Area Angelo State University students at San Angelo are listed on the dean's honor roll for the fall semester at the university.

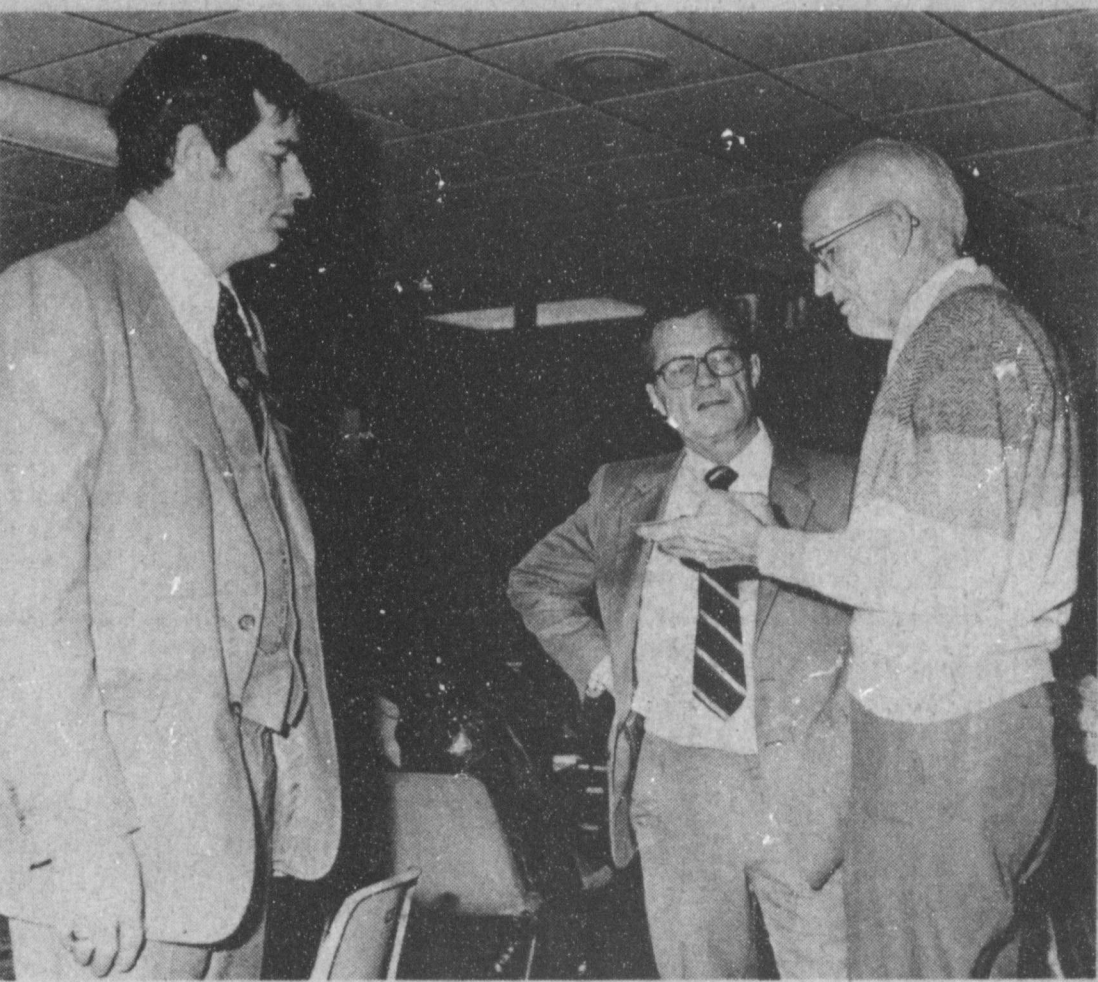

Greenbug Increase Is Noted In County

By Spencer Tanksley, County Extension Agent

Reports from area entomologist, Dr. James Leser, show that greenbug populations are being found in increasing numbers in wheat fields on the Rolling Plains. Control measures have been necessary in some counties during early and mid January. Reports have been relayed to us that greenbug populations are building on the High Plains.

Population counts of 200 plus per foot of drill-row and damage symptoms are showing. These observations were made prior to this last cold period. Even severe weather kills very few greenbugs. Essentially all it does is cease reproduction and cause them to retreat into cracks

If you were not at the candidate's meeting at the Bailey County Exhibition Center and Coliseum Monday night, you missed an excellent opportunity to listen to two of the leading candidates for the office of State Senator.

Both Bill Sarpalius and Gerald McCathern were given the opportunity to present their views on current issues, then a question and answer session followed.

Sarpalius was the first speaker, and the young man who grew up at Boys Ranch said he was not going to make a lot of promises, but instead, planned to speak about goals for the future.

Speaking to the small group who attended the meeting sponsored by the W.I.F.E. organization, Sarpalius said the prerequisite for senator included a willingness to work hard; a dedication to serve the people on a grassroots level and to listen to issues and ideas.

He commented, "To serve the people, you have to go to the people."

Sarpalius and Gerald McCathern very closely followed the basic issues, including inflation, energy, water importation, agriculture programs and more care for the elderly.

McCathern advocated taking a long, hard look at the welfare programs and eliminate welfare pay-

ments for people who were physically able to work.

Both deplored the apathy apparently shown by citizens who do not concern themselves with the politics, but continue to 'gripe' about sorry government and government officials.

"Regardless of who is elected," said McCathern, "we are only one person and if we are not backed by the people of the district, we cannot do anything in

the senate."

Both spoke on the heavy vote toward the urban areas, where most of the senators reside, and said senators from the cities do not understand rural problems.

They were also both emphatic that water supplies are 'running out' in this area, and water importation is imperative for the future of this agricultural area.

On inflation, both spoke on the continuing rise in taxation and believed a tax revolt was imminent, in the event taxes continue to rise. Also both advocated

Construction Bids Sought For Housing

Senior Citizen housing is fast becoming a reality in Muleshoe. With this issue of The Journal, a legal notice is in the classified page, seeking bids for construction of a 20-unit complex.

Unfortunately, although the Muleshoe Housing Authority had sought 50 units initially, on the basis of applications submitted by senior citizens, the government said funds would be available only for a smaller complex. However, plans at this time are to reapply for additional funds to expand the first unit to be constructed.

Harmon Elliott, chairman of the Muleshoe Housing Authority, said bids will be opened at 2 p.m. on Thursday, March 13, for construction of the first 20 units of the complex.

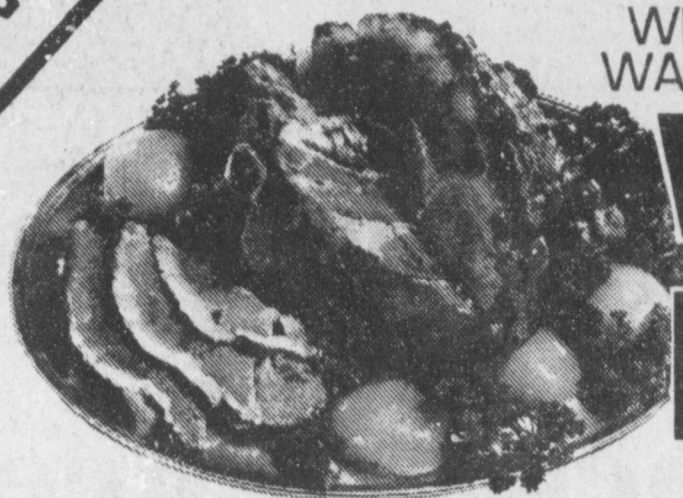

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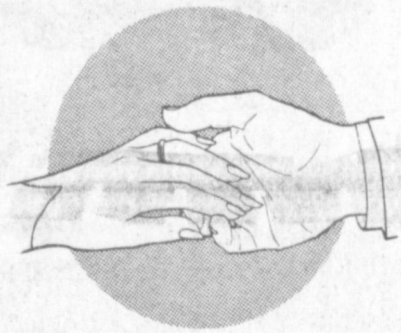

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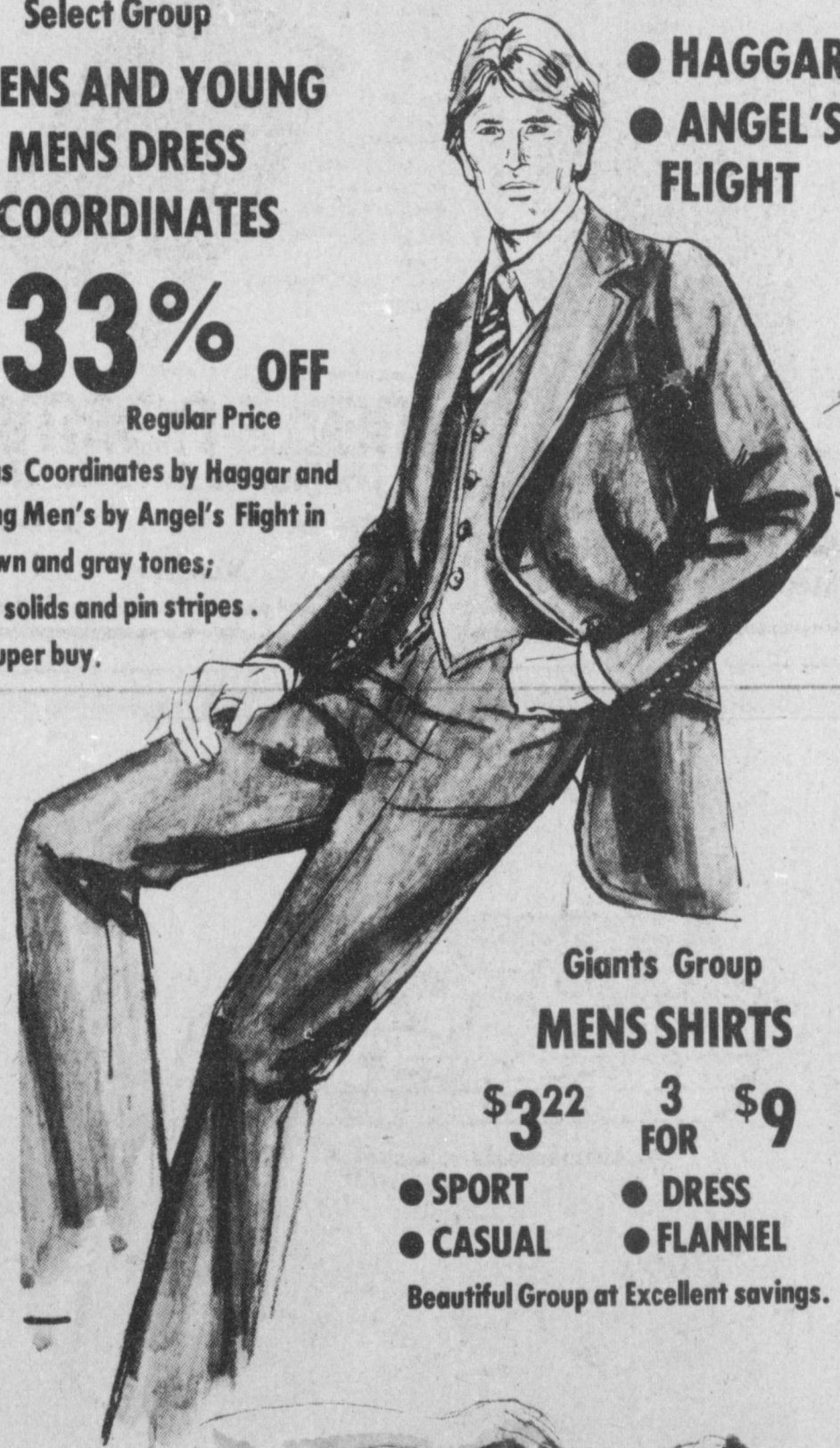
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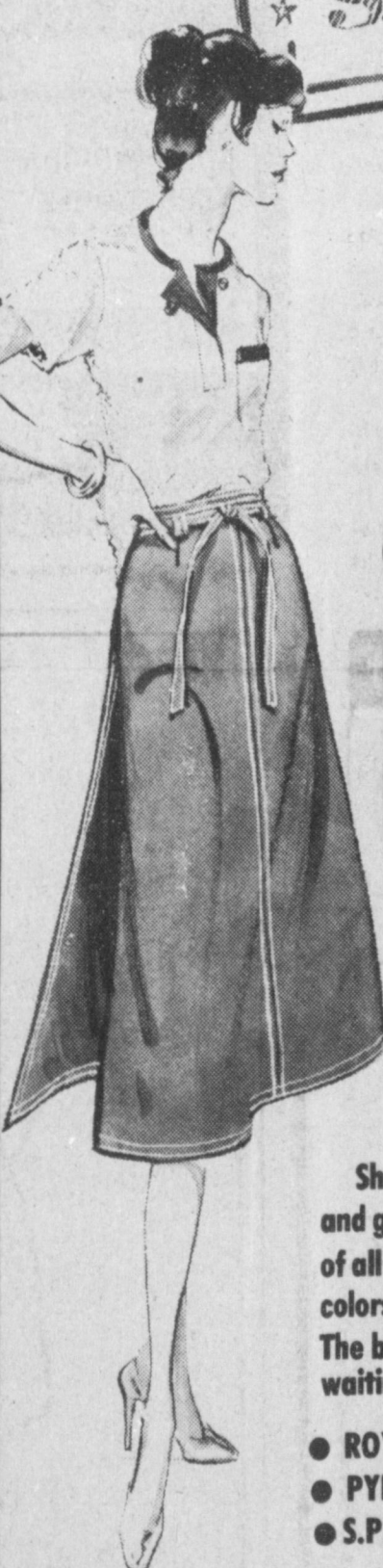
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Carol Jones, Sexton Exchange Double Ring Vows

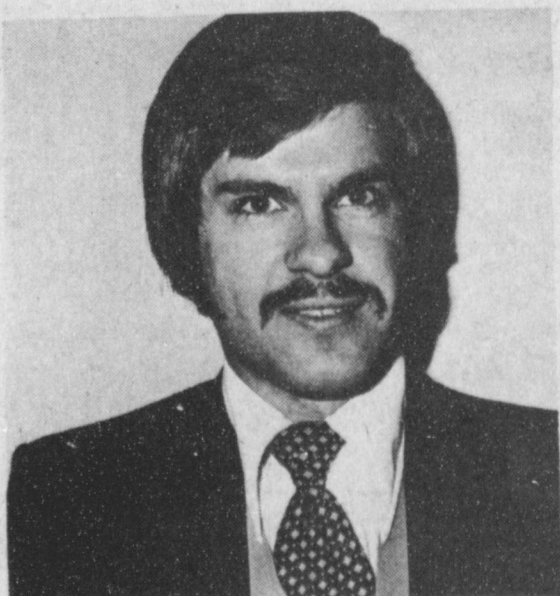

perhaps eliminating some of the useless government agencies, who were 'dead-wood' but continued to spend tax dollars.

With schools the biggest business in the state, both spoke at length on problems facing the school systems, and both underwent intense questioning from the audience on school problems, and plans to try to help upgrade the school systems and teachers.

On a proposal for increased sales taxes, it was advocated that an across-the-board sales tax for everything, could eliminate up to 80 percent of the ad valorem taxes.

Fuel alcohol was boosted as one fuel for the future, along with Sarpalus commenting that raw alcohol could be used in the manufacture within the state of many industrial items, including cosmetic and carpet.

They cautioned voters to listen to the candidates, on all levels, hear their proposals and see where they stand on the issues that are of vital concern.

In the future, both candidates plan a return to Muleshoe to speak again before election. They both said they would like to have more people visit the meeting and ask questions that are bothering them, and the candidates will attempt to have answers.

A portion of their stand on issues will be broken down in future issues of the Journal for voters to study before election.

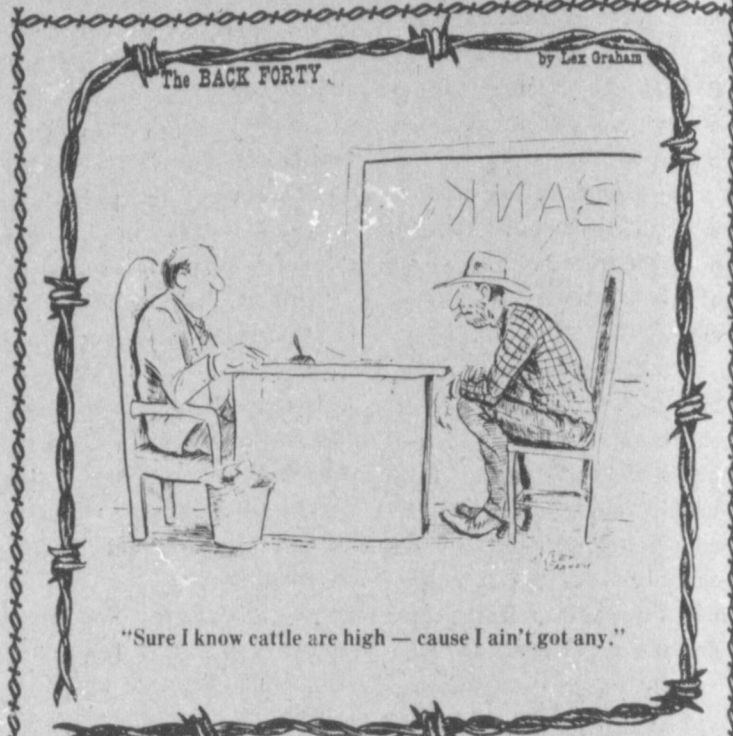

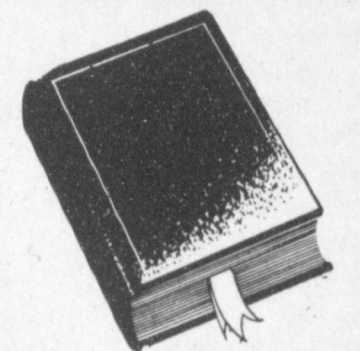

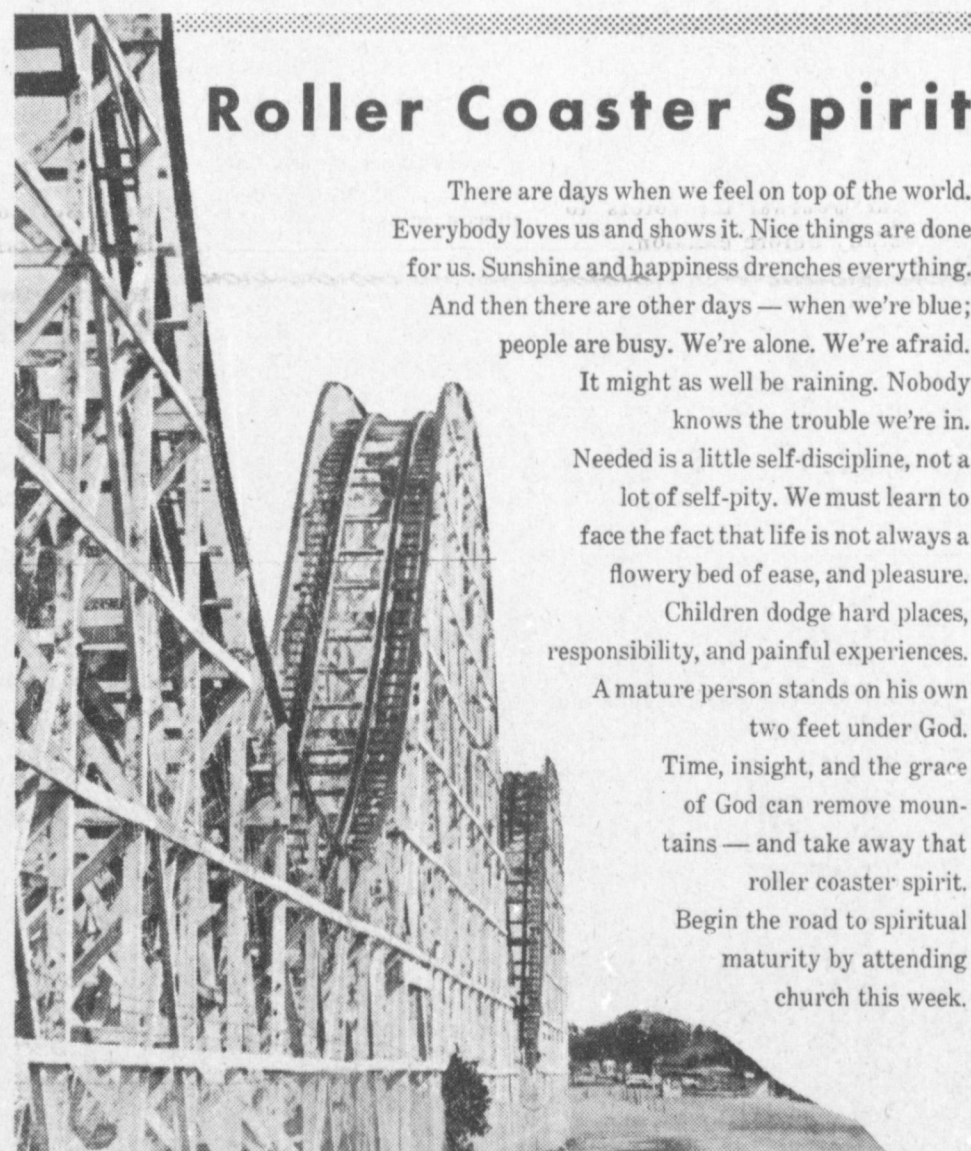

Jon Miller and Linda Shafer each received two certificates.

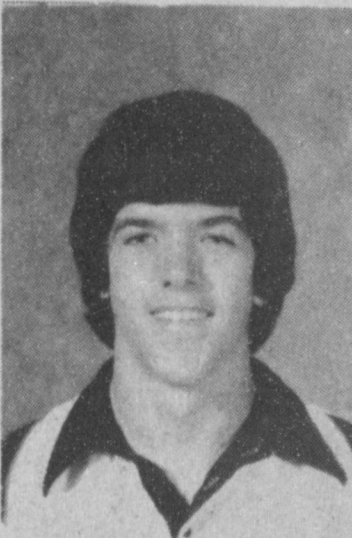

Fifteen Oil painting certificates were awarded, and the Mulestrators won ten of them.

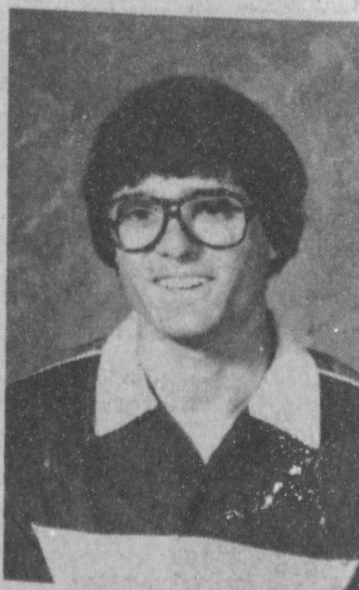

Earl Richards Reflects On Life Spent Operating Cotton Gins

"Things do not change; we change." Henry David Thoreau

Men are not stagnant with the passing of time. In the mirror of one man's life there may be reflections of many changes over the passing of his days. It is man changing, however and enacting his change on his world that causes his world to change.

West Texas Farmer: What runs a cotton gin?

Average American: Electricity of course!

STF: Wrong!

AA: Wrong? But you can't run a gin without electricity or some sort of power.

WTF: There is something else you can't do without.

AA: Oh, you mean a press, cleaner, dryer, and all that stuff? or employees? or cotton?

WTF: Or a manager?

AA: Oh yeah. A manager.

WTF: What about a manager who's been there for 25 years? Or a man who's been in the ginning business for 44 years?

AA: Yeah!

WTF: Now lets try another question. What runs the Muleshoe Co-op Gin?

AA: Oh that's easy, Earl Richards!

WTF: Wrong! Dummy! Earl Richards is who runs it not what runs it.

Earl Richards started working for his first cotton gin in 1936, "the year social security was invented" he laughed. He worked at Paymaster in Memphis (Hall County) for nine years. He started out working on the press, "I

did that from four to five years, then I went from helping gin to ginning."

Richards managed his first Co-op Gin in Alaska, Tex., for ten years. Then in 1955 he moved to Muleshoe because "I was looking for a better job" he said, and "I heard they were looking for a manager here."

Some welcome changes have come through the years. When Richards first started working in cotton gins he made 30 cents an hour and "back then you didn't get paid for overtime." He made a weekly salary of \$18.00 "but that could buy a lot of groceries then."

Richards has seen gins pass through a number of power sources from steam boilers to diesel, natural gas, and finally electricity.

Obviously efficiency has improved with time. When Richards began at the Muleshoe Co-op Gin it had one gin plant that had been there for two years. It could gin about nine bales an hour. Now they have three gin plants and can gin up to thirty bales an hour. The average ginning season used to be about three months long, now the main ginning period only lasts about six weeks.

Richards says that there are about the same amount of farmers patronizing the gin now as when he first started. Everything just moves faster now.

There have been many improvements since Richards came into the cotton business. For the last two years the modules have helped the farmers to replace the baskets, a

great advantage to them. However, Richards thinks the greatest improvements in the business have been in the quality and capacity of the machinery. "Basically the equipment is still the same" (the stand, dryer, press, cleaner, lint cleaners...) but the quality of this equipment has been upgraded over the years. The improved quality of gin machinery has enabled the gin to have a "higher capacity and gin faster," he said.

What kind of responsibility is it to run a cotton gin?

Richards said the Muleshoe Co-op Gin handles 250 active customers and during ginning season employs about 100 employees to run the gin. During the off-season, the basic tasks are repairing the gin to get it ready for the next season and selling supplies. Usually 6 or 7 employees can handle this.

After 44 years in the business and 25 years as manager of the Muleshoe Co-op Gin, What's it like to think about retiring? "I'm kinda looking forward to it" Richards says.

When asked what he will do now, Richards says, "may fish, play golf," but "I won't quit working I've been working too long."

Richards feels like he's old enough to retire but still young enough to keep on working. When asked what kind of a job he would consider, he said, "I don't know, I've been in agriculture all my life, both farming, and ginning."

"But I can do alot of other things." "I hope anyway."

Earl Richards was born in Donley County, grew up mostly in Hall County, with the exception of ten years spent in Floyd County. Richards married his wife Opal Willis, in 1938. She also is "like me, an oldtimer from around there." (Hall County) Earl and Opal have two daughters, both presently residing in Austin. His oldest daughter Rosemary Allison (37) is a legal secretary for a Supreme Court Judge in Austin. His youngest daughter Shirley (33) is a nurse. They have two grandchildren David Allison (18) who attends the University of Texas at Austin and Todd Allison (17).

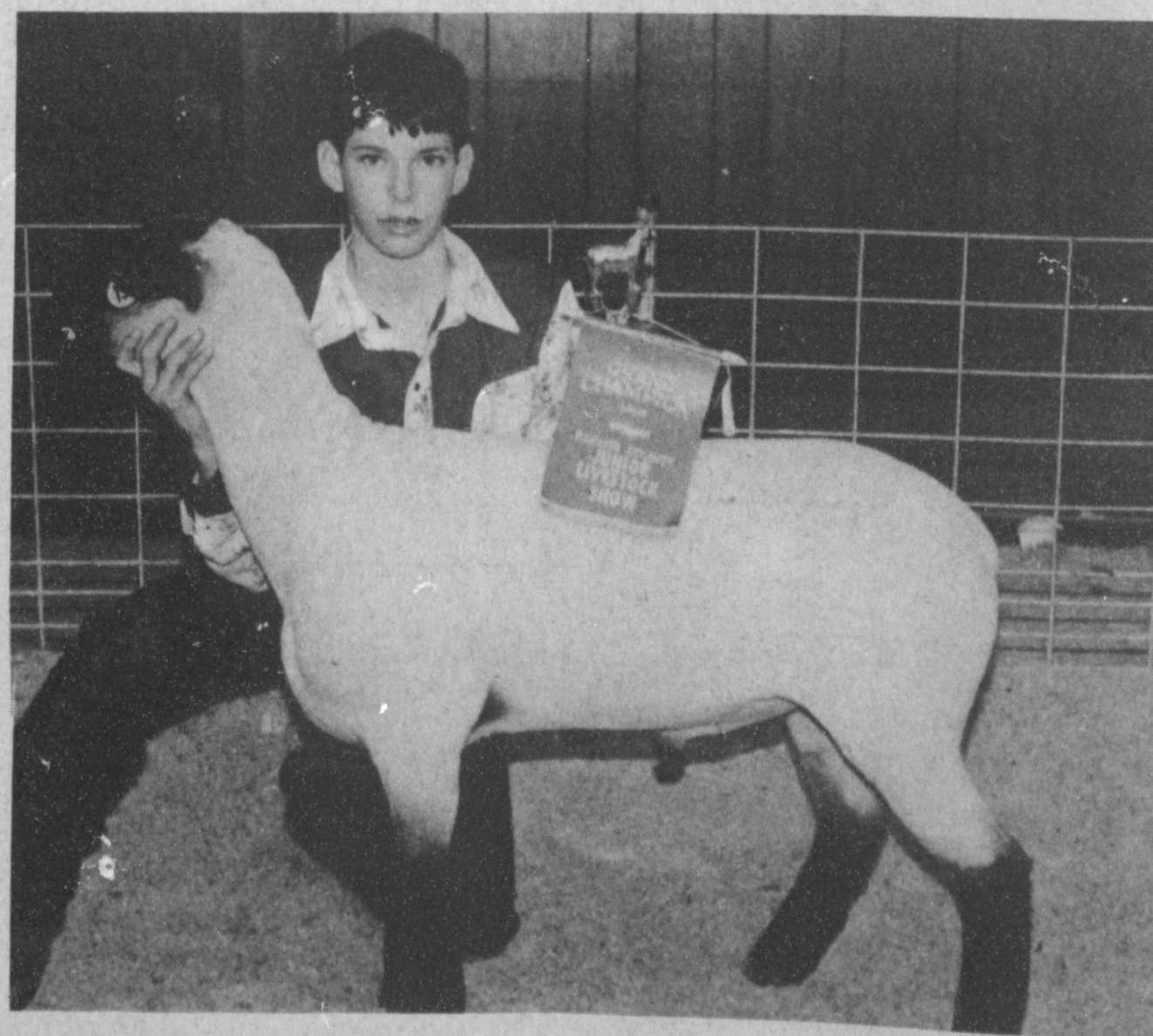

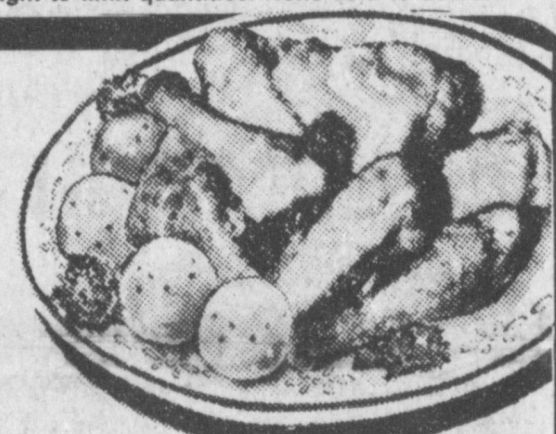

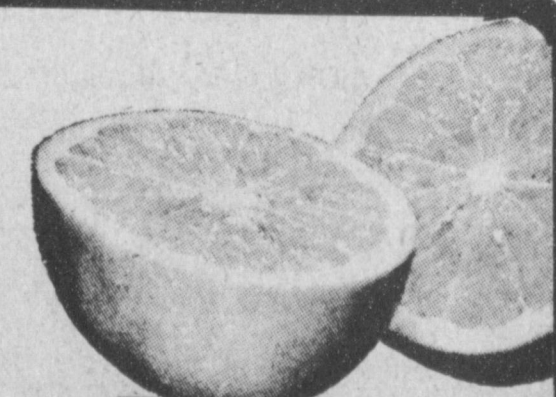
