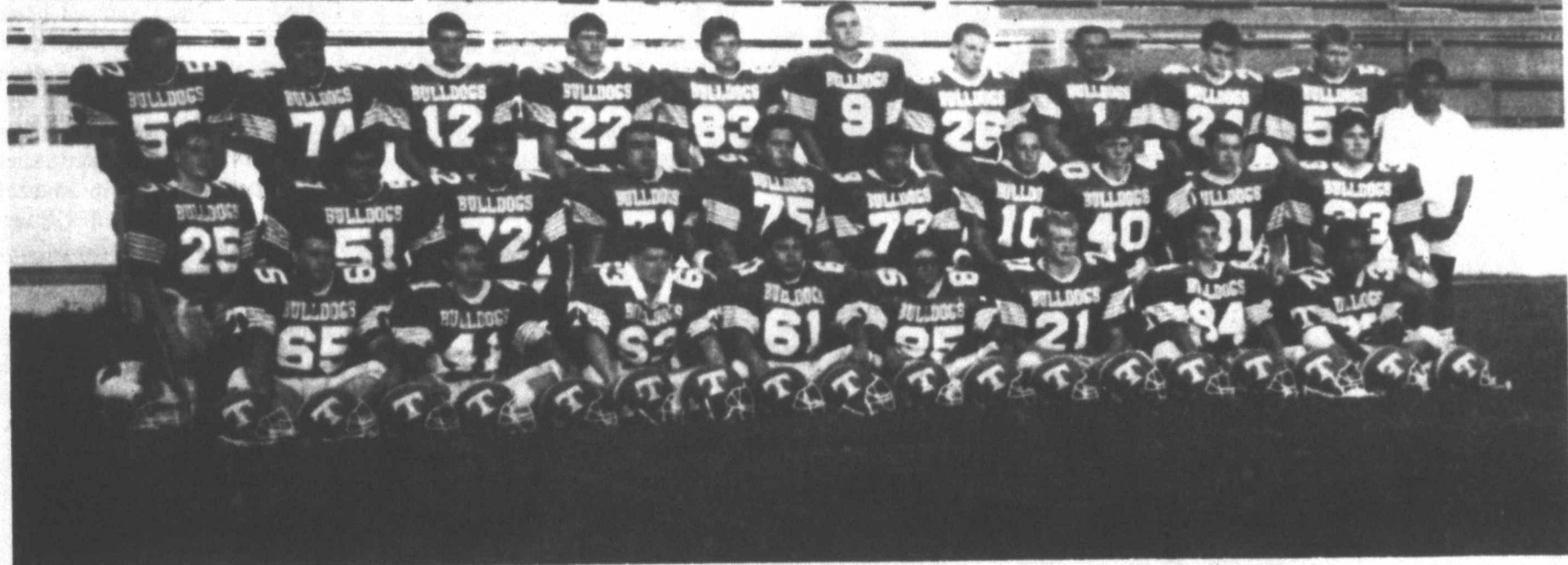

I CAN'T BELIEVE the State of Texas seriously expects to get some revenue out of a new law which requires drug pushers to register and pay taxes to the state, and also requires them to label the cocaine and marijuana and all that other stuff they sell as hazardous to the user, complete with stamp of skull and crossbones.

The annual Lynn County Harvest Festival, scheduled this year for Saturday, Oct. 7, will feature a new event this year: Cow Patty Bingo. Sponsored jointly by the Harvest Festival Committee and the Tahoka High School Junior Class, Cow Patty Bingo will give some lucky ticket-winner 300 pounds of beef. Here's how it works:

The Harvest Festival Committee will mark off squares on a downtown street, and number each square. Members of the THS Junior Class will sell tickets for \$5 per square. A drawing will be held to determine which number square the ticket-holder will receive. On the day of the Harvest Festival, a steer will be released on the marked-off squares, and the steer will "select his own square" to determine the winner.

After expenses, all proceeds from this event will go to the THS Junior Class for their Junior-Senior Prom, according to a representative from the Harvest Festival Committee.

## Two Men Are Charged After Vehicles Taken

Two Tahoka men were named in felony charges of unauthorized use of a motor vehicle in separate incidents investigated by officers during the last week.

David Tillman, 25, of Tahoka was charged after City Manager Barry Pittman reported to Tahoka Police Dept. Friday that a city-owned 1978 Chevrolet pickup apparently had been stolen from the residence of a city employe and later was found

eight miles north of Tahoka on U.S. 87. Witnesses reported seeing two men leaving the pickup about 6:30 a.m.

Domingo Baeza of Wilson reported to Tahoka police on Saturday that his 1976 Ford LTD had been stolen from his residence. Police later arrested Ruben Garza, 41, of Tahoka, and charged him with authorized use of a motor vehicle, plus failure to report an accident that occurred at 1200 Lockwood, where there was damage to the vehicle and to a portable sign at Double Circle Farm Supply.

Police also investigated a disturbance at a local residence where a 26-year-old woman reportedly had been struck on the face and choked by a male acquaintance. No charges were filed.

A 20-year-old O'Donnell man was arrested on a charge of criminal mischief after officers observed him damaging a 1982 Pontiac with a 31-inch pipe in downtown O'Donnell Aug. 26. Damage to the car owned by Michael Cavazos of O'Donnell was estimated at \$1658. The windshield and a mirror were broken and there was damage to a door and other body damage.

C.W. Slone of Wilson told sheriff's officers that welding equipment had been stolen from a farm about 12 miles northeast of Tahoka last Thursday.

In jail during the week were seven persons on various charges related to liquor law violation. Two were for driving while intoxicated, and one each for DWI plus possession of marijuana under two ounces, DWI plus speeding, DWI plus no drivers license plus no insurance plus failure to control speed, application to revoke probation on DWI charge, public intoxication, and one for unauthorized use of a motor vehicle.

He was taken to Lubbock Methodist Hospital for treatment. Extent of his injuries was not known at press time.

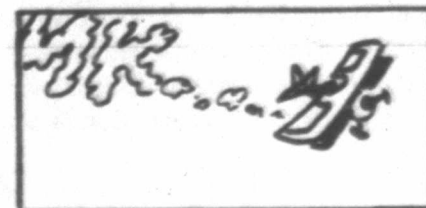

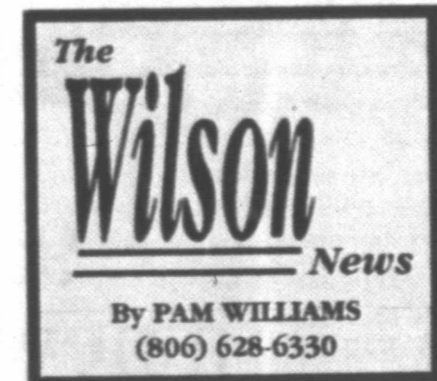

The Texas Agricultural Experiment Station located at Halfway will host its annual Field Day on Tuesday, Sept. 12, from 1 p.m. to 4 p.m. Other agencies at the center and cooperating in the event are the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, High Plains Research Foundation, Texas Forest Service, and the USDA-ARS.

### New Permit For Oversized Loads Offered

Effective Sept. 1, a new annual permit allowing certain vehicles to exceed the maximum allowable weight is being issued by the highway department. The permit was authorized by the last regular session of the Texas Legislature.

The new law applies to vehicles carrying loads that can be "reasonably dismantled." Loads that cannot be broken down into smaller units are covered by current permit classifications.

Weight limits are set to protect Texas roadways from damage due to heavy loads. Permits allow heavier vehicles to travel designated routes upon payment of a fee, which helps cover road repair costs.

The new permit costs \$75 a year and requires a \$15,000 bond. It allows vehicles to exceed the maximum axle weight by up to 10 per cent and the maximum gross weight by five per cent. It applies to trucks operating on state highways, on county roads and bridges, and on other roads designated by the counties. It is not valid on the Interstate system.

This law also allows agricultural commodities, shipped in their natural state, to exceed axle weight by up to 12 per cent and gross weight by 5 per cent without a permit or bond.

Application for the permit will be by mail only. Further information is available at highway district offices and tourist bureaus.

### League of Mercy Serves the Lonely

For many of the residents of nursing homes, retirement villages, hospitals, mental institutions, rehabilitation centers and children's homes, loneliness is a constant companion. The Salvation Army's League of Mercy, in operation since 1905, was organized to alleviate this loneliness, providing a network of volunteers and staff dedicated to bringing Christian love and cheer to those in isolation.

League of Mercy volunteers set up programs such as birthday parties, sing-a-longs, craft workshops and worship services. 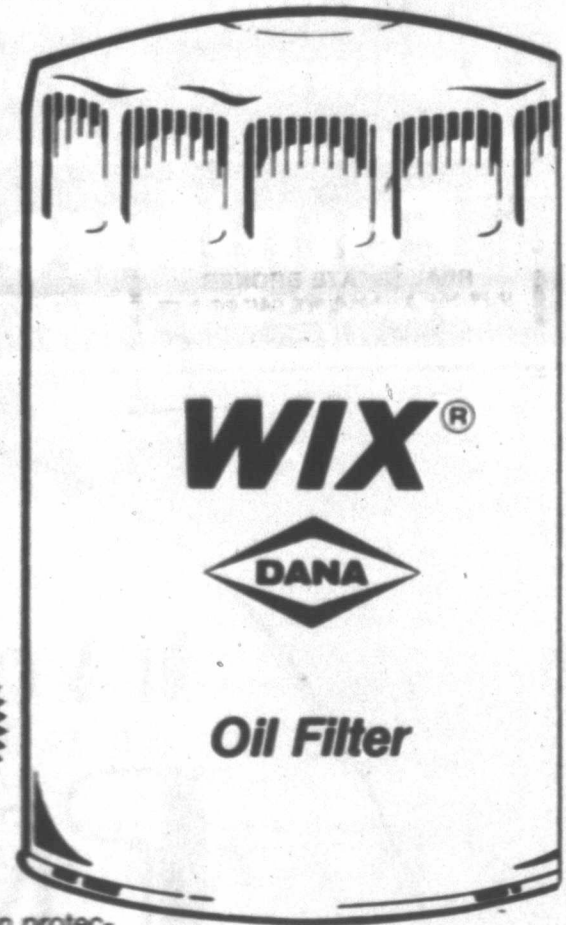
