wednesday. I'll talk about fathers and why they should be honored in a few paragraphs or so, but first, I want to look at some of the other holidays and special days listed for June.

Flag Day is June 14, the anniversary of the day in 1777 when the U.S. flag was adopted. So far as I know, it's not an official holiday for anybody. Also not an official holiday is June 21, the first day of summer when, according to the dictionary, either that day or the next one is the time in the Northern Hemisphere when the sun is farthest north of the equator. An almanac puts it a different way, saying that "anything north of the arctic circle receives 24 hours of daylight... beginning at 3:53 a.m. on June 21." This makes me glad I don't live north of the arctic circle. In fact, anything north of the (late unlamented) Tahoka traffic circle is too far north for me.

The calendar on the office wall says June 9 was "Shavuot". I missed it this year; in fact I never had heard of it until I noticed it on the calendar this week. I first thought it said "Shavnot" and was maybe a tribute to people with beards. The handy dictionary again helped, explaining that it is a Jewish holiday related to the time Moses staggered down the mountain with all those stone tablets.

June 18, this Sunday, not only is Father's Day, but also is "Brother-in-Law Day," according to a list of "Forgotten Holidays" in the Farmers Almanac. It is not listed on my calendar, but it is a day for being nice to your brother-in-law, like bailing him out of jail, giving him back his sister or paying him that \$20 you owe him.

Brother-in-Law Day probably will get even less attention than usual this year, since this time June 18 also is Father's Day, providing topics for all the ministers' sermons Sunday morning and giving old Dad a lot of recognition so you can kind of forget all about him the rest of the year.

Every child needs a father around as a role model, although some of us perhaps are more like roll models. And every father needs to be aware of the awesome responsibilities of fatherhood, something few fathers really appreciate until many years later when he suddenly realizes that he never is going to finish the job of being a father. Even when the kids get 40 years old and you are 60-something, you still have to worry about what they are involved in, and how you can help them.

Being a father is rewarding, though, especially when the offspring do something really good, or when they tell you they appreciate you on Father's Day. Every father should have children.

LATEST ITEM on my list of *Stupid Court Rulings* is a recent action by the Supreme Court prohibiting prayer at public school athletic events. This means no more prayers at home football games, no matter how far behind you are.

'Fantastic Fourth' Slated In Tahoka Mini Park

Tahoka Chamberettes are planning a July 4th celebration in Tahoka with games, entertainment, hot dogs and ice cream throughout the evening slated at the Tahoka Mini-Park. The festivities will begin at 5 p.m. Tuesday, July 4 and will last until about 10 p.m. All area residents are invited to bring lawn chairs and participate in the evening's activities.

Tent awnings will be set up in the park for shade, and the Chamberette concession stand will offer hot dogs, chili, pickles, tea and soft drinks, and possibly candy bars and popcorn. There will be an "Ice Cream Freeze-Off" contest, and local residents are encouraged to make a freezer of ice cream to donate to the celebration, have it judged by several local "tasters" and then Chamberettes will sell cups of ice cream to help pay for celebration expenses.

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Financial Fitness After First Paycheck

Summer signals a time of new jobs for many new graduates. It's a time when young adults enter the money world for real.

For the first time, there are bills to be paid, financial information to be deciphered, credit to contend with, bank accounts to open, savings to think about and the purchases to be made—all with your own paycheck. Creating order from chaos is a challenge for many young adults.

The first rude awakening comes with the realization that your paycheck is smaller than you expected to be. Why? Perhaps you forgot about the various deductions—for taxes, insurance, retirement or other payroll deductions. If you based your financial plans on the whole picture instead of just your take-home pay, go back to the drawing board. Avoid becoming over-extended. Base your budget on your take-home pay.

Drawing up a written budget is a good idea. Try to estimate how much your expenses will be. First, make a list of all the main categories you'll be spending money for: rent, car payment, insurance, groceries, clothing, gasoline and utilities. Don't forget things like savings and loan payments.

If the outgo on paper looks like it's going to exceed your take-home income, then you'll have to do some

belt-tightening. Try reducing the amounts you estimate you will spend in certain categories. Remember, you must meet your basic obligations such as rent, utilities and loan payments first.

If you have a major shortfall, then you'll have to face some serious decision-making. Can you reduce your housing costs? What about sharing the rent with a roommate, or moving to a less expensive place? Can you reduce your food expenses by eating out less often, eating out at less costly places, or carrying your own lunch? Can you reduce your car insurance costs by taking a drivers' safety course or increasing the amount of deductibles? Look at every expense category to see if there are ways you can reduce what you spend.

If you have a student loan, make sure you always make your monthly loan payments. Failure to do so can ruin your credit rating. Being prompt in payments will save you the embarrassment of your creditors (school, lender, state and federal government) taking action against you.

While you are repaying your student loan, be careful about how much other debt you assume. Try to follow the rule of thumb that you commit no more than 20 percent of your monthly income to repaying con-

sumer debt. That means the total amount of your student loan, car payment, personal loans and credit card payments should not exceed 20 percent of your monthly income. This rule of thumb excludes home mortgages.

If you go over 20 percent in consumer debt, you may find yourself using credit even more to stay afloat, making only the minimum payment due, or failing to pay all your bills every month. Eventually, you will find yourself in deeper debt than you had ever guessed you would be.

So, it pays to be cautious and to establish a good credit history when you're young. That way, when you need to borrow money in the future, you are more likely to be approved for a loan.

Getting organized may take some effort in the beginning, but it will pay off in the long run.

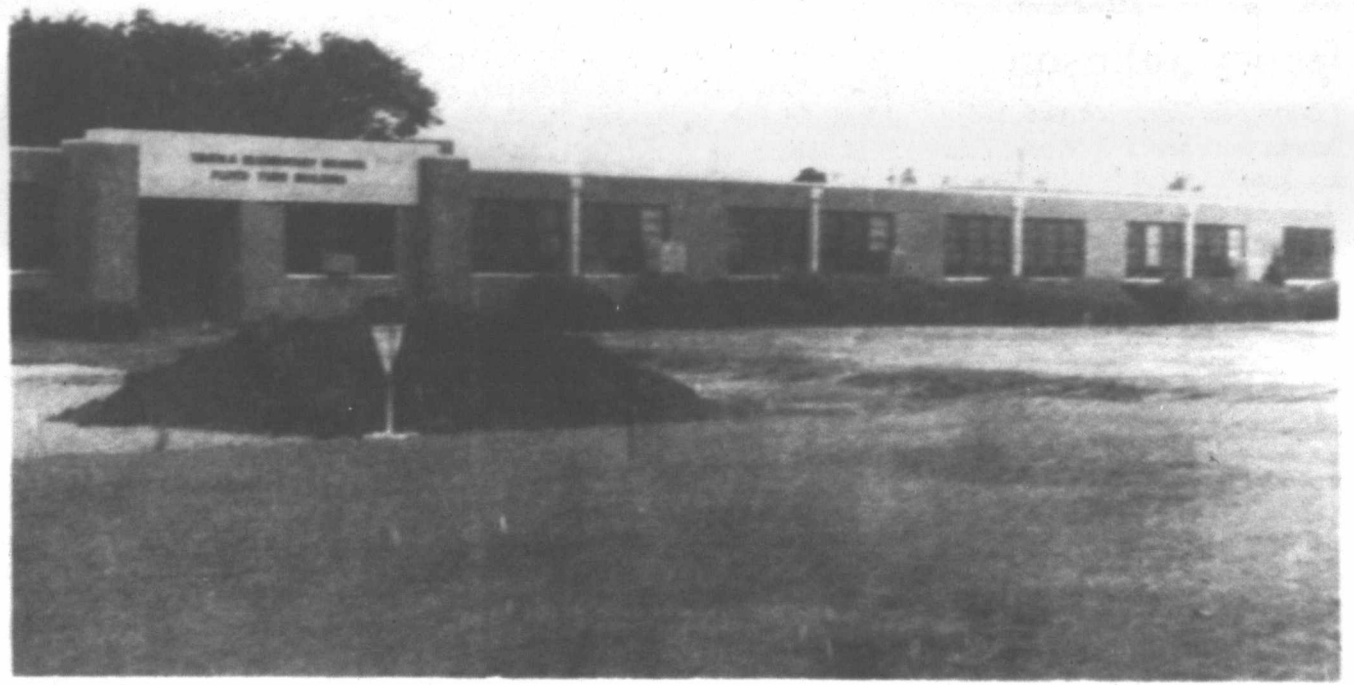

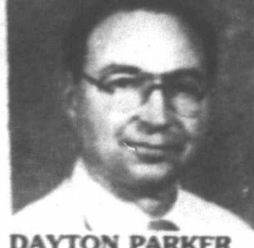
The Guest Register at the Museum indicated that visitors during the month of June came from New Mexico, Nebraska, Wyoming, California, and points around Texas.

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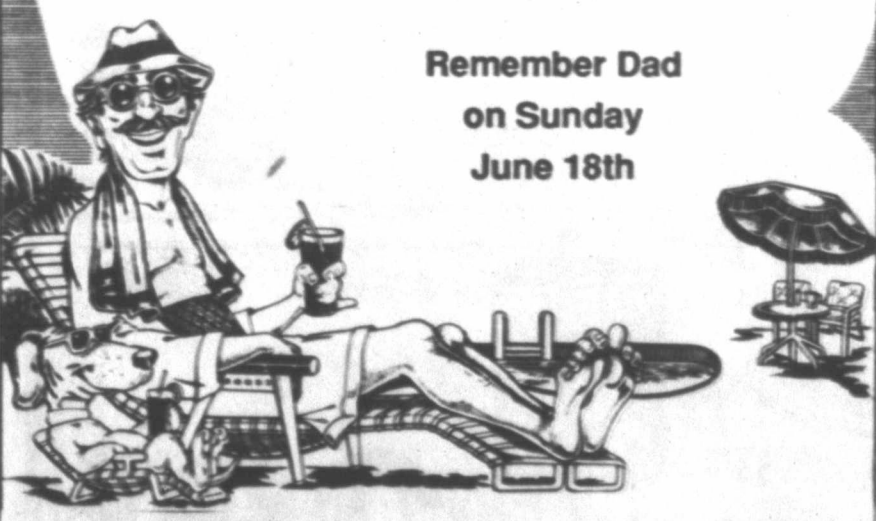

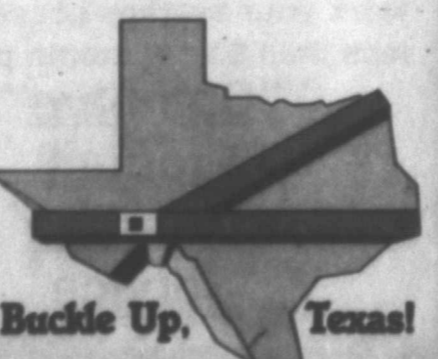

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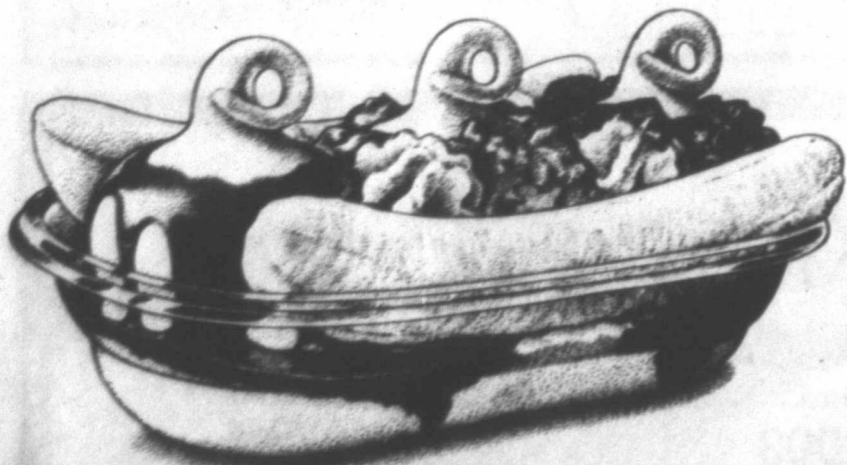

**Sales Taxes
Still Ahead
Of 1988 Pace**

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Friday that local sales tax allocations to cities, counties, and transit authorities across the state increased 14.2 percent during the first half of 1989, compared to the first half of 1988.

In O'Donnell 1989 payments to date was \$6,956.93; 1988 payments to date was \$6,057.97; a 4.49% change. In Tahoka, net payment this period was \$3,673.46; comparable payment prior year, \$4,238.49; -13.33% change; 1989 payments to date, \$32,595.35; 1988 payments to date \$31,409.14; a 3.78% change. In Wilson, 1989 payment to date was \$2,715.04; 1988 payment to date was \$2,952.02; a -8.03% change.

"The Texas economy continues to strengthen and expand, and the local sales tax rebates reflect that growth," Bullock said. "Even payments to economic areas that haven't fully recovered, such as Austin and San Antonio, are improving."

In the first six months of 1989, statewide city allocations totaled \$512.5 million. Last year's payments for the first six months were \$465.9 million.

Bullock added that the June 1988 monthly allocation was usually large, so this month's payments compared to June 1988 payments may appear to be slightly lower than they actually are.

Time To Wage War On Pine Tip Moth

The pine tip moth can be a serious pest of young pine trees planted by homeowners on the South Plains. And right now is one of the few times homeowners can effectively fight back.

The larvae of this moth bore into the growing tips of the trees, causing them to turn brown. Severely infested trees develop a bushy appearance over time.

The tip moth passes the winter as a pupa within the injured terminals and twigs of the tree. Moths emerge in late March and early April and begin the first of several generations which will occur during the summer.

Female moths lay eggs on the needles and stems. After hatching, the young larvae bore into the tip and begin feeding. After several weeks of feeding and constructing a tunnel in the tip of the stem, the larvae pupate. The adult moth then emerge from their pupal cases, and a new cycle of generation begins.

Properly time application of an insecticide is the best way to reduce pine tip moth populations and damage.

Since this pest spends most of its life cycle protected inside the pine tip, foliar sprays are most effective when the young larvae are just hatching from the egg.

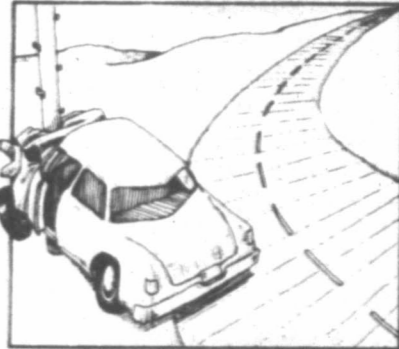
To properly time these applications, pheromone traps can be used to detect the presence of adults moths and determine when eggs are being laid and new cycles are beginning. Traps in Lubbock have recently begun catching moths of the second generation, indicating it is time to apply an insecticide.

Foliar-applied insecticides recommended for homeowners include Orthene and dimethoate. Adding a small amount of liquid soap or surfactant to the spray solution will improve control because it helps the insecticide adhere to the treated trees.

Always read and follow label instructions when applying insecticides.
