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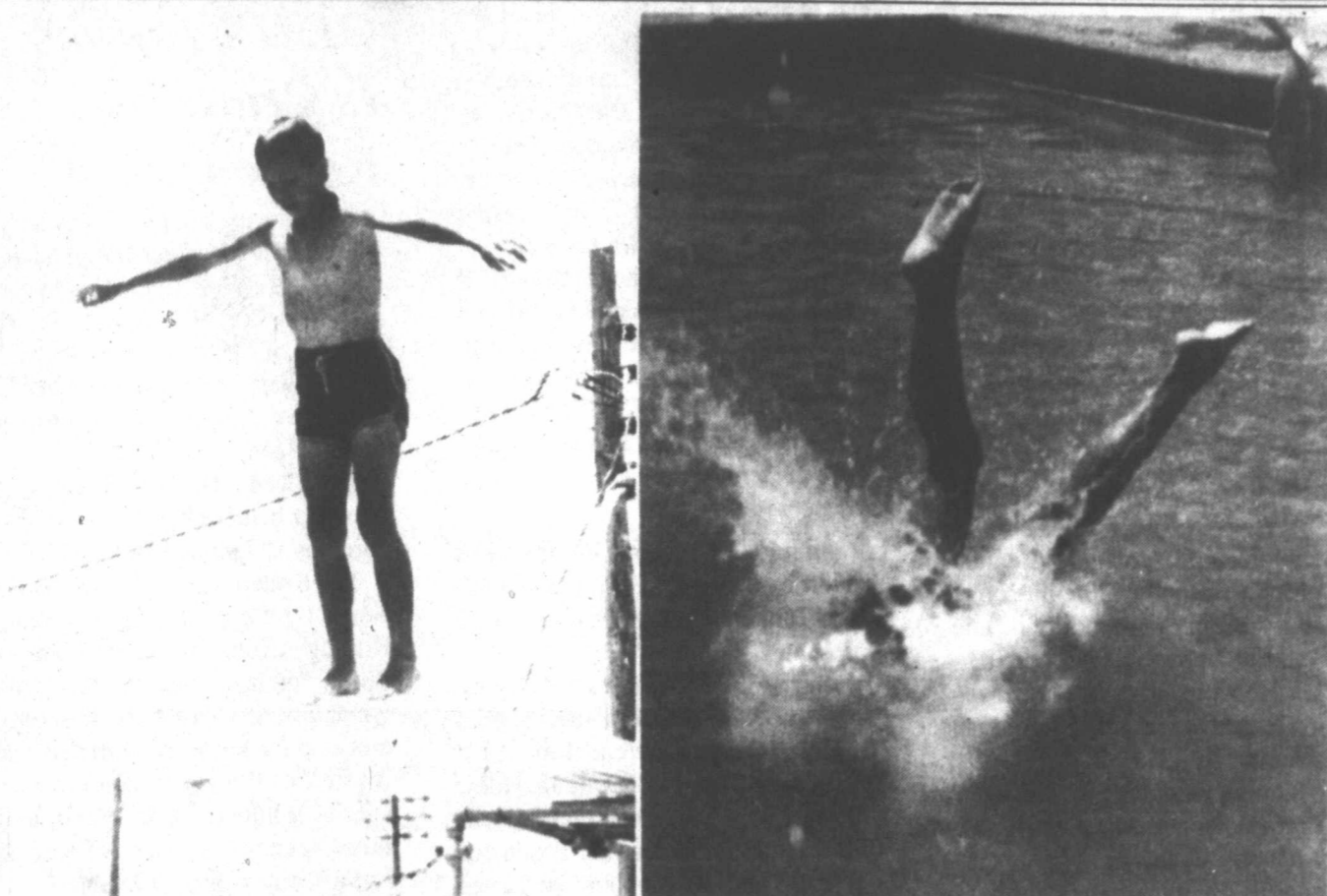

Woodwork...

SCOTT AND WHITE Hospital in Temple has mailed us a news release about the importance of wearing sunglasses, because bad things happen to your eyes if you go out in the bright sun without them.

In bright sunlight without shades people squint, said the release, which termed this "our eyes' built-in way of protecting themselves." Sunglasses, said the story, are "very important," because, like our skin, our eyes absorb light and the effects can accumulate over time. "Studies have shown that ultraviolet (UV) light may aggravate cataracts and may even cause retinal damage to the eyes."

It's a good thing I wear sunglasses outside most of the time in summer, because my eyes are in bad enough shape already. I've been told all my life that I don't open them wide enough. They already look like two slits in a blanket, so if I close them any further, they will be shut and I will go around bumping into even more things.

There are good sunglasses and bad ones, and a higher price doesn't necessarily mean good ones, according to the director of ophthalmology at Scott and White. What is important, he says, is to buy sunglasses that fit close to the eye, have large lenses and have a UV protection label on them. The color of the glasses has no bearing on their protection value, and the darker lenses may not be any better than the lighter ones, he said. He noted that the coating applied to sunglasses to filter out UV light is clear; therefore, the color or tint indicates nothing about the protection quality of the glasses.

The story also noted that light, both visible and invisible (as the UV light), is strongest between 10 a.m. and 2 p.m. Obviously everyone, except those people working for me, should have inside jobs which start at 10 and end at 2.

I go through about 38 pairs of sunglasses a year. Thirty-six of them I lose, and the earpieces fall off the other two. I do have one expensive pair which I have had more than two years. They are in the glove box of my car and I have worn them only twice. At more than 50 bucks, they are too expensive to carry around in my pocket and lose.

Only once before did I ever own any expensive shades. I paid \$25 for some I got from my optometrist back in the 60s, and about a week later they fell out of my pocket, which I discovered only after I had backed the pickup over them.

For Father's Day one of our daughters gave me four pairs of sunglasses. She explained that she decided to get me four moderately priced pairs instead of one expensive pair, because she knows I lose them all the time. So far I have worn one of the pairs, and put the others away so I would have them when I lose these. The only problem is that I can't remember where I put the sack with the three extra pair. I guess this time, I lost three pair at once.

My wife says she can't understand how I can remember the score of a football game played more than 20 years ago, and also who scored the touchdowns, and can't remember where I put my sunglasses five minutes ago. I don't understand it either.

My Bible says we see through a glass darkly, but that's only for those who can locate their sunglasses.

County Names New Veterans Service Officer

Welch Flippin has been employed as new Veterans Service Officer for Lynn County in action taken by Lynn County commissioners at their regular meeting Monday. Flippin succeeds James Reed, who recently resigned from that job. Flippin will be available on Wednesdays at the Lynn County courthouse.

Commissioners also approved a three-year tax exemption policy for new industries locating in the city of Tahoka which are not in competition with existing businesses. This move to attract new business is in conjunction with similar action taken by the City of Tahoka.

Sheriff Jack Miller appeared in connection with a request for a new vehicle for the sheriff's department.

Much of Monday's session, attended by all commissioners and County Judge J.F. Brandon, was spent in discussion of the upcoming 1990 budget.

Furniture Olé Moves To New Location Here

Furniture Olé, owned by Marguerite Sawyer and operated by her and her husband Bill on the west side of the square for the last two years, this week moved into a new location at 1452 Ave. J, on the southwest corner of the square in Tahoka.

"This move will give us much more room and better facilities to serve our customers in the Tahoka area," said Mrs. Sawyer.

The store will have open house in its new location all day Friday. Anyone coming into the store Friday may register for one of three door prizes to be given away at a drawing at 6 p.m. No purchase is necessary, and the winners do not have to be present to win. Top prize is 100,000 pesos, which Sawyer said was worth about \$45. Second prize is a \$50 savings bond and third prize is \$20 cash.

Mrs. Sawyer's experience in the furniture business includes 16 years of employment in a furniture store in Del Rio, where she also managed a dental office for more than a year.

She attended Texas State College for Women in Denton where she majored in home economics education. She and Bill Sawyer were married July 16, 1949 in Dallas. They have two sons, Marty of Miles, TX, and Stuart of Tahoka, and three grandsons. The Sawyers are members of the Tahoka First United Methodist Church.

OFFICERS MAKE RAID AT O'DONNELL

578 Cans Of Beer Seized

Fourteen law enforcement officers, led by Lynn County Sheriff's Dept. officers and including officers from Dawson County, the Dept. of Public Safety and an O'Donnell City officer, raided two residences in O'Donnell Friday night, confiscating a total of 578 cans of beer and 40 pints of whiskey.

Two O'Donnell men, age 68 and

52, were arrested and later paid fines of \$695 each assessed by Judge J.F. Brandon in county court on charges of illegal sale of alcoholic beverages, a misdemeanor charge.

Lynn County officers also arrested two young men, age 16 and 17, in Wilson this week in possession of a late model pickup which had been reported stolen in Arizona. The two

were to be turned over to Arizona authorities.

Harvey Craig reported several items stolen off a John Deere tractor at his farm about six miles northeast of Tahoka during the last week. Stolen items, valued at a total of \$594, included an alternator, muffler, CB radio and hand tools.

Donna Willis reported to Tahoka Police Dept. that Tahoka Flowers, 1614 Main, had been burglarized between 6 p.m. and 8 p.m. Friday. A back door had been pried open and approximately \$85 cash stolen from a cash register. Damage to the door was estimated at \$150.

Police investigated a minor accident on Wednesday, July 5, at First National Bank parking lot. Involved were a 1979 pickup driven by Kensie Walter Phillips of Tahoka and a 1988 Oldsmobile driven by Harvey Lee Duckett of Tahoka. No injuries were reported.

In jail during the week were the two for illegal sale of alcoholic beverages, three persons for driving while intoxicated, one for DWI plus no drivers license, two for application to revoke probation on DWI charges, with one of these also charged with DWI second offense, and one for theft by taking.

The Lynn County jail was also holding 15 federal prisoners as of Wednesday.

City Makes Plans For Emergencies

Tahoka city council members took action at Monday night's regular meeting to ensure that there will be an organized plan of action to be put into effect in case of any emergency threatening city residents, such as tornadoes, toxic waste threat, nuclear attack, or a chemical spill.

An ordinance establishing procedures for city employees to follow in case of emergency was passed, plus a resolution to establish a Lynn County Emergency Organization, under which both city and county employees will have assigned duties in any such emergency. The county has not yet acted on the matter, but is expected to do so.

City officials also passed an ordinance regulating U-turns and backing on city streets. The ordinance specifies that U-turns are unlawful "in the middle of the block", but may be allowed at intersections with the driver making such U-turns fully responsible for the safety of the action. "This won't keep the young people from turning around at the end of the drag," said City Manager Barry Pittman.

The ordinance specifies that a vehicle may not back into an intersection or over a crosswalk, or more than 25 feet in one direction. Most traffic violations carry a fine of \$53 per offense.

Police Chief Jerry Webster was present to give council members a report on the last month's activities in his department.

Fire Marshal Jerry Ford told the council that two fires were started by fireworks over the July Fourth holi-

day. The council subsequently decided to order a more strict enforcement of the ordinance prohibiting shooting fireworks in the city limits the next holiday in which fireworks are offered.

All council members and Mayor Jim Solomon were present.

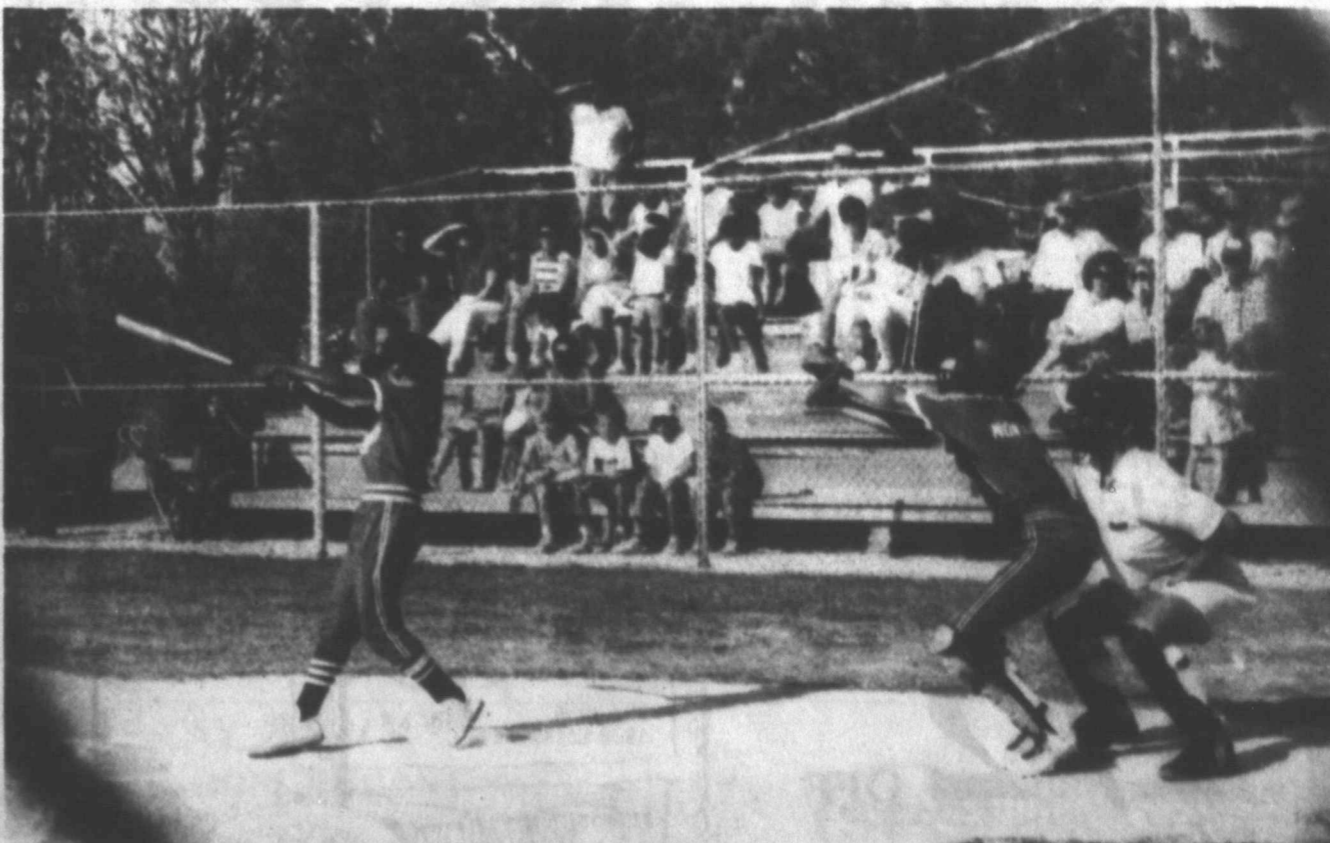

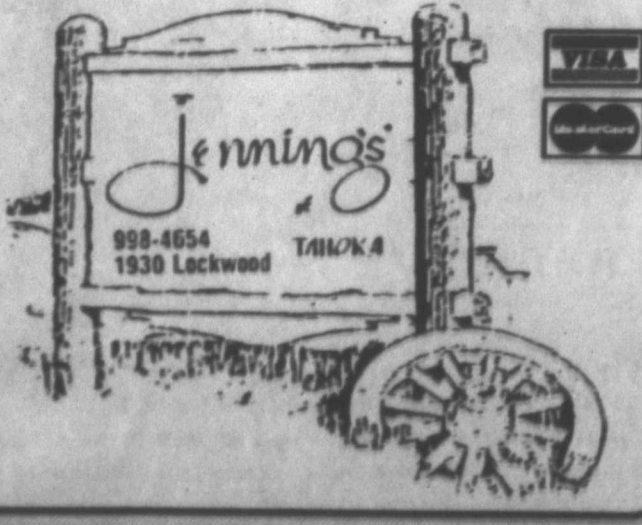

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SCS Offers Information On Irrigation Water Management

Irrigation water management can be compared to managing your bank account. The moisture in the top two feet of the soil profile, which is readily available to plants, can be compared to a checking account. While the soil moisture in the three and four foot levels, can be compared to a savings account. It will be utilized when the moisture in the top two feet is in short supply or during critical periods for water stress, i.e. during critical plant growth stages.

The key to high crop yields is to begin the crop year with a full bank account- soil profile at field capacity. Then replace the amounts utilized by the plants, thru supplemental irrigations, as the profile is depleted throughout the growing season.

Irrigation water management comes down to six basic questions:

"How much moisture can be utilized by the plants (is available to the plants)?" "How much moisture is being used by the crop?" "When should I irrigate?" "How much should I irrigate?" and "How much am I usually putting down?" To help answer these questions irrigators can visit the local SCS office to get assistance with their water management.

The local SCS office can provide locally developed Fact Sheets, Water Management Notes, and Crop Coefficients to help irrigators arrive at estimates of how much water a particular soil profile holds, how much of the soil is available to the plant's roots, and how much water the crop is using. Once these questions are answered, an irrigator can predict when and how much additional water the crop will require for maintenance

and production.

There are several different irrigation management schemes which irrigators can use to obtain maximum benefit from limited water supplies. One scheme is to irrigate the crop when the readily available moisture is used and the soil is at about 50 percent available water capacity. The calculation used to plan future irrigations is:

Days before irrigations= current available moisture-50% available water capacity daily water use.

Another management scheme is to apply irrigation water during the most critical growth stages of crops. Under this management scheme, the irrigator may choose to deplete more than 50% of the available moisture reserves in a soil before applying an irrigation. By applying water during the most critical growth stages of crops, supplemental irrigation can be most effectively utilized, however total crop yields may suffer as a result of this type of management. The critical periods for soil stress are:

Cotton- flowering and boll formation
Grain Sorghum- tillering to boot stage and heading, flowering, and grain formation.

Regardless of the management scheme used, the irrigator needs a reliable means of determining how much water is being applied and how much water is present in the profile. The local SCS office can assist irrigators perform irrigation well evaluations, measure well outputs, and monitor soil moisture levels. Visit your local SCS office to obtain more information on irrigation water management.

It is my understanding that the Tahoka Community Center, operated by the City, is supposed to be for use by the citizens who pay the prescribed fee of \$25 for a day, with this money presumably to be used for utilities, and a deposit put up to pay for the use and assure that the users will clean up the facility when they are finished.

This arrangement is fine in theory, but it doesn't always work out that way, and certainly did not for our family last weekend. We reserved the facility weeks ahead of time for an annual family reunion which includes many out-of-town visitors and on Friday put up our deposit of \$50. When we went to the center Sunday morning expecting to get ready for those coming in for lunch, we found no tables or chairs in the building, and found the building filthy, obviously not cleaned up by whoever used it last (or by anyone else in recent months). Without tables and chairs, we could not have our meeting there, and had to put up signs asking visitors to go to an outdoor location.

The city did refund our money, but there obviously is something wrong with the administration of the center which is supposed to be for general use by the public, especially for family reunions.

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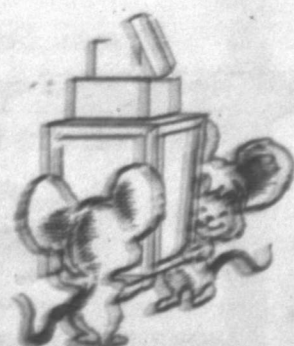
