Men are not stagnant with the passing of time. In the mirror of one man's life there may be reflections of many changes over the passing of his days. It is man changing, however and enacting his change on his world that causes his world to change.

West Texas Farmer: What runs a cotton gin? Average American: Electricity of course!

STF: Wrong! AA: Wrong? But you can't run a gin without electicity or some sort of power.

WTF: There is something else you can't do without. AA: Oh, you mean a press, cleaner, dryer, and all that stuff? or employees? or cotton?

WTF? Or a manager? AA: Oh yeah. A manager.

WTF: What about a manager who's been there for 25 years? Or a man who's been in the ginning business for 44 years?

AA: Yeah! WTF: Now lets try another question. What runs the Muleshoe Co-op Gin? AA: Oh that's easy, Earl **Richards!**




